

FULDA, a post settlement in the Prov. of Saskatchewan, 9 miles west of Dead Moose Lake post office, 12 miles from Humboldt Station, on the Can. Northern Ry., 39 miles north-west of Quill Lake. It has 3 churches (German and English), 6 stores, 2 hotels, 1 private bank, and 1 printing office, besides express and telegraph offices at Humboldt Station. Pop., 400.

FULFORD, a post village in Brome co., Que., on C.P.R., 4 miles from Waterloo. It contains Episcopal, Methodist and Adventist churches, 1 saw mill, 1 grist mill, 1 store, 1 cheese factory, 1 butter factory and creamery station, and 1 telephone office; unlimited water-power. Pop., 300.

FULLARTON, a post village in Perth co., Ont., on the Thames River, 6 miles from Mitchell, a station on the Stratford & Goderich div. of the G.T.R., 13 miles north-west of Stratford and 11 miles south-east of Seaforth. It has 2 churches (Meth. and Baptist), 1 general store, 1 saw mill, and 1 cheese factory. Pop. 150.

FULLER, a post village in Hastings co., Ont., 3 miles from Moira Lake, 20 miles from Belleville, the county seat, and 1½ miles from Ivanhoe, at the junction of the C.P.R. with the Belleville branch of the G.T.R. It has 2 churches (Pres. and Methodist). Pop., 95.

FULLERTON'S LAKE, a small lake situated between Amherst and Parrsborough, Cumberland co., N.S., about 3 miles in length by half a mile in width. The River Hebert takes its rise in this lake. The lake abounds in alewives and trout.

FULLERTON'S MARSH, Queens co., P.E.I. See Southport.

FULTON, a post village in Lincoln co., Ont., 4 miles from Grassies Station, on the Toronto, Hamilton & Buffalo RR., 7 miles west of Smithville, and 16 miles east of Hamilton. It has several stores. Pop., under 150.

FULTON BROOK, a post village in Queens co., N.B., on the Salmon River, 12 miles from Chipman, on the New Brunswick Coal and Ry. Co.'s line. It contains 3 churches (Roman Catholic, Baptist and Presbyterian), 4 stores, 6 hotels, 1 saw mill and 1 grist mill. Fur trading and lumbering are carried on. Pop., about 200.

FULTONS, Wellington co., Ont. See Fultons's Mills.

FULTON'S MILLS, a post office in Wellington co., Ont., and a station (Fulton's) on the Hamilton & Southampton div. of the G.T.R., 4 miles from Harriston.

FUNDY, BAY OF, an inlet of the Atlantic, separating Nova Scotia from New Brunswick. Length near 170 miles; breadth varying from 30 to 50 miles. At its upper extremity are Chignecto Bay and Minas Channel, leading to Minas Basin. Passamaquoddy Bay opens into it near its mouth. The Bay of Fundy is deep, but its navigation is dangerous. The tides, which here rise to the height of 71 feet, rush in with such rapidity that swine are often taken and drowned while feeding on shell fish. Grindstones and gypsum are obtained at the head of this bay. It comprises the Grand Manan and Long Islands, and receives the St. John and St. Croix Rivers. The city of St. John, N.B., is on its north coast.

FURBY'S COVE, a small fishing settlement in the dist. of Fortune Bay, on the east side

of Hermitage Bay, Nfld., 3 miles from Hermitage Cove, 133 miles from Port aux Basques. It contains an Anglican church and 1 lobster factory. Pop. (1901), 72.

FURNACE FALLS, a post hamlet in Victoria co., Ont., on the Burnt River and a station on the Irondale, Bancroft & Ottawa Ry., 5 miles n. e. of Kinmount Jct., on the Haliburton & Lindsay branch of the G.T.R. Pop., 40.

FURY and HECLA STRAIT, in Franklin dist., of the North-East Territories, lat. 89° 30' N., lon. 85° W., leads westward into Boothia Gulf from Fox Channel, and having on the north Cockburn Island and on the south Melville Peninsula. It is about 30 miles wide and 120 miles long, and contains numerous islands.

FURY POINT, in the Arctic waters of Franklin dist., close to Prince Regent's Inlet, on the southeast side of North Somerset, in lat. 72° 40' 30" N., lon. 91° 55' W. Here Sir James Ross wintered in 1822-23.

FYFIELD, a settlement in Bruce co., Ont., 5 miles from Teeswater, on the C.P.R., 11 miles from Wrexeter. It contains 1 store, 1 saw mill and 1 cheese factory. Pop., about 75.

GABAROUSE, a post settlement in Cape Breton co., N.S., 15 miles from Louisburg, on the Sydney & Louisburg Ry. It contains 4 churches (Presbyterian, Methodist, Roman Catholic and Baptist), 9 stores, 1 hotel, 2 saw mills, 1 lobster cannery and telegraph office. Pop., 500.

GABAROUSE, a small lake in Cape Breton co., N.S., between Gabarouse Bay and Belfrey Lake, near the sea coast. See Gabarus Lake.

GABAROUSE BARACHOIS, a post village in Cape Breton co., N.S., on Gabarouse Bay, 12 miles south-west of Louisburg, on the Sydney & Louisburg RR. It has 4 churches (Roman Catholic, Presbyterian, Methodist and Baptist), 11 stores, 2 hotels, 4 saw mills and 3 lobster factories, besides telegraph office. Pop., about 950.

GABAROUSE LAKE, a post settlement in Cape Breton co., N.S., 20 miles from Louisburg on the Sydney and Louisburg RR., with port on Gabarouse Bay, on the Atlantic. It has 1 Presbyterian church, 1 general store, post office, and 2 saw and shingle mills. Pop., about 300.

GABARUS, a lake in Cape Breton co., N.S., gives rise to a river running into the Atlantic through Little Fourchu Harbor, in Richmond co.

GABELLE, FALLS OF, on the River St. Maurice, about 15 miles from its mouth, in St. Maurice co., Que. They are 25 ft. high, and descend through a partial contraction of the river possessing little of the picturesque.

GABRIOLA ISLAND, a post settlement in Vancouver, B.C., 12 miles from Nanaimo. It has 1 saw mill. Pop., 150.

GAD'S HARBOR, a settlement in the dist. of St. Barbe, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 19.

GAD'S HILL, a post village in Perth co., Ont., on the G.T.R., 7 miles from Stratford. It contains 1 Methodist church, 1 store, 1 hotel, 2 saw mills and 1 grist mill. Pop., 110.

GADUAMGOSHOUT, a river of Quebec, rises in 2 lakes bordering on the north-west angle of Bonaventure co., and becomes one of the chief sources of the River Restigouche.

GAFF TOPSAIL, a flag station on the Reid-Nfld. RR. (Bishop's Falls section), 23 miles

west of Millertown Jct., and 69 miles north-east of Bay of Islands, Nfld.

GAGETOWN, a post settlement in Queens co., N.B., on the Grimross Creek, a tributary of the St. John River ($\frac{1}{2}$ a mile distant), 35 miles from Fredericton and 50 miles from St. John. The nearest convenient station is Wellsford, on the C.P.R. (28 miles distant), 24 miles north of St. John. It has 2 churches (Eps. and Meth.), 3 stores, 3 hotels, 1 post office and savings bank, 1 saw mill, besides grammar and primary schools and telephone office. Pop., 250.

GAGNE, a post village in Bonaventure co., Que., on the Grand Cascapedia River, $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Maria Station, on the Atlantic, Quebec and Western RR., close to Chaleurs Bay. It has 1 Roman Catholic church, 8 stores, 1 hotel and 2 flour mills, with express and telegraph office at Maria. Pop., 125.

GAGNON, a post office in Russell co., Ont., $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles from South Indian station, on the Ottawa div. of the G.T.R., 22 miles from Ottawa.

GAGNON, a lake in Chicoutimi co., Que.

GAGNON RIVER, rises in the lakes of Abercrombie, in Terrebonne co., Que., and falls into the Rivière du Nord.

GAGNON RIVER, a small stream in Kamouraska co., Que.

GAGOUCHIGAOU, a river running into the south bank of the Restigouche, in Restigouche co., Que.

GAILEY, Kent co., N.B. See Cormierville.

GAINSBOROUGH, a post village in Assa. dist., Prov. of Sask., on North Antler Creek and C.P.R. (Estevan div.), 223 miles west of Winnipeg. It contains 4 churches (Baptist, Anglican, Presbyterian and Methodist), 6 stores, 1 hotel, 1 flour mill, 1 branch bank, telegraph and express offices. Pop., 300.

GAIRLOCH MOUNTAIN, a post settlement in Victoria co., N.S. (Cape Breton Island), on the Middle River, 2 miles from Alba, a station on the I.C.R., 12 miles south of Grand Narrows, on the Bras d'or Lakes. It has 1 Presbyterian church, 1 general store, 1 saw mill and 1 carding mill. Pop., 100.

GALBRAITH, a post office in Lanark co., Ont., 14 miles from Almonte, on the C.P.R.

GALENA, a post settlement in Kootenay dist., B.C., on the Columbia River, 45 miles from Golden station, on the C.P.R., between Field and Donald. It contains 1 hotel. Pop., about 100.

GALESBURG, a post office in Peterboro co., Ont., $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Lakefield station on the G.T.R., 9 miles from Peterboro.

GALETTA, a post village in Carleton co., Ont., on the River Mississippi and a station on the Parry Sound & Ottawa div. of the G.T.R., 5 miles east of Arnprior and 33 miles west of Ottawa city. It has Methodist and Episcopal churches, 2 stores, 1 hotel, 1 roller mill, 1 woollen factory, besides post, telegraph and express offices. Pop., 200.

GALIANO, a post settlement on Galiano Island (area, 1,600 acres) adjoining Active Pass, in the Gulf of Georgia, B.C., midway between Victoria, Vancouver and New Westminster. It is 18 miles from Sidney Station, on the Victoria & Sidney RR., on Vancouver Island, and has also steamboat connection twice a week with Victoria and Vancouver. Farming, sheep and cattle-raising and fruit growing are the chief

industries on the Island. It has become a favorite summer resort, and there is good sea bathing. It has a public school, where Sunday services are held, besides 2 general stores and post office, with express and telegraph office at Victoria. Pop., 100.

