


Eclipses.

In the year 1852, there will be three Eclipses of the Sun and three of the Moon.
I. A total Eclipse of the Moon, January 6, 1852, visible in Canada. The following table contains the mean time of the principal phases of this Eclipse, at each of the places named:

Magnitude of the Eclipse, (Moon's diameter=1) 1.667 on the northern limb.

The first contact with the shadow occurs at 80° from the northernmost point of the Moon's limb to the east. The last contact at 83° towards the west.

II. A partial Eclipse of the Sun, January 20, 1852, not visible in Canada, being confined to regions surrounding the South Pole.

III. A partial Eclipse of the Sun, June 17, 1852, not visible in Canada, being confined to the Southern portion of South America.

IV. A total Eclipse of the Moon, July 1, 1852, not visible in Canada, being confined to the Eastern Hemisphere.

V. A total Eclipse of the Sun, December 10, 1852, not visible in Canada, being confined to the Continent of Asia and the North Pacific ocean.

VI. A partial Eclipse of the Moon, December 25-26, 1852, not visible in Canada, but visible in the more Western parts of the Hudson's Bay Company's Territory.

Saturn's Ring.—To render Saturn's Ring visible to the earth, it is necessary that the Sun and the Earth, as viewed from the Planet, be elevated on the same side of it, which is the case during the whole of 1852. It will attain its greatest apparent diameter in November=45.8'




Map of Part of

Explanation of the Articles in the Calendar.

THE SUN'S DECLINATION is given for mean noon at Toronto, for every day: the difference for mean noon for any other place in the British Provinces, will rarely amount to one minute.

APPARENT NOON, SHOWING THE EQUATION OF TIME.—This column contains the mean time corresponding to the apparent noon on each day, or the hour which should be shown by a clock or watch at Toronto, when a Sun-dial marks twelve o'clock. Its error at any other place in the British Provinces will rarely amount to one second. The Equation of Time is the difference in time between the real place of the Sun, and its supposed or mean place. The actual interval between the successive arrivals of the Sun on the meridian, or the length of successive solar days, is variable, owing to the difference in the rapidity of the motion of the earth in different parts of its orbit, and in the inclination of the successive parts of the ecliptic to the equator. But as time-keepers cannot be made to measure an interval which varies every day, a clock or watch is made to mark twenty-four hours in the average of all the days. In other words, it is made to keep pace with an imaginary or mean Sun, having a motion exactly equal to the average motion of the real or apparent Sun. Hence, when it is twelve o'clock by the real Sun, it may be before or after twelve by the mean Sun. The true Sun and the mean or imaginary Sun coincide four times in each year, viz., about the 15th of March, the 15th of June, the 1st September, and the 24th December. The difference between them or the Equation of Time, is never more than sixteen minutes. A Sun-dial gives *apparent time*, and must be corrected by applying the Equation of Time before setting a clock or watch by it.

SUN RISING AND SETTING.—The mean time of the Sun rising and setting is given for every day for Toronto and Montreal, and will be found given for every tenth day at Quebec, Halifax, and Fredericton, by referring to the Table at page 17. If the time is wanted for any intermediate day, enter the table of Semi-diurnal Arcs (page 17) with the Sun's declination for that day, the value given, subtracted from, or added to, the mean time of apparent noon, will give the hour of rising or setting. The value as it stands in that Table is the *apparent time* of setting and its complement to 12h, the *apparent time* of rising.

THE MOON'S RISING OR SETTING is given for every day at Montreal and Toronto: the time of rising being when she sets during daylight; and the time of setting when she rises during daylight. The time given for Montreal will never be more than four minutes in error for Halifax, three minutes in error for Fredericton, and five minutes in error for Quebec; and it is, therefore, near enough for ordinary reference at those places.

THE PLANETS.—The hour of meridian passage, right ascension and declination of each of the principal planets, is given for the 1st and 15th of each month. (*in signifies morning*.) To which is added the mean time transit ϕ or the mean time of transit of the first point of Aries, being the mean time corresponding to 6h. 0m. 0s. of Sidereal time, on each of those days. By the aid of this Table the time of the meridian passage of any heavenly body may be readily found. From the right ascension of the body subtract the *retardation*, which is at the rate of 9.56s., for each hour, or 0.16s. for each minute of its RA; add the remainder to the mean time transit ϕ ; the sum, diminished

if necessary by 24h., will be the mean time of the meridian passage of the body in question. For any other day than the 1st or 15th of the month apply a correction at the rate of 3 m. 55.91 s. per day, reckoned from the nearest given day, to be added if for an earlier date, subtracted if for a later.

THE POLE STAR.—For the convenience of land surveyors and others, we this year give a Table in which will be found not only the mean time of the meridian passage of this star for every tenth day of the year, but also the mean time of its greatest elongation from the meridian, upon the parallel of 44½ deg., and its azimuth at that time upon three parallels, namely, 43 deg., 44½ deg., and 46 deg. The middle of these is the parallel which passes through the greatest number of Townships; and the first and third are nearly the limiting parallels of Upper Canada. The object of the Table is to furnish a ready and accurate way of referring a Theodolite or other instrument to the true meridian. Where the time is known with accuracy, this is best done by means of the Pole Star when on the meridian; but as at that time it changes its azimuth at the rate of half a minute of arc to one minute of time,

in these latitudes; when the latter is not known with accuracy, then the Star must be referred to when at its greatest elongation, at which time its azimuth changes so slowly that an error of a few minutes will not be important, and the angle given in the Table must be added to, or subtracted from, the reading, as the case may be. For any other day, or any other latitude than those given, a value can be interpolated. By means of the North Polar distance of the Star, which is added, the same opportunity may be employed for determining the latitude very nearly.

TWILIGHT begins in the morning, when the Sun is about 18 degrees below the horizon, and ends in the evening, when it is eighteen degrees beyond it. The mean time for beginning and ending for every tenth day will be found at page 17, together with the time of the Sun's rising and setting at Quebec, Fredericton and Halifax.

SEMI-DIURNAL ARCS.—This table is useful for determining the times of rising and setting of the heavenly bodies. Enter the table with the declination of the object; under the proper column for the locality will be found half the time which the object remains above the horizon, which is to be subtracted from the time of its meridian passage, if the time of rising is required, or added, for the time of setting.

Example.—Required the time of rising for the Planet Jupiter, at Montreal, June 16th, 1832, Declination of Jupiter 15° deg. S.

 METEOROLOGICAL.—Having in previous almanacs given comparisons of Canadian climates with that of the Southern portion of Great Britain, represented by Greenwich, we this year select for the purpose Makerstown, in Roxburghshire, North Britain, in latitude 55° 35', the Observatory of Sir Thomas Macdougall Brisbane. The particulars are derived from eight years observations 1842-9, except the quantity of rain, which has been recorded for 18 years.

The observations at Fredericton, New Brunswick, were made by Lieut. Col. Page, R. E., to whom we are indebted for them. They embrace about two-and-a-half years, from September 1817 to February 1820, but include a period of six months in the summer of 1818, when the observations were made at St. Johns, N. B. The thermometer was recorded daily, at 5, 6, or 7, A. M., according to the season of the year; at noon, 5 P. M., and 10 P. M.; the mean temperatures here given are reduced to the true mean of the 24th, the largest correction being however only 0° 7'. The data for Quebec are also of old date, being derived from the observations of the Rev. Dr. Sparks, from 1809 to 1818, as reduced by Mr. Justice McCord. (Hall's British American Journal, vol. 1.) Those values which are marked by an asterisk are from another source and refer to the years 1829 to 1822.

The observations at Hamilton, C. W., are those of Dr. Craigie, (16 vols. 3, 4, and 5) and include five years, from 1846 to 1850. Although the mean temperatures are derived from observations at 9 A. M. and 9 P. M., which give a value somewhat below the true mean; they are invariably considerably higher than those of the same months at Toronto. The difference being much more than can be due to the difference in the geographical position of the two localities, may be attributed, probably, to some special circumstance in the position of the instruments.

COUNTY COURTS, U. C.—Presided over by a resident Judge in each county. The jurisdiction of the court extends to all causes relating to debt, covenant or contract, to the amount of £50; and in causes of debt or contract, where the amount is ascertained by the signature of the defendant, to £100; and also in all matters of tort relating to personal chattels, where the damages shall not exceed £20, and where the title to land shall not be brought in question. The plaintiff at his option may bring these suits in the courts of Queen's Bench or Common Pleas, but County Court costs will only be allowed. (See table of Judges and other Judicial Officers of Counties page 24.)

INSOLVENT DEBTORS' COURT, U. C.—The County Judge in each County presides in this court for the relief of Insolvent Debtors.

QUARTER SESSIONS, U. C.—Chairman—the County Judge in each County, who with one or more Justices of the Peace, holds a Court of Quarter Session in his county four times a year, for trials by Jury in cases of larceny, misdemeanor and other minor offences. *Sittings*—first Tuesday in January, April, and July, and third Tuesday in November, with power of adjournment.

DIVISION COURTS, U. C.—For the summary disposal of cases by the County Judges. In certain cases juries are granted. Courts are held once in two months in each division, or oftener, at the discretion of the judge. The divisions are established by the Courts of Quarter Sessions. The jurisdiction of the Court extends to cases of debt or account, or breach of contract or covenant, or money demand, whether payable in money or otherwise, where the amount or balance claimed does not exceed £25, and all torts to personal chattels to the amount of £10. A plaintiff may not divide his claim, so as to bring it by more than one suit within the jurisdiction of the court, but he may abandon the excess, provided the amount in dispute does not exceed £50, and thus sue for the restric-

ed amount of £25. Suits to be tried in the Division where the defendant resides, or the debt, &c., was contracted. Servants under age may sue for wages in this court. Judgments recoverable against goods and chattels. In certain cases, where judgment exceeds £10, it will affect lands. Attachments may issue against the goods and chattels of absconding or concealed debtors, going from one county to another in Upper Canada, or to Lower Canada, or leaving the Province, for any sum not exceeding £25, nor less than 2s.

From half-past two to half-past four o'clock is set apart every Friday afternoon for the separate religious instruction of the Students by the Pastors of their respective persuasions. Number of Teachers trained in the Provincial Normal School during the first Session, ending 15th April, 1843, 63 males; ditto, during second Session, ending 15th October, 1843, 191 males, 24 females—total 225; ditto, during the third Session, ending 15th April, 1846, 76 males, 32 females—total 108; ditto, during the fourth Session, ending 15th October, 1849, 99 males, 21 females—total 111; ditto, during the fifth Session, ending the 15th April, 1850, 92 males, 43 females—total 135; ditto, during the sixth Session, ending 30th May, 1851, 54 males, 25 females—total 76. The Sessions are half yearly, commencing 15th of May and 15th of November, and continuing for a period of five months each—concluded by a public Examination, and followed by a vacation of one month. Students not admitted after the first week of Session. We learn from an address of the Chief Superintendent of Schools for Upper Canada, in 1851, that the principles on which the Normal School is established and conducted, form the basis of the system of public elementary instruction for Upper Canada. It recognizes Christianity as an essential part of education, and unites the clergy with their people in providing for and imparting it. The people of Upper Canada have, during the last year, paid, by self-imposed taxation, for the support of teachers alone, under this system, the sum of £89,526, besides £14,189 for the erection of school houses. There are 3039 schools, attended by 151,891 children. The new Normal School is erected by a public grant of £15,000—an enlightened liberality on the part of our Legislature, in advance of any other on the American continent. The Normal School is designed to accommodate 200 teachers in training, and 600 pupils in the Model School, attached to it. It also affords accommodation for the offices of the department of Public Instruction; a depository for maps, apparatus, &c., library and museum; and rooms for a school of art and design. The lands attached are also set apart for botanical garden, experimental farm, and grounds for gymnastic exercises. The premises will be ready for occupancy in the Spring of 1852.

An Act has been passed by the Legislature to establish a Normal School in Lower Canada. From the report of the Superintendent of Education, we learn that, for the first six months of 1850, there were in operation in Lower Canada, 1879 schools; that the number of children attending these was 73,351; and that the amount paid from the Parliamentary Grant towards their support was £12,893. We have no returns for the second six months of the year. The total amount paid for building and repairing school houses in Lower Canada, from 1842 to 1850, inclusively, was £52,921; and the entire sum paid in Lower Canada, during the same period, for the support of Teachers and the building and repair of School houses was £249,530.

THE MONTREAL EYE AND EAR INSTITUTION.—This valuable Institution is also open to students; and is under the care and management of Mr. Howard, Oculist and Aurist. Established six years ago. The annual average of patients treated falls not far short of 1000, and the daily attendance about 20 or 30. Its success is entirely due to Mr. Howard's philanthropic exertions, and it has been conducted to a very considerable extent, at his own individual expense. This Institution presents to the student as fine a field for the study of Ophthalmic and Aurist diseases as is to be met with on this Continent.

THE MONTREAL GENERAL HOSPITAL.—This fine Hospital, supported by voluntary contributions, and a Legislative grant of £1000, is open to all students under certain restrictions. Since the erection of the Richardson and Reid wings, it can accommodate with facility 300 patients, although the daily average, has not, within the last two years, exceeded 50. Both Medical and Surgical cases are admitted into the wards, and a fine field of study is thus presented to the diligent student. Post mortem examinations are a rule of the Hospital, at the discretion and in presence of the attending Physician. The staff is composed as follows:—Consulting Physicians—A. F. Holmes, M.D., O. T. Bruneau, M.D., and A. Hall, M.D. Attending Physicians—Drs. Campbell, Crawford, Arnolli, David, Fraser, Sutherland, Scott, and Sewell.

THE HOTEL DIEU HOSPITAL, is under the control of the Sisters of the Congregational Nunnery, aided. It can accommodate about 100 patients at the utmost, and the average daily number, we believe, to be about 30 or 40. Its Medical staff is composed of Dr. Munro, and two or three other medical gentlemen, connected with the School of Medicine of Montreal.

Secretary, P. M. Bardy. A six months course of lectures is delivered at this school, commencing the first week of November, and terminating the last week of April.

THE MARINE HOSPITAL, QUEBEC, for the reception of Sailors and Emigrants. The largest Hospital in Canada. Under the supervision of a Board of Commissioners appointed by the Government, with a staff of 8 Physicians and Surgeons—can accommodate 250 patients.

THE FRENCH HOSPITAL OR HOTEL DIEU OF QUEBEC, for the reception of citizens, and superintended by the Sisters of Charity. Attended by six Physicians—all donations admitted if citizens, and accidents at all times.

PROVINCIAL LUNATIC ASYLUM, TORONTO.—Two and a half miles West from the City Hall, on Queen Street, conducted by a Board of twelve Directors, who meet monthly or oftener as may be needed, viz.: Chairman, The Hon. C. Widmer, M. D.; Revs. H. J. Gracet, J. Roof and J. Carroll; J. G. Chewett, M. J. O'Leirne, J. Beaty, W. McMaster, W. Mathers, D. Patterson, Geo. Gurnett, and Captain Eccles. Officers of the Institution—Superintendent, John Scott, M. D.; Clerk, Storekeeper and Treasurer, James McKirdy; Steward, Thomas Toimie; Matron, Ann Toimie. The building is designed to contain 250 patients, but 300 may be accommodated in it. There are at present within it about 270 patients. The Institution is open to the public on an order of a Director, or that of the Medical Superintendent, between the hours of 12, Noon, and 3, P. M., every day, Saturdays and Sundays excepted. The admission of patients is regulated by an Act of the Provincial Legislature, 2nd Victoria, Chapter II, which requires that the patient be examined by three licensed Medical Practitioners, collectively, who certify to the insanity; also, that the patient is a subject of Her Majesty, and a resident of

the Province. Forms of the above may be had at the offices of all the Clerks of the Peace throughout the Province, or by application at the Asylum. It is required that patients or their friends having the means, will contribute towards their support, while in the Institution. The Board require the parties presenting any destitute or pauper Lunatic, to obtain the certificate of a Clergyman and Magistrate in the neighbourhood of the residence of the patient, that such Lunatic, or his friends, have not the means of paying the expenses to be incurred for his maintenance and support, see 2nd Victoria, Chapter XI, section 8. Idiots and persons afflicted with Paralysis, are inadmissible into the Institution.

THE BEAUPORT LUNATIC ASYLUM.—About two miles from Quebec, capable of accommodating upwards of 300 patients. This building was erected at the sole expense of Drs. Morin, Douglas, and Fremont,—the three Physicians who have had, for some years past, the contract from Government for the management and treatment of Lunatics in Canada East.

HOUSE OF INDUSTRY, TORONTO.—Incorporated 1851.—To support the aged and decrepid, discharged patients from General Hospital, Orphans and deserted children. There are fifteen Trustees and twenty-five Managers. Treasurer; E. H. Rutherford; Secretary, W. M. Westminster. Medical Officers, Drs. Holder, Badgley and Bovell. Superintendents, Mr. and Mrs. Perry.

This Institution was established in 1834, as the Upper Canada Penitentiary, but at the Union it was made applicable to the whole province. No prisoner is received for a shorter term than two years. The system of discipline is that known as the silent or congregate. The convicts are kept at hard labour for the benefit of the Crown during daylight, their services being leased to contractors, who teach them useful occupations. The buildings have been chiefly erected by convict labour, under the superintendence of the officers, but they are not yet complete. The draft on the public exchequer for maintaining the prison for 1843, 1847, and 1848, averaged over £16,000 per annum. For 1849, it was £10,500, for 1850, £7,500, and for 1851, the estimate was only £4,900. An Act was passed in August, 1851, to come in force on the 1st October following, (14 and 15 Vic., Cap. II.) "for the better management of the Penitentiary," but nothing was of course done under it, when this summary was written—(September, 1851.)

POST OFFICE REGULATIONS.

STIPULATIONS INTRODUCED INTO CONTRACTS FOR CONVEYING THE MAILS.

The Route to be pursued to be the ordinary stage road. The Mail to be conveyed in the manner particularly agreed to. The rate of travel, including stoppages for changing the Mails, at the different Post Offices, and for all other purposes, to be fixed. The hours of arrival and departure (subject to the right of the Post-Master General to alter them should he deem it advisable) to be specified. The Contractor to be subject to a fine for failing to deliver the Mail within the appointed time. The Route to be divided into stages for changing horses. If it be shown that the division is not practicable, from the want of convenient stations, no stage to exceed — miles. Two teams to be regularly and constantly employed for the working of each stage. Five minutes only to be allowed for changing the mail at each Way Post Office. The carriages employed to be subject to the approval of the Post Master General. The contractor to use every care to defend the mail bags and their contents from injury and dangers of every kind. The Post Master General, Inspector, or a mail conductor or guard to be allowed to travel each trip, free of charge. Each courier employed in the service to take the Post Office oath, and to be provided with a post horn, which is to be sounded distinctly on approaching and leaving a Post Office. The contractor to provide two responsible parties as his sureties, to be bound with him in the sum of £ for the due and faithful performance of the service. The contractor will not be permitted to sub-let his contract without special permission from the Post Office department. The contract to continue until three months notice is given on either side of a wish to terminate the agreement; reserving the right to the department to break the contract without previous notice, should the contractor fail at any time to fulfil his engagement. Payment for the service to be made to the contractor quarterly, within 20 days after the 5th January, 5th April, 5th July, and 5th October, all Fines which the contractor may have incurred being, however deducted from the payment for the quarter in which they may be imposed.

PROVINCIAL NEWSPAPER POSTAGE.

Newspapers not exceeding two ounces in weight $\frac{1}{2}$ currency; exceeding two ounces, 1d currency per ounce. [Except Provincial Newspapers addressed to the United Kingdom, and British Newspapers addressed to the Colonies, which are not limited as to weight.] Prepayment optional, through Canada only: those for the adjoining Provinces must be pre-paid. [N.B.—Newspapers pass free in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.] One copy of each newspaper published in Canada may be sent free to the publisher of any other newspaper in the Provinces. Newspapers published in Canada may be sent from the office of publication, to publishers and subscribers in the United States, free to the Province Line, when sent by others, the postage to the Line must be prepaid $\frac{1}{2}$ each.

Postmasters in Canada are required to return undelivered or refused papers to the publishers, stamping them with the Post Office Stamp, and marking the reason upon them—“refused,” “not called for,” “removed,” or “dead,” as the case may be, viz: a *copy* when undelivered for two weeks; a *copy or two weekly*, for three weeks; a *copy*, for one month; and a *monthly periodical* for two months.

Letters addressed to any part of Canada, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, or Prince Edward's Island, to be rated with the uniform rate of 3d. per half ounce; prepayment optional. Postage stamps or money may be used in pre-payment of letters. No franking privilege is allowed, except with regard to letters and packets on the business of the Post Office, addressed to, or transmitted by, the Post Master General.

PROVINCIAL SCALE OF RATING PRINTED BOOKS, CIRCULARS, &c., WITHIN THE BRITISH NORTH AMERICAN PROVINCES.

Upon each printed circular, price current or handbill, and other printed matter of a like description, when unconnected with any manuscript or written communication, of no greater weight than one ounce, there shall be charged 1d.; and for each additional ounce or fraction of an ounce, 1d. additional.

Upon each periodical or magazine, pamphlet or book, bound or unbound, there shall be charged a rate of one half-penny per ounce.

Pre-payment of the foregoing rates will be optional. Publishers in Canada of periodicals and magazines will be allowed to interchange their publications free of postage, provided that such interchange be confined to one single copy of each publication.

Circulars and other printed papers must be sent unsealed, and pamphlets, periodicals, magazines, books, &c., must be put up in covers open at the ends or sides to pass at the above rates; and if these regulations are not strictly complied with or if any such printed paper, pamphlet, periodical, magazine or book, be found to contain any writing other than the address, the said printed paper, pamphlet, &c., is to be rated with letter postage.

No book or packet of periodicals, magazines, &c., can be forwarded through the post if exceeding the weight of 48 ounces.

Printed votes and proceedings of the Legislatures, 1d per 4 ounce weight. (The extreme weight allowed to be mailed is six pounds.)

LETTERS, &c., FOR NEWFOUNDLAND AND THE WEST INDIES.