GALIANO ISLAND, in the strait of Georgia, B.C., situate to the south of Valdez Island, off Vancouver Island.

GALLAGHER, a post office in Westmoreland co., N.B., 3 miles from Canaan station, on the I.C.R., 18 miles from Moncton.

GALLINGER TOWN, a post village in Stormont co., Ont., 4 miles from Aultsville on G. T.R. It contains 2 churches, 1 store, 1 cheese factory and 1 blacksmith shop. Pop., 44.

GALL LAKE, a small lake in Labelle co., Que., well stocked with whitefish and salmon-trout.

GALLOWAY, a station in Kootenay dist., B.C., 8 miles from Elko, and 26 miles from Fernie, all on the C.P.R. (Crows Nest Pass section).

GALSON, a post office in Compton co., Que., 13 miles from Scotstown station, on the C.P.R., 25 miles from Megantic.

GALSTON, a post settlement in Nipissing dist., Ont., on the Amable-Prefond River, 7 miles from Eau Claire Station, on the C.P.R., 12 miles west of Mattawa, on the Ottawa River. Its industries are chiefly lumbering and farming, though there is iron ore in the vicinity, and there ought to be good mining. It has 2 churches (Pres. and Meth.). Pop., under 100.

GALT, an incorporated town of Ontario, in Waterloo co., on the Grand River, and on the Hamilton & Southampton and Brantford, Galt & Elmira divs. of the G.T.R., 19 miles north of Brantford, and 25 miles north-west of Hamilton. It has extensive water-power privileges, and contains churches of 6 denominations, 6 branch banks (Commerce, Imperial, Toronto, Merchants, Sovereign and United Empire), several assurance and insurance agencies, 2 printing offices, issuing daily and weekly newspapers, 2 telegraph offices, 12 hotels, about 45 stores, several large flouring mills, and manufactories of axes, iron castings, machinery, paper, soap and candles, lasts, pails, woollens, wooden ware, leather, etc. It is also on the C.P.R., and on a local electric line. Pop. (1901), 7,866.

GALWAY, a post settlement in Albert co., N.B., at the head of Salmon River, 10 miles from Elgin, on the Elgin & Havelock Ry. It contains a Roman Catholic church, 1 store and a copper mine (2 miles distant). The district abounds in game, such as deer, moose, cariboo, etc. Pop., 65.

GAMACHE, or **ELLIS RIVER**, a small stream on the Island of Anticosti, Que., rises in a lake of the same name, and, after a course of 4 miles, enters the Gulf of St. Lawrence through Gamache or Ellis Bay.

GAMBLE'S CORNERS, a post village in the south-east part of Prince co., P.E.I., 5 miles from Emerald, a jct. station (Cape Traverse section), on the P.E. Island RR., with port at Victoria. It has besides the post office 1 school. Pop. of dist. (chiefly Methodists and Baptists), 105.

GAMBO, a settlement in the dist. of Bonavista, and a station on the Reid-Nfld. Ry., 135 miles from Whitbourne, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 107.

GAMEBRIDGE, a post village in Ontario co., Ont., on the Talbot River, and on the G.T.R.

and Can. Northern Ontario Ry., 5 miles from Beaverton. It contains 1 Presbyterian church, 1 hotel and 3 stores, 1 cheese and butter factory, 1 printing and newspaper office and telegraph and express offices. It is a fine summer resort, with good boating and fishing. Pop., 100.

GANANOQUE, an incorporated town of Ontario, Leeds co., on the north shore of the St. Lawrence, at the mouth of the Gananoque River, and on the G.T.R., 13 miles north-east of Kingston, and 25 miles west of Brockville. It has unlimited water power, and contains 4 churches, 2 branch banks (Merchants and Toronto), several assurance and insurance agencies, 2 telegraph offices, 1 express office, 2 printing offices, 5 hotels, 60 stores, 18 factories, 1 roller mill 1 grist mill, and manufactories of woollens, iron castings, edge tools, machinery, agricultural implements, nails, leather, organs, wooden ware, boots and shoes, etc., etc. Gananoque is a port of entry. The Thousand Island Ry. connects it with the G.T.R., having a station at King Street and one at the wharf. The mouth of the Gananoque River is spanned by a steel swing bridge, and Gananoque is now one of the leading summer resorts. Pop., about 3,750.

GANANOQUE, a small lake in Leeds co., Ont. The Gananoque River takes its rise in this lake.

GANANOQUE JUNCTION, a post office in Leeds co., Ont., on the Thousand Islands RR., and a Jct. of the same name on the G.T.R., 7 miles from Lansdowne.

GANANOQUE RIVER, rises in a lake of the same name in Leeds co., Ont., and runs south into the St. Lawrence, which it enters at a village to which it lends its name. It is a fine mill stream.

GANDER BAY, a settlement in the dist. of Fogo. Pop. (1901), 546.

GANDER BAY POND, a lake of Newfoundland, lies between 54° and 55° N. lat. and 48° and 49° W. lon. It is about 30 miles long, and 2 to 3 miles wide; and has its outlet into the Atlantic Ocean through Gander Bay.

GANDER RIVER, of Newfoundland, an important stream falling into the Atlantic Ocean on the south-east coast. Total length about 100 miles.

GANGES, a post office in Nanaimo dist., B.C. **GANGES HARBOR**, a post office in Vancouver Island, B.C., on the Victoria steamer route to Nanaimo.

GANG RANCH, a post settlement in Yale and Cariboo dist., B.C., on the Fraser River, 100 miles from Ashcroft on the C.P.R. It contains 1 store and 1 saw mill, and is the property of the Western Canadian Ranching Co., Ltd. Pop., 50.

GANNET ISLAND, on the coast of Labrador, lat., 54° N., lon. 56° 34' W.

GANNET ROCK, a small island 6¼ miles from the south-west head of Grand Manan, in Charlotte co., N.B. Lat. 46° 32' N., lon. 66° 52' W. On it is a lighthouse exhibiting a revolving light 66 feet above high water mark. A gun is fired every hour during a fog. Dangerous rocks extend 4 miles eastward of the lighthouse.

GAP VIEW, a post village in the Prov. of Saskatchewan (formerly Assa. E., N.W.T.), 8 miles from Forget, a station on the Moose Mountain section of the C.P.R., 17 miles west

of Arcola, and 96 miles south-east of Regina. Besides the post office, there is 1 Methodist church.

GARAFRAXA, EAST and WEST, townships and electoral districts in Wellington Centre co., East Garafraxa, about 2,000 acres; West Garafraxa, Ont., combined area, about 90,000 acres. Pop., about 2,700.

GARDEN, a station on the Soo line of C.P.R., in Algoma dist., Ont., 9 miles from Sault St. Marie.

GARDEN HILL, a post settlement in Durham co., Ont., and a station on the G.T.R., 6 miles from Millbrook. Port Hope is its port. It contains 2 churches (Methodist and Presbyterian), 1 store, 2 flour and lumber mills, 1 woollen factory, 1 branch bank, and telegraph and express offices. Pop., under 400.

GARDEN ISLAND, an incorporated village in Frontenac co., Ont., on an island in the St. Lawrence, 1¾ miles from Kingston, on the G.T.R. It contains 1 hall, 1 shipyard, 1 machine shop, 1 saw mill, 1 telegraph office and 1 store. Pop., 242.

GARDEN OF EDEN, a post settlement in Pictou co., N.S., on the Garden River, 22 miles from New Glasgow, on the I.C.R. It contains 1 Presbyterian church and 1 store. Pop., 140.

GARDEN RIVER, or **KETEGAUNESEEBE**, a post village in the dist. of Algoma, Ont., on the Soo line, C.P.R., 9 miles from Sault Ste. Marie and 500 miles from Toronto. This is an Indian Reserve, extending 10 miles along St. Mary's River, and 5 miles into the interior, and derives its name from a stream which runs through it in a southerly direction and falls into the St. Mary. The Indians are chiefly engaged in the fishery and the chase during summer, and cutting timber and loading vessels in winter. Garden River is a missionary station of the churches of England and Rome. The neighborhood abounds in mines of silver, lead and copper. It contains 4 stores, express and telephone offices and daily mail. Steamers from Collingwood to Fort William call here. Pop., 1,000.

GARDENTON, a post village in Provencher co., Man., on the Roseau River, 25 miles east of Dominion City, a station on the Emerson branch of the C.P.R., 55 miles south of Winnipeg, and 10 miles north of Emerson. A branch railway, north-eastward from Emerson is now under construction, which it is expected will soon give Gardenton closer railway connection. Several hundreds of settlers, chiefly foreigners, have of late taken up land in the vicinity.

GARDENVILLE, a post office in Prince Edward co., Ont., 1 mile from Weller's Bay, on the Central Ontario RR.

GARDINER MINES, a post settlement in Cape Breton co., N.S., 1½ miles from Dominion No. 1, on the Sydney & Louisburg Ry. Its port is Lingan Bay. It has a post office.

GARDINER'S CREEK, a post settlement in St. John co., N.B., on the Bay of Fundy, 14 miles from St. Martin's Station (Hampton & St. Martin's RR.), and 20 miles from St. John. It contains 3 churches, 2 stores and 2 saw mills. Farming and fishing are extensively carried on. Pop. 100.

GARDNER CHANNEL, an inlet in Skeera dist., from Hecate Strait, the channel between the Queen Charlotte Islands and the mainland of B.C. Near it, north-westward, is Hawkesbury Island, with Douglas Channel beyond, and

on the south-westward is Princess Royal Island. A number of small streams flow into Garden Channel or Canal, among them Kitlobe and Kemano Rivers.

GARDNER'S, a lake in Pontiac co., Que.

GARDNER'S MILLS, a post office in Yarmouth co., N.S., 2½ miles from Brazil Lake, on the Dom. Atlantic RR., 13 miles from Yarmouth.