Mails made up at Quebec upon Newfoundland, containing letters &c., for that Island, and upon Bermuda for the West Indies and Gulf of Mexico, will be forwarded to Halifax, for transmission thence by Mail packet, to Newfoundland and Bermuda respectively,—at the latter Island, the West India Mail will fall into the regular line of West India Royal Mail Steamers. The postage charge upon letters for the above places will be the ordinary Provincial rate of 3d. currency, per

half ounce, which must in all cases be prepaid, and in addition, the packet rates specified in the accompanying tables, of which in some cases the pre-payment will be optional.

On newspapers, either for Newfoundland or West Indies, the ordinary Provincial rate must be prepaid, and when addressed to certain Foreign places mentioned in the Table of Rates—a packet charge in addition.

LETTERS, &c., FOR THE UNITED STATES. Letters posted at any office in Canada, addressed to any place in the United States, except California and Oregon, are to be rated with a uniform rate of sixpence, currency, per half-ounce.

Letters posted in any part of the United States, except California and Oregon, addressed to Canada, will be rated there with a uniform charge of ten cents, equal to sixpence currency, per half-ounce.

The Postage Rate on Letters passing between Canada and California and Oregon, will be a uniform charge of nine-pence currency, equal to fifteen cents per half-ounce.

Pre-payment of the above, in all cases, optional. The Canada Postage Stamps, when used, will be taken in the United States as evidence of pre-payment of postage on letters going from Canada to the United States, and in like manner the United States Postage Stamps on Letters coming into Canada, are to be taken by Post Masters in this Province as evidence of pre-payment having been made in the United States.

Newspapers, Pamphlets, &c., posted in Canada, addressed to the United States, including California and Oregon, must be pre-paid to the lines, the same rates as if addressed to places within the Province, otherwise they cannot be forwarded. The United States postage on these, will be collected on delivery.

United States Newspapers, Pamphlets, &c., mailed in the United States for Canada, must be pre-paid to the lines.—The Canada postage to be collected on delivery.

Newspapers posted by Publishers in this Province, addressed to Publishers or Subscribers in the United States, including California and Oregon, are to be forwarded through the Post in Canada, free of charge to the Province Line.

One copy of each United States Newspaper addressed to the Publisher or Editor of a Newspaper in this Province, is to be delivered to the said Publisher or Editor free of any Canada charge for conveyance from the Province Line.

Printed Documents coming from the United States, addressed to the Publisher or Editor of a Newspaper in this Province, are to be delivered to the said Publisher or Editor free of any Canada charge—such Documents must be without covers, or in covers open at the ends or sides.

There is an exchange of mails between the United States and Canada at the following points, viz :

Letters and newspapers intended to be sent by these mails should be addressed "via Quebec."

Letters for the British West Indies may also be forwarded from Canada via the United States, upon the pre-payment of 15 cents=3d. cy., per half ounce. Newspapers must be pre-paid 3 cents=2d. cy. each.

Letters for the Foreign West Indies and Mexico may be sent via the United States upon the pre-payment of 49 cents=2s. cy. per ½ ounce. Newspapers for those places must be prepaid 5 cents=3d cy. each. Letters and Newspapers intended to be sent by way of the States must be prepaid at the above rates, and addressed "via the United States."

N. B.—Negotiations are going on to arrange for the despatch of closed Mails for the Eastern Provinces, Newfoundland and the West Indies, through the United States to Boston, and thence by the British steamers to Halifax.

The Mails exchanged between the offices of New York Albany, Buffalo and Boston, on the one side, and Toronto, Kingston and Montreal on the other, pass each way as through mails, not to be opened at any intermediate Frontier Office.

The Offices designated for the despatch and receipt of Canada Mails on the side of the United States will stamp "U. States" upon all letters sent into Canada for delivery; and the Offices designated for the despatch and receipt of United States Mails on the side of Canada will stamp "Canada" upon all letters sent into the United States for delivery.

The Post Office Departments of the United States and Canada shall each return to the other all Dead Letters unopened and without charge every three months, or oftener as may best suit the general regulations of each Department.

The expense of transporting the Mails between the Frontier Exchange Offices, where the conveyance is by water, shall be borne equally by the two departments; but where the transportation is by land, the expense shall be borne by each in proportion to the distance travelled over the territory of each country. All contracts for such transportation shall, before they go into operation, be approved by the Post Office Department of each Country.

Ashes, Pot and Pearl, and Soda; Cotton Wool; Anatomical Preparations; Philosophical Instruments and Apparatus; Printed Books, (not foreign reprints of British Copyright Works), Maps, Buses and Cases of Marble, Bronze, Alabaster, or Plaster of Paris; Paintings, Drawings, Engravings, Etchings, and Lithographs; Cabinets of Coins, Medals, or Gems, and other collections of Antiquities; specimens of Natural History, Mineralogy or Botany; Trees, Shrubs, Bulbs and Roots; Wheat and Indian Corn; Animals specially imported for the improvement of Stock.

Models of Machinery and other inventions and improvements in the Arts.
 Coin and Bullion.
 Manufactures of all kinds.

Arms, Clothing, Cattle, Provisions and Stores of every description, which any Commissary or Commissaries Contractor or Contractors shall import or bring, or which may be imported or brought by the Principal or other Officer or Officers of Her Majesty's Ordnance into the Province for the use of Her Majesty's Army or Navy, or for the use of the Indian Nations in this Province, provided the duty otherwise payable thereon would be defrayed or borne by the Treasury of the United Kingdom or of this Province.

Horses and Carriages of travellers; and Horses, Cattle and Carriages and other vehicles when employed in

carrying Merchandise, together with the necessary harness, and tackle, so long as the same shall be bona fide in use for that purpose, except the Horses, Cattle, Carriages, Vehicles, and Harness of persons hawking Goods, Wares and Merchandise through the Province for the purpose of retailing the same, and the Horses, Cattle, Carriages and Harness of any Circus or Equestrian Troop for exhibition; the Horses, Cattle, Carriages and Harness of any Menagerie to be free.

Donations of clothing specially imported for the use of or to be distributed gratuitously by any charitable society in this Province.

Seeds of all kinds, Farming Utensils and Implements of Husbandry, when specially imported in good faith by any Society incorporated or established for the encouragement of Agriculture.

The following articles in the occupation or employment of persons coming into the Province for the purpose of actually settling therein, viz:

Wearing apparel in actual use, and other personal effects not merchandise; horses and cattle; implements and tools of trade of handicraftsmen.

The personal household effects, not merchandise, of inhabitants of this Province, being subjects of her Majesty and dying abroad.

And the following articles when imported directly from the United Kingdom, or from any British North American Province, and being the growth, produce or manufacture of the said United Kingdom, or of such Province, respectively, viz:

Animals, beef, pork, mutton, bread, butter, cocoa paste, corn or grain of all kinds, flour, fish fresh or salted, dried or pickled, fish oil, furs or skins the produce of fish or creatures living in the sea; gypsum, bones, meat, poultry, plants, shrubs and trees, potatoes and vegetables of all kinds, seeds of all kinds, skins, pelts, furs or tails un-dressed, wood, viz: boards, planks, staves, timber and firewood.

TABLE OF PROHIBITIONS.

The following articles are prohibited to be imported, under a penalty of Fifty pounds, together with the forfeiture of the parcel or package of goods in which the same may be found:

ABSTRACTS OF ACTS.

Currency of Canada.

The Acts of the Provincial Parliament affixing a legal value to coins passing current in this Province, are 4 and 5 *Vic. Cap. 93*; 13 and 14 *Vic. Cap. 9*; and 14 and 15 *Vic. Cap. 47* and 49. These values are,—

The Acts specify the weights and fineness of the several coins, and assign proportionate values to the multiples or divisions of the British Sovereign and U. S. Eagle respectively. Specific values, by weight, are also assigned to the gold coins of other countries, according to their intrinsic fineness. British silver coins, and the subdivisions of dollars less than halves, are only a legal tender to the amount of £2 10s. currency, and copper coins to the amount of 1s. The other coins enumerated in the act, and partly quoted above, are a legal tender at their respective rates, to any amount,—the British Sovereign only when of full weight,—*vide 4 and 5 Vic. Cap. 93, Sec. 2.*

The Act 13 and 14 *Vic. Cap. 9*, fixing the reduced rates for the quarter, eighth, and sixteenth of the dollar, other than those of the United States, has been objected to by the Lords of the Treasury, and may yet be disallowed.

The Act 14 and 15 *Vic. Cap. 47*, does not take effect until proclaimed by the Governor. When it comes in force the dollar shall then pass only for 5s., and the half dollar for 2s. 6d. That Act authorizes the introduction of a decimal currency, and the keeping of accounts in dollars and cents, instead of the present system of £ s. d. It also authorizes a Provincial Decimal Coinage to be struck.

Municipal Corporations, U. C.

Act 12 *Vic. Cap. 81*, "the Upper Canada Municipal Corporations Act of 1819," 13 and 14 *Vic. Cap. 64*, "the Upper Canada Municipal Corporations' Law Amendment Act of 1830," and 14 and 15 *Vic. Cap. 100*, "the Upper Canada Municipal Corporations' Law Amendment Act of 1851." The Municipalities under these Acts, have discretionary powers of taxation for promoting public improvement within their respective circuits. There are 1st Township Municipalities; 2nd County Municipalities; 3rd, Police Villages; 4th, Incorporated Villages; 5th, Incorporated Towns; and 6th, Incorporated Cities. The qualifications of Electors and Candidates are fixed by the Acts, and ascertained from the Collectors' Rolls of the previous year.

MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS.

The Elections take place in each Municipality on the *first Monday* in January, for the choice in,—

Townships or Unions of Townships, of five Councillors for each. When divided into Rural Wards, one Councillor is chosen for each of the five Wards in the Township or Union :

Incorporated Villages of five Councillors for each :

Towns, of three Councillors for each Ward :

Cities, of two Aldermen and two Councillors for each Ward.

In Police Villages the Elections take place on the *second Monday* in January, for the choice of three Police Trustees.

QUALIFICATIONS OF MUNICIPAL VOTERS.

The qualifications of Voters are, fir—

Townships, freeholders and householders of the Township or Ward, entered on the roll, for rateable real property, in their own right or that of their wives, as proprietors or tenants, and resident at the time in the Township or Ward :

Police Villages, same as for Townships :
Incorporated Villages, freeholders and householders of the Village, entered on the Roll, for rateable real property, in their own names or that of their wives, as proprietors or tenants, to the amount of £3 per annum or upwards, and resident at the time in the Village. The property qualification of Village voters may be partly freehold and partly leasehold :

Towns, freeholders and householders of each Ward, entered on the roll for rateable real property, held in their own names or that of their wives, as proprietors or tenants, to the amount of £5 per annum or upwards, and resident at the time in the Ward. The property qualification of Town voters may consist partly of freehold and partly of leasehold :

Cities, freeholders and householders of the Ward, entered on the roll, for rateable real property, held in their own names or that of their wives, as proprietors or tenants, to the amount of £8 per annum or upwards, and resident at the time in the Ward or its liberties :

Counties, the several Township, Village, and Town Councils, in each County, choose their Reeves, and Deputy Reeves where the population admits of it, and these form the County Council.

QUALIFICATIONS OF MUNICIPAL COUNCILLORS, &c.

The qualifications are as follows :—

Township Councillor must be a freeholder or householder of the Township or Ward, seized or possessed of real property, in his own right, or that of his wife, as proprietor or tenant, rated on the Roll, in case of a freeholder, for £100, or upwards; and in case of a householder, for £300, or upwards :

Police Trustee, must be entered on the Village Roll, for rateable property, in his own right or that of his wife, as proprietor or tenant, for £100 :

Village Councillor, must be a freeholder or householder of the Village, seized or possessed of real property, in his own right or that of his wife, as proprietor or tenant, rated on the roll, in case of a freeholder, for £10 per annum, or upwards; and in case of a householder, for £20 per annum, or upwards. The property qualification of Village Councillors, may be partly freehold and partly leasehold :

Town Councillor, must be a freeholder or householder of the Town, seized or possessed of real property, in his own right or that of his wife, as proprietor or tenant, rated on the rolls of the Town, in case of a freeholder, to the amount of £20 per annum, or upwards, and in case of a householder, to the amount of £40 per annum, or upwards. The property qualification of Town Councillors may be partly freehold and partly leasehold :

City Alderman, must be a freeholder or householder of the City, seized or possessed of real property, in his own right or that of his wife, as proprietor or tenant, rated on the Roll of the City, in case of a freeholder, to the amount of £40 per annum, or upwards, and in case of a householder, to the amount of £80 per annum, or upwards :

City Councillor, must be a freeholder or householder of the City, seized or possessed of real property, in his own right or that of his wife, as proprietor or tenant, rated on the Rolls of the City, in case of a freeholder, to the amount of £20 per annum, or upwards, and in the case of a householder, to the amount of £10 per annum, or upwards :

A special qualification is attached to Aldermen and Councillors generally, that each must be seized or possessed, to his own use or that of his wife, of the real property for which he shall be assessed, either in fee or freehold, or for a term of one year or upwards, situate within the Village, or Town, or City or the Liberties thereof, for which they may be the candidates respectively.

FIRST MEETINGS OF MUNICIPALITIES.

Township Councils, on the second Monday next after the Elections. To choose from among the Councillors a Town Reeve; and where there are 500 resident freeholders and householders on the Collectors' Roll of the Township, a Deputy Town Reeve for the year.

County Council, (composed of the Reeves and Deputy Reeves of Townships, Towns and Villages in each County,) on the fourth Monday in January. To choose from among the Councillors, a County Warden, for the year.

Police Village Trustees, within a reasonable time after the Election, to choose an Inspecting Trustee, from among the Trustees :

Village Council, on the second Monday next after the Election, to choose from among the Council a Town Reeve, and in certain cases a Deputy Town Reeve, same as in Townships :

Town Council, on the second Monday next after the Election, to choose from among the Councillors, a Mayor, for the year; also a Town Reeve and where the numbers on the roll admit of it, a Deputy Town Reeve, same as in Townships and Villages :

City Council, on the second Monday next after the Election, to choose from among the Aldermen, a Mayor for the year.

[For the Corporations Acts in detail, and all Legislative measures relating to Municipalities in Upper Canada, see Scobie's Municipal Manual, latest edition.]

INSPECTORS OF PUBLIC HOUSES.

The Act 13 and 14 Vic., Cap. 65, "to amend the laws relating to Tavern Licenses, in Upper Canada." Sec. 5, provides, that at the annual election of Councillors, in Upper Canada, on the first Monday in January, there shall be elected by the same electors, in each Township not divided into Wards, or Incorporated Village, three Inspectors of Houses of Public Entertainment—and in each Ward of any Township divided into Wards, or of any Town or City, one such Inspector. These Inspectors are to be subject to the By-Laws of the Municipality. [For their duties in detail, see the Municipal Manual, latest edition. An Act was passed in 1851, viz.: 14 and 15 Vic., Cap. 120, "to explain and amend the Act of the last Session, intitled, an Act to amend the laws relating to Tavern Licenses in Upper Canada."]

ELECTION OF SCHOOL TRUSTEES.

Under the School Act, 13 and 14 Vic., Cap. 42, the annual meetings for the election of School Trustees, are appointed to be held, in all the Villages, Towns, Cities, and Townships of Upper Canada, on the second Wednesday in January—for the election,

In School Sections or Divisions of Townships, of one Trustee in each, in place of the one who retires. Each School Section has a Board of three Trustees, one of whom retires annually :

In Cities and Towns, of one School Trustee, for each Ward, in place of the one who retires. Each City and Town has a Board of School Trustees, composed of two for each Ward, one from each ward retires annually :

In Incorporated Villages, two School Trustees, in each, in place of the two who retire. Each Incorporated Village, has a Board of six School Trustees, two of whom retire annually. [For the School Laws in detail, see the Municipal Manual, latest edition.] An Act was passed last Session of Parliament, having reference to the School Law, viz.: 14 and 15 Vic., Cap. 111, entitled, "An Act to define and restore certain rights, to parties therein mentioned."

SELECTORS OF JURORS.

Under the Acts 13 and 14 Vic., Cap. 55, commonly called the Upper Canada Jurors' Act of 1850, and 14 and 15 Vic., Cap. 112, to amend the same, Mayors, Town-reeves, Clerks and Assessors, in their respective Municipalities, are *ex officio* Selectors of Jurors. They are required to assemble annually, on 1st September, for the purpose of selecting from their several Assessment rolls for the year, the names of persons qualified to serve as Jurors, between the ages of 21 and 60. The qualifications of Jurors and exemptions from serving, are specified in the Acts. The number of Jurors selected must be equal to two-thirds of the whole number of names on the Assessment Roll, provided there be that number qualified by law to

serve. These are to be distributed into four divisions, viz.: Grand Jurors of the Superior Courts, and Grand Jurors of the Inferior Courts; Petit Jurors of the Superior Courts, and Petit Jurors of the Inferior Courts. The distribution to be in the following proportions, viz.: one-fifth under the first division, two-fifths under the second, four-fifths under the third, and eight-fifths under the fourth. The Selectors are to make their reports in duplicate, one copy of which to be deposited on or before the 15th September with the Clerk of the Peace for the County, and the other with the Clerk of the Municipality. The Clerks of the Peace are then to prepare from these Rolls, Jurors' Books for their several Counties, according to forms set down in the Statute. These to be done between the 15th September and 31st October, and to be handed to the Chairman of Quarter Sessions, in Court, the first Court thereafter, and sworn to. Jury lists are then to be balloted for from these Rolls. On or before the 31st December, the several Clerks of the Peace are to deposit a correct copy of their respective Jurors' Books with the Clerk of the Crown and Pleas of the Queen's Bench, at Toronto, and another with his Deputy in the County. [Books and forms, for all purposes, under the Act, are supplied by the Publisher of this Almanac, at Toronto.]

PAYMENT OF JURORS.

The Act 14 and 15 Vic., Cap. 11, makes provision for the payment of Petit Jurors in Upper Canada. It also authorizes County Councils, in their discretion, to make provision for the payment of Grand Jurors.

Assessment Law, Upper Canada.

The Acts regulating the assessments by Municipalities, for taxation for local purposes, in Upper Canada, are 13 and 14 Vic. Cap. 67, and 14 and 15 Vic. Cap. 110, the former denominated, "the Upper Canada Assessment Act of 1850," and the latter, "the Upper Canada Assessment Law Amending Act of 1851." The property liable to taxation for local purposes, comprises all lands, including all buildings and other things erected upon or affixed to the same: all machinery so fixed in any building or real property, as to form in law part of the realty: all trees and underwood growing upon the lands; and all mines, minerals, quarries, and fossils, in and under the same, except mines belonging to Her Majesty. The occupant of any land belonging to Her Majesty shall be liable to taxation, for the land so occupied, but not the land itself. The personal property liable to taxation, embraces only,—all horses of three years old and upwards: all Neat cattle of three years old and upwards; pleasure carriages of all descriptions, and also all carriages kept for hire: The average Stock of Goods on hand of every Merchant, Trader or Dealer, Manufacturer, Tradesman or Mechanic; such average stock to be considered to be the mean between the highest and the lowest amount of goods on hand at any time during the year, which shall include all materials intended to be used by him in the manufacture of any goods, in whatever state such materials may be, as well as the manufactured goods themselves, whether in a complete or incomplete state; and every person, partnership, company or body corporate, shall be assessed for his, her or their average stock of goods, in the place where such stock of goods is kept, or if it be kept partly in one place and partly in another, then in each such place, for the average stock there, although such person, or any member of such partnership, company, or body corporate shall reside elsewhere; but no person assessed for such stock or any part thereof, for a greater amount than his income, shall be liable to be taxed upon his income in the same or any other place; the amount of all Stocks or Shares in Steamers, Schooners, or other water craft employed in the conveyance of freight or passengers, and owned within the Municipality: No person deriving income from any trade, calling, office (including all pensions payable out of the public moneys of this Province) or profession, exceeding the amount of £30, per annum, shall be assessed for a less sum, as the amount of his net taxable personal property, than the amount derived from such income, during the year then last past, but such last year's income shall be held to be his net taxable personal property, unless he has other taxable personal property to an equal or greater amount: Every person liable to be assessed upon his income, shall be so assessed in the municipality where he resides, al-

though the place at which he exercises the trade, calling, office or profession, from which such income is derived, may be within some other municipality. The income of a farmer derived from his farm, or the full or half pay of any one in any of Her Majesty's Naval or Military services, or any pension, salary or other gratuity or stipend, derived by any person from Her Majesty's Imperial Treasury, or elsewhere out of this Province; or the other personal property of any such persons, in such Naval or Military services, on full pay, or otherwise in actual then present service, are declared not liable to be assessed; and these persons not liable to perform Statute labour, or to commute for the same. The Governor, Lieutenant Governor, or person administering the Government for the time being is also exempted from assessment under these acts. The other exemptions from taxation under them are, Indian Lands; Public Lands of the Province; places of worship; real estate of Universities, Colleges, incorporated Grammar Schools or other seminaries of learning, actually used and occupied by them, but not if occupied by others or unoccupied; Public School Houses; Town or City Halls, Court Houses and Gaols, Houses of Correction and Lock-up Houses, and the lands attached thereto; Public Hospitals, the lands attached to them, and the personal property belonging to them; Public Roads and Ways, or Public Squares, and the property belonging to any municipality, if occupied for the purposes thereof, or unoccupied; the Provincial Penitentiary and the land attached to it; Industrial Farms, Poor Houses, Alms Houses, Houses of Industry or Lunatic Asylums, Houses belonging to Companies for the reformation of offenders, and the real and personal property belonging to or connected with the same; and lastly, the property of every public library. All real and personal property, liable to taxation, must be estimated by the assessors at its full value, (or full yearly value, as the case may be) as they would appraise the same in payment of a just debt, due from a solvent debtor. Every vacant lot in a city, incorporated town or village, must be assessed at its actual value, and six per cent. thereon shall be deemed its yearly value; and no lot having any building upon it, shall be assessed at a less sum than if it were a vacant lot. All local taxes must be levied on taxable property generally, and not on any particular kind. The means for enforcing payment, by the collectors, are of a very summary nature. The lands of non-residents or absentees, are liable equally with those of residents, for their proportionate share according to value of all local taxes; and they are payable yearly to the County Treasurer, from whom the amount can always be ascertained, and to whom regular yearly payment must be made, to avoid a sale of the property for taxes. In Townships, the assessments are levied on the aggregate value of taxable property, as returned by the assessors; in cities, towns and incorporated villages, the assessment is levied on the rental or annual value, which on real property is the real rack-rent, or the full yearly sum of six per cent. on the actual valuation by the assessor; and the yearly value of taxable personal property is six per cent. on the amount of such property or income. The assessors and collectors are appointed by the Municipalities. The assessors are required to make out their Rolls yearly, between 1st February and 1st April, but when unable to do so, then as soon thereafter as possible, and also to notify each party assessed of the amount of his assessment. The Collector's Rolls have to be made out by the Clerks of the various municipalities; and the Collectors upon receiving them, are to proceed to the collection of the taxes, and return their Rolls to the Treasurer, with the taxes, on or before the 14th December, unless otherwise provided by the County Councils. County Councils are empowered, at an annual meeting on the first Monday in May, with power of adjournment, to examine the several Assessment Rolls of their Municipalities, and to increase or decrease the aggregate valuations of real and personal property, in townships, villages, or urban wards, adding or deducting such sums upon the hundred, as may in their opinion be necessary to produce a just relation between all the valuations of real and personal estates in the County; but they are not in any case to reduce the aggregate valuation for the whole County, as made by the assessors.—

Fees to Magistrates, U. C.

14 AND 15 VIC., CAP. 119.—1851.

An Act to establish a uniform rate of Fees to be received by Justices of the Peace in Upper Canada, and to repeal the Act of Upper Canada, passed in the fourth year of the Reign of King William the Fourth, Chap. Seventeen.

Whereas it is expedient to establish a uniform rate of Fees to be received by Justices of the Peace in Upper Canada, for the duties therein mentioned; and to repeal the Act of Upper Canada, passed in the fourth year of the Reign of His late Majesty, King William the Fourth, Chapter Seventeen, intitled, *An Act to declare what Fees shall be received by Justices of the Peace for the duties therein mentioned*; and whereas since the passing of the said Act, increased duties have been imposed upon Justices of the Peace in Upper Canada, for which no Fees have been established by law; and whereas under the said repealed Act, doubts have arisen as to the meaning and application of some of its provisions; therefore, to remove such doubts and establish a uniform rate of Fees to be received by the Justices aforesaid for the services hereinafter mentioned; Be it enacted, &c., That the said Act, intitled, *An Act to declare what Fees shall be received by Justices of the Peace for the duties therein mentioned*, be and the same is hereby repealed.

II. That from and after the passing of this Act, the following Fees and no other shall be taken from the parties prosecuting, by Justices of the Peace in Upper Canada, or by their Clerks, for the duties and services hereinafter mentioned, that is to say:—

For Information and Warrant for apprehension, or for an Information and Summons for Assault, Trespass, or other Misdemeanour, Two Shillings and Six Pence.—2s. 6d.

For each Copy of Summons to be served on Defendant or Defendants, Six Pence.—6d.

For a Subpoena, Six Pence, only one on each side is to be charged for in each case, which may contain any number of names, and if the justice of the case shall require it, additional Subpoenas shall be issued without charge.—6d.

For every Recognizance, One Shilling and Three Pence, (only one to be charged in each case).—1s. 3d.

For every Certificate of Recognizance under the Act of Upper Canada, Seventh William the Fourth, Chapter Ten, One Shilling and Three Pence.—1s. 3d.

For Information and Warrant for Surety of the Peace or Good Behaviour, to be paid by Complainant, Two Shillings and Six Pence.—2s. 6d.

For Warrant of Commitment for Default of Surety to keep Peace or Good Behaviour, to be paid by Complainant, Two Shillings and Six Pence.—2s. 6d.

III. That the costs to be charged in all cases of Convictions, where the Fees are not expressly prescribed by any Statute, other than the Statute hereinbefore repealed, shall be as follows, that is to say:—

For Information and Warrant for Apprehension, or for Information and Summons for Service, Two Shillings and Six Pence.—2s. 6d.

For every Copy of Summons to be served upon Defendant or Defendants, Six Pence.—6d.

For every Subpoena to a Witness, (as provided in the Second Section of this Act.) Six Pence.—6d.

For Hearing and Determining the Case, Two Shillings and Six Pence.—2s. 6d.

For Warrant to levy a Penalty, One Shilling and Three Pence.—1s. 3d.

For making up every Record of Conviction when the same is ordered to be returned to the Sessions, or on *Certiorari*, Five Shillings.—5s.

Provided always, That in all such cases as admit of a summary proceeding before a single Justice of the Peace, and wherein no higher penalty than Five Pounds can be imposed, the sum of Two Shillings and Six Pence only shall be charged for the Conviction, and One Shilling and Three Pence for the Warrant to levy the Penalty, and that in all cases where persons are Subpoenaed to give Evidence before Justices of the Peace in case of Assault, Trespass, or Misdemeanour, such Witness shall be entitled in the discretion of the Magistrate, to receive at the rate of Two Shillings and Six Pence for every day's attendance, where the distance travelled in coming to and returning from such a judicial

tion; does not exceed Ten Miles, and Three Pence for each Mile above Ten.

Every Bill of Costs when demanded to be made out in detail, Six Pence.—6d.

Copy of any other Paper connected with any trial, and the Minutes of the same if demanded,—every folio of One Hundred Words, Six Pence.—6s.

IV. That in all cases of a summary conviction before any one or two Justices of the Peace, under the provisions of the several Acts passed in the Session held in the fourth and fifth years of Her Majesty's Reign, Chapters Twenty-six and Twenty-seven, and intitled respectively, *An Act for consolidating and amending the Laws in this Province relative to Larceny and other offences committed therewith*,—*An Act for consolidating and amending the Laws in this Province relative to Malicious Injuries to property*,—and *An Act for consolidating and amending the Statutes in this Province relative to Offences against the Person*, it shall and may be lawful for such Justices or Justices, in his or their discretion, to issue his or their Warrant to levy by distress and Sale of the Offenders Goods and Chattels, the amount of Fine and Costs imposed, and in default of the same being levied or made, the Offender or Offenders may be committed to the Common Gaol or House of Correction for the period and in the manner prescribed by the above mentioned Statutes, or to proceed, as heretofore, by committal for Default of payment instead of issuing such Distress Warrant.

V. That in all cases where costs are payable by parties who may have failed in prosecuting with effect, it shall and may be lawful for the Justice or Justices before whom complaint may have been made in his or their discretion, to issue his or their warrant to levy by distress and sale of the Goods and Chattels of such person so failing to prosecute, such costs as shall be determined by the Justice or Justices, to be payable by him or them.

VI. That this Act shall not be construed to authorize any claim being made by the Justices aforesaid, for Fees of any description connected with cases above the degree of Misdemeanor; nor shall witnesses in such cases be allowed anything for their attendance or travel, except under the order of the Court before which the trial of the case shall be had; anything in this Act to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding.

VII. That this Act shall come into operation and take effect from the first day of November next.

Protection to Magistrates and Others.

14 AND 15 VIC., CAP. 54.—1851.

An Act to amend and consolidate the Laws affording protection to Magistrates and others in the performance of public duties.

Whereas there are divers Acts of Parliament in force in Canada, both public, local and personal, whereby certain protections and privileges are afforded to Magistrates and others; and whereas the said Acts are not of an uniform character, and it is desirable that many of the provisions of such Acts should be altered and amended, and the whole reduced into one Act: Be it therefore enacted, That so much of any such Act or Acts now in force in this Province, whether public, local or personal, as confers any privilege, either as to notice or limitation of action, or as to amount of costs, or as to pleading the general issue and giving the special matter in evidence, or as to the venue of the action, or as to tender of amends or payment of money into Court, upon any Magistrate, Public Officer, or other person, for any act done, either by virtue of his office, or under the provisions of any such Act or Acts, be and the same is hereby repealed, except as to any action, suit or proceeding which has been commenced or prosecuted before the passing of this Act.

II. That no Writ shall be sued out against any Justice of the Peace or other officer or person fulfilling any public duty, for any thing by him done in the performance of such public duty, whether such duty arises out of the common law, or is imposed by Act of Parliament, either Imperial or Provincial, nor shall any judgment or verdict be rendered against him, unless notice in writing of such intended Writ, specifying the cause of action

with reasonable clearness, shall have been delivered to such Justice, officer or other person, or left at the usual place of his abode, by the Attorney or Agent of the party who intends to sue out such Writ, at least one calendar month before suing out such Writ, and in computing such calendar month, the day of the service of such notice and the day of suing out such Writ shall both be excluded, and on such notice shall be written the name and place of abode of such Attorney or Agent suing out such Writ, and by the cause of action stated in such notice the party suing out such Writ shall be bound, and shall not be allowed to give evidence of any other cause of action at the trial thereof.

III. That any such Justice, officer or other person acting as aforesaid, may at any time within one calendar month after the service of such notice as aforesaid, tender amends to the party complaining, or his agent or attorney; and in case the same is not accepted, may plead such tender in bar to any action brought against him grounded on such Writ, together with the plea of not guilty, and any other plea; and if the Court or jury shall find the amount tendered to have been sufficient, they shall find for the defendant; but if the Court or Jury shall find they were insufficient, or that no tender of amends was made, and they shall also find the other issues against the defendant, or if they find against the defendant where no tender of amends is made or pleaded, then they shall give a judgment or verdict for the plaintiff, with such damages as they shall think proper, and the plaintiff shall have his costs of suit.

IV. That any such action against such Justice, officer or other person, acting as aforesaid, shall be laid and tried within the County in Upper Canada or District, or Circuit in Lower Canada, as the case may be, where the act complained of was done and committed: *Provided always*, that such Justice, officer or other person, acting as aforesaid, may change the venue in such action, upon notice to the plaintiff in such action, if he shall think fit so to do: *And provided also*, that the venue may be changed to any other County in Upper Canada or District, or Circuit in Lower Canada, as the case may be, that the Court in which such action is brought, or any Judge thereof in Chambers may order, if it shall be made appear to such Court or Judge that such action cannot be tried fairly and without prejudice in the County or District or Circuit in which the venue in such action is laid.

V. That every such Justice, officer or person acting as aforesaid, in any such action or suit as aforesaid, may plead the general issue only thereto, that he or they is or are not guilty, and give all special matters of justification or excuse, or that he or they received no notice of action thereunder, as fully and amply as if the same were specially pleaded in such action.

VI. That it shall be lawful for such Justice, officer or other person acting as aforesaid, if he shall not have tendered amends, or shall have tendered insufficient amends, to pay into Court such sum as he shall think fit, without requiring the leave of the Court or a Judge thereof; and such payment into Court shall be specially pleaded, and shall have the same effect, and such proceedings shall be had thereafter, as in ordinary cases of payment of money into Court.

VII. That if in any such action or suit, judgment shall be rendered in favour of such Justice, officer or other person acting as aforesaid, either on demurrer, verdict, non-suit, or non-pros, or otherwise, or the plaintiff shall discontinue his suit, the defendant shall be entitled to recover against the plaintiff all his costs, as between attorney and client, but no double or treble costs shall in any case be taxed or allowed against the plaintiff.

VIII. That no such action or suit shall be brought against any Justice, officer or other person acting as aforesaid, for any thing done by him in the performance of his public duty, as aforesaid, unless commenced within six calendar months after the act committed.

IX. That the privileges and protection given by this Act, shall be given to such Justice, officer or other person acting as aforesaid, only, and to no other person or persons whatever, and any such Justice, officer and other person acting as aforesaid, shall be entitled to such protection and privileges in all such cases as he shall act *bona fide* in the execution of his duty, although in such case, he shall have exceeded his powers or jurisdiction, and have acted clearly contrary to law.

ELECTION LAW OF CANADA.

12 Vic., CAP. 27, 1840.

An Act to repeal certain Acts therein mentioned, and to amend, consolidate, and reduce into one Act, the several Statutory provisions now in force for the regulation of Elections of Members to represent the People of this Province in the Legislative Assembly thereof.

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Voter, sections 14, 29, 30, 31, 32, 33, 34, 35, 36, 37, 38, 39, 40, 41, 42, 43, 44, 45, 46, 55.

Waterloo, County and Township, Special Provision for—section 62; Weapons, Offensive, Punishment for carrying, 52, 58; Wilnot, Township, Special Provision for, 68; Women cannot vote, 46; Writ of Election, 4, 11, 23, 27, 62.

York, Ridings of—section 3.

CLAUSES OF THE ACT IN SUBSTANCE.

SECTION 1. The following Acts repealed: Lower Canada, 5 Geo. 4, cap. 33; 10 and 11 Geo. 4, cap. 50. Upper Canada, 4 Geo. 4, cap. 3; 3 Will. 4, cap. 11; 4 Will. 4, cap. 14. Acts of United Canada, 4 and 5 Vict. cap. 52; 6 Vict. cap. 1; and all Acts and statutory provisions repugnant to the present Act. N. B. All Acts repealed by the Acts hereby repealed, to stand repealed.

2. Sheriffs in Lower Canada to be Returning Officers *ex officio* for all Cities and Towns of their District. If two or more Sheriffs for one District, then that one to whom the writ of Election shall be addressed shall be Returning Officer. For Counties, the Registrar of Deeds and Titles, or such one, if more than one, to whom writ shall be addressed, to be Returning Officer.

3. In Upper Canada, High Sheriffs of Districts to be *ex officio* Returning Officers for Counties and Ridings within their jurisdictions, and in which they shall reside, and also for Cities and Towns within such Counties and Ridings. For other Counties, the Registrars of Deeds therein to be *ex officio* Returning Officers: Provided always that the High Sheriff of the Home District shall also be Returning Officer for the West Riding of York—and the Registrar of the County of York shall be Returning Officer for East and North Ridings thereof. (See amended Act below, Sec. 2.)

4. Writs of Election to be addressed to such Officers accordingly.

5. Where Sheriffs or Registrars are Members of Legislative Council, or in case of death, absence, or sickness, the Governor General may appoint any qualified person Returning Officer; but person so appointed must be resident elector. Penalty on unqualified person acting, £50. (See amended Act below, Sec. 3.)

6. Members of Executive or Legislative Council, of Legislative Assembly, Ministers, Teachers, &c., of Religion, Judges, ex-Members of Legislative Assembly, if they have served in the immediately preceding Session, ineligible as Returning Officer, Election Clerk, or Poll Clerk. Penalty £25.

7. Exemptions: Medical Men, Millers, Post Masters, persons sixty years of age, persons who have previously served, not compelled to take the Office of Returning Officer, Deputy, Election Clerk, or Poll Clerk, unless they be Sheriffs, Registrars, Town Clerks or Assessors.

8. Penalty of £50 on qualified persons refusing to serve. Exempted persons must claim exemption within two days after receipt of writ.

9. Returning Officers to endorse on writ, day of its reception, and within eight days by Proclamation (form A in Schedule) fix time and place of Election, the place to be public and central, and the time between 11, A. M. and 2, P. M. Proclamation to be posted eight clear days at least before day named for Election, and to name day of polling in the Parishes, &c., and in U. C. to be posted at City Hall, and also publicly in each township, ward, &c.—in L. C. in French and English and at door of at least one place of worship, and also publicly in each ward. Penalty for neglect £25.

10. Returning Officer to take oath No. 1, in Schedule, and annex Certificate thereof to his Return. Penalty £10.

11. Returning Officer to appoint Election Clerk to assist him, and in case of death, incapacity, or neglect before or during Election, to appoint another, and such Clerk upon death or other cause of incapacity of R. O. to be in his place. Oath to taken. Penalty £10.

12. Hustings to be at place named in Proclamation in open air and free of access to all Electors, and R. O. to be there at time named, and in English and French languages in L. C. and English in U. C., to make Proclamation in form E of Schedule, and read or have read to Electors the Writ of Election, and his Commission of R. O., and then call on Electors to name whom they wish to elect, and if candidates or their agents and the Electors on a show of hands agree in the choice, and a poll be not demanded after such show, R. O. shall close election, and proclaim as Member or Members persons so chosen. But if poll be demanded (which any Elector present or Candidate by self or agent may demand) R. O. shall grant the same under penalty of £200 for refusal or neglect.

13. Poll to be open and kept separately in each Electoral Division of Parish, Township, &c., which in U. C. in Counties and Ridings shall be at or near where the last

Township meeting was held, and in Cities and Towns at the most convenient place in each ward; and in L. C. at the most public and convenient place in the open air or in some building close to the public highway, with free access; but not a Tavern or place of public entertainment. Elector to vote only at polling place of division, wherein his property lies, (excepting as excepted in Sec. 33.) under penalty of £10. (See amended Act below, Sec. 1.)

14. Returning Officer for Montreal to appoint three polling places in each of St. Anne's, St. Antoine, St. Lawrence, St. Louis, St. James, and St. Mary's Wards, in the City of Montreal; and for Quebec, in each of the Wards St. Roch and St. John, and to appoint three Deputy Returning Officers for each of said Wards, which for purposes of this Act shall remain bounded as at present; and when there are several polling places in one Ward, Electors may vote at any one of them.

15. Meaning of word "Parish," in L. C. for the purposes of this Act, and at which polling place residents in extra parochial places, and parts of Parishes (for which no separate polling place shall be erected unless there be 100 electors,) may vote.

16. After poll granted, Returning Officer to proclaim from Hastings day and place previously proclaimed for taking the votes separately in each Parish, &c., and allow six and not more than ten days from the day of nomination to elapse before opening the several polls, the places for which the R. O. shall then specially designate and describe; after which R. O. to adjourn to a day for closing the Election, which shall be one of the ten days, following the day appointed for opening the poll.

17. The day proclaimed for opening the poll shall not be a Sunday nor any of the Holydays named in this section. There shall be two days for polling and no more, which shall be consecutive, excepting where a Sunday or holiday intervenes, when the day next following shall be the second day. Polling to commence at 9, A. M., and close at 5, P. M.

18. Returning Officer to appoint Deputy Returning Officers by commission under his hand for each division—as per Schedule Form F,—and three for each of certain wards before mentioned in Quebec and Montreal; Deputy Returning Officer to take oath of office, as per Schedule, oath No. 3, and refusing, to incur penalty of £25. In U. C. Township Clerks, Assessors or Collectors must be appointed Deputy Returning Officers.—Deputy Returning Officers to appoint Poll Clerks by commission as per Schedule form H. Poll Clerk to take oath of office, as per Schedule No. 4. Penalty on refusing, £10.

19. Returning Officer to issue to any Deputy his warrant for each Deputy to hold the prescribed poll, in form K for warrant, and form L for Poll Book. Deputy to return Poll Book signed and sealed by him, on or before the day appointed for closing the Election.

20. Instructions for keeping Poll Book.

21. Poll Clerk to assist Deputy Returning Officer generally, obey his orders, and to become Deputy Returning Officer in certain cases, whereupon he will appoint another Poll Clerk. In like cases, Deputy Returning Officer to appoint another Poll Clerk.

22. Deputy Returning Officer and Poll Clerk to take and subscribe respectively the oaths as per Schedule forms M and N, before the Poll Book be returned to the Returning Officer, said oaths to be annexed to the Poll Book. Poll Book to be returned to R. O. on or before day fixed for closing the Election. Penalty on Deputy for non-compliance £30—on Clerk £20.

23. At the time and place appointed for closing the Election, Returning Officer shall count the votes given, and openly proclaim as duly elected the person or persons who shall have a majority of the total number of votes taken and recorded according to law, but no such proclamation shall be made unless all the Poll Books shall have been returned by all his Deputies.

24. Returning Officer shall not examine the Poll Books unless all have been returned, but adjourn from day to day, publicly stating his reason for such adjournment, but not adjourn so long as to delay the return of the writ by the day appointed therefor; nor shall he adjourn to any Sunday or holiday.

25. Indenture to be executed by Returning Officer as per Schedule, form O, and at least three Electors—one copy to be given to each person elected, and one to be sent to the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery with the return.

26. On the loss of any Poll Book, Returning Officer to examine on oath D. R. O. and Poll Clerk as to contents,

and include the votes recorded therein in his summing up. Penalty £50 and imprisonment.

27. Returning Officer to deposit copies of Poll Book with Registrar of County within ten days after the close of Election; which are to remain open to inspection on payment of one shilling. The original books to be returned with the writ within fifteen days after the close of the Election to Clerk of the Crown in Chancery, and to be *prima facie* evidence of the truth of the contents.

28. Returning Officer or Deputy, hereafter to have no power to grant a scrutiny.

29. Any Elector may declare himself and act as Agent for a Candidate in the absence of one authorized by writing, but no Agent who is paid or expects remuneration can vote, under penalty of £25.

30. No person shall be entitled to vote at County Elections, who has not, vested in him by legal title, real property in said County of the clear yearly value of forty-four shillings and five pence and one farthing currency. Title to be in fee simple or freehold under tenure of free and common socage, or in *feif in roture*, or in *franc alleu*, or derived from the Governor and Council of the late Province of Quebec, or Act of Parliament. Qualification to be effective requires actual and uninterrupted possession on the part of the Elector, or that he should have been in receipt of the rents and profits of said property, for his own use and benefit at least for six months before the date of the Writ of Election. But the title will be good without such anterior possession if the property shall have come by inheritance, devise, marriage or contract of marriage, and also if the deed or patent from the Crown on which he claims to hold such estate in Upper Canada, have been registered three calendar months before the date of the Writ of Election. In Lower Canada possession of the property under a written promise of sale registered, if not a Notarial Deed, for twelve months before the Election, to be sufficient title to vote. In Upper Canada a conveyance to wife after marriage must have been registered three calendar months or husband have been in possession of property six months before Election.

31. Voter for City or Town to have a lot of ground with a dwelling thereon of the clear yearly value of £5 11s. 1d. currency, held in fee simple or in freehold under legal tenure, or derived from Governor in Council of late Province of Quebec, or from Act of Parliament, of which lot he shall have been in possession, or in receipt of the rents and profits for his own use and benefit, for six months, unless the same shall have come to him by inheritance, devise, marriage or contract of marriage, or that in Upper Canada the deed from the Crown have been registered for three months before date of Election Writ,—same conditions as in Section 3, in respect of written promise of sale in L. C. and post-nuptial conveyance to voter's wife in U. C.