GARDNER'S RIVER, a celebrated salmon stream of British Columbia, in Cassiar dist., rises near Fort St. James, on the eastern shore of Stuart Lake, in lat. 54° 25' N., lon. 123° 30' W., and enters the Pacific Ocean through Gardner's inlet. Length about 150 miles.

GARFIELD, a post office in Queens co., P.E.I., via Charlottetown.

GARGAMELLE, a settlement in the dist. of St. Barbe Nfd., 140 miles from Bay of Islands. Pop. (1901), 19.

GARGAMELLE COVE, a settlement on the north-west coast of Nfld., 140 miles north of Bay of Islands, a port on the same coast, and a station on the Reid-Nfld. RR., 404 miles north-west of St. John's and 144 miles north of Port-aux-Basques. Port-aux-Choix is 1 mile from Gargamelle. Pop., 25.

GARIA, a fishing settlement in the dist. of Burgeo and La Poile, Nfld., on Garia Bay, 8 miles from Rose Blanche. Pop. (1901), of Garia and Garia Bay, 32.

GARLAND, a post settlement in Kings co., N.S., 6 miles from Berwick, on the D.A.R., It contains a school-house, in which Baptist meetings are held, and a branch store. Pop., 110.

GARLAND, a post office in Dauphin co., Man., and a station on the Can. Northern RR., 24 miles north-west of Sifton Jct., and 10 miles south-east of Pine River.

GARLAND, a post office in Chateauguay co., Que., near Aubrey, a station on the Ottawa & Swanton div. of the G.T.R., 5 miles from Howick Jct.

GARNEAU, a post village in L'Islet co., Que., 19 miles from St. Jean Port Joli, a station on the I.C.R., 15 miles east of Cap St. Ignace. Pop., about 300.

GARNEAU JUNCTION, a post village in Champlain co., Que., a station on the Three Rivers and Grandes Piles branch of the C.P.R. at its junction with the Can. Northern Quebec Ry.

GARNET, a post hamlet in St. John co., N.B., 12 miles from St. John. It contains an Anglican church, 1 store, and 1 lumber mill. Pop., 50.

GARNET RIVER, rises in rear of St. Maurice co., Que., and runs west into Lake Kempt.

GARNETT, a post settlement in Haldimand co., Ont., and a station on the G.T.R., 12 miles from Port Dover. It contains 1 Methodist church and 1 store. Pop., 100.

GARNISH, a post village on Fortune Bay, Nfld., situate in a beautiful level dist., 21 miles from Burin Bay. It contains 3 churches (Anglican, Methodist and a Salvation Army Barracks), 2 stores, 1 saw mill and 2 lobster canneries. Its rivers and brooks are noted for salmon and trout fishing. Pop. (1901), 465.

GARNOCK, a post office in Humboldt dist., Prov. of Saskatchewan, 26 miles from Lipton, a station on the Kirkella branch of the C.P.R., 23 miles east of Regina.

GARONNE, a post office in Humboldt dist., Prov. of Saskatchewan, 14 miles from Duck

Lake on the C.N.R. (Regina branch), 52 miles north of Saskatoon.

GARRET'S COVE, a settlement in the dist. of Trinity, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 21.

GARRETTON, a post office in Grenville co., Ont., via Prescott, on the G.T.R.

GARRISON ROAD, a post office in Welland co., Ont., 3 miles from Fort Erie, on G.T.R. It contains 1 church, 1 school and black-smith shop.

GARRY ISLAND, in Beaufort Sea, Mackenzie dist., N.W.T., off the mouth of Mackenzie River, in lat. 69° 30' N., lon. 135° W.

GARRY LAKE, a body of water partly in Mackenzie and partly in Keewatin districts, N.W.T., situate between Lakes Pelly and Macdougall. Area in Keewatin, 156,800 acres; area in Mackenzie, 470,400 acres.

GARRYOWEN, a post office in Grey co., Ont., 10 miles from Owen Sound, on C.P.R. and G. T. R.

GARSON, a station on the C.P.R., in Selkirk co., Man., 27 miles north-east of Winnipeg.

GARTH, a lake in Chicoutimi co., Que., in the township of Otis, south of the Saguenay River.

GARTHY STATION, a post village in Wolfe co., Que. (Municipality de Beaulac), on Lake Aylmer, and a station on the Quebec Central RR. It has 1 Roman Catholic church, 3 stores, 1 hotel, and 1 saw mill, with express and telegraph offices at the station. On Lake Aylmer, a resort of the residents of Sherbrooke, there are a number of club houses and chalets, frequented by sportsmen and those seeking the quieter attractions of the place. Pop., 950.

GARTHY WEST, a post office in Wolfe co., Que., 3 miles from Garthby on the Quebec Central RR.

GARTMORE, a village in Marquette co., Man., on the Vermillion River, 68 miles from Strathclair, on the North-Western branch of the C.P.R. It contains 2 churches (Anglican and Methodist), 2 stores, 1 hotel, and 1 saw mill. Pop., 480.

GARWOOD, a station in Rainy River dist., N.W. Ont., on the C.P.R., 5 miles east of Rat Portage (Kenora), on the Lake of the Woods.

GASCOIGNE, a fishing settlement in the dist. of Placentia and St. Mary's, near St. Mary's Bay and Point la Haye. Pop. (1901), 123.

GASCONS, a post office in Bonaventure co., Que., 28 miles from New Carlisle on the Atlantic, Quebec and Western Ry. The landing name, on Chaleurs Bay, is L'Anse aux Gascons.

GASKIN, or POINT LA HAYE, a fishing settlement in the dist. of Placentia and St. Mary's, Nfld., on the east side of St. Mary's Bay, 4 miles from St. Mary's. Pop. (1901), 156.

GAS LINE, a post settlement in Welland co., Ont., on Lake Erie, 2½ miles from Sherston (Sherks), on the G.T.R. Its port is Port Colbourne. It contains 2 Lutheran churches, 1 store, 1 hotel, 1 cheese factory and a telegraph office. Pop., about 300.

GASPARINE, a post village in Chateauguay co., Que., near St. Remi, a station on the Mooer's Jct. & Massena Springs branch of the G.T.R., 6 miles from St. Isidore Jct. It contains 1 store, 1 saw mill. Pop., about 350.

GASPE, a district of Eastern Quebec, comprising the counties of Gaspe and Bonaventure, is surrounded from Cap Chat to Cap des Ro-

siers by the waters of the Gulf and River St. Lawrence; thence to Pointe aux Macquerau by the waters of the Gulf, this point being the boundary between the two counties; thence to Point Magouacha by the Baie des Chaleurs, and thence westward to the uppermost end of the district by River Restigouche; the whole extent being about 375 miles of coast, intersected by numerous smaller rivers, bays and harbors, and being throughout a most valuable and inexhaustible fishing coast,—more particularly so the county of Gaspé and the Magdalen Islands, situate in the centre of the Gulf. The chief resources of the district, with respect to exportation are the cod, salmon, mackerel, herring and whale fisheries, and lumber; the former principally in the county of Gaspé, and the latter principally in the county of Bonaventure. The imports, consisting of the necessaries of life in the way of provision and clothing for the total supply of nearly two-thirds of the population (not being producers or manufacturers) make this district an extensive market for the products of other parts of the Province, contributing largely to the public revenue. The population of the two counties, per last census (1901) was: Bonaventure, 24,495; Gaspé, 30,683—total, 55,178—mostly settled along the coast, leaving immense tracts of wild lands fit for cultivation. The area of Gaspé is 2,912,941 acres; of Bonaventure, 2,216,550 acres. Bonaventure only has railways—the I.C.R. crosses it; the other is the Atlantic & Lake Superior line, running from Metapedia to Paspebiac.

GASPE, a maritime county of Quebec, occupying the east portion of the Gaspé Peninsula, has an area of 2,912,941 acres. Chief town Percé. Pop. (1901), 30,683.

GASPE, or GASPE BASIN, a post town, summer resort and port of entry in Gaspé co., Que., situate on York River and on the north side of the entrance to the harbor formed by Gaspé Bay, 136 miles from Baie des Chaleurs Station and 450 miles (by sea) from Quebec. It is the seat of extensive fisheries of salmon, cod, mackerel, herring, whales, etc., and is distinguished in history as being the place where Jacques Cartier landed on 24th July, 1554. It contains 4 churches, 1 telegraph office, 2 saw mills, 2 hotels, 1 sleigh factory, branch of Bank of Toronto and 6 stores. On the high ground to the rear of the town is Fort Ramsay, upon which are mounted several guns. Pop. (1901), 454.

GASPE BAY, in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, on the south-east side of Gaspé co., Que., lies between Cape Gaspé and Whale Head. It runs about 16 miles into the land and is about 5 miles broad; from its extremity two inlets, called the north-west and south-west arms, penetrate a considerable distance into the interior, and receive the waters of several streams that flow from the mountains. They are noted for their salmon; some weighing 40 pounds have been caught. The bay itself is deep and well sheltered; its waters are a great resort for cod and other deep sea fish; the shores are lofty, and the settlers are nearly all fishermen. The basin, which is easy of access, is said to be one of the best and most commodious harbors in America, and is capable of containing more than 300 vessels in perfect security.

GASPEREAUX, a post village in Kings co., N.S., on the Gasperaux River, 2½ miles from Wolfville, on the Dominion Atlantic Ry., 3 miles from Grand Pré. It contains 4 Baptist churches, 2 stores, 5 mills (grist, saw and carding), and 1 barrel factory. Pop., about 500.

GASPEREAUX, a post village in Queens co., N.B., at the confluence of the Gasperaux and Salmon Rivers, and a station on the C.P.R., 32 miles from St. John. It contains 1 Baptist church, 1 store and 1 hotel. Pop., about 150.

GASPEREAUX, a small lake in Antigonish co., N.S., has its outlet in the West River.

GASPEREAUX, a small lake on Allan's River, in Annapolis co., N.S.

GASPEREAUX, a river of New Brunswick, rises in a lake in Sunbury co., flows north-east and then south, and falls into the Salmon River, which has its exit in Grand Lake, in Queens co. It is navigable for canoes for 50 miles.

GASPEREAUX, a post office in Kings co., P. E.I., 9 miles from Georgetown, a terminal station (on the Gulf of St. Lawrence), on the P. E. Island RR., 46 miles north east of Charlottetown.

GASPEREAUX STATION, on the C.P.R., in Queens co., N.B. See Gasperaux.

GASTERS, a fishing settlement in the dist. of Harbor Main, Nfld., at the head of Conception Bay, 36 miles from St. John's. Pop. (1901), 47.

GATESIDE, a station in Macdonald co., Man., on the Prince Albert branch of the Can. Northern RR., between Pratt and Arizona stations.

GATEWAY, a post village in Kootenay dist., B.C., on the Kootenay River, on the international boundary, and a station on the Great Northern RR. It is near Morrissey station, on the C.P.R., 8 miles south west of Fernie, and has Canadian custom office and government stock yards and an international exchange post office. It contains 1 store, 1 hotel, 2 saw mills and lumber camps. Pop., 150.

GATINEAU, a river of Wright co., Quebec, rises in a large lake in lat. 49° N., lon. 75° 40' W., flows south, entering the Ottawa near Hull, being 400 miles in length, draining an area of upwards of 9,000 square miles, and navigable for canoes upwards of 300 miles. The timber berths on this river and its tributaries are very extensive. About 280,000 saw logs are floated down it annually. It abounds in views of the wildest and most romantic scenery.

GATINEAU POINT, a village in Wright co., Que., on the C.P.R., 3 miles from Ottawa. It contains 1 Roman Catholic church, 11 stores, 3 hotels, 1 saw mill and 1 grist mill. Pop. (1901), 1,583.

GAUDETTE, a post office in Pontiac co., Que., 45 miles from Kippewa, on the C.P.R. (Kipawa the station is named), on Temiskaming branch of the line.

GAULTOIS, a fishing settlement and seaport in Hermitage Bay, on the south coast of Nfld., west of Fortune Bay, and 12 miles east of Pass Island, in Hermitage Bay. The harbor is a good safe one. It has 2 churches (Roman Catholic and Episcopal), 2 stores, and 2 schools. Pop. (1901), 143.

GAUTHIER, Provencher co., Man. See Letteller.

GAUTHIER, a lake in Argenteuil co., Que., in the township of Grandison.

GAUTHIER RIVER, a small stream that takes its rise in the Abercrombie lakes, Terrebonne co., Que., and falls into the Riviere du Nord.

GAUTIER JUNC., a station at the junction of the Rapid City and Miniota branch of the C. P.R., in Marquette co., Man., 33 miles from Brandon.

GAVELTON, a post village in Yarmouth co., N.S., 2 miles from Yarmouth on the Halifax & South Western RR., Pop., about 75.

GAVIN LAKE, a lake in Colchester co., N.S., noted for its fish.

GAWAS, a post hamlet on St. Joseph Island, in Algoma dist., Ont., situate on St. Mary's River, at the west end of the North Channel of Lake Huron, 30 miles south-east of Sault Ste. Marie. The nearest station (5 miles distant) on the main shore is Desbarats, on the C.P.R. ("Soo" branch), 28 miles east of the "Soo."

GAY'S RIVER, a small stream running into the Shubenacadie, in Colchester co., N.S. Gold is found on this river.

GAY'S RIVER, a post village in Colchester co., N.S., 6 miles from Shubenacadie, on the I.C.R., 22 miles from Truro. It contains 1 Presbyterian church, 2 stores and shingle, saw, grist and carding mills. Pop. (1901), 735.

GAY'S RIVER ROAD, a post village in Halifax co., N.S., 11 miles from Stewiacke Station, 44 miles north east of Halifax. It contains 1 store, 1 plaster mill, and 1 tannery. Pop. 150.

GAYTHORNE, a post office in Northumberland co., N.B., near Neguac, on the Miramichi steamer line, 30 miles from Chatham.

GEARY, a post village in Sunbury co., N.B., 7 miles from Russignois, on the C.P.R., 10 miles from Fredericton. Pop., about 125.

GEDDES, a small lake in Halifax co., N.S., has its outlet in a small stream running into the Musquodoboit River, east of Halifax city.

GEGOGGIN, a post settlement in Guysboro' Co., N.S., in the Liscombe dist., at which port steamers call weekly, plying between Halifax and Sherbrooke. It is 40 miles south of Antigonish on the I.C.R., and has 1 general store, post office and 1 lobster canning factory. Pop., about 100.

GELBERT, a post village in Victoria co., Ont., a station on the G.T.R. (Haliburton & Lindsay branch), 42 miles from Lindsay and 13 miles from Haliburton. It contains several stores, post and telegraph offices, and has a stage twice daily to Minden. Pop., about 125.

GELLATLY, a post office in Yale dist., B.C., near Peachland, a station on the Okanagan RR. & Steamer Line (C.P.R.), 41 miles south of Okanagan Landing, and 22 miles north of Penticton.

GENELLE, a station in Kootenay dist., B.C., 10 miles south of Castlegar Jct., on the C.P.R.

GENEST, a settlement in Portage la Prairie co., Man., and a station on the Northwestern div. of the C.P.R., 6 miles from Portage la Prairie.

GENEVA, a post office in Argenteuil co., Que., 4 miles from Lachute on the North Shore (Ottawa) line of the C.P.R. Pop., 150.

GENOA, a post village in Argenteuil co., Que., 3 miles from St. Hermas, on the C.P.R.,

5 miles from St. Scholastique, 38 miles from Montreal, on the North Shore line to Ottawa.

GENTILLY, an incorporated village in Nicolet co., Que., on the St. Lawrence, 11 miles from Doucet's Landing on the G.T.R., 5 miles from Champlain Station, on the C.P.R., and 12 miles from Forestdale, on the I.C.R. It contains a Roman Catholic church and a convent, 5 stores, 2 hotels, 4 mills (grist and saw), 3 factories (sash and door, butter and cheese), a private bank and telegraph office. Pop., 1,036 (of village); 2,215 (of parish).

GENTILLY RIVER, rises in Lake St. Louis, in Nicolet co., Que., and after winding a serpentine course, falls into the St. Lawrence.

GEORGE, a lake in York co., N.B., 25 miles south-west of Fredericton, gives rise to the River Poquiock.

GEORGE, a lake in Portneuf co., Que., in the township of Chevigny.

GEORGE IV. LAKE, a lake near the centre of Newfoundland, about 20 miles long and 5 wide. It is romantically situated and abounds with excellent fish.

GEORGE RIVER, in Ungava dist., N.E.T., follows a general northerly course, running nearly parallel to the Labrador coast, from whence it is at no part more than 100 miles distant, and falls into Hudson Strait, through Ungava Bay. About 200 miles from its mouth there is a large lake (Indian House Lake) abounding with fish.

GEORGE'S BROOK, a small settlement in the district of Trinity, Nfld., at the western extremity of Smith Sound, 65 miles from Clarenville. It contains a Methodist church, 1 store, 2 lumber mills and brick works. Pop. (1901), 74.

GEORGE'S COVE, a settlement in the dist. of Trinity, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 35.

GEORGE'S LAKE, a lake of Prescott co., Ont., noted for the mineral springs which are found in the vicinity.

GEORGE'S RIVER, a post settlement in Cape Breton co., N.S., ½ mile from George's River Station on the Cape Breton extension of the I.C.R., 4 miles from North Sydney Junction. It contains 2 churches (Roman Catholic and Presbyterian), 3 stores and 1 saw mill. Pop., about 800.

GEORGE'S RIVER STATION, a post settlement in Cape Breton co., N.S., on the I.C.R. Its port is Bras d'Or Lake. It contains a Presbyterian church, 1 store and 1 saw mill. Pop., 100.

GEORGETOWN, an incorporated village in Halton co., Ont., on the River Credit, and on the G.T.R., 29 miles north-west of Toronto. It contains 6 churches (Episcopal, Roman Catholic, Presbyterian, Methodist, Baptist and Congregational), 2 bank agencies (Hamilton and Merchants), 2 telegraph and express offices, paper mill, planing mill, saw mill, boot and shoe factory, glove factory, knitting machine and type-writer factory, foundry and machine shop, 3 hotels, 15 stores and 2 printing offices, issuing 2 weekly newspapers. Pop., 1,313.

GEORGETOWN, a seaport town, capital of Kings co., P.E.I., on the Peninsula between the Brudenell and Cardigan Rivers, at the entrance into Cardigan Bay, on the south-east side of the island, 46 miles east of Charlottetown. It possesses one of the best harbors on the island, open the whole year round and

capable of receiving vessels of the largest tonnage. It has a good trade in country produce, and contains several churches, stores, schools, and hotels, besides post, telephone, telegraph and express offices, being a station (one of the three eastern terminals: Souris, Murray Harbor and Georgetown) of the P.E. Island R.R. Its manufacturing industries are 1 herring drier and curer, 2 lobster canning factories, and 2 foundries. Pop. (1901), 1,123.

GEORGETOWN, a settlement in the dist. of Port-de-Grave, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 155.

GEORGETOWN SAW MILLS, a small place in British Columbia, at the mouth of Georgetown Creek, 7 miles from Port Simpson and 600 miles from Vancouver. It has a Methodist church, 1 store and a lumber mill. Pop. 12 (whites), 9 (Japs), 10 (Indians).

GEORGEVILLE, a post village in Stanstead co., Quebec, 9 miles from Smith's Mills, 10 miles from Memphremagog Lake, which is reached by B. & M. Ry. steamers, and 10 miles from Magog Station on the C.P.R. It is noted for its beautiful scenery, and contains 2 churches (Episcopal and Methodist), 5 stores, 1 hotel, telegraph and telephone offices. Pop., 300.

GEORGEVILLE, a post office in Antigonish co., N.S., 16 miles from Antigonish, on the I. C. R.

GEORGIAN BAY, Ont. See Lake Huron.

GEORGIA, STRAIT OF, B.C. See Gulf of.

GEORGINA, Ont. co., Ont. See Sutton West.