32. It matters not by whom the said dwelling house was erected, whether by voter or others, and an agreement between landlord and tenant giving right to remove the house, or stipulating a payment in lieu of removal, does not affect the proprietor's right to vote.

33. A Tenant voter in Town or City must have occupied by actual residence, as a separate tenant, a dwelling house or houses, part or parts of houses for five months, of the yearly value of £11 2s. 1d. currency, and have paid a year's rent, or that amount of money for the twelve months immediately preceding the date of Election Writ. A person holding only a shop, or place of business, but not actually residing therein, not qualified to vote. And voter having changed his residence within the Town during the year, does not affect his right to vote, but must vote in the ward in which he resides on the day.

34. Tenant's right to vote not affected by question of whether he or another built the house, or any agreement with landlord respecting removal of the same.

35. Occupiers of dwelling house provided for them by Government, Civil or Military, or by any Incorporated Body or Society, not entitled to vote on account of such occupation, unless such party shall have contracted to pay and *bond fide* have paid one year's rent for the same.

36. When property lies partly in one County or Riding and partly in another, the vote shall be taken for that County for which the Election is held; and when property is situated partly within one polling place and partly in another, the Elector may vote at either.

37. A proprietor under Section 31, whose lot is partly

witha and partly without the limits, cannot vote unless the "dwelling house" be wholly within the limits.

38. In Lower Canada only, where one shall have the right of property and another the usufructuary enjoyment for his own use and benefit, the latter only shall vote.

39. Joint Tenants or Tenants in common may each vote if his undivided share be of the proper value, Shareholders in Incorporated Companies excepted.

40. Votes "objected to" to be entered as such in Poll Book, with name of objecting candidate annexed. When required by D. R. O., Candidate, Agent, or Elector, the Voter shall verbally describe property on which he votes, and D. R. O. if so required by Candidate or Agent, shall enter same in the column of "description" in Poll Book.

41. Oath which Elector may be required to take; but only on demand of Candidate or Agent. Deputy R. O. refusing to administer, or administering without such demand, shall incur a penalty of £10. Elector voting without taking the oath, so required, shall incur a penalty of £10. If he refuse, his refusal shall be entered on Poll Book, and his vote not be recorded. But if recorded, shall be null and void, and Deputy R. O. incur a penalty of £10.

42. Only British subjects of the full age of 21 allowed to vote. Elector may remove any objection by producing certificate or by taking oath No. 10, in Schedule.

43. Deputy Returning Officer may administer oath of allegiance to persons who, according to the provisions of any Act of Parliament, shall become on taking such oath entitled to the privileges of British birth in this Province.

44. Persons knowing themselves not to be qualified, voting at Elections, incur penalty of £10; and on action brought, the burden of proof shall be on defendant,—such vote null and void. Electors voting more than once at same Election, incur like penalty, and all votes after the first null and void.

45. Any person having lands or tenements conveyed to him fraudulently for the purpose of qualifying him to vote, shall incur a penalty of £25. The said conveyance shall be valid, and vest the property nevertheless, and any agreement to revoke or reconvey null and void.

46. No woman shall vote.

47. Deputy Returning Officer may employ an Interpreter, if needed. Oath.

48. Candidate when required to make the declaration of qualification prescribed by Imperial Act for re-union of the Provinces, shall give and insert at the foot of the declaration a correct description of the lands or tenements on which he qualifies, and any wilful misstatement therein to subject the candidate to the pains and penalties of perjury.

49. Candidate may make such declaration voluntarily at any time before or after date of Writ. When requested to make declaration it must be on or before the day of nomination, and before a poll shall have been granted, and the requisition must be made to the Candidate personally, and he may comply at any time before the Proclamation of R. O. at close of election, but he need not comply if he have already made one voluntarily. Such declaration may be made before R. O. or a Justice of the Peace, or Mayor, or Alderman of any City or Town in the Province, who shall attest in writing the making thereof; and any candidate delivering or causing to be delivered the same to the R. O. before Proclamation at close of Election, shall be deemed to have complied with the law. Returning Officer bound if required, under penalty of £50, to give written acknowledgment of delivery of such declaration, and possession of such acknowledgment to be *prima facie* evidence of possessor's having been authorized by Candidate to deliver the same to R. O., and whatever be the date of attestation, or receipt, it shall be deemed to have been made on the day of delivery.

50. Returning Officer and Deputy to have all the power of Justices of the Peace, and to arrest on verbal order, bail, try and convict persons who shall break the law, trouble the peace, or disturb good order, and imprison such for any period not later than the final closing of the Election, and all persons bound to obey and give their aid under a penalty of £5.

51. On written requisition, to swear in Special Constables.

52. Returning Officer and Deputy to take staves, bludgeons and offensive weapons from persons attending the Election, and persons refusing to surrender the same guilty of misdemeanor, punishable by fine of £5 or imprisonment for three months, or both, at discretion of the Court.

53. Persons convicted of a battery within two miles of the place appointed for the Election, to be deemed guilty of an aggravated assault and punishable accordingly.

54. Candidate employing means of corruption by bribe, gift, promise, or threat to induce Elector to vote or abstain from voting, or opening or causing to be opened any house of public entertainment for accommodation of the Electors, his election, if returned, shall be set aside on proof.

55. Any person making any gift or promise to any Elector to corrupt or induce him to give or forbear giving his vote, or as expenses or compensation for loss of time, and any voter accepting the same for such purpose, shall forfeit and pay any sum between £5 and £50 at the discretion of the Court.

56. Name of bribed voter to be erased from Poll Book on trial of contested Election.

57. Entertainment of Electors to promote the Election prohibited,—exception as to entertainment at the residence of the entertainer.

58. No person armed with offensive weapons, who has not been a resident for six months, excepting officers lawfully engaged in the Election, to come within the electoral limits, nor shall any resident so armed approach within two miles of the Poll.

59. Prohibition for any Candidate or other person to carry or give to be carried any flag, ensign, or standard, as a party flag during an Election or within eight days before the commencement thereof.

60. Similar prohibition as to any ribbon, label, or flower as a party badge.

61. Offenders against the provisions of any of the four preceding Sections to be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor punishable by fine not exceeding £25, or imprisonment not exceeding six months, or both, at the discretion of the Court.

62. Any person stealing or unlawfully taking away, or unlawfully destroying, injuring or obliterating, or counselling or assisting therein, any Writ of Election, or return thereto, or any Indenture, Poll Book or Document required by this Act, shall be guilty of felony, and may be imprisoned at hard labour in Penitentiary for not less than three nor more than seven years, or be otherwise punished by fine and imprisonment at the discretion of the Court.

63. All oaths and affirmations under this Act to be administered gratuitously.

64. Penalties imposed by this Act recoverable by suit with costs, and offender committed to gaol until paid, but suit must be brought within nine months, and what it shall be sufficient to aver in the declaration.

65. Cities and Towns not to form part of Counties or Ridings for purposes of Election, and no one to vote at Election for a County or Riding upon lands, tenements, or lots within limits of any City or Town.

66. Enumeration of fees and allowances for services and disbursements at Election.

67. One copy of this Act with Index for each Returning Officer, and for each Deputy R. O. to be transmitted with the Writ of Election.

68. Time of Polling in the County of Waterloo, as to the Township of Waterloo and Wilmot may be extended upon requisition of twelve Electors on behalf of the voters remaining unpolled on the second day.

69. Act may be amended or repealed during the Session in which it was passed.

Schedule of Forms, Oaths, &c.

AMENDMENTS TO THE ELECTION LAW.

14 AND 15 VIC., CAP. 108, 1851.

An Act to fix the place for holding the Polls for the Election of Members of Parliament, in Townships divided into Wards, in Upper Canada, and for other purposes relative to Elections.

1. That in every case where a Poll is to be held in a Township divided into wards, such Poll shall be held at the Town Hall in which the meetings of the Municipal Council of the Township are held, if there be any such Town Hall, and if there be none, then at the place where the Municipal Council of the Township shall have held its first meeting in the year in which such Poll is to be held, or if the said Council shall not have met during such year, then at the place where it shall have held its last meeting during the next preceding year: Provided, that if in any case it shall happen that there is no place

at which, under the provisions of the Election Act, 12 Vic., cap. 27, and of this Act, the Poll ought to be held, and also when two or more Townships are united for municipal purposes and divided into Wards, then the Deputy Returning Officer shall himself appoint the place, selecting such as he shall deem most central and convenient for the majority of the Electors. Provided, also, that if in any case there shall be no Officer or person who, under the provisions of the eighteenth section of the said Act, ought to be appointed Deputy Returning Officer then it shall be lawful for the Returning Officer to return such person as he may think fit to be Deputy Returning Officer, who shall have all the powers and perform all the duties and be subject to all the liabilities incident to the said office by virtue of the said Act.

2. That all the words in the third section of the Election Act, 12 Vic., cap. 27, after the words "in Upper Canada only" in the beginning of the said section shall be repealed, and the following words substituted therefor: "That the High Sheriffs for the time being of the several Counties and Unions of Counties for judicial purposes in that part of the Province, shall be *ex officio* Returning Officers for the Counties and Unions of Counties for purposes of Representation in the Provincial Parliament, over which or over any County in which, their authority as such Sheriffs shall extend and in which they shall respectively reside, and also for the respective cities and towns sending Members to Parliament and lying within the local limits of such Counties or Unions of Counties; and that for the several other Counties or Unions of Counties for the purpose of Representation, for which no Sheriff shall, under the foregoing provision, be *ex officio* the Returning Officer, the Registrars of Deeds for the time being for such Counties or Unions of Counties, or for any of the Counties included in such Unions of Counties, shall be *ex officio* Returning Officers: Provided always, Firstly, That so long as the county of Peel shall remain united for judicial purposes to the County of York, the Sheriff of that County, or of the Union of which it is a member, shall be *ex officio* Returning Officer for the County of Peel as well as for the County of York and the City of Toronto; and so long as the County of Ontario shall remain united for judicial purposes to the said County of York, and there shall be no separate Registrar for the said County of Ontario, the Registrar of the said County of York shall be *ex officio* Returning Officer for the said County of Ontario: And provided also, Secondly, That if in any case there shall be more than one person who may under the foregoing provisions be *ex officio* Returning Officer for any place, then the writ of Election may be directed to either of them, and

the person to whom it shall be directed shall alone act as such Returning Officer; and if in any case it shall happen that writs of Election shall issue at the same time, or so nearly at the same time that the one shall not be returnable before the other or others shall issue, for several places for which the same person would, under the foregoing provisions, be *ex officio* Returning Officer, then only one of such writs shall be directed to such person, and the other or others to such other person or persons, qualified in the manner provided by the fifth section of the said Act, as the Governor shall appoint to be the Returning Officer or Officers."

3. That if in any case it shall happen either in Upper or in Lower Canada, that there shall be no person, who, under the provisions of the said Act and of this Act, shall be *ex officio* Returning Officer for any place for which an Election is to be held, or the person who is such Returning Officer shall be absent from the Province, or incapacitated from sickness or otherwise from performing the duties of Returning Officer, then it shall be lawful for the Governor to appoint any person qualified under the said fifth section of the said Act to be Returning Officer for such place.

GASPE AND SAGUENAY ELECTIONS.

14 AND 15 VIC., CAP. 87, 1851.

An Act to amend the laws regulating the Election of Members of the Legislative Assembly in certain Counties, in so far as relates to the Return of Writs.

1. Any writ which may hereafter issue for the election of a member to serve in the Legislative Assembly of this Province for the county of Gaspé, or for the county of Saguenay, may be made returnable at any time within ninety days from the day on which the same shall bear date.

2. Every proclamation issued by a Returning Officer of the County of Gaspé, or of the County of Saguenay, fixing the place, day and hour at which he will proceed to hold the election under any Writ of Election directed to him, shall be posted up at least twenty days before the day which by such proclamation he shall have fixed for holding such election, and that there shall be at least fifteen days, and not more than thirty days between the days respectively fixed by any such Returning Officer in and by any such proclamation for opening the election as aforesaid, and for opening the poll at separate places in the said Counties respectively; and that the delay between the closing of the polls and the day on which the result of the polling shall be announced by the Returning Officer shall not exceed thirty days.

LAW OF SUCCESSION IN UPPER CANADA.

14 AND 15 VIC., CAP. 6.—1851

An Act to abolish the Right of Primogeniture in the succession to Real Estate held in fee simple or for the life of another, in Upper Canada, and to provide for the division thereof amongst such of the relatives of the last proprietor as may best accord with the relative claims of such parties in the division thereof.

WHEREAS it is expedient to abolish the right of Primogeniture in the succession to real estate held in fee simple or for the life of another, in Upper Canada, as such right now exists according to the laws in force in that section of the Province, and to provide for the division of such real estate amongst such of the relatives of the person last seized or possessed, and who shall have died without leaving any testamentary disposition thereof, as may best accord with the relative claims of such parties in the division thereof: Be it therefore enacted, &c., That whenever on or after the first day of January, which will be in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, any person shall die seized in fee simple or for the life of another of any real estate in Upper Canada, without having lawfully devised the same, such real estate shall descend or pass by way of succession in manner following, that is to say:

Firstly—To his lineal descendants, and those claiming by or under them, *per stirpes*;

Secondly—To his father;

Thirdly—To his mother; and

Fourthly—To his collateral relatives;

Subject in all cases to the rules and regulations hereinafter prescribed.

2. That if the intestate shall leave several descendants in the direct line of lineal descent, and all of equal degree of consanguinity to such intestate, the inheritance shall descend to such persons in equal parts, however remote from the intestate the common degree of consanguinity may be.

3. That if any of the children of such intestate be living, and any be dead, the inheritance shall descend to the children who are living, and to the descendants of such children as shall have died, so that each child who shall be living shall inherit such share as would have descended to him if all the children of the intestate who shall have died, leaving issue, had been living, and so that the descendants of each child who shall be dead shall inherit the share which their parent would have received, if living, in equal shares.

4. That the rule of descent prescribed in the last section shall apply in every case where the descendants of the intestate, entitled to share in the inheritance, shall be of unequal degrees of consanguinity to the intestate so that those who are in the nearest degree of consanguinity shall take the shares which would have descended to them, had all the descendants in the same degree of consanguinity who shall have died, leaving issue, being living, and so that the issue of the descendants who shall have died, shall respectively take the shares which their parents if living would have received.

5. That in case the intestate shall die without lawful descendants, and leaving a father, then the inheritance shall go to such father,—unless the inheritance came to the intestate on the part of his mother, and such mother be living; and if such mother be dead, the inheritance

descending on her part shall go to the father for life, and the reversion to the brothers and sisters of the intestate and their descendants, according to the law of inheritance by collateral relatives hereinafter provided; and if there be no such brothers or sisters, or their descendants living, such inheritance shall descend to the father.

6. That if the intestate shall die without descendants and leaving no father, or leaving a father not entitled to take the inheritance under the last preceding section, and leaving a mother and a brother or sister, or the descendant of a brother or sister, then the inheritance shall descend to the mother during her life, and the reversion to such brother or sister of the intestate as may be living and the descendants of such as may be dead, according to the same law of inheritance hereinafter provided; and if the intestate in such case shall leave no brother or sister, nor any descendant of any brother or sister, the inheritance shall descend to the mother.

7. That if there be no father or mother capable of inheriting the estate, it shall descend in the cases hereinafter specified to the collateral relatives of the intestate; and if there be several of such relatives, all of equal degree of consanguinity to the intestate, the inheritance shall descend to them in equal parts, however remote from the intestate the common degree of consanguinity may be.

8. That if all the brothers and sisters of the intestate be living, the inheritance shall descend to such brothers and sisters; and if any of them be living and any be dead, then to the brothers and sisters and every of them who are living, and to the descendants of such brothers and sisters as shall have died, so that each brother or sister who shall be living, shall inherit such share as would have descended to him or her, if all the brothers or sisters of the intestate who shall have died leaving issue had been living, and so that such descendants shall inherit the share which their parent would have received if living, in equal shares.

9. That the same law of inheritance prescribed in the last section shall prevail as to the other direct lineal descendants of every brother and sister of the intestate, to the remotest degree, whenever such descendants are of unequal degrees.

10. That if there be no heir entitled to take under any of the preceding sections, the inheritance, if the same shall have come to the intestate on the part of his father, shall descend:

Firstly—To the brothers and sisters of the father of the intestate in equal shares if all be living.

Secondly—If any be living, and any shall have died leaving issue, then to such brothers and sisters as shall be living, and to the descendants of such of the said brothers and sisters as shall have died, in equal shares.

Thirdly—If all such brothers and sisters shall have died, then to their descendants; and that in all such cases the inheritance shall descend in the same manner as if all such brothers and sisters, had been the brothers and sisters of the intestate.

11. That if there be no brothers or sisters, or any of them, of the father of the intestate, and no descendants of such brothers and sisters then the inheritance shall descend to the brothers and sisters of the mother of the intestate, and to the descendants of such of the said brothers and sisters as shall have died, or if all shall have died, then to their descendants, in the same manner as if all such brothers and sisters had been the brothers and sisters of the father.

12. That in all cases not provided for by the preceding sections, where the inheritance shall have come to the intestate on the part of his mother, the same instead of descending to the brothers and sisters of the intestate's father, and their descendants as prescribed in the preceding tenth section, shall descend to the brothers and sisters of the intestate's mother, and to their descendants, as directed in the next preceding section; and if there be no such brothers and sisters or descendants of them, then such inheritance shall descend to the brothers and sisters and their descendants of the intestate's father as before prescribed.

13. That in cases where the inheritance has not come to the intestate on the part of either the father or the mother, the inheritance shall descend to the brothers and sisters both of the father and mother of the intestate in equal shares, and to their descendants, in the same manner as if all such brothers and sisters had been the brothers and sisters of the intestate.

14. That relatives of the half blood shall inherit equally with those of the whole blood in the same degree, and the descendants of such relatives shall inherit in the same manner as the descendants of the whole blood, unless the inheritance came to the intestate by descent, devise or gift of some one of his ancestors; in which case all those who are not of the blood of such ancestors shall be excluded from such inheritance.

15. That on failure of heirs under the preceding rules the inheritance shall descend to the remaining next of kin of the intestate, according to the rules in the English Statutes of distribution of the personal estate.

16. That whenever there shall be but one person entitled to inherit according to the provisions of this Act, he shall take and hold the inheritance solely; and wherever an inheritance, or a share of an inheritance, shall descend to several persons under the provisions of this Act, they shall take as tenants in common, in proportion to their respective rights.

17. That descendants and relatives of the intestate begotten before his death, but born thereafter, shall in all cases inherit in the same manner as if they had been born in the life time of the intestate and had survived him.

18. That children and relatives who are illegitimate shall not be entitled to inherit under any of the provisions of this Act.

19. That the estate of the husband as tenant by the courtesy, or of a widow as tenant in dower, shall not be affected by any of the provisions of this Act, nor shall the same affect any limitation of any estate by deed or will, or any estate which, although held in fee simple or for the life of another, is so held in trust for any other person, but all such estates shall remain, pass and descend as if this Act had not been passed.

20. That if any child of an intestate shall have been advanced by the intestate by settlement or portion of real or personal estate, or of both of them, and the same shall have been so expressed by the intestate in writing, or so acknowledged in writing by the child, the value thereof shall be reckoned, for the purposes of this section only, as part of the real and personal estate of such intestate descendable to his heirs, and to be distributed to his next of kin according to law; and if such advancement be equal or superior to the amount of the share which such child would be entitled to receive of the real and personal estate of the deceased, as above reckoned, then such child and his descendants shall be excluded from any share in the real and personal estate of the intestate.

21. That if such advancement be not equal to such share, such child and his descendants shall be entitled to receive so much only of the personal estate, and to inherit so much only of the real estate of the intestate, as shall be sufficient to make all the shares of the children in such real and personal estate and advancement to be equal, as near as can be estimated.

22. That the value of any real or personal estate so advanced shall be deemed to be that, if any, which may have been acknowledged by the child by an instrument in writing, otherwise such value shall be estimated according to the value of the property when given.

23. That the maintaining or educating or the giving of money to a child, without a view to a portion or settlement in life, shall not be deemed an advancement within the meaning of this Act.

24. That it shall be lawful, and competent for the parties authorized to make partition of any such Real Estate according to law, and they are hereby required to receive from any of the persons entitled to a share of such Real Estate, an offer or proposition to purchase the share or shares of the other parties interested therein, giving the preference, however, to the person who would have been the heir-at-law thereto had this Act not been passed; and after such heir-at-law, then giving such preference to the several persons successively who would have been such heirs-at-law had this Act not been passed, and after such heir-at-law, then giving such preference to the several persons successively who would have been such heirs-at-law, had this Act not been passed, and had those persons preceding them respectively in the series of such preference been dead at the time of the death of the intestate; and the parties so authorized to make such partition, shall certify particularly to the Court in which proceedings for such partition may be commenced or

pending, the particulars of such offer or proposition for purchase, the nature, quantity and value of the Estate or share proposed to be purchased, and whether they advise such offer or proposition to be accepted or rejected, and their reasons therefor; Provided always, nevertheless, firstly, that it shall be competent to any Court authorized to make partition of Real Estate, to direct a sale of the same if they shall think it right so to do, upon the application of any of the parties beneficially interested therein, giving however the preference at all times to the person who would have been the heir-at-law to such Real Estate had this Act not been passed, and after such heir-at-law, then giving such preference to the several persons successively who would have been such heirs-at-law, had this Act not been passed, and had those persons preceding them respectively in the series of such preference, been dead at the time of the death of the intestate. And provided also, secondly, that every such preference shall be upon and subject to such terms, security and conditions as such Court may think it right to direct.