GEORGINA ISLAND, an island in Lake Simcoe, Ont., 2 miles from main land, 7 miles from Sutton West, and is an Indian reservation. It is also a post office.

GERALDINE, a post village in Huntingdon co., Que., 15 miles from Hemmingford. It contains 1 Methodist church and 1 Holiness Movement church. Pop. 100.

GERMANIA, a post settlement in Muskoka dist., Ont., 5 miles from Uffington, 11 miles from Gravenhurst Station, on the G.T.R., and 26 miles north of Orillia. It contains 2 churches (Methodist and Lutheran), 2 stores and 1 saw and shingle mill. Pop. 175.

GERMANICUS, a country post office in Renfrew co., Ont., 5 miles from Golden Lake, on the Parry Sound & Ottawa div. of the G.T.R. The district contains 2 churches (Lutheran Synodical Conference and Canada Lutheran), and 1 store.

GERMAN MILLS, a post village in South Riding of Waterloo co., Ont., on the G.T.R. (Galt branch), 4 miles from Berlin. It contains 1 Mennonite church, 1 hotel, 1 grist mill, 1 flour mill, and express and telegraph offices. Pop., 150.

GERMANSEN LANDING, a settlement in Omineca dist., B.C., on the Peace River, 500 miles from Ashcroft Station, on the main line of the C.P.R., 203 miles north-east of Vancouver. It is in a mining region.

GERMANSEN LAKE, in Omineca (Cariboo) dist., B.C., situate to the north-east of North Tacla Lake. It is drained by GERMANSEN River (on which is GERMANSEN Landing), which connects with Omineca River, both flowing into the Peace River.

GERMANTOWN, a post village in Albert co., N.W. Ont., 6 miles from Albert, the terminus of the Salisbury and Harvey Ry. It contains 1 Baptist church and 3 saw mills. Pop., about 150.

GERMANTOWN LAKE, in Albert co., N.B., about 20 miles from Hillsborough, covers a few thousand acres, and is considered the best trout lake in the eastern part of the Province.

GERRARD, a settlement in the Kootenay dist., B.C., on Trout Lake, and a station on an interior line of the C.P.R., 17 miles from Trout Lake city, which is reached by means of C.P. R. steamer and 34 miles north of Lardo at the head of Kootenay Lake. It contains 1 store, 1 hotel, telegraph and express offices. Pop., 25.

GERRARD ISLAND, a post office in Halifax co., N.S., near West River Harbor.

GERTRUDE MINE, a post office in Algoma dist., on the Manitoulin & North Shore section (now under construction) of the Algoma Central and Hudson Bay R.R.

GESNER'S CREEK, a small village in Annapolis co., N.S., 5 miles from Bridgetown, on the Dominion Atlantic Ry. Pop., 97.

GESTO, a post settlement in Essex co., Ont., 3½ miles from New Canaan, on the Pere Marquette R.R., and 6 miles from Essex Centre, on the Michigan Central R.R. It contains 1 store, 1 church, 1 school, 1 blacksmith shop and 1 saw mill. Pop., about 400.

GETHSEMANI, a post office in Saguenay co., Que., near Esquimaux Point, on the north shore of the St. Lawrence.

GETSON'S COVE (or POINT), a post village in Lunenburg co., N.S., on the Lahave River, 11 miles from Bridgewater, on the Halifax & South-Western Ry. It contains 2 churches (Anglican and Presbyterian), 5 stores, 2 fish and oil clothing factories and telephone (to Bridgewater). Pop., about 600.

GEYSER, a post settlement in Selkirk co., Man., on the Icelandic River, 29 miles from Gimil, on the Winnipeg Peach branch on the C. P. R. It has a store. Pop., about 300.

GIANT'S LAKE, a post and farming settlement in Guysboro' co., N.S., 25 miles from South River, a station on the I.C.R., 5 miles east of Antigonish. It contains 1 Roman Catholic church, 1 store, 1 shingle mill and 1 wagon factory. Pop., about 250.

GIBBON, a post office in Kings co., N.B., 15 miles from Sussex, on the I.C.R., 43 miles north-east of St. John.

GIBRALTAR, a post village in Grey co., Ont., on Silver Creek, 10 miles from Collingwood, on the G.T.R. The scenery surrounding the place is exceedingly picturesque. It contains 2 churches, 1 store and 2 saw mills. Pop., about 300.

GIBSON, a post hamlet in Simcoe co., Ont., 5 miles from Elmvale on the G.T.R. (Barrie & Penetang div.) Pop., 35.

GIBSON, a post village in York co., N.B., on the St. John River, and station on the C.P.R. and Intercolonial Ry., within 2 miles of Fredericton. It has 4 churches (Anglican, Meth., Baptist and Free Baptist), 6 stores, 1 saw mill, 2 foundries, the I.C.R. machine shops and 1 wagon factory, besides express and telegraph offices. Pop., 650.

GILALO, a post office in Selkirk co., Man., 6½ miles from Selkirk station on the C.P.R., 21 miles north east of Winnipeg.

GILARDEAU, a lake in Chamblain co., Que.

GILBERT, a station in Rainy River dist., N.W. Ont., on the C.P.R., 18 miles west of Eagle River, and 47 miles east of Rat Portage (Kenora), on the Lake of the Woods.

GILBERT COVE, a post village in Digby Co., N.S., on St. Mary's Bay, 3¼ miles from Port Gilbert (Sissiboo Falls Station), on the Dominion Atlantic Ry., 6 miles east of Weymouth. It contains 3 churches (R.C., Holiness Movement and Baptist), 2 stores, 1 hotel, 1 private bank, and telegraph and express offices. Pop., about 400.

GILBERT DES CAPS, a post office in Charlevoix co., Que., 21 miles from St. Joachim on the Quebec Ry. Light and Power Co.'s Ry.

GILBERT MOUNTAIN P.O. (name of village **SUGAR HILL**), in Cumberland co., N.S., at the head of West Brook River, and 5 miles from West Brook Station, on the Spring Hill & Parrsboro branch of the Cumberland RR. It has 1 Methodist church and 2 portable saw mills. Pop., under 50.

GILBERT PLAINS, a post settlement in Dauphin co., Man., on the C.N.R. (Edmonton div.), 20 miles west of Dauphin, on Dauphin Lake. It contains 3 churches (Anglican, Methodist and Presbyterian), 20 stores, 2 hotels, 1 flour mill, agency for the Bank of Commerce, 1 printing office issuing a weekly newspaper and telegraph and express offices. Pop., 400.

GILBERT PLAINS JCT., a station at the junction of the Can. Northern Ry. (Edmonton line) with the Prince Albert line and Winnipegosis branch of the same railway, in Dauphin co., Man., 3 miles west of Dauphin.

GILBERT'S MILLS, a post village in Prince Edward co., Ont., on Consecon Creek, 5 miles from Bloomfield Station, on the Central Ontario Ry., and 7 miles from Picton. It contains 2 churches and several factories and mills. Pop., 100.

GILCHRIST, a post settlement in Simcoe co., Ont., 4 miles from Gowan on G.T.R. It contains 1 Presbyterian church, cheese factory and blacksmith shop.

GILEAD, a post office in Hastings co., Ont., near Corbyville, on the G.T.R., within 3 miles of Belleville (Peterboro' branch).

GILES CROSSING, a settlement in Cumberland co., N.S., 1¼ miles from West Chester station on the I.C.R.

GILFORD, a village in Simcoe co., Ont., on the North Bay division G.T.R., 15 miles from Barrie and 49 miles north of Toronto, and is within 10 minutes' walk of Lake Simcoe. It contains express and telegraph offices, 1 store 1 Methodist church, 1 creamery, and one of the finest cold storages north of Toronto, school, temperance hall, also one of the best grain markets on the line. Pop., 200.

GILKS, a post office in Northumberland co., N.B., with station called Blissfield on the Fredericton branch of the I.C.R.

GILL, a village in Haldimand co., Ont., 1 mile from Nelles' Corners, on the G.T.R., 5 miles from Cayuga, the county seat and nearest banking location. Pop., under 60.

GILLAM'S COVE, a settlement in the dist. of St. George. Nfd. Pop. (1901), 28.

GILLANDER'S MOUNTAIN, a post hamlet in Victoria co. (Cape Breton Island), N.S., 4 miles west of Middle River, and some little distance north-west of Baddeck, with port at Nyanza. The nearest station is Iona, on the I.C.R., 25 miles distant. Sunday service is held in Presbyterian church at Middle River. Pop. (mainly farmers), under 25.

GILLESPIE, a post office in Victoria co., N.

B., near Ortonville, on the C.P.R., 7 miles from Grand Falls.

GILLIES, a post settlement in the Prov. of Saskatchewan, on the Saskatchewan River, 27 miles from Duck Lake station, on the Regina branch of the C.N.R., 52 miles north of Saskatoon. I has 1 Episcopal church and 1 general store, besides a station and barracks of a post of the N.W. Mounted Police. Pop., under 100.

GILLIES DEPOT, a post office and station on the Temiskaming & Northern Ontario RR., 4 miles south of Cobalt, 17 miles north of Temagami, and 99 miles north of North Bay, on the C.P.R. and G.T.R., in Nipissing dist., Ont.

GILLIE'S HILL, a post office in Bruce co., Ont. 6 miles from Paisley, on the Southampton div. G.T.R.

GILLIES LAKE, a post settlement in Cape Breton co., N.S., 12 miles from Sydney, on the I.C.R. and S. & L. Ry. Pop., about 250.

GILLIES PLATFORM, or **GILLIS**, a settlement in Kings co., N.B., and a station on the New Brunswick Coal and Railway Co's line 6 miles from Norton.

GILLIES POINT, a post office in Victoria co. (Cape Breton Island), N.S., 4 miles from Iona, on the I.C.R.

GILLIES POINT EAST, a post village in Victoria co., N.S., 4 miles from Iona, on the I.C.R., 1 mile from the Grand Narrows and 16 miles from Orangedale. It contains 2 Roman Catholic and 5 Protestant churches, 3 stores, 1 hotel, 1 saw mill and 1 grist mill. Pop., about 750.

GILLINGHAM, a post office in Alberta Province, on Middle Fork of Old Man's River, 2 miles from Lubreck, and a flag station on the Crows Nest branch of C.P.R., called Burrows. It has a hall used for the services of all denominations, and 1 store. Farming and ranching is carried on in the vicinity.

GILLIS COVE, a post office and farming dist. in Inverness co., N.S., 3 miles from Orangedale, on the I.C.R. Pop., 9 families.

GILMAN, a station on the St. Stephen branch of the C.P.R., in Charlotte co., N.B., 10 miles from St. Stephen, 24 miles from McAdam Jct.

GILMAN, a post settlement in Brome co., Que., 1 mile from West Brome, on the C.P.R. It contains 1 cheese factory and 1 steam marble shop. Pop., about 300.

GILMOUR, a post office in Hastings co., Ont., on the Central Ontario RR., 59 miles north of Trenton.

GILPIN, a post office in the Prov. of Alberta, 13 miles from Ranfurly on the Can. Northern RR.

GILPIN, a station in Yale dist., B.C., on the C.P.R., 7 miles from Grand Forks.

GIMLI, a post settlement in the dist. of Selkirk, Man., on Lake Winnipeg, on the Winnipeg Beach branch of the C.P.R., 60 miles from Winnipeg city, and 40 miles from Selkirk. It is one of the best fishing places in the North West and Manitoba, and notable for good timber. It contains 2 churches (Lutheran and Unitarian), 5 stores, 1 hotel and 2 printing offices issuing 2 weekly newspapers. Pop., 450.

GIN COVE, a settlement in the dist. of Trinity, Nfd. Pop. (1901), 33.

GINGRAS, a post office in Lotbiniere co., Que., 5 miles from St. Apollinaire station, on the I.C.R., 8 miles east of Laurier.

GIRARD, formerly **MONT ST. NICHOLAS**,

a post settlement in St. Johns co., Que., and a station on the Rouse's Point branch of the G.T.R., 9 miles from St. John's, and 15 miles from Rouse's Point. It contains 1 cheese factory, 1 saw mill and 1 store.

GIROUX, a station on the Atlantic, Quebec & Western Ry., in Bonaventure co., Que., 47 miles from New Carlisle.

GIROUX, a small post village in Provencher co., Man., and a station on the Port Arthur branch of the C.N.R. It has 1 Presbyterian church, 1 store and 1 boarding house.

GIROUX LAKE, a post office in the d.ist. of Nipissing, N. Ont. It lies west of Lake Temiskaming and south of Cross and Peterson Lakes, 4 miles from Cobalt, on the Temiskaming & Northern Ontario RR., 103 miles north of North Bay.

GIROISS, Antigonish co., N.S. See Monastery.

GIRVAN, a post village in Kent co., N.B., 6 miles from Richibucto. The village has electric light.

GIRVIN, a post settlement in an excellent farming region in Humboldt co., Sask. Prov., with a station on the Regina branch of the C.N.R., about midway between Regina and Saskatoon. It has 2 churches (Presbyterian and Methodist), 1 school, 3 stores, 1 grain elevator, besides express and telegraph offices. Pop., 45.

GITWINGAK, a settlement in Cassiar dist., B.C., on the Skeena River, with port at Essington. The projected G.T.R. Pacific line is expected to pass near the place when in operation. It has 1 Anglican church and Mission printing office and 2 Indian stores. Pop., 150 Indians.

GLACE BAY, an incorporated town in Cape Breton co., N.S., on the Sydney & Louisburg Ry., 14 miles from Sydney. It contains 10 churches (Anglican, Roman Catholic, Presbyterian, Methodist and Baptist), 120 stores, 10 hotels, 1 wood working factory, 3 branch banks, 2 printing offices issuing 2 newspapers, telegraph and express offices, water works and electric light plant, excellent fire brigade and electric tram service, which connects the town with the city of Sydney and surrounding collieries. Output of coal per day 14,000 tons. Pop., 6,945.

GLACIER, a progressive town in Kootenay dist., B.C., on the main line of the C.P.R., 3 miles south-west of Rogers Pass (on the Rockies), and 15 miles north-east of Illicillewaet, or 43 miles north-east of Revelstn., on the Columbia River. It is an important divisional point on the C.P.R.

GLADSTONE, a hamlet in Grenville co., Ont., 3 miles from Prescott, on the G.T.R.

GLADSTONE, a post settlement in Middlesex co., Ont., 3 miles from Harrietsville, on the C.P.R., 15 miles from St. Thomas. It contains 1 Baptist church, 2 stores, 1 cheese and butter factory and 1 telegraph office. Pop., under 75.

GLADSTONE, a post village in Portage la Prairie co., Man., on the C.P.R. and C.N.R., 35 miles from Portage la Prairie. It contains 4 churches (Presbyterian, Baptist, Methodist and Anglican), 20 stores, 3 hotels, 1 roller mill, 2 sash and door factories, 2 bank agencies (Merchants and Hamilton), newspaper and telegraph and express offices. Pop., 1,150.

GLADSTONE, a post settlement in Victoria co., N.B., on the Tobique River, 2½ miles from Curry Station, on the Tobique branch of the C.P.R. It contains Presbyterian and Baptist churches, 2 stores and 1 saw mill. Pop., 64.

GLADWIN, a station in Yale district, B.C., on the main line of the C.P.R., 5 miles north-east of Lytton.

GLADWYN, a post settlement in Victoria co., N.B., on the Tobique River, 2½ miles from Red Rapids Station, on the Tobique branch of the C.P.R., 9 miles east of Tobique Narrows, and 14 miles east of Perth Jct. It has a post office, and, in the immediate dist., a pop. of 125.

GLADYS, a post settlement in Calgary dist., Prov. of Alberta, 12 miles from Okotoks Station, on the C.P.R. It contains a school house which is used for church services. Pop., about 200.

GLAISES, RIVIERE AUX, in St. Maurice co., Que., falls into Lake St. Peter between the Rivers St. Charles and Aux Loutres.

GLAMMIS, a post village in Bruce co., Ont., on Lake Huron, 8½ miles from Pinkerton Station, and 10 miles from Paisley on the G.T.R. It contains 3 churches, 1 hotel, 1 saw mill, 1 cheese box factory and 2 stores. Pop., 225.

GLAMORGAN, a post settlement in Durham co., Ont., 6 miles from Millbrook, on the G.T.R., 13 miles from Peterboro. It contains 1 Church of England, 1 store and 1 saw mill. Pop., under 100.

GLANDINE, a post hamlet in Victoria co., Ont., 6 miles from Lindsay, on the G.T.R. It contains a Methodist church and 1 store. Pop., 25.

GLANFORD, a post village in Wentworth co., Ont., 3 miles from Glandford Station on the G.T.R., 6 miles from Caledonia and 8 miles from Hamilton. Pop., 150.

GLANFORD STATION, a post village in Wentworth co., Ont., on the G.T.R. (Hamilton and Port Dover branch), 5 miles from Caledonia.

GLANMIRE, a post office in Hastings co., Ont., 6 miles from Millbridge, on the Central Ontario RR.

GLANWORTH, a post village in Middlesex co., Ont., on the London & Port Stanley branch of the Pere Marquette Ry., 8 miles from London. It contains 2 churches, 2 stores, 1 grist mill, carriage and cheese factories, 1 drug store and 1 blacksmith shop. Pop., 150.

GLASCOTT, a post office in Grey co., Ont., 8 miles from Markdale, on the Orangeville & Owen Sound branch of the C.P.R., 6 miles from Flesherton. Pop., under 60.

GLASGOW, a seaport town of Nova Scotia, Cape Breton co., on Bras d'Or Lake, 4 miles from Shenacadie, on I.C.R. It contains 1 Roman Catholic church, 2 stores, 1 grist mill, 1 shingle mill and 1 saw mill. Pop., 200.

GLASGOW, a post village in Ontario co., Ont., on Duffin's Creek, 3 miles from Stouffville on the G.T.R. It contains 2 churches, 1 store and 1 flour mill. Pop., 50.

GLASGOW STATION, a post settlement in Renfrew co., Ont., and a station (Glasgow) on the Parry Sound & Ottawa div. of the G.T.R., midway between (8 miles each way), Arnprior and Renfrew. It has 1 general store, 1 saw mill, 1 blacksmith shop, besides express and telegraph offices. Pop., 40.

GLASIER, a station on the Fredericton branch

of the C.P.R., in Sunbury co., N.B., and a port of call of the Starr Steamship co., 6 miles from Fredericton.

GLASSBURN, a post village in Antigonish co., N.S., on the Black River, 6 miles from Heatherton, on the I.C.R., 12 miles east of Antigonish. It contains 1 Roman Catholic church, 1 store, grist and saw mills, 1 brush factory and 1 public school. Pop., 200.

GLASSVILLE, a post and farming settlement in Carleton co., N.B., situate on the height of land which separates the south-west branch of the Miramichi River from the St. John, and 9 miles from Bristol Station on the C.P.R., about midway between Newburg Junction and Perth Junction. It has 3 churches (Episcopal, Presbyterian and baptist), 5 stores, 1 hotel, 1 cheese factory. Pop. of village, 200, and of Glassville parish, 700.

GLAUDE, a post office in Westmoreland co., N.B., near Shediac, on the I.C.R.

GLEASON ROAD (ST. JAMES), a post settlement in Charlotte co., N.B., on the St. Croix River, 9 miles from Moore's Mills on the C.P.R. It has 2 churches (Methodist and Presbyterian), Pop. of dist., 90.

GLEBE ROAD, a post office in Antigonish co., N.S., near Antigonish, on the I.C.R.

GLEICHEN, a post settlement in Calgary dist., Alberta Province, and a station on the C. P. R. It contains 1 church (Anglican), 3 stores, 2 hotels, 1 branch bank and telegraph and express offices. Pop., 75.

GLENADA, a station on the Can. Northern Quebec Ry. (Mackenzie-Mann System), in Champlain co., Que., 1 mile from Shawinigan Junction.