25. That the term "Real Estate" as used in this Act shall be construed to include every estate, interest, and right, legal and equitable, held in Fee Simple or for

the life of another (except as in the nineteenth section of this Act is before excepted) in lands, tenements and hereditaments in Upper Canada, but not to such as are determined or extinguished by the death of the intestate seized or possessed thereof, or so otherwise entitled thereto, nor to leases for years; and the term "Inheritance" as used in this Act, shall be understood to mean Real Estate as herein defined, descended or succeeded to, according to the provisions of this Act.

26. That whenever, in the preceding sections, any person is described as living, it shall be understood that he was living at the time of the death of the intestate from whom the descent or succession came, and whenever any person is described as having died, it shall be understood that he died before such intestate.

27. That the expressions used in this Act, "where the estate shall have come to the intestate on the part of the father" or "mother" as the case may be, shall be construed to include every case where the inheritance shall have come to the intestate by devise, gift or descent from the parent referred to or from any relative of the blood of such parent.

28. That this Act shall apply to that part of this Province called Upper Canada, and to none other.

Another very noticeable fact, to which we would draw attention, is the remarkable increase in our Export Trade to the United States by Inland Ports and which is shown in the following Comparative Table for the three last years.

When it is considered that this latter Trade is still in its infancy, and, in fact, had no existence only a few years ago—and that in many articles it already equals, and in some exceeds our exports to the Mother Country—it affords matter for reflection, as to what the future Commercial Policy of this Country, should be. For instance, the quantity of Ashes exported by inland last year, was 21,700 brls., against 25,620 brls. by Sea. The quantity of Flour was 369,761 brls., against 290,673 brls. by Sea. That of Wheat was 1,213,078 bushels, against only 81,951 bushels; and of Oats, 657,639 bushels, against only 12,613 bushels by Sea. The Export of Timber and Sawn Lumber also shows that our Trade with the United States in these Articles is increasing in a rapid ratio, whilst that with England, in the same articles, has apparently seen its maximum, being for the last four years less in the aggregate, than for the two years preceding.

For the course of Prices for the last eight years, we must content ourselves with merely remarking, that the average prices of Breadstuffs and Freight, show a decline year by year, for the last few years—whilst Ashes show a very considerable advance.

In conclusion, we would draw attention to the gratifying evidence of returning prosperity afforded of the value of Bank Stocks since 1848. For instance, in 1849, "Montreal Bank" Stock stood for months at 10 @ 11 discount—it is now worth 19 @ 11 premium; "Commercial" stood for months at 10 discount—it is now worth 2 premium. "City" was at low as 40 discount upon the Reduced Stock—and is now worth 27 discount; "Upper Canada" was at 37 discount—and is now worth 8 discount.

United States Postage.

The following is a synopsis of the Postage Law of the United States, which came in force on 1st July, 1851:—

LETTER POSTAGE.

A letter not exceeding half an ounce, three cents pre-paid and five cents if not, under three thousand miles; but over that distance double these rates.

A letter when conveyed wholly or in part by sea to or from a foreign country, over 2,500 miles, twenty cents; and under 2,500 miles ten cents, except all cases where the postages have been or shall be adjusted at different rates by postal treaty or convention.

Advertised letters, one cent in addition to the regular postage. Drop letters, one cent.

NEWSPAPER POSTAGE.

Weekly newspapers sent free of postage in the county where published.

Weekly newspapers not exceeding three ounces in weight and sent within fifty miles out of the county where published - - - - 5 cents per quarter.

Not exceeding 300 miles - - - - 10 " "

Not exceeding 1000 miles - - - - 15 " "

Not exceeding 2000 miles - - - - 20 " "

Not exceeding 4000 miles - - - - 25 cents per quarter.

Any distance over 4000 miles - - 30 " "

Semi-weekly, double; tri-weekly, treble; and oftner than tri-weekly, five times these rates.

Newspapers not containing over three hundred square inches one-fourth of the above rates.

Monthly newspapers, one-fourth, and semi-monthly, one half of the postage on a weekly newspaper.

NEWSPAPERS, CIRCULARS, HANDBILLS, PAMPHLETS, PERIODICALS, &c.

For any distance not exceeding 500 miles - - 1 c't & oz.

Not exceeding - - - - - 1500 " - - 2 c'ts "

Do. - - - - - 2500 " - - 3 " "

Do. - - - - - 3500 " - - 4 " "

Any distance exceeding - - - 3500 " - - 5 " "

Subscribers to all periodicals must pay one quarter's postage in advance, and in such cases the postage shall be one half the foregoing rates.

Bound books not weighing over 32 ounces may be sent by mail at the above rates. All printed matter sent by mail must be pre-paid, and if sent without pre-payment is charged double the amount of the above rates.

COUNTIES, UPPER CANADA.

The recent Acts affecting the territorial divisions of Upper Canada, are 12 Vic. Cap. 78, abolishing Districts, and establishing Counties and Unions; 12 Vic. Cap. 79, respecting Essex, Kent and Lambton; 12 Vic. Cap. 96, respecting Huron, Perth and Bruce; and the Act of 1851, 14 and 15 Vic. Cap. 5, "to make certain alterations in the territorial divisions of Upper Canada." These Acts are given at length, in the third edition of *Scobie's Municipal Manual*, now in the Press. The arrangements of Counties and Unions of Counties on the succeeding pages, are those provided by the Act of 1851, and they take effect on 1st January, 1852. The extent of Townships in acres, and the amount of their population, have been taken from a return laid before Parliament in June last, certified by the Commissioner of Crown Lands, and the Secretary of the Board of Registration and Statistics. The total values of real property, and of taxable personal property in Townships, and their annual values in Cities, Towns and Villages, taken under the provisions of the Assessment Act of 1850, [vide page 46,] are given, as also the names and Post Office addresses, of various Municipal Officers. These have been made up from Returns which we obtained from the Clerks of the respective Municipalities. While we acknowledge, with thanks, the promptitude with which on application, these were sent to us, we regret that there are several instances, in which no returns have reached us; and probably the parties to whom we applied, and from whom we expected to have obtained them, will now see the bad effects of the omission. The Townships which are divided into Wards, are marked with a *; the Unions of Townships are marked with a ~. Considerable irregularity may be discovered, in the comparative valuations of property in Townships, arising probably out of the conflicting views entertained by different assessors, of the meaning of certain parts of the Assessment Act, and also from the assessed value of vacant or absentee lands, being included in some of the returns and not in others. This latter discrepancy may be pretty accurately discovered, by contrasting the stated values, with the extent and population of the Townships. The Cities of Toronto, Kingston and Hamilton, are Counties in themselves, for Municipal purposes.

We fill up the remaining space, with the following condensation, of valuable materials sent us from New Brunswick.

EDUCATIONAL, N. B.

The Provincial Board of Education for New Brunswick, is composed of the Lieutenant Governor and the Executive Council. *Secretary*—John Gregory, Fredericton. *Training Master*—E. H. Duval, St. John.

THE UNIVERSITY OF KING'S COLLEGE, is established at Fredericton, of which the Queen is Patron, the Lieut. Governor is visitor, the Chief Justice is Chancellor, and the Bishop is President. There is also a Council, composed of distinguished persons. The Convocation comprises the Chancellor, President and Professors, and persons admitted Masters of Arts, or to degrees in Divinity, Law or Medicine. The Professors are—*Principal and Professor of Classical Literature, History, Moral Philosophy and Divinity*—Rev. Edwin Jacob, D. D.; *Mathematics and Natural Philosophy*—Wm. B. Jack, A. M.; *Chemistry and Natural History*—James Robb, M. D.; *Modern Languages*—

There is a Collegiate School attached to the University, with an efficient staff of Classical and Mathematical Masters.

GRAMMAR SCHOOLS, N. B.—The supervision of the County Grammar Schools in New Brunswick, is vested in Boards of Directors and Trustees, appointed by the Lieut. Governor in Council. There are thirteen of them, from which we have been favoured with returns for 1850. These are situated severally in the Counties of St. John, Charlotte, Northumberland (2), Gloucester, Carleton, Salsbury, King's, Queen's, Restigouche, Albert, Westmorland, and Kent. The teachers receive £100 a year each, from Government, and fees averaging something over £50; but the teacher at St. John is more amply provided for, his government allowance being £150, and his other emoluments £230; while the second teacher at Northumberland, receives only £50 from Government, with £50 only as his other emoluments. The following abstract statement, relating to these thirteen Grammar Schools, for 1850, will convey some idea of their importance:—

PARISH SCHOOLS, N. B.—The general management of

the Parish Schools in New Brunswick, is vested in the Board of Education, composed of the Lieut. Governor and Executive Council. The average number of Schools in the Counties has heretofore been limited to nine for each Parish: but the number may now be increased to thirteen in any Parish, provided the whole number in the County does not exceed the established average. The Government allowance to the teachers, is £30 a year for the first class; £22 for the second; and £18 for the third. The other emoluments range between £20 and £100, the general average being about £30. The following is taken from the Parish School returns of 1850:—

SIR,—The Committee of the Consolidated Board of General Officers, having had before them the two inclosed letters from Mr. Joseph Stovel, (with memorandums from the Duke of Wellington and the Deputy Adjutant General attached thereto,) together with a pair of Trowsers submitted by Mr. Stovel to exemplify the improvements which he proposes in the cut and make of that garment for the Service of the Cavalry, have deemed it expedient to obtain his personal attendance, and also to see some Dragoons fitted with Overalls made after this Pattern; and they are therefore now in a position to form a decided opinion upon its merits.

The advantages of the proposed Pattern over that at present established, are, that it fits the body neater and better in any position; that, while sitting closer at the fork, it affords a greater freedom of stride; and that the leg-secum is so placed as to be less exposed to friction by the saddle or by the stirrup-leather. It is found, moreover, on reference to some of the principal Army Clothiers, who admit the proposed Pattern to be an improvement, that these advantages can be obtained without entailing an additional expense upon the Colonel. The Board are therefore enabled to submit, for the consideration of His Grace The COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF, their entire approval of the proposed Pattern, for which, in their opinion, Mr. Stovel deserves much credit; and they have caused a Pair of Overalls to be prepared, of the proper quality, and of a size calculated to fit a man of 5 feet 10 inches in height, (the usual standard of scaled patterns,) which they beg to recommend to His Grace to be scaled as the established Pattern, in place of that now deposited in this Office.



Eclipses.

In the year 1853, there will be two Eclipses of the Sun, and one of the Moon.

I. An annular Eclipse of the Sun, June 6, 1853, not visible in Canada, but visible in Texas, Mexico, and the Southern States; central and annular about the Equator. Begins on the earth generally, June 6d. 5h. 7m., Greenwich Mean Time—in Longitude 156° 49' W.—Latitude 23° 23' S.

Central Eclipse begins generally June 6d. 7h. 58m.—in Longitude 170° 26' W.—Latitude 0° 38' N. Ends June 6d. 9d. 57m.—in Longitude 63° 27' W.—Latitude 9° 8' S.

Eclipse ends on the earth generally, 6d 11h. 7m.—in Longitude 77° 32' W.—and Latitude 1° 42' S.

II. A partial Eclipse of the Moon, June 23, 1853, visible in Canada. The following table contains the mean time of the principal phases of this Eclipse, at each of the places named :


III. A partial Eclipse of the Sun, January 20, 1853, not visible in Canada, being confined to regions surrounding the South Pole.

III. A total Eclipse of the Sun, November 30, 1853, not visible in Canada, but confined to South America and the Pacific Ocean. Begins on the earth generally, November 30d. 4h. 37.6m. mean time at Greenwich, in Longitude 153° 36' W., and Latitude 19° 47' N. Central Eclipse begins generally, November 30d. 5h. 33.7m. ends 30d. 8h. 56.3m. Eclipse ends on the earth, generally, November 30d. 9h. 52.5m. in Longitude 57° 49' W. and 0° 25' S.

Saturn's Ring.—To render Saturn's Ring visible to the earth, it is necessary that the Sun and the Earth, as viewed from the Planet, be elevated on the same side of it, which is the case during the whole of 1853. It will attain its greatest apparent diameter in November, 1853, when apparent outer *major* axis of the outer rim will be =46.32'—apparent outer *minor* axis=19.05'.

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

Explanation of the Articles in the Calendar.

THE SUN'S DECLINATION is given for mean noon at Toronto, for every day: the difference for mean noon for any other place in the British Provinces, will rarely amount to one minute.

APPARENT NOON, SHOWING THE EQUATION OF TIME.—This column contains the mean time corresponding to the apparent noon on each day, or the hour which should be shown by a clock or watch at Toronto, when a Sundial marks twelve o'clock. Its error at any other place in the British Provinces will rarely amount to one second. The Equation of Time is the difference in time between the real place of the Sun, and its supposed or mean place. The actual error is between the successive arrivals of the Sun on the meridian, or the length of successive solar days, is variable, owing to the difference in the rapidity of the motion of the earth in different parts of its orbit, and in the inclination of the successive parts of the ecliptic to the equator. But as time-keepers cannot be made to measure an interval which varies every day, a clock or watch is made to mark twenty-four hours in the average of all the days. In other words, it is made to keep pace with an imaginary or mean Sun, having a motion exactly equal to the average motion of the real or apparent Sun. Hence, when it is twelve o'clock by the real Sun, it may be before or after twelve by the mean Sun. The true Sun and the mean or imaginary Sun coincide four times in each year, viz., about the 15th of March, the 15th of June, the 1st September, and the 24th December. The difference between them or the Equation of Time, is never more than sixteen minutes. A Sun-dial gives *Apparent Time*, and must be corrected by applying the *Equation of Time*, before setting a watch or clock by it.

SUN RISING AND SETTING.—The *mean time* of the Sun rising and setting is given for every day for Toronto and Montreal, and will be found given for every tenth day at Quebec, Halifax, and Fredericton, by referring to the Table at page 17. If the time is wanted for any intermediate day, enter the table of Semi-diurnal Arcs (page 17) with the Sun's declination for that day, the value given, subtracted from, or added to, the *mean time* of apparent noon, will give the hour of rising or setting. The value as it stands in that Table is the *apparent time* of setting and its complement to 12h., the *apparent time* of rising.

THE MOON'S RISING OR SETTING is given for every day at Montreal and Toronto: the time of rising being when she sets during daylight: and the time of setting when she rises during daylight. The time given for Montreal will never be more than four minutes in error for Halifax, three minutes in error for Fredericton, and five minutes in error for Quebec; and it is, therefore, near enough for ordinary reference at those places.

THE PLANETS.—The hour of meridian passage, right ascension and declination of each of the principal planets, is given for the 1st and 15th of each month. (*m signifies morning.*) To which is added the *mean time* transit ☉ or the mean time of transit of the first point of Aries, being the mean time corresponding to 0h. 0m. 0s. of Sidereal time, on each of those days. By the aid of this Table the time of the meridian passage of any heavenly body may be readily found. From the right ascension of the body subtract the *retardation*, which is at the rate of 9.83s., for each hour, or 0.16s. for each minute of its R. A.; and the remainder to the mean time transit ☉; the sum, diminishing, by 24s., will be the mean time of the meridian passage of the body in question. For any other day than the 1st or 15th of the month, apply a correction at the rate of 3m. 53.91s. per day, reckoned from the nearest given day, to be added if for an earlier day, subtracted if for a later day.

METEOROLOGICAL.—We have reprinted, at page 23, a paper from the *Upper Canada Medical Journal*, by Captain J. H. Lefroy, Royal Artillery, F.R.S., upon the winter of 1851-'2, which will be referred to with interest by those of our readers who may desire to see how far the very general impression which was current at the time, of its unusual severity, is borne out by an actual comparison with the last twenty-one winters. In the meteorological notices accompanying the Almanac for the several months, we have given the mean results of observations made at Balsam Lake, township of Bexley, by Mr. J. Stevens. Balsam Lake is about 70 miles N.E. from Toronto, and from 1100 to 1200 feet above the sea,—or about 700 feet above H. M. Observatory at Toronto. The thermometer used was an ordinary japanned one, such as are purchased at hardware stores, and has never been compared with an accredited standard; until this shall be done, the temperatures must be regarded as somewhat uncertain; but as a register of the backwoods, continued with regularity and perseverance for a long period of years, it will have interest for a large number of our readers. The means are derived from observations at noon only, and for the sake of comparison, the mean temperature at the same hour has been extracted, by permission, from the records at H. M. Observatory, Toronto, for all those months in which an observation was made at that hour. The corrections to reduce the mean temperature at noon to the mean for the 24 hours at Toronto, are nearly as follows:—

The * signifies that the record is imperfect.

THE POLE STAR.—For the convenience of land surveyors and others, we this year give a Table in which will be found not only the mean time of the meridian passage of this star for every tenth day of the year, but also the mean time of its greatest elongation from the meridian, upon the parallel of 41½ deg., and its azimuth at that time upon three parallels, namely, 43 deg., 44½ deg., and 46 deg. The middle of these is the parallel which passes through the greatest number of Townships; and the first and third are nearly the limiting parallels of Upper Canada. The object of the Table is to furnish a ready and accurate way of referring a Tacheo-bolite or other instrument to the true meridian. Where the time is known with accuracy, that is best done by means of the Pole Star when on the meridian; but as at that time it changes its azimuth at the rate of half a minute of arc to one minute of time, in

these latitudes; when the latter is not known with accuracy, then the Star must be referred to when at its *greatest elongation*, at which time its azimuth changes so slowly that an error of a few minutes will not be important, and the angle given in the Table must be added to, or subtracted from, the reading, as the case may be. For any other day, or any other latitude than those given, a value can be interpolated. By means of the North Polar distance of the Star, which is added, the same opportunity may be employed for determining the latitude very nearly.

The duties on gold in Russia on the produce of the private mines are heavy, varying from 12 to 24 per cent.; in Austria they amount to 10 per cent., in Brazil to 5 per cent., and are understood to lead to a great deal of smuggling. In other countries, such as the United States, where there are no duties, the gold and silver stated in the table are only the quantities brought to the mints to be coined, there being no means of determining the quantity used in jewellery and other arts and manufactures.

The annual produce of gold in the whole world (excepting Africa and some parts of Asia) at the commencement of the century was in a somewhat greater ratio, being lb. of gold to 45lb. of silver; in the year 1846 the produce of gold (including Africa, but excepting China and Japan) was at the rate of 1 to 17. In 1850 the produce of the same countries had risen to 1 of gold to 7 of silver.

As regards the produce of gold in 1851, in California, it would appear that it must have amounted to about \$2,115,500, equal to £1739,514. The yield of the newly discovered gold mining region at Bathurst, New South Wales, and at Mount Alexander and Buninyong, Victoria, may be stated at fully £1,000,000. Hence there is an increase to the production of 1850 of 121,382 lb. Troy of fine gold, the total produce of gold in 1851 being, therefore, 490,352lb.; at £50 19s. 5½d. per lb. pure gold, equal to £24,594,968. There is much reason to believe (*vide* the comparative table) that the annual produce of silver is now steadily increasing, say at the very low rate of 2½ per cent. The yield of silver in 1851 will thus be 2,229,970lb. Troy, equal to £9,008,960. Consequently the total value of the produce of gold and silver in 1851 is £34,002,968.

But, large as the produce of gold is thus shown to have been in 1851 in California and Australia, it is likely to be greatly increased in 1852, it being confidently expected by the Americans that the recent discoveries of very rich deposits in various districts of California will raise the exports for the twelve months to \$100,000,000, equal to £21,911,666. This, moreover, is a very moderate allowance, as the exports alone in the first three months are known to have amounted to \$3,000,000 more than those of the corresponding three months of 1851; while, as regards Australia, late news from that quarter makes it probable that the produce there will at least amount to one-half of the yield of California in '50, or £2,000,000. The exports merely from Australia up to January 15th (although gold dust was selling as low as £2 17s. per ounce) have amounted to 251,000 ounces, equivalent to £1,000,000, a part of the yield of about four months' digging. Should other countries only yield at the same rate as in 1850 or 1851, viz., £0,651,522, thus, added to the produce of California and Australia, will amount to £39,696,188 or 661 032½lb. Troy. Estimating the increase in the yield of silver at 2½ per cent, the amount of silver for 1852 is 2,798,219lb.; at £3 6s. per lb., equal to £9,234,122. The total value of both gold and silver for the year 1852 is, therefore, £42,930,310.

These tables, imperfect though they be, will suffice to show that the produce of gold in the world has greatly increased in the last few years. It would appear that it has risen from 114,674lb. in 1816, to 365,950lb. in 1850. In those five years the increase has been at the rate of 219 per cent., while silver has only increased from 1,979,044lb. in 1816, to 2,633,861lb. in 1850, or 34½ (34.5) per cent. The former metal is, therefore, apparently increasing at the rate of 44 (42.8) per cent. per annum, and the latter at 7 (6.9) per cent. The greater part of the increase in silver is in Mexico, which is doubtless owing to a variety of circumstances, such as restored tranquility, richer mines, and greater skill. It would not, therefore, be safe to count upon such an increase every year, but we are certainly not exaggerating in saying that silver is now regularly increasing throughout the world. It may be estimated at an average of 2½ per cent. per annum.

It is a remarkable fact, however, and worth recalling, that in the country where the greatest increase of silver has taken place there was concurrently a loss of thousands of pounds of English capital by the various English silver mining companies; so much so that none of all the silver mining companies projected to work mines in Mexico between 1824 and 1831 have been successful. Some of them were being wound up during the very time when mining was prosperously conducted by the Mexicans. This seems to have been owing to a want of knowledge, or of control, or to the mischief of share jobbing in the English companies; but, whatever may have been the cause, the natives of that country have found silver mining to be profitable. The enormous profit of £240,000 a-year obtained by the old Spaniards from the Valenciann mine, a profit larger than all the tin and copper mines of England put together, is generally looked upon more as a fable than a reality by those who have heard casually of silver mining as conducted by English mining companies. The English gold mining companies have done better, and probably, had they some 20 years ago the skill and knowledge of the present day, they would have been highly successful.

The quantity of gold produced in America at the beginning of this century was according to Humboldt, 45,331lb. Troy, and that of silver 2,131,770lb. In 1846 the produce of gold in America had fallen to 25,503lb. Compared with the silver then produced, viz., 1,594,431lb., the gold was therefore 62 times less than the silver. In 1850 the yield of gold, in consequence of the great discoveries

eight times less than the weight of the silver

the specie appears to the value of £20,231,937, being the largest amount she has ever held, and £3,582,722 above her highest accumulation previous to the development of the wealth of California.