GLEN ADELAIDE, a post hamlet in the Prov. of Saskatchewan, 15 miles from Manor, on the C.P.R. It has 1 Methodist church.

GLENALADALE, a 500 acre estate in the suburbs of Tracadie, Queens co., P.E.I., fronting on Bedford Bay, an inlet of the Gulf of St. Lawrence. It is $\frac{1}{2}$ a mile from Tracadie Station, on the P.E. Island RR., 17 miles north-east of Charlottetown. It has 2 stores and telephone office. Pop., under 12.

GLENALDA, a post settlement in Peterborough co., Ont., on Deer River, 7 miles from Coe Hill Station, on the Central Ont. Ry. It has 2 churches (Anglican and Methodist), 1 store, 2 saw and shingle mills, a cheese factory and 1 telegraph office. Pop., 300.

GLENALLAN, a post village in Wellington co., Ont., on the Conestogo River, 10 miles from Drayton, on the Hamilton & Southampton division of the G.T.R., 11 miles from Palmerston. It contains 2 churches (Presbyterian and Methodist) 1 grist mill, 1 saw mill, 1 branch bank and telegraph office. Pop., about 400.

GLEN ALMOND, a post village in Labelle co., Que., on the River du Lievre, 10 miles from Buckingham Jct., a station on the north shore Ottawa & Montreal div. of the C.P.R., 19 miles east of Hull (opposite Ottawa). It has 2 churches (Epis. and Pres.), 2 stores, 2 saw mills and 2 cheese factories, with express and telegraph offices at Buckingham. There are phosphate and mica mines in the vicinity worked at intervals only. Pop., about 200.

GLEN ALPINE, a post village in Antigonish co., N.S., 10 miles from James River Station, on the I.C.R. Its port is Lochaber. It contains 2 churches (Presbyterian and Roman

Catholic), 2 stores, 2 hotels, 4 saw and grist mills, 1 cheese and 3 carriage factories. It is an agricultural district. Pop., 750.

GLEN ANDREW, a post settlement in Prescott co., Ont., 3 miles from Dalkeith, on the Hawkesbury div. of the G.T.R. It contains 2 stores, and 2 cheese factories. Pop., 100.

GLEN ANGLIN, a post settlement in Gloucester co., N.B., quarter mile from Miller's Brook Station, on the Caraquet Ry. It contains 2 churches (Anglican and Methodist), and 1 saw and shingle mill. Salmon fishing is the chief industry. Pop., about 75.

GLEN ANNAN, a post office in Huron co., Ont., and a station on the C.P.R., 5 miles from Wingham, on the G.T.R., and C.P.R. It has a blacksmith shop.

GLENARM, a post village in Victoria co., Ont., 10 miles from Woodville, on the G.T.R., 2 miles from Lorneville Jct. It contains 1 store and 1 hotel and Presbyterian church. Pop., 50.

GLEN BARD, a hamlet in Antigonish co., N.S., 1 mile from James River Station, on the I.C.R., 10 miles from Antigonish. It contains 1 Presbyterian church. Pop., about 30.

GLEN BEAN, a post office in Wright co., Que., 3 miles from Gracefield, on the Ottawa & Maniwaki branch of the C.P.R., 60 miles north of Ottawa.

GLEN BECKER, a post hamlet in Dundas co., Ont., near the St. Lawrence River, and 3 miles from the G.T.R. Station of Morrisburg, between Prescott and Cornwall. Besides the post office, there is 1 cheese factory.

GLENBERVIE, a post village in Colchester co., N.S., on Pembroke Creek, a small tributary of the Stewiacke River, 13 miles from Summit (eastward), and 20 miles from Brookville (westward), stations on the I.C.R. It has, besides the post office, 2 churches (Presbyterian), 1 grist mill and 1 saw mill. Lumbering and farming are the industries of the place. Pop., 73.

GLENBORO, a post village in Portage la Prairie dist., Man., a little south of the Assiniboine River, on the Winnipeg and Souris division of the C.P.R., 106 miles west of Winnipeg, and 45 miles east of printing and newspaper ("The Gazette") office, Souris. It has 4 churches (Anglican, Presbyterian, Methodist and Lutheran), 12 stores, 2 hotels, 2 banks, 1 flour mill, 1 creamery, 1 with express and telegraph service. Pop., 600.

GLENBORO, a settlement in the district of Calgary, Alta., and a station on the Transcontinental line of the C.P.R., 18 miles west of Calgary.

GLEN BUELL, or FORTHTON, a post office in Leeds co., Ont., and a station on the Brockville, Westport & North-Western Ry., 13 miles from Brockville. It contains 1 Methodist church, 1 store, 1 hotel and 1 cheese factory. Pop., 125.

GLENBURNIE, a post village in Frontenac co., Ont., on Collins Lake, 5 miles from Kingston, on the G.T.R. It has a Methodist church. Pop., 200.

GLENBURNIE, a settlement in the dist. of St. Barbe, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 26.

GLENCAIRN, a post village in Simcoe co., Ont., on the Beeton & Collingwood div. G.T.R., 22 miles from Collingwood. It contains 1 saw mill, 1 grist mill, 1 store, tele-

graph, express and telephone offices. Pop., 150.

GLENCAIRN, a post office in Dauphin co., Man., and a station on the Canadian Northern RR., 37 miles north west of Gladstone and 11 miles south of McCreary Jet.

GLEN CAMPBELL, a hamlet in Inverness co., N.S., 35 miles from Orangedale Station, on the I.C.R. See Campbell.

GLENCOE, a post village in Inverness co., N.S., on the Inverness & Richmond RR. It is also 15 miles from River Denys, on the I.C.R. It contains 1 Roman Catholic church and 1 saw mill. Pop., about 125.

GLENCOE, a flourishing town in Middlesex co., Ont., 4 miles from Thames River, and a station on the St. Thomas, Glencoe & Kingscourt Jct. div. of the G.T.R., 23 miles from St. Thomas, and on the C.P.R. (North Glencoe), 31 miles from London. It has a large trade in grain, cattle, lumber and country produce, and contains 11 stores, 3 hotels, 5 mills (flour, saw, planing, knitting and wool carding), 1 foundry, 1 butter factory, 1 evaporating factory, 1 private and 2 chartered banks (Traders and Merchants), 2 telegraph offices, 4 churches (Anglican, Presbyterian, Disciples and Methodist), and 1 printing office issuing a weekly newspaper ("The Transcript"). The streets and all public business places are lighted by electricity. Pop., 1,200.

GLENCOE, a post village in Restigouche co., co., N.B., on Christopher Brook, a small tributary of the Restigouche River, 4 miles from Moffat's, a station on the I.C.R. (Chaleurs Bay section), 5 miles west of Campbellton, and 7 miles east of Matapedia. Lumbering and farming are the chief industries. It has 2 saw and shingle mills. Pop., 64.

GLENCOE MILLS, a post settlement in Inverness co., N.S., situate in a pretty valley and on the Mabou River, 5 miles from Mabou, on the Inverness & Richmond Ry. It contains a Roman Catholic church and a lumber mill. Pop., 200.

GLEN COLIN, a post village in Elgin co., Ont., 3 miles from Springfield, on Catfish River, on the Michiean Central Rv. east of St. Thomas. It contains 1 Methodist church, 1 store, saw and shingle mills and 1 turning factory. Pop., 50.

GLENCORRALDALE, a post settlement in Kings co., P.E.I., 3½ miles from Harmony, on the Prince Edward Island Ry. It contains 1 Roman Catholic church, 1 store and 2 saw mills. Pop., about 200.

GLENCOVE, a post settlement in Guysboro co., N.S., 12 miles from Heatherton, on the I.C.R., 12 miles from Antigonish.

GLENCROSS, a post office in Lisgar co., Man., 6½ miles from Morden, on the C.P.R., 21 miles from Manitow.

GLEN CROSS, a post settlement in Dufferin co., Ont., on the Mattawa River, 7 miles from Orangeville, on the C.P.R., 49 miles north-west of Toronto. It contains 1 Methodist church, 1 store, shingle and lath and 2 saw mills. Pop., under 150.

GLENDALE, a post office in Portage la Prairie co., Man., and a station on the Can. Northern RR., 6 miles north-west of Carberry Jct., and 4 miles south-east of Neepawa on the C.P.R.

GLENDALE, a post settlement in Middlesex

co., Ont., 3 miles from London, on the G.T.R. Lake Erie is its port. It contains a Methodist church and 1 hotel. Pop., 100.

GLENDALE, a post office in the parish of Glendale, Inverness co., N.S., on the River Inhabitants, 8 miles from West Bay Road, on the I.C.R. It contains 2 churches and 2 stores. Pop. of parish, 580.

GLENDINNING, a post office on the banks of Pelican Lake, Souris co., Man., 12 miles from Killarney, on the C.P.R.

GLEN DONALD, a post office in Glengarry co., Ont., 4 miles from Cornwall, on the G.T.R.

GLENDOWER, a post office in Frontenac co., Ont., 8 miles from Verona, on the Kingston & Pembroke RR.

GLEN DYER, a post village in Inverness co., N.S., on the Inverness & Richmond Ry. It has 1 woollen mill. Pop. 50.

GLENEDEN, a post settlement in Grey co., Ont., 5 miles from Mount Forest, on the C.P.R. (10 miles from Harriston), and on the G.T.R. (12 miles from Palmerston). It contains 1 Methodist church, 1 store, 1 flour and 1 shingle mill. Pop., about 125.

GLEN ELBE, a post settlement in Leeds co., Ont., on the Brockville, Westport & North-Western R.R. (Elbe Station), 14 miles from Lyn, on the G.T.R. It has a Methodist church, 1 general store and 1 cheese factory. Pop., 150.

GLENELG, a post settlement in Guysborough co., N.S., 29 miles from Antigonish, on the I.C.R. It has 1 church and 1 general store. Pop., about 150.

GLENELG LAKE, Guysborough co., N.S., affords good salmon and other fishing.