It may be stated generally that there was, in 1850, five times as much gold produced in North and South

The gold coinage last year in the United States exceeded by £3,398,927 the largest coinage of the same metal ever made in the United Kingdom. And the coinage in France during the first 10 months exceeded by £536,494 the memorable gold coinage in this country of £9,520,758 in the year 1821.

The annual consumption of the precious metals (exclusive of coinage) in Europe and America is supposed to be about £1,840,000, to which there may be added for the other quarters of the globe £1,660,000. Total, £3,500,000. It is important, but difficult, to determine how much of this sum consists of gold. M. Jacob about 20 years ago estimated the annual consumption of gold in Great Britain at £1,635,000. The other countries of the globe would at least consume half as much more, making £2,451,000, to which the annual gold coinage has to be added; comparing this total with the quantity of gold produced at the beginning of the century, or even for many years after, it then appears that gold from the mines was not raised in amount equal to the entire consumption; besides which, it seems to have been used relatively in a greater proportion than silver, and accounts for the premium in France of 12 francs per mill over silver, which gold not unfrequently commanded till the recent discoveries, for a pound Troy of gold in France in 1892 was found to be exactly equal to 15lb. 6oz. of silver, but afterwards became equal to 15lb. 8oz. Now, however, the premium is likely to be reversed most materially, for, deducting the £2,451,000 of gold consumed in the arts from the supposed yield of the gold mines in the present year, viz., £3,696,188, leaves £1,245,188 to be converted into coin; being a larger sum by £5,230,053, than the total circulation of gold coin in Great Britain in the year 1790. The general inference that specie must be accumulating is further borne out by the fact that, notwithstanding discounts are unusually low in the three principal cities of the world, yet there is in each city a notable increase of bullion, compared with 1845, as the following table will show:

America as in any of the most productive years of the American mines under the Spanish Government. At the same time the silver mines of America were yielding quite as much silver as at the beginning of the century, when they were nearly as productive as at any former or later period under Spanish dominion.

Yet, notwithstanding the great increase in the produce of gold relative to silver, it is a curious fact that the price of silver has not risen; on the contrary, it has fallen in value. In the course of the week, ending April 17th, 1852, £350,000 worth of silver was sold at 5s. an oz., British standard, which is only equivalent to 64s. 6d. per lb. Troy, for pure silver. At that rate 1 lb. of pure gold is worth 15½ (19.74) pounds of pure silver. In January, 1851, gold was only 15¼ (15.5) times more valuable than silver.

Although the 212 tons is an increase of no less than 12 times the quantity produced at the beginning of the century—a quantity of the glittering treasure that is fraught with the mightiest consequence to society—yet, as respects bulk, it sinks into perfect insignificance, for, if it were melted into bars, a closet 8 feet high, 8 long, and 8 broad, would hold it all. It would require 21,713 times as much space to hold all the iron that is now smelted in Great Britain.

In 1801 the quantity of pure gold produced in America was 46,331 lb; in Europe and Northern Asia (exclusive of China and Japan), 4,916 lb; total produce, 51,247 lb; = 55,910 lb. British standard gold = £2,612,250.

In 1846 the quantity of pure gold produced in America was 25,593 lb; in Europe, Africa and Asia, (exclusive of China and Japan), 50,191 lb; total produce, 114,674 lb = 125,108 lb. British standard gold = £5,816,772.

In 1850, the quantity of pure gold produced in America was 261,731 lb; in Europe, Africa and Asia, (exclusive of China and Japan), 104,219 lb; total produce, 365,950 lb = 399,247 lb. British standard gold = £18,654,322.

On the Winter of 1851-2 in Upper Canada.

BY CAPTAIN J. H. LEFROY, R. A., F. R. S.

The impression that the past winter was one of a character almost without a precedent, if not in the actual severity of the cold, yet in its long and steady continuance, appears to have been so general throughout Canada and the United States, that it is worth while to examine how far, upon such a subject, fading impressions may be brought into comparison with vivid and recent ones, and whether the winter in question has really surpassed in severity any thing included within the memory of the present generation. I am not acquainted with sufficient data for extending the inquiry further back than the winter of 1831-2, but for the twenty-one winters embraced between that year and 1851-2, the observations of the Rev. C. Dade, made in or near Toronto, and published in that most valuable work Scobie's Canadian Almanack for 1851, together with those of H. M. Observatory, furnish two series which can be easily connected for the purpose, provided no permanent instrumental or local difference has existed

between them. In order to ascertain this point, I have compared the mean values for S. A. M., for each winter during six years in which the observations were contemporaneous.

They were as follows:—One summer month is added for comparison.

These observations were made at Mr. Dade's present place of residence, near Oakville, about 18 miles S. W., from the Observatory: it appears from the comparison that the mean temperatures recorded at the latter point are, in almost every instance, lower than those of Mr. Dade; on the average of thirty-four winter months, 0° .8 lower. In the summer the difference is between two and three degrees. The Magnetical Observatory being distant about two miles from the open lake, while the residence of Mr. Dade is within a quarter of a mile of the shore, it might be expected that the neighbourhood of so large a body of water, having necessarily a temperature higher than the mean temperature of the air, would tend to diminish the cold in its immediate neighbourhood, at least in the months of December, January and February; but the differences are too irregular to be attributable entirely to this cause, and are probably in some cases the result of real local irregularities, in others, occasioned by extreme temperatures, falling occasionally on Sunday, and being included in one register, not in the other, but principally, both in summer and in winter, due to a difference in the position of the instrument, and to the great care with which the thermometer at the Observatory is protected from direct and indirect radiation, and placed in an artificial shade more complete than is usually thought requisite, although admitting a free circulation of air from W. N. and E. It is possible also that the thermometer used by Mr. Dade may have had an index error, as unfortunately is the case with most of these instruments. To whatever cause due the average difference is not sufficiently large to preclude comparison, and the observations in the earlier years of the series, to which alone I shall have to recur, having been taken at the Upper Canada College in Toronto, would probably differ considerably less than those.

Mr. Dade's observations are given for S. A. M. only; to reduce them to the true mean of the 24th, we must apply the following corrections derived from ten years observations:—

In January, add 2.02. In April, add 1.15. In July, subtract 0.14. In October, add 1.55.
 February, " 3.08. May, " 6.59. August add 0.18. November, " 1.05.
 March, " 2.09. June, " 6.21. September, " 0.77. December, " 1.98.

The exceptional character of the diurnal curve of temperature for the month of February, or more probably that of January, which instead of being colder than February is in Canada slightly warmer, is a peculiarity worth notice, but is established by every year of the series, with one exception. The following are the mean temperatures for each of the winter months, in the whole series.

It will be seen that the mean for the six months compared is actually the lowest since the winter of 1836-7; and although slightly exceeded in severity by that winter and two earlier ones in the series, the difference in its favour is so trifling, both in that case, and as compared with the winter of 1831-2 that it might possibly disappear, if, instead of deducing mean temperatures, from one observation daily, which in individual months leaves a liability to error to the extent of about one degree, we possessed it from observation. This remark does not apply to the winter of 1835-6, which is said, however, to have been the most severe in North America since 1770-80, and was

decidedly more severe than that of 1831-2. The total quantity of snow, also far exceeds that of any one of the nine winters, in which it has been recorded.

So far therefore, the winter taken in its popular extent, maintains its character, but this results chiefly from our having excluded October, and included April. October 1851 was unusually warm and genial, having had a mean temperature of 47.8 which is 39.3 higher than the mean for the same series of years, while April, 1852 has been one of the coldest in it.

It is also remarkable that the lowest mean temperature of the series does not occur in any one month of the past winter, and is only approached by two, November and January: there was no individual month in it nearly so extreme of its kind as December 1831, January 1849, February 1835, and February and March 1847. The first of these is so very remarkable that but for the privilege Mr. Dade has kindly given me of consulting his original journal, I should have suspected an error. It appears that in this year the cold set in on the 25th November, and with such severity that the mean temperature at 8 A. M. for three weeks, from the 30th November to the 14th December, inclusive, was only 19.0—lower than the mean for the same hour for any one winter month at Montreal.

We may next refer to the meteorological winter, or months of December, January, and February: the mean of which is given in the following table, together with the lowest temperature at 8 A. M. in each season—the lowest at any hour, and the number of observation which indicated at that hour temperatures below zero, and from zero to 20° in the three months.

We see that taken in its meteorological sense, the past winter was less severe than those of 1831-2, and 1835-6, but ranks decidedly among the coldest of the series. In respect to the lowest temperature recorded it has been often exceeded. The winter of 1831-2, if we restrict the term to these three months, appears to have been the most exceptional of the whole, and it may be mentioned in this connection, on authority of Mr. Paine's observations at Boston, that the winter of 1837-8 was the mildest of the last 27, it is stated that the Hudson River did not close at all in that winter.

It does not appear from Table III. that any very distinct alternation of mild and severe winters is to be recognized in the period covered by the comparison; on the whole, however, we find that of the last nine winters, six were warmer than the average, and of the previous nine, six were colder than the average;—this latter period again, as there is reason to think, was preceded by a series of mild seasons, so that there are some grounds for supposing that we may now expect a succession of the opposite character: but, it is evident, that a very cold winter frequently occurs in a warm series, and a mild one in a cold series. Of the former character may have been that of 1849-50, which by this rule should fall in a warm group, although it will long be remembered by the old inhabitants of Canada, for the memorable *black night*, the 1st January, 1850, in which the temperature changed in a few hours from a high thermometer, with rapid thaw, warm and genial sunshine to the most intense frost, producing distress and devastation unparalleled in their recollection. There are probably in existence some precise notes taken on this remarkable occasion, but I have not been able to hear of them.

Toronto Bay was frozen over on the 13th December, 1841, and within a day or two of that early date was crossed in sleighs from the neighbourhood of the Queen's Wharf; as to the date, it has been frequently frozen as early, as in 1835 it was frozen on Dec. 1, in 1845 on the 3rd, and in 1840 on the 6th December, but in most, if not all of these cases it broke up again; this was not the case in 1851, when it was so solid that as early as December 13, the steamboats found it necessary to land their passengers at the edge of it, half-a-mile or more beyond that point, and at one time were reduced to landing them with great difficulty and some danger, upon the south side of the Peninsula, by boats, indeed the ice extended in a solid state considerably beyond the new Garrison, and with a broken margin nearly to the east point of the Humber Bay, thus presenting a solid surface almost as far as could be seen from the city; all which are circumstances of very rare occurrence. Although the closing and opening of the bay are affected by accidental circumstances, and an uncertain criterion of the character of the winter, the following memoranda on the subject may be interesting, the dates previous to 1840 are extracted from Mr. Dade's valuable notes, and for the subsequent years derived chiefly from memoranda kept for his own information by Serjeant J. Walker, Royal Artillery.

There is one circumstance, in addition to the state of the thermometer, which very much affects the impressions derived from the senses as to the severity of a winter, namely the occurrence of high wind with a low temperature;

such was the case on many of the coldest days of the past season, particularly in December and January, when a long continuance of searching westerly gales enhanced the sufferings of those badly provided with fuel, food or clothing to a distressing extent. The following are a few examples:—

On every one of these very cold days we have a high wind. With regard to direction, the mean direction, and mean velocity for each of the above months, from five years registration by Robinson's anemometer, and the mean of the same months in the past winter, are given below:—

There was an unusual prevalence of westerly wind in December and February of northerly in March, and of easterly in April, the other months offer nothing unusual, nor is the quantity of wind excessive in any other month than December and January.

English Mails.

English Mails by the British and American weekly, Liverpool Mail Steamers, are despatched direct from and received at Montreal, Kingston and Toronto. They are despatched every Monday Morning, from these places, to New York and Boston, alternately, for the steamers leaving on the Wednesday. The day of departure from Liverpool, is Saturday in each week.

Part I.

Office Hours of Business.

The Postmaster will keep his Office open for the despatch of business every day, except Sunday, during the usual hours of business in the place, and will attend at such other hours as may be necessary to receive and despatch Mails; and on Sundays he will open the Office for at least one hour before or after Divine Service, as may be most convenient to the public generally.

Part IV.

POSTAGE RATES ON LETTERS.

Postage on Letters in British North America.

58. On Letters not exceeding $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. in weight, between any place in Canada and any other place in British North America, including Canada, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, and Cape Breton, the rate is a uniform charge of 3d.

For every additional weight of half an oz., or any fractional excess of less than half an oz., there shall be charged an additional rate of 3d., thus,—

On a Letter weighing more than $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., and not exceeding 1 oz., 2 rates, or.....	0 6

59. On Letters deposited at an Office for delivery in the same place, called Drop or Box Letters, the rate is One half-penny each, to be brought to account by Postmasters.

Rate on Letters for Great Britain or Ireland.

60. On Letters between any place in Canada and any part of Great Britain or Ireland, if conveyed by the Weekly closed Mails through the United States, the rate is a uniform charge of 1s. 2d. sterling, equal to 1s. 4d. currency, on a Letter not exceeding $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. in weight; and on Letters of greater weight, as follows:—

Letters for United Kingdom—how to be rated.

61. In rating Paid Letters for Great Britain or Ireland, both the sterling and currency rates must be written in red ink, thus, "1s. 2d. = 1s. 4d." On Unpaid Letters the sterling rate only, in black ink, thus, "1s. 2d."

Letters for United Kingdom via Halifax must be specially addressed.

62. On Letters between Canada and the United Kingdom, conveyed by the semi-monthly Mails by way of Quebec, New Brunswick and Halifax, the rate is,—

Rate on Letters to United States.

63. On Letters between any place in Canada and any part of the United States, except California and Oregon, the rate is a uniform charge of 6d., equal to 10 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. weight.

Rate to California and Oregon.

64. On Letters to California and Oregon, the rate is 9d., equal to 15 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz.

Above Rates may be paid or not.

65. Letters to any place in British North America to the United Kingdom, or to the United States, California and Oregon, may be sent at the above rates, Paid or Unpaid at the option of the sender.

Letters for United States if paid, must be paid in full.

66. On Letters for the United States or California, or Oregon, the full rate must be paid or not at all. If only a portion of the rate is paid, it must be cancelled, and the Letter treated as Unpaid.

Rate to Newfoundland.

67. Letters to Newfoundland may be sent via Quebec and Halifax at a Postage rate of 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. Pre-payment optional.

Rate to West Indies via Halifax.

68. Letters to the British West India Islands, via Quebec, Halifax and Bermuda, will be charged the Canada rate of 3d., and in addition the Packet rate for sea conveyance between Halifax and Bermuda of 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ d. currency—making on a Letter not weighing more than $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. a rate of 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ d.; the Pre-payment of which will be optional.

Rate to West Indies via New York: must be specially addressed.

69. Letters may also be sent from Canada to the British West Indies and the Havana by the ordinary United States Mails to New York, and from thence by British Steam Packet to destination, on Pre-payment in Canada of 9d., equal to 15 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. Letters to go by this route must be specially so addressed.

Letters for Nova Scotia through United States.

70. Mails are made up at Montreal every fortnight for Halifax, Nova Scotia, and despatched for conveyance to Halifax with the Mails by the Royal Mail Steamers from Boston to Halifax and Liverpool, by which Letters may be sent to the following places at the rates mentioned:—

Pre-payment of these rates will be optional.

Rate to British Colonies through England.

71. Letters for the East Indies, Australia and New Zealand, VanDienian's Land, the Cape of Good Hope, Mauritius, St. Helena or Sierra Leone, may be sent on Pre-payment of 2s. 5d. currency, on a Letter not weighing more than $\frac{1}{2}$ oz.

72. Letters for France may be sent Paid or Unpaid, and the rates will be,—

73. The rates upon Letters for other Foreign Countries and parts abroad, will be found in the Tables appended to these Regulations, [pp. 36, 37 and 38.]

Part V

POSTAGE STAMPS.

Three kinds of Postage Stamps are in use in Canada for payment of postage, viz., a Threepenny, a Sixpenny, and a Shilling stamp, representing respectively, the Beaver, Prince Albert, and the Queen. To be had of Postmasters of all the Cities and principal Post Offices in the Province. They will also be supplied, where necessary, to other Postmasters, upon application to the Department. Postage Stamps ought to be affixed on the upper right hand corner of letters,—never used as a seal.

Part VI.

WAY LETTERS.

Couriers are bound to receive Letters offered to them whilst on the road between one Post-office and another, when distant over a mile from the nearest Post-office, to be given by the Courier to the first Postmaster at whose office he stops.

Letters left at an office and pre-paid, may be forwarded by the Courier, and delivered to persons on the route, between that and the next office.

Part VII.

SOLDIERS' AND SEAMEN'S LETTERS.

Non-Commissioned Officers, Embodied Pensioners, Seamen and Soldiers, in actual Service, can send and receive letters, referring solely to their private affairs, and not exceeding $\frac{1}{2}$ ounce in weight, on payment of 1d. at time of posting. Those for Europe are sent by the Quebec and Halifax route. The name and regiment or ship, of the soldier or sailor sending, must be written at length on the outside of the envelope.

Part VIII.

POSTAGE RATES ON PRINTED PAPERS, CIRCULARS, PRICES CURRENT, PAMPHLETS, PERIODICALS, BOOKS, &c.

Postage on Printed Circulars, Handbills, &c.

95. Upon each Printed Circular, Price Current, or Handbill, and other printed matter of a like description when unconnected with any manuscript or written communication whatever, passing between any Post Office in Canada and any place in British North America, or the United States, or the British West Indies, is to be charged a rate of one penny per ounce or fraction of an ounce.

On Pamphlets, Magazines, &c.

96. Upon each Pamphlet, Periodical, Magazine or Book, bound or unbound, passing as above, is to be charged a rate of one half-penny per ounce.

Payment when optional, to be collected on those received from other places.

97. Pre-payment of these rates will be optional, except when the printed matter is addressed to the United States or British West Indies, and in such cases the charge must invariably be pre-paid—and on all printed matter received by mail from the United States and British West Indies, the above Canada rates will always remain to be collected on delivery in this Province.

Printed Papers to Editors pass Free.

98. Printed Documents addressed to the Publishers of Newspapers in Canada, are to pass free through the Post, if inclosed in covers, open at the ends, and unaccompanied by any written communication.

Regulations under which to be forwarded.

99. Circulars and other Printed Papers must be sent Unsealed, and Pamphlets, Periodicals, Magazines, Books, &c., must be put up in Covers, open at the ends or sides, to pass at the above rates, and if these Regulations are not strictly complied with, or if any such Printed Paper, Pamphlet, Periodical, Magazine or Book, be found to contain any writing other than the Address, the said Printed Paper, Pamphlet, Book, &c., is to be rated with full Letter Postage.

Limit of Weight.

100. No Book, Packet of Periodicals, Magazines, &c., can be forwarded through the Post if exceeding the weight of forty-eight ounces.

Prices Current for United Kingdom.

101. Printed Prices Current, and Commercial Lists may be sent to the United Kingdom at a charge of one penny each, provided that the Regulations in force in England with regard to them are strictly observed, namely—such papers are to contain merely the names and prices of articles, (if the names of parties dealing in such articles are given, the Prices Current, &c., will be liable to full Letter Postage)—each copy must be made up in the same form as a Newspaper, with the covers open at the end—the word "Price Current" must be written or printed immediately above the Address, and any writing, or mark of reference, or initial on such papers, or their covers, beyond the address and the designation Price Current, will subject them to full rates of Letter Postage.

For other places through United Kingdom.

102. Prices Current or Commercial Lists may be sent through the United Kingdom to any other British Colony beyond sea, or to any Foreign Country at a rate of 2½d. each, observing strictly the above conditions.

Part IX.

BOOK POST WITH ENGLAND.

Rates on Books to or from United Kingdom.

103. Printed Books, Magazines, Reviews, or Pamphlets, whether British, Colonial, or Foreign, may be sent through the Post, between Canada and the United Kingdom, at the following rates of Postage:—

Caution as to mode of Rating.

Observe that the rate is one shilling per lb. weight—not 6d. per $\frac{1}{2}$ lb.—and that when a book weighs over one pound, it is to be rated one shilling the pound.

Rate must be pre-paid, and in money.

104. The above charge must always be pre-paid on Printed Books, &c., &c., sent to the United Kingdom under this regulation at the time of posting in Canada; and the pre-payment must be made in money and cannot be taken in Canada Postage Stamps.

How to be Rated.

105. Postmasters, as with pre-paid Letters for England, must rate the Books, &c., posted under this regulation, in red ink, with both the sterling rate and its equivalent, in currency, charging themselves in their ordinary Letter Bills and Accounts, with the currency amounts—thus, a Book, &c., weighing 3½ pounds, will be rated—

" Paid, 1s. sterling—equal to 5s. currency."

Conditions to be observed.

106. The following conditions must be strictly observed:—
The Books, &c., must be sent in covers, open at the sides.

There must be no word or communication printed on the Book, Pamphlet, Magazine, &c., after its publication, or upon the cover thereof, nor any writing or marks upon it, or upon the cover of it, except the name and address of the person to whom sent.

There shall be no paper or thing enclosed in or with such Book, Pamphlet, &c.

Books to be forwarded to Quebec.

107. Postmasters will forward Packets of Books, &c., intended for the United Kingdom upon the Quebec Post Office, where the Book Post Mail is made up.

Part X.

VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS OF PARLIAMENT.

Printed Votes, &c.

108. Votes and Proceedings of the Imperial Parliament, or of any Colonial Legislature in British North America, or the British West Indies, are liable to a charge as follows:—

Rates of Postage.

" If not exceeding 4 oz. in weight, 1d. cy.	
" Ditto 8 oz. " " 2d. "	
" Ditto 12 oz. " " 3d. "	
" Ditto 16 oz. " " 4d. "	

And so on, adding one penny, currency, for every additional four ounces.

To places in B. N. America and to United Kingdom.

109. Such Votes and Proceedings, whether Paid or Unpaid, pass at these rates between any places in British North America, and to or from the United Kingdom and British West Indies by Packet.

To United States.

110. Such Votes and Proceedings may be posted in Canada to be forwarded to the United States on pre-payment of the rate of 1 penny per 4 oz.

Part XI.

RATES ON NEWSPAPERS.

Definition of a Newspaper.

111. A Newspaper is defined to be any printed Publication issued in numbers, and published at stated intervals of not more than a month, conveying intelligence of passing events.

Rate on Newspapers in Canada.

112. The Postage rate on a Newspaper conveyed through the Post in Canada is, with the following exceptions, One half-penny.

Exceptions.

First.—One copy of each Newspaper published in Canada may be sent free of Postage to any Publisher of another Newspaper in the Province.

Second.—Newspapers printed by Publishers in the Province, and addressed to Subscribers in the United States, pass free of Postage to the Province Line.

Third.—Newspapers between Canada and New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland are free from charge.

Fourth.—Newspapers posted for transmission to the United Kingdom are not liable to any charge or rate at the time of Posting—such, however, as are sent in the Weekly closed Mails through the United States will be liable to a charge of 1d. each on delivery in the United Kingdom, and must be rated 1d. unpaid accordingly. If specially addressed *via Quebec and Halifax* they pass free.

Fifth.—Newspapers received from the United Kingdom, if brought by the semi-monthly mails, via Halifax and Quebec, will be delivered free of any charge—but if received in this Province by the Weekly closed Mails, via the United States, will be liable to a rate of 1d. each on delivery in Canada. This rate cannot be pre-paid in the United Kingdom. To pass free they must be specially addressed *via Halifax and Quebec.*

Sixth.—Newspaper Publishers may send and receive their Exchange Newspapers to and from the United States, free of charge.

Seventh.—Newspapers for the British West Indies, Australia, East Indies, New Zealand, Van Dieman's Land, Gibraltar, Malta, Ionian Islands, may be forwarded from Canada, via Quebec and Halifax, without charge.

Newspapers for Foreign Countries.

113. Newspapers for Foreign Countries and parts abroad are liable to the rates stated in the Tables appended to these Regulations.

An "Extra" or Supplement chargeable.

114. An extra Newspaper, or a Supplement to a Newspaper, is to be deemed a distinct Newspaper, and charged accordingly.

Regulations as to Newspapers.

115. A Newspaper, when posted, must be so enveloped or folded that it can be distinctly seen to be such, and also that it contains no writing, marks, or signs to serve the purpose of written communications; and, if these conditions are not complied with, the Paper is to be charged as a Letter with Letter Postage by weight, and the reason for the charge stated on the cover of the Paper, which should then be fastened to the Paper with the Office Seal.

How to be put up by the Publishers.

116. In Towns where Newspapers are published, the Printers and Publishers should be required to send them for transmission put up in a manner to admit of their being readily counted, and, if necessary, withdrawn from the covers for examination.

Notice to be given when undelivered.

117. When the numbers of a Newspaper published in Canada, or in either of the other British North American Provinces, or in the United States, and issued daily, have remained in a Post Office in this Province uncalled for during two weeks—of a Newspaper issued semi-weekly during three weeks—of a Newspaper issued weekly—during one month—and of a Monthly Periodical during two months—or when such Newspapers or Periodicals shall have been refused to be taken by the party to whom the same shall be addressed, the Postmaster will forthwith address to the respective Publishers one of the Editors' Notices, furnished by the Department for the purpose—such Notices, are to be sent and delivered by Postmasters free of charge. If the Newspaper or Periodical continues to arrive after this Notice has been sent, Postmasters should address the Editor a second time, calling his attention to the first Notice given.

Undelivered Newspapers to be returned.

118. Undelivered Newspapers, &c., are to be returned in the same manner as Undelivered Letters to the Post Office Department, and any Postage upon them charged against the Postmaster is to be taken credit for by him, in the same manner as with Dead Letter Postage.

Rates when re-posted.

119. Newspapers re-posted in this Province, whether British, Provincial, or United States, will be liable to the ordinary rates on transmission.

PART XIII.

MISSENT AND RE-DIRECTED LETTERS.

Missent Letters, &c.

128. When Letters, Newspapers, &c., intended for another place are mis sent to a Post Office, the Postmaster will write the words "Missent to" in red ink on the front of each, and affix his Office Stamp immediately after, and such Letters, Newspapers, &c., must then be forwarded on to their destination by the first post.

Not to be re-charged.

129. No additional rate for re-mailing is to be charged on Missent Letters or Newspapers.

No charge for Re-direction, except to places out of the Province.

130. A Postmaster will re-direct and forward a Letter addressed to and lying in his Office, to any other Office at the request of the writer thereof or of the person addressed and without any additional charge for re-direction to any place in Canada or British North America; but Letters re-directed from an Office in Canada to Great Britain or Ireland, or to the United States, will be liable to additional charge on re-direction of the ordinary Postage rate to the place of destination.

Requests to re-direct should be written.

131. Orders or requests to forward or re-direct Letters as above should be in writing and must be filed by Postmasters—but Postmasters may re-direct Letters to the known places of residence of the persons addressed, after allowing a short time to elapse.

Re-directed letters for Officers.

134. When Letters addressed to a Commissioned Officer of the Army or Navy arrive at an office in Canada after the removal of the Officer to some other place, such letters are to be re-directed to the said place without additional charge for re-direction, whether the re-direction is to another place in Canada or British North America, to any other British Colony or to the United Kingdom.

PART XIV.*Undelivered and Dead Letters.*

Advertised and Refused Letters, and those addressed to persons and places not known, or not found, and Letters mailed unpaid, which are required to be prepaid, must be sent to the Dead Letter Office Quebec.

PART XV.

ABATING AND REFUNDING OVERCHARGED POSTAGE.

Returning Postage.

145. When application is made for the return of Postage on a Letter, stated to have been charged as weighing more than the just weight, the Postmaster may, after satisfying himself that the demand is just, refund to the applicant the amount overcharged upon the Letter, he will obtain the cover of the Letter, if it can be spared, mark upon it the actual weight of the Letter, and the amount refunded, and procure on it the signature of the person to whom the Letter is addressed in receipt for the said amount—if the cover cannot be spared, the Postmaster will correct the charge in red ink, and obtain the signature of the person to whom the Postage has been refunded upon the regular printed Overcharge Receipt.

Amount to be entered in Form No. 4.

146. The amount of the sums thus refunded the Postmaster will enter in the first Form No. 4, or Dead Letter and Overcharge Bill, transmitted to the Post Office Department, and the covers or receipts must be sent therewith, as Vouchers to support the claim.

Postage on Letters to Postmasters on official business.

147. Postmasters may claim as overcharged the Postage which may have been paid by them on Letters addressed to them on official business, sending in the covers of such Letters with the Form No. 4 on which credit is claimed for the amount.

On Papers, &c., addressed to Publishers.

148. Postmasters are authorised to remit the Postage incorrectly charged on Editors' Notices, Printed Documents addressed to Publishers, Editors' Exchange Papers &c., which should legally pass without Postage charge.

and, in claiming credit for the amounts so remitted, the covers of the charged Papers or Paekets, with the receipt of the Publisher or Editor for the amount remitted, must accompany the Form No. 4, in which the credit is claimed. In cases of doubt, Claims to be referred to Postmaster General.

149. A Postmaster is only permitted to refund or abate Postage where error has manifestly been committed in calculating the weight of a Letter or Paeket, or in the cases above mentioned, all other claims for return or abatement of Postage are to be specially referred to the Postmaster General for his decision, with the Letter or Paeket on which the return of Postage is claimed.

Part XVIII.

Courier not to carry any Letters, except Way Letters.

148. Couriers are strictly forbidden to carry Letters, sealed or unsealed, printed or written, out of the Mails, except Way Letters to be delivered to the Postmaster at the next Office—or Letters received from a Postmaster for delivery between his Office and the next.

Cannot carry any mailable matter.

149. Contractors and Mail Carriers are not permitted to carry Newspapers or other printed matter out of the Mails, unless authorised to do so by the Postmaster General.

PART XIX.

GENERAL REGULATIONS.

Postmasters not to give Credit.

199. Postmasters are not authorized to give credit for Postage, and if they do so, it is at their own risk, and cannot be admitted as an excuse for failing to remit the balance of Postage due from an Office at the prescribed periods.

If Credit has been given.

200. If credit has been given by a Postmaster, he cannot detain a Letter or Paper addressed to the person credited which is Free, or Paid, or for which the Postage is tendered to him, because there may be an unsettled account for postage due by that person.

Postmasters not bound to give change—The Public to be treated with courtesy.

201. A Postmaster is not legally bound to give change, but, if absolutely necessary, may require that the exact amount of Postage on any Letter or Paeket be tendered or paid to him in current coin, or in Canada Postage Stamps. In a matter of this kind, however, as in all other intercourse with the public, a Postmaster is expected to offer every accommodation in his power, and treat every individual having transactions with his Office with the utmost courtesy, and he will strictly enjoin a similar line of conduct upon his Assistants.

Exemptions enjoyed by Postmasters.

202. Postmasters and other Officers of the Department are exempt from serving on Juries, or Inquests, or in the Militia.

A Mailed Letter the property of the person addressed.

203. A Letter once posted becomes the property of the person to whom it is addressed, and must be forwarded according to its direction; no application, however urgent, will justify the Postmaster with whom it has been posted in giving it up to the writer or to any other person, on any pretence whatever.

Care to be taken of Newspapers.

210. Postmasters are strictly forbidden to take themselves or lend to others, for the purpose of reading, any Newspaper lying in their Offices for delivery; a Newspaper is to be kept whilst in an Office and delivered with the same care as a Letter, and it is a misdemeanor punishable by law to detain, delay, or misuse a Newspaper.

Letters for warm climates.

211. Postmasters should caution persons posting Letters for the East or West Indies, or other warm climates, not to seal them with wax—as serious injury might be occasioned to such Letters from the melting of the sealing wax.

Missent Mails.

212. Whenever a whole Mail is Missent, the Postmaster to whose Office it is Missent will write in legible characters upon the cover of the packet or on the label should the Mail be contained in a bag, the words "Missent to" inserting the name of his Office, and it will be his duty further to acquaint the Post Office Inspector of his District of the circumstance, stating the Office from which the Mail was sent, (which he can ascertain by examining the seal,) and pointing out, if he can possibly

do so, to whose neglect or mismanagement the missending of the said Mail is attributable.

Confidential nature of a Postmastership.

213. Postmasters are enjoined not to give information to any other person than the party addressed with respect to letters passing through their offices, a Postmaster should consider his situation to be one of trust, and must not abuse the confidence placed in him by disclosing the addresses of Letters passing through his hands.

Authority held by certain Postmasters over their Clerks.

214. Postmasters whose Assistants are appointed by the Governor General are authorised, in the event of the misbehaviour or insubordination of any Assistant to suspend him from his duties, and report the offender to the Postmaster General, who will communicate the Governor General's pleasure thereon.

Exchange Offices with United States.

215. Under the postal arrangement with the United States, the following are the Exchange Offices, viz:—

THE BAR OF LOWER CANADA.

All Advocates, Barristers, Attorneys, Solicitors, and Proctors at Law, in Lower Canada, are incorporated—(see Act 12 Vic., cap. 46.)—under the name of "The Bar of Lower Canada." The corporation is divided into three sections viz : one for each of the districts or Montreal, Quebec, and Three Rivers. The members of the profession residing in the District of St. Francis, form part of the section of Three Rivers; those residing in the Districts of Gaspé and Kamouraska, form part of the section of Quebec; and those residing in the District of Ottawa form part of the section of Montreal. The Board of Examiners sits monthly to examine candidates for admission to the Bar.

DISTRICT OF QUEBEC.

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DEPUTY CLERKS OF THE CROWN.—The Clerks of the County Courts are to be *ex officio* Deputy Clerks of the Crown and Pleas in their several Counties, *i.e.*, as

vacancies occur. (See page 42.)

LAW TERMS.—*Hilary*, begins 1st Monday in February and ends Saturday of the ensuing week; *Easter*, begins 1st Monday in June, and ends Saturday of the ensuing week; *Trinity*, begins last Monday in August, and ends on the Saturday of the ensuing week; *Michaelmas*, begins third Monday in November, and ends Saturday of the ensuing week. Long Vacation commences 1st July, and ends 21st August.

CIRCUITS.—The Circuits are held twice a year in each county, betw'n Hilary and Easter terms, and between Trinity and Michaelmas terms, except in the County of York, where there are three in each year, commencing on the first Thursday in January, the first Monday in May, and the second Monday in October, in each year. There are six Circuits, as follows, viz :

The *Home*—Niagara, Cobourg, Peterboro', and Barrie. The *Midland*—Picton, Belleville, Brockville, and Kingston. The *Oxford*—Guelph, Cayuga, Simcoe, Woodstock, and Hamilton. The *Western*—Goderich, London, Chatham, and Sandwich. The *Toronto*—At Toronto. And the *Eastern*—Perth, Bytown, L'Orignal, and Cornwall.

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HEIR AND DEVISEE COURT.—*Commissioners*—The Judges of the Superior Courts, and such other persons as may be appointed by Commission under the Great Seal. Their duties are to determine claims to lands in Upper Canada, for which no patent has issued from the Crown, in favour of the proper claimants, whether as heirs, devisees, or assignees. *Sittings*—at Toronto first Monday in January and July in each year. *Clerks to the Commissioners*—W. H. Lee, *Executive Council office, Quebec.*

COURT OF PROBATE.—*Official Principal*—S. Brough, *Toronto; Registrar*—C. FitzGibbon, *Toronto.*

SURROGATE COURTS.—(See table page 42 for Judges and Registrars.)

COUNTY COURTS.—Presided over by a resident Judge in each county. The jurisdiction of the court extends to all causes relating to debt, covenant or contract, to the amount of £50; and to causes of debt or contract, where the amount is ascertained by the signature of the defendant, to £100; and also to all matters of tort relating to personal chattels, where the damages shall not exceed £30, and where the title to land shall not be brought in question. The plaintiff at his option may bring these suits in the Courts of Queen's Bench or Common Pleas, but County Court costs will only be allowed. (See table of Judges and other Judicial Officers of Counties page 42)

INSOLVENT DEBTORS' COURT.—The County Judge in each County presides.

QUARTER SESSIONS.—*Chairman*—The County Judge in each County, who with one or more Justices of the Peace, holds a Court of Quarter Sessions in his county four times a year, for trials by Jury in cases of larceny, misdemeanor and other offences. *Sittings*—first Tuesday in Ja-

nuary, April, and July, and third Tuesday in November, with power of adjournment.

RECORDERS' COURTS.—In the Cities of Toronto, Hamilton, and Kingston, the Recorder's Court, takes the place of the County Sessions, the Justices for Counties, having no jurisdiction in the Cities, the care of which is confided to the Recorder, Mayor, Aldermen, and Police Magistrate of each. The City Sessions are held on the second Monday in January, April, July and October.

DIVISION COURTS.—For the summary disposal of cases by the County Judges. In certain cases juries are granted. Courts are held once in two months in each division, or often at the discretion of the judge. The divisions are established by the Courts of Quarter Sessions. The jurisdiction of the Court extends to cases of debt or account, or breach of contract or covenant, or money demand, whether payable in money or otherwise, where the amount or balance claimed does not exceed £25, and to all torts to personal chattels to the amount of £10. A plaintiff may not divide his claim, so as to bring it by more than one suit within the jurisdiction of the court, but he may abandon the excess, provided the amount in dispute does not exceed £50, and thus sue for the restricted amount of £25. Suits to be tried in the Division where the defendant resides, or the debt, &c., was contracted. Servants under age may sue for wages in this court. Judgments recoverable against goods and chattels in certain cases, where judgment exceeds £10, it will affect lands. Attachments may issue against the goods and chattels of absconding or concealed debtors, going from one county to another in Upper Canada, or to Lower Canada, or leaving the Province, for any sum not exceeding £25, nor less than 20s.

HAMILTON.—*Orphan House*, under the charge of the Sisters of St. Joseph, an affiliation of the Parent House at Toronto.

SANDWICH.—*Orphan Asylum, and Female School*. Under the charge of the Ladies of the Sacred Heart.

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THE MARINE HOSPITAL, QUEBEC, for the reception of Sailors and Emigrants. The largest Hospital in Canada. Under the supervision of a Board of Commissioners appointed by the Government, with a staff of 8 Physicians and Surgeons—can accommodate 250 patients.

THE FRENCH HOSPITAL OR HOTEL DIEU OF QUEBEC, for the reception of citizens, and superintended by the Sisters of Charity. Attended by six Physicians—all denominations admitted if citizens, and accidents at all times.

THE BEAUFORT LUNATIC ASYLUM.—About two miles from Quebec, capable of accommodating upwards of 300 patients. This building was erected at the sole expense of Drs. Morin, Douglas and Fremont,—the three Physicians who have had, for some years past, the contract from Government for the inmanagement and treatment of Lunatics in Canada East.

TORONTO DISPENSARY FOR DISEASES OF THE EYE, &c., Yonge Street, near Crookshank Street, supported by voluntary contributions. Hours of attendance on the poor from 9 to 11 o'clock daily. *Surgeon and Oculist*, S. J. Stratford, M. R. C. S., England.

TORONTO GENERAL DISPENSARY—Richmond Street.—Established 1843, for providing medical aid, advice and medicine, gratuitously, to the poor. Reception at noon, daily, Sundays excepted. *Consulting Physician*—Dr.

O'Brien; *Physicians*—Drs. Bovell, Badgley, Bethune, and Hallowell.

TORONTO GENERAL HOSPITAL.—Incorporated, 1847. *Trustees*—The Mayor, the President of the Board of Trade, Toronto, *ex-officio*; C. Gamble, John King, M.D., Rev. H. J. Grasett, M. A., appointed by Government; Hon. C. Widmer, M. D., Geo. Herrick, M. D., appointed by Corporation of Toronto. *Attending Physicians and Surgeons*—Hon. C. Widmer, M. D., F. R. C. S., Eng; and John King, M. D.; Walter Telfer, L.R.C.S., Ed.; Lucius O'Brien, M.D.; George Herrick, M. D.; Wm. Beaumont, F.R.C.S., Eng. *Resident Surgeon*—Edw. Clarke, M.R.C.S., Eng. *Secretary and Treasurer*—J. W. Brent. *Hours of Attendance*—12 o'clock, noon, daily. During the Winter Session, Clinical Lectures are given twice a week on the Medical and Surgical cases in the Hospital. Medical on Saturdays, at 1 o'clock, P. M., by Professor King; Surgical on Mondays, at 1 o'clock, P. M., by Professor Beaumont. Visitors are admitted to see their friends from 3 to 5, P.M., every day, except Sunday.

TORONTO LYING-IN HOSPITAL.—Richmond Street.—Established 1844, for the reception, treatment and care of Lying-in women, and the Diseases peculiar to females. *Physician*—Dr. Hodder.

KINGSTON GENERAL HOSPITAL.—*Board of Management*—S. F. Kirkpatrick, County Judge; D. Roblin, Warden; T. A. Corbett, Sheriff; the Mayor and three Aldermen of the City; *Medical Attendant*—Dr. Harvey; *Secretary*—M. Flanagan.

THE HOTEL DIEU HOSPITAL, is under the control of the Sisters of the Congregational Nunnery. It can accommodate about 100 patients at the utmost, and the average daily number, we believe, to be about 30 or 40. Its Medical staff is composed of two or three medical gentlemen, connected with the School of Medicine of Montreal.

ST. PATRICK'S HOSPITAL.—Lately instituted, and now established in the splendid building formerly occupied as the Baptist College. It is calculated to contain between 200 and 300 beds, and since its commencement in February last, has had a daily average of about 60 patients. It is proposed to convert this hospital into a *Clinical Hospital*, in which lectures on the *Medical, Surgical, Obstetric, and Ophthalmic and Aural* cases admitted, will be delivered at stated periods. Its medical staff is as follows:—Dr. Macdonald, Surgeon and Lecturer on Clinical Surgery. Dr. David, Physician, and Lecturer on Clinical Medicine. Mr. Howard, Oculist and Aurist, and Clinical Lecturer on Ophthalmic and Aural Surgery. Dr. — Accoucheur, and Lecturer on Clinical Midwifery. Dr. Schmidt, Physician; Dr. M. Geath, Surgeon. Under the care of the ladies of the Congregational Nunnery, the hospital will be Roman Catholic, but no restrictions are placed on the admission of patients of other religious persuasions. This hospital promises to be the field of clinical instruction for the Province. The Lecturer on Clinical Midwifery is not yet appointed.

THE MONTREAL DISPENSARY is open daily, and is accessible to students. It has a staff of six medical officers, and is established on the self-supporting system, adopted in similar Institutions in Great Britain.

THE MONTREAL EYE AND EAR INSTITUTION.—This valuable Institution is also open to students; and is under the care and management of Mr. Howard. Established several years ago; the annual average of patients treated falls not far short of 1000, and the daily attendance about 20 or 30. Its success is entirely due to Mr. Howard's philanthropic exertions, and it has been conducted to a very considerable extent, at his own individual expense. This institution presents to the student as fine a field for the study of Ophthalmic and Aural diseases as is to be met with on this Continent.

THE UNIVERSITY LYING-IN HOSPITAL, MONTREAL.—*Physician*—M. McCulloch, M. D.; *Consulting Physicians*—the Members of the Medical Faculty of McGill College. A large number of cases are here annually attended.

THE MONTREAL GENERAL HOSPITAL.—This fine Hospital, supported by voluntary contributions, and a Legislative grant of £1000, is open to all students under certain restrictions. Since the erection of the Richardson and Reid wings, it can accommodate with facility 300 patients, although the daily average, has not, within the last two years, exceeded 50. Both Medical and Sur-

gical cases are admitted into the wards, and a fine field of study is thus presented to the diligent student. Post mortem examinations are a rule of the Hospital, at the discretion and in presence of the attending Physician. The staff is composed as follows:—*Consulting Physicians*—A. F. Holmes, M. D., O. T. Bruneau, M. D., and A. Hull, M. D. *Attending Physicians*—Drs. Campbell, Crawford, Arnoldi, Fraser, Sutherland, Scott, Sewell and P. Howard.

THE SCHOOL OF MEDICINE OF MONTREAL.—*Anatomy*, Dr. Munro; *Practice of Medicine*, Dr. Beaubien; *Chemistry*, Dr. Coquerre; *Midwifery*, Dr. D'Orsomans; *Institutes of Medicine*, Dr. Peltier; *Materia Medica*, Dr. Boyer; *Anatomy*, Dr. Bibaud; *Demonstrator*, Dr. Regnier. A six months course is delivered at this school, but in the French language only.

THE ST. LAWRENCE SCHOOL OF MEDICINE.—Newly established.—Incorporated last session of Parliament, *Lecturers*—*Surgery*, Dr. Macdonnell; *Medicine*, Dr. David; *Midwifery*, Dr. Arnoldi; *Materia Medica*, Dr. Fenwick; *Chemistry*, Dr. R. P. Howard; *Anatomy*, Dr. Jones; *Ophthalmic and Aural Surgery*, Mr. H. Howard; *Institutes of Medicine*, Dr. Gibb. The lectures will be delivered in courses of six months, and in the English language.

TORONTO COLLEGE OF MEDICINE.—Incorporated by Act of Parliament.—Location, 53 Queen Street. Commences the 1st of November of every year, and ends the last of April following. The course embraces the various branches of Medical education. The Tickets received at par by McGill College, Montreal, and by the various medical colleges in the United States. *Lecturers*, Dr. Rolph, Dr. Workman, Dr. Aikins, Dr. Morrison, and Dr. Howett. A Maternity Hospital and Dispensary are attached to the College, and the General Hospital opened to its pupils.

HOUSE OF INDUSTRY, TORONTO.—Incorporated 1851.—To support the aged and decrepid, discharged patients from General Hospital, Orphans and deserted children. There are fifteen Trustees and twenty-five Managers. *Treasurer*; E. H. Rutherford; *Secretary*; W. M. Westmacott. *Medical Officers*; Drs. Hodder, Badgley and Bovell. *Superintendents*; Mr. and Mrs. Hancock.

NATURAL HISTORY SOCIETY MONTREAL.—Established about 25 years ago—for the development of the Natural History of the Province, and its subsequent appli-ance to economic uses. It is supported by a Legislative Grant, and the contributions of members. The late Rev. J. Somerville, bequeathed the handsome sum of £1000 to it, on condition that the interest should be devoted annually to the payment of a series of lectures on some subject of Natural History. The Society has pocketed the £1000, but the requirement has not been too exactly fulfilled. The Society, however, is located in their own building, in Little St. James Street, and presents for examination a Museum, whether of Zoological, Mineralogical, or Geological specimens, second to few on this Continent. The Zoological department is particularly rich, comprising almost every species met with in this Province. The Society seems lately to have acquired a fresh impetus. We only hope that it may not prove evanescent.

PROVINCIAL LUNATIC ASYLUM, TORONTO.—Two and a half miles West from the City Hall, on Queen Street, conducted by a Board of Twelve Directors, who meet monthly or oftener as may be needed, viz. :—*Chairman*—The Hon. C. Widmer, M. D.; *Revs. H. J. Grasett, J. Roaf and J. Carroll*; J. G. Chevett, M. J. O'Beirne, J. Beaty, W. McMaster, W. Mathers, D. Patterson, Geo. Gurnet, and Captain Eccles. *Officers of the Institution*—*Superintendent*, John Scott, M. D.; *Clerk, Storekeeper and Treasurer*, James McKirdy; *Steward*, Thomas Tolmie; *Matron*, Ann Tolmie. The building is designed to contain 250 patients, but 300 may be accommodated in it. There are at present within it a full complement of patients. The Institution is open to the public on an order of a Director, or that of the Medical Superintendent, between the hours of 12, Noon, and 3, P. M., every day, Saturdays and Sundays excepted. The admission of patients is regulated by an Act 2nd Victoria, Chapter 11, which requires that the patient be examined by three licensed Medical Practitioners, collectively, who certify to the insanity; also, that the patient is a subject of Her Majesty, and a resident of the Province.

DEPARTMENT OF COMMON SCHOOLS.—UPPER CANADA. Chief Superintendent—the Rev. E. Ryerson, D. D.; Chief Clerk—J. Geo. Hoag; Second Clerk—Thomas Hodgins; Education Office—Normal School Buildings, Gould Street, Toronto. Office Hours—from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

COUNCIL OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION.—Chairman—The Hon. Samuel Bealy Harrison, County Judge; the Rev. Egerton Ryerson, D. D.; Right Rev. A. F. M. de Charbonnel, D.D.; R. C. Bishop of Toronto; the Rev. Henry J. Grasett, A.M.; Joseph C. Morrison, M.P.P.; Hugh Scobie; James Scott Howard; Rev. John Jennings, and Rev. Adam Lillie. Recording Clerk—J. G. Hodgins.

PROVINCIAL NORMAL SCHOOL.—Under the management of the Council of Public Instruction. For the instruction and training of (male and female) Common School Teachers. Head Master—Thomas Jeffrey Robertson; Mathematical Master, etc.—Teacher of Book-keeping—A. McCallum; Teacher of Hall's System of Vocal Music—P. Walsh; Senior Teacher of Model School Department—A. McCallum; Assistant Teacher—John Sangster. From half-past two to half-past four o'clock, is set apart every Friday afternoon, for the separate religious instruction of the Students by the Pastors of their respective parishes.

COUNTY GRAMMAR SCHOOLS, U. C.—These Schools are managed by a Board of Trustees in each County or Union of Counties, appointed by the Provincial Government. There is one Grammar School in every County Town, and where the funds will admit of it, the Trustees are allowed to establish others. Pupils attending these Schools are prepared to enter the University.

DEPARTMENT OF COMMON SCHOOLS, LOWER CANADA.—Superintendent of Education—J. B. McNeill, M. D.; Secretary—L. Girard; Clerk—W. S. Williams. Education Office—Government House, Montreal. An Act has been passed by the Legislature to establish a Normal School in Lower Canada.

* At the commencement of the Eighth Session, May, 1852, there were admitted to be trained in the Normal School, 101 Students—71 male, and 30 female—making a grand total of 131 Students, (64 male, and 195 female), admitted since the commencement of the Institution, in 1847.

N. B.—No females were admitted during the first Session of the Normal School—the contemplated arrangements not having been completed.

NOTE.—Out of the entire number of 818 who made application, but 688 were admitted into the Normal School,—(of these, 437 had been School Teachers previously),—only 520 received weekly assistance, and but 380 received certificates of attendance or qualification, on leaving the Institution. It will be observed, that not even one-half of these admitted received Certificates. The Certificates which were given at the end of the First and Second Sessions, contain simply a statement of the attendance of the student, or his or her conduct while in training. The blank form of this Certificate will be found in the Appendix, No. 16, of the annual report for 1849. Those issued afterwards, contained, in addition to the foregoing, a statement, in tabular form, of the proficiency of each student in the several branches taught in the Normal School, &c. The blank form of this Certificate will be found in the Appendix No. 16, of the same report. The form of Certificate given at the close of the seventh Session, will be found in Appendix D, to the report, No. 13—many of the Students receiving these had been in attendance during a part or the whole of the previous Session.

The Model School, in connexion with the Normal School, is daily attended by from 250 to 300 pupils. It is in this School that the Teachers in training in the Normal School practise teaching more or less each week, under the direction of masters trained in the Normal School. Admission to the Model School is much desired—there being sometimes 200 or 300 more applications on the books than can be entertained. The school is at all times open to the visits of strangers. Its examinations have excited much interest, and have evinced to great numbers the excellence of the system of instruction pursued.

PROVINCIAL NORMAL SCHOOL, TORONTO.

COLLEGE OF PHYSICIANS AND SURGEONS OF LOWER CANADA.—President, Joseph Morris, M. D.; Vice President, A. F. Holmes, M. D., District of Montreal; J. Blaneau, M. D., District of Quebec; Secretaries, A. H. David, M. D., District of Montreal; Dr. Burdy, District of Quebec; Treasurer and Registrar, F. C. T. Arnoldi, M. D. These six with thirty other members of the profession, constitute a Council or Board of Governors, of whom fifteen are resident in the City and District of Quebec, fifteen in the city and District of Montreal, three in the District of Three Rivers, and three in the District of St. Francis. The Council meet twice a year at Montreal and Quebec alternately, on the second Tuesday of May and October, for the examination of candidates for license to practise, for the preliminary examination of all young men entering upon the study of medicine, and for other business. The Council is elected triennially, at a meeting of the Corporation, held at Three Rivers. This is the only licensing board for Lower Canada.

The Medical Board is governed by the Upper Canada Acts of 1818, 59 Geo. 3, Cap. 13: of 1819, 59 Geo. 3, Cap. 2: of 1827, 8, Geo. 4, Cap. 3: and the Act of the Province of Canada, 4 & 5 Vic. Cap. 41, passed in 1841. The members of the Board are appointed, from time to time, by the Governor. The duties of the Board are to examine applicants for licence, to practise Physic, Surgery and Midwifery, or either, within the Province; and upon their certificate, in favour of the Candidates, the Governor may grant such licence. The sittings of the Board are, at Toronto, on the first Monday in January, April, July, and October, in each year. Parties exhibiting diplomas or licences, from any University in Her Majesty's dominions or from the Royal College of Physicians or of Surgeons, in London, as Physicians or Surgeons, or Commissions or Warrants as Physicians or Surgeons, in Her Majesty's Naval or Military Services, and making affidavit of their identity, before a County Judge in Upper Canada, may receive licence from the Governor, without examination by the Board. Persons who have been appointed to the Medical Board, and persons actually employed as Physicians or Surgeons, in Her Majesty's forces, may practise here, without licence. Females may practise Midwifery without licence. There is a general prohibition, against practising without licence, (with the exceptions aforesaid,) and parties offending, are liable to prosecution and punishment for misdemeanour. Medical men, authorized to practise, in Upper or Lower Canada, may practise throughout the whole of the Province of Canada: vide 4 & 5 Vic. Cap. 41.

TOWNSHIP, TOWN, AND VILLAGE COUNCILS.

The Municipalities in Upper Canada are regulated by various Acts of the Provincial Legislature, known as the "Counties Divisions," the "Municipal Corporations" and the "Assessment Acts," together with a few others, such as the "School," the "Road Companies," and the "Jurors Acts," which impose certain duties on the Municipalities. These Acts are to be found at length in *Scobie's Municipal Manual for Upper Canada*, latest edition.

The preceding tables of Counties shew the subdivisions of each County into Townships, Towns and Villages. Each Township having 100 resident freeholders or householders on the Collector's Roll, forms a separate corporation; and those having less on the Roll, are for the time united to some other Township, to be afterwards separated when the requisite number of freeholders or householders shall be acquired to entitle it to independent corporate powers. Each Township corporation is organized by a Council, with ample powers of levying moneys by assessment, for local purposes within the municipality. The members of the Council, consisting of five, are chosen annually by the people in public meeting assembled. In some cases the elections are held in ward meetings of the Townships. Those cases are signified in the preceding tables by a *. Each Council chooses its own Reeve or presiding officer; and in Townships having 500 resident freeholders or householders on the Collector's Roll, the Council chooses also a Deputy Reeve. This gives the populous Townships a double voice in the County Council, as will be seen below. The Councils also appoint their Treasurers, Clerks, and other necessary officers.

The Village Corporations are formed of Villages having one thousand inhabitants or upwards. The Councils consisting of five, are elected in the same way in Townships, and possess the same powers and privileges within the Village Municipality. Villages acquiring the necessary population may be incorporated, on application of the inhabitants. The incorporation is perfected by Proclamation of the Governor. Several cases of the kind have occurred within the last two years, as may be seen from the preceding tables.

Hamlets, not possessing the necessary population, to entitle them to Village Incorporation, may be erected into Police Villages, the Trustees of which, three in number, are invested with limited powers for maintaining order and enforcing reasonable rules, for security from fire, &c., within the Village or Hamlet.

Towns are also incorporated. They are divided into Wards, and the Councilors are chosen yearly, three in each Ward. The Councilors choose their own Mayor. They also choose a Reeve, and, when the population admits of it, a Deputy Reeve, as in Townships and Villages. The powers of taxation, for local improvements within the Town, are ample. Incorporated Villages, attaining to a population of 3000 inhabitants and upwards, may be advanced to the privileges of Incorporated Towns, on the application of the inhabitants to the Governor in Council. The Incorporation into a Town, is effected by proclamation of the Governor.

The County Councils are composed of the Reeves and Deputy Reeves of the Townships, Towns and Villages. In some cases, two or more Counties are united, forming but one corporation. The Acts provide for the separation of these as their population increases, fifteen thousand souls being the number requisite for a junior County to possess to entitle it to separation from the Union, and to independent incorporation. The preceding tables shew several instances of the existence of Provisional County Councils, for the separation of their Counties from those to which they are temporarily united. The Reeves and Deputy Reeves, forming the County Councils, choose their Wardens yearly, and appoint Treasurers, Clerks, and other necessary County officers. These Councils possess ample powers of levying money for local improvements within their respective Counties.

The Assessments are levied at so much in the pound, on the value of property in the Municipalities, as valued yearly by the assessors. In Townships, the aggregate value of the property is taken as the basis of taxation; in Cities, Towns and Villages the rate is yearly value. Where rental is not attainable, six per cent. on the ag-

gregate valuation is taken in place of it. The real property is taken at its full value, according to the judgment of the assessors; but, we apprehend there is great inequality over the country in the valuations that are made. The only personal property liable to municipal local taxation under the acts, is as follows:—(1.) Horses three years old and upwards; (2.) Neat Cattle, three years old and upwards; (3.) Pleasure carriages of all descriptions, and also all carriages kept for hire; (4.) The average stock of goods on hand of every Merchant, Trader, Dealer, Manufacturer, Tradesman or Mechanic; such average stock to be considered to be the mean between the highest and the lowest amount of goods on hand, at any time during the year; (5.) The amount of all Stocks or Shares in Steamers, Schooners, or other water craft employed in the conveyance of freight or passengers, and owned within the Municipality. Income exceeding £50 a-year is taxable, in place of the personal property above enumerated, provided the income exceeds the amount of the value of such personal property; but should the income be less than such value, it is exempted, and the amount of the personal property taxed. The income of a farmer from his farm, or the full or half pay of any one in the Army or Navy; or any Pension, Salary or gratuity derived from the Imperial Treasury, or elsewhere out of the Province of Canada, are exempted from Municipal Assessment; as is also the other personal property of Naval or Military persons on full pay, or otherwise in actual then present service, who are moreover exempted from Statute Labour or its commutation. The Governor General is also exempted. In the preceding tables, we have given the valuations of all property for assessment purposes, in each Township, Town and Village, for 1851 and 1852. We have also given the extent of each in acres; and the population according to the census taken in 1850 and 1852. These, with the other statistical tables, given in subsequent pages, when taken in connection with those given in the Canadian Almanac, for previous years, commencing in 1848, will form a very useful compilation for various purposes; and we are happy to perceive, that the previous numbers have been generally acknowledged to possess information of much value, which has been turned to advantageous account, in various ways, by parties interested in the advancement of the Province both at home and abroad.

Owners of wild or unoccupied lands, are informed, that a yearly sale takes place by the sheriff, in December, of lands, for taxes that are unpaid.

CITIES.

The Cities of Toronto, Kingston and Hamilton, have each independent corporate powers, exercised by a Council, composed of Mayor, Aldermen and Councilors. The Aldermen and Councilors, are chosen yearly, by the citizens, two Aldermen and two Councilors, in each Ward, into which the City is divided. The Aldermen and Councilors choose the Mayor, from among the Aldermen. The Cities are Counties in themselves, possessing the entire management of their own Municipal affairs, with ample powers of levying assessments for local purposes. They do not, therefore, send any representatives to the Councils of the Rural Counties. Incorporated Towns, acquiring a population of 15,000 inhabitants and upwards, may be promoted to the rank of Cities, on application of the inhabitants to the Governor in Council. The Incorporation into a City is effected by Proclamation of the Governor.

CANADA.—In 1622 there were only 50 men and women in Quebec. In 1799 Quebec contained about 7000, and Montreal 3000 inhabitants. The first general capitulation of the Province was taken in 1676, from which period the progressive population is given in the foregoing table. In 1791 the Province was divided into Upper and Lower Canada. Previous to 1770, the only white settlers in Upper Canada were a few French immigrants, in the vicinities of Kingston and Detroit. Subsequently, considerable additions were made to the population by the influx of United Empire Loyalists, who settled along the frontier, at the time of the American Revolution. In 1791, when Upper Canada was set apart, it contained barely 50,000 inhabitants. From that period, the progressive population is set forth in the table. The Provinces were re-united in 1840, but, for convenient comparison, we have given the population of each separately.

NOVA SCOTIA.—There are no accurate early details of the population of Nova Scotia. In 1749, about 140 years after the settlement by France, the Acadians amounted to 18,000. After their removal from Nova Scotia in 1755, the British inhabitants were computed at 3000. In 1761 the population was reckoned at 13,000, including 2,600 Acadians. In 1772 the numbers were reported to be 10,130; but, in 1781, in consequence of many having left the colony, the population was reduced to 12,000. In 1783, there arrived 23,000 loyalists, which increased the inhabitants to 32,000. The subsequent separation of New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island into distinct governments,

had, of course, diminished the population of Nova Scotia. These remarks will aid to a proper understanding of the table. The population of Cape Breton is included in that of Nova Scotia. It amounted in 1800, to 2315; in 1817, to 7000; in 1827, to 18,700; in 1838, to 30,000; in 1843, to 49,680; and in 1851, to 27,580.

New Brunswick.—The populations in 1783, 1803, and 1848, are stated, from official estimates, made at these periods, in New Brunswick. A census was taken by authority in each of the other years noted in the table. In 1840, there was a reduction of population to the extent of 2162, in consequence of the cession of territory to the United States under the Ashburton Treaty, and that awarded to Canada under the recent arbitration.

The Grain Crops in Lower Canada are taken in the Minot and not in the Bushel, excepting the Townships. In like manner, the Acres are taken in Arpents. An Arpent is about one-seventh less than an Acre; and a Minot about one-eighth more than a bushel. Beef and Pork are incorrectly given in both parts of the Province. The Fish in Lower Canada is exclusive of the Gaspe and Bonaventure Fisheries.

The County in Upper Canada which possesses the largest number of occupied acres is York, viz., 390,325; the same County has likewise the largest number of acres in wheat, viz.: 50,147, producing 991,669 bushels. The smallest number of acres in wheat is in the new County of Bruce, where only 489 acres are cultivated.

for this crop. These acres are virgin soil, newly cleared for cultivation, and produced 9,796 bushels, or an average of 20 30-100 per acre. Bruce therefore, claims the honor of being by a trifle, the most fertile wheat county in the Province. York comes next, with an average of 19 71-100 bushels per acre and considering the extent of cultivation in the County, it will be readily conceived that in reality it produces the largest average wheat crops. Brant, Durham, Halton, Huron, Oxford, Stormont, and Wentworth, all show a product either within a fraction more or less of nineteen bushels to the acre. The County which exhibits the smallest average per acre is Lenox, with 5,046 acres, producing 30,251 bushels—little more than 6 bushels to the acre. The average for the whole of Upper Canada is 14 90-100 bushels per acre.

The County in Lower Canada, which possesses the largest quantity of cultivated land is Dorchester, with 476,712 acres; and that with the greatest quantity in wheat is Huntingdon, with 49,293 acres, and 231,171 bushels. The smallest number of cultivated acres is in Gaspé, viz.—92,219; producing also the smallest quantity of wheat, or 641 acres, and 3418 bushels. Stanstead grows most wheat to the acre of any County of Lower Canada, having 4,551 acres in wheat, and 92,852 bushels,—12 96-100 bushels per acre. The County producing the smallest quantity per acre is L'Islet, from which the return is 15,531 acres—57,912 bushels, or 4 38-100 bushels per acre. After Stanstead, Missisquoi and Sherbrooke, are the most fertile counties in wheat; both producing more than 12 50-100 bushels per acre. The total production of wheat in Lower Canada is 427,111 acres, and 3,675,898 bushels,—7 20-100 per acre. Dorchester grew the most barley, viz., 199,799 bushels; Rimouski most rye, viz., 53,304 bushels; Huntingdon most peas, viz., 127,083 bushels; Berthier most oats, viz., 635,569 bushels; Sherbrooke most buckwheat, viz., 64,539 bushels; Missisquoi most Indian corn, viz., 12,394 bushels; Montreat most potatoes, viz., 319,598 bushels; Ponthier most hay, viz., 53,763 tons; Berthier, most flax or hemp, viz., 92,407 lbs., and most tobacco, viz., 6,174 lbs.; Beauharnois most wool, viz., 73,354 lbs.; Sherbrooke most maple sugar, viz., 421,932 lbs. The greatest number of bulls, oxen and steers are in Dorchester, viz., 9,274; also of milch cows, viz., 16,102; and of horses, viz., 69,433; and of sheep, 37,416. Beauharnois has the greatest number of calves, viz., 11,254; and of pigs, viz., 14,378. Beauharnois also makes the greatest quantity of butter, viz., 916,371 lbs.; the next largest county making only 594,917 lbs. Missisquoi carries the palm in cheese, making 199,688 lbs. Stanstead packs most beef, viz., 31,432. Rimouski most pork, viz., 66,794 barrels.

The population in the square mile cannot be ascertained or calculated. The interior of the Island not being yet settled or inhabited, the population is dispersed along the margin of the sea coast. Except in the district of St. John's, very few buildings are to be found beyond a mile or two from the sea. As to the prices of produce, there is comparatively little sold, being for the most part consumed by the growers. The average value of the crops usually grown on the Island may be stated as under, viz: Oats, 2s to 2s. 6d. per bushel; potatoes, 1s. 3d. to 1s. 9d. per bushel; turnips, 1s. to 1s. 3d. per bush; hay, £4 to £5 per ton; oaten fodder, £2 10s. to £3 per ton. Although the agriculture of the colony is progressively increasing, and in the district of St. John's rapidly so, yet there are but comparatively few persons exclusively employed in it, the population being nearly all engaged the fisheries.