GLENELLA, a post settlement in Dauphin co., Man., and a station on the C.N.R., 27 miles north of Gladstone and 19 miles south of McCreary. It contains 7 stores, 1 hotel and 2 saw mills. Pop., 65.

GLEN EMMA, a post village in Yale dist., B.C., on Salmon River, 10 miles from Armstrong, a station on the Okanagan Rail & Steamer Line of the C.P.R., 32 miles south of Scaumou Jct., on the main line of the road. Besides the post office, there is a Presbyterian church. Farming and fruit growing are the local industries.

GLEN EMMA, a post settlement in Bonaventure co., Que., 5 miles from Millstream, a station on the I.C.R.

GLEN EWEN, a post settlement in Assiniboia dist., Prov. of Saskatchewan, on the C.P.R. (Estevan branch), 57 miles from Napinka and 49 miles from Estevan. It contains 3 churches (Presbyterian, Methodist and Anglican), 5 stores, 1 hotel, and 1 grist mill, 1 branch bank and telegraph office.

GLEN FALLOCH, a settlement in Pictou co., N.S., 2 miles from Pictou Landing, a station on the Pictou Landing branch of the I.C.R.

GLENFANNING, a post settlement in Kings co., P.E.I., on the Grand River, 4 miles from Cardigan, on the Prince Edward Island Ry. It contains 1 store.

GLEN FARROW, a post office in Huron co., Ont., 5 miles from Wingham, on the C.P.R. and G.T.R.

GLENFIELD, a post office in Lennox and Addington co., Ont., 40 miles from Lavant, a station on the Kingston & Pembroke RR.

GLENFINNAN, a post hamlet in Queens co.,

P.E.I., on a branch of the Hillsboro' River, 6 miles from Bunbury, a station on the Murray Harbor branch of the P.E. Island R.R., 3½ miles east of Charlottetown. It is situate in a farming section between Johnston and Glenfinnan rivers, tributaries of Hillsborough River. Pop., of dist., about 100.

GLENFORSA, a post village in Marquette co., (Strathclair municipality), Man., and a station on the Rossburn section of the Can. Northern R.R., 3 miles west of Elphinstone and 36 miles north-west of Clanwilliam. There is good land in the dist. for mixed farming.

GLENGARRY, a post settlement in Prince co., P.E.I., 5 miles from Bloomfield, on the P.E. Island R.R. Pop., about 125.

GLENGARRY, a county in the eastern part of Ontario, having the St. Lawrence for its south-eastern boundary. Area, 305,660 acres. It is traversed by the G.T.R. Chief town, Cornwall. Pop. (1901), 22,131.

GLENGARRY, a post village in Inverness co., N.S., on the south-west Mabou River, 3 miles from Mabou Station, on the Inverness & Richmond line. It has 2 churches (Roman Catholic and Presbyterian). Pop. 50.

GLENGARRY STATION, a post village in Pictou co., N.S., on Middle River, and on the I.C.R., 12 miles from Stellarton and 31 miles from Truro. Pop., under 200.

GLENGARRY VALLEY, a post settlement in Cape Breton co., N.S., 30 miles from Sydney. It has 1 saw mill, and possesses a rich mineral area as yet undeveloped; also a mineral spring much patronized during summer months by people from various places in the county. Pop., 60.

GLEN GORDON, a country place in Ontario, on Military Road, about 3 miles north of Lancaster Station (Glengarry co.), on the G.T.R. It has a cheese factory.

GLEN GORDON, a village in Labelle co., Que., 21 miles from Monte Pello, on the C.P.R. It contains 2 churches (Roman Catholic and Methodist), 2 stores, 1 hotel, saw and grist mills and 3 cheese factories. Pop., 300.

GLENGYLE, a settlement in Pontiac co., Que., and a station (McKee's), on the C. P. R. (Waltham branch), 43 miles west of Ottawa city. It contains 1 store and 1 cheese factory. Pop., 20.

GLENHOLM, a post office in Dauphin co., Man., 7½ miles from Arden, on the C.P.R. (North-Western branch), 17 miles from Gladstone.

GLEN HURON, a post village beautifully situate at the foot of the Blue Mountains in Simcoe co., Ont., on Mad River, 1½ miles from Glen Huron Station on G.T.R. It contains 1 Methodist church, 1 store, 1 saw mill, 1 flour mill, 2 cheese factories and 1 telegraph office. Pop., 200.

GLENHURST, a post office in Assa. W. dist., Prov. of Saskatchewan, 40 miles from Hanley, a station on the Regina and Prince Albert branch of the Canadian Northern Ry.

GLENILA, a post settlement in the dist. of Parry Sound, Ont., 35 miles from Parry Sound and 35 miles from Lake Nipissing. It has a Methodist church, 2 stores, 1 hotel, sash and door factory. Pop., 200.

GLEN ISLAND, a post office and summer resort in Lennox co., Ont., on the Bay of

Quinte, 5 miles from Picton on the Central Ontario Ry. It has a telephone office.

GLEN IVEK, a post village in Sherbrooke co., Que., 3½ miles from Rock Forest Station, on the C.P.R., 6 miles south-west of Sherbrooke, and near Lake Magog, its port. It has 1 Roman Catholic church, 2 schools (1 French Roman Catholic and 1 English Protestant), 2 stores, post office, 1 cheese factory, 2 saw mills and 1 blacksmith shop, besides telephone office. Pop., about 400.

GLENLEA, a post village in Provencer co., Man., and a station on the Winnipeg & Emerson branch of the Canadian Northern R.R., 19 miles south of Winnipeg and 22 miles north of Morris. It has 1 church, 2 stores, 1 grist mill, and 1 cheese factory, besides post, telegraph and express offices.

GLENLEE, a post office in Wellington co., Ont., near Kenilworth, on the C.P.R., 8 miles from Mount Forest.

GLENLIVET, a post settlement in Wright co., Quebec, 1¼ miles from Kirk's Ferry on the C.P.R., 13 miles north of Ottawa. It contains 1 Anglican church, 1 store and 1 grist mill. Pop., about 65.

GLENLIVET, a post office in Restigouche co., N.B., near Flat Lands, a station on the I.C.R., 3 miles from Matapedia (Bonaventure co., Que.) and 9 miles from Campbellton (Restigouche co., N.B.).

GLENLLOYD, a post settlement in Meganitic co., Que., 13 miles from Lyster, on the G.T.R., 5 miles from St. Julie. It contains 1 Methodist church, 1 store and 1 saw mill. Pop., about 150.

GLENLYON, a post office in Dauphin co., Man., 6½ miles from Gilbert Plains, a junction station on the Can. Northern R.R., 4 miles from Dauphin.

GLEN MAJOR, a post village in Ontario co., Ont., on the east branch of Duffin's Creek, on the C.P.R., 5 miles from Myrtle. It contains 2 churches. Pop., 50.

GLEN MARGARET, a post office in Halifax co., N.S., 36 miles from Halifax. Pop., about 100.

GLEN MARTIN, a post office in Kings co., P.E.I., 5 miles from Murray Harbor station on the P. E. Island R.R.

GLEN MARY, a post office in Humboldt dist., Prov. of Saskatchewan, near Prince Albert, on the Can. Northern R.R.

GLEN MEYER, a post settlement in Norfolk co., Ont., 10 miles from Tillsonburg, on G.T.R. It contains 1 church, 2 stores, 1 hotel and blacksmith shop. Pop., 250.

GLEN MILLER, a post settlement in Hastings co., Ont., on Trent River, 3 miles from Trenton, on the G.T.R. and Central Ontario Ry. It contains 1 store, 1 paper mill, 1 grist mill and 2 churches (Anglican and Methodist).

GLENMORE, a post office in Grenville co., Ont., 8 miles from Maitland, on the G.T.R. It has a Methodist church and cheese factory.

GLENMORE, a post settlement in Halifax co., N.S., 13 miles from Stewiacke, on the I.C.R. 45 miles north-east of Halifax. It contains 1 lumber and shingle mill. Pop., 75.

GLEN MORRIS, a post village in Brant co., Ont., 7 miles from Galt, on G.T.R. and C.P.R. It contains 1 Presbyterian church, 2 stores, 1 hotel and 1 saw mill. Pop., 200.

GLEN MORRISON, a post office in Cape Bre-

ton co., N.S., via Sydney, on the I.C.R. and Sydney & Louisburg RR.

GLEN MURRAY, a post settlement in Megantic co., Que., on the Thames River, 9 miles from Lyster, a station on the G.T.R., 33 miles south-west of Quebec. It contains 1 Orange hall, 1 school, 1 saw mill and 1 store. Pop., 100.

GLENNEVIS, a post hamlet in Glengarry co., Ont., 2 miles from Dalhousie Mills, on the C.P.R. It contains 1 store and Roman Catholic church.

GLEN NORMAN, a post settlement in Glengarry co., Ont., on River Lisle, and a station on the C.P.R. It contains 1 store and 1 cheese factory, 1 carriage and blacksmith shop. Pop., 70.

GLEN OAK, a post settlement in Middlesex co., Ont., 3½ miles from Longwood Station, on the G.T.R., 21 miles from London. It contains 1 Methodist church. Pop., about 125.

GLENOGLE, a settlement in Yale district, B. C., and a station on the C.P.R., 7 miles east of Golden, 29 miles west of Field.

GLENORA, a country post office in Inverness co., N.S., on the Inhabitants River, 3½ miles from West Bay Road, on the I.C.R. The dist. contains about 20 farms.

GLENORA, a post settlement in Souris co., Man., and a station on the Wakopa sect. of the Can. Northern RR., 9 miles south-west of Greenway. It lies north of Rock Lake, which teems with fish, and is on the Pembina River. It has 2 churches (Epis. and Pres.), besides several stores, post, telegraph and express offices.

GLENORA (formerly **STONE MILLS**), a post settlement in Prince Edward co., Ont., on the Bay of Quinté, 5 miles from Picton. It contains 1 Methodist church, 1 store, 1 hotel, 1 flour and grist mill, 1 machine shop, 1 foundry, 1 grain store-house and elevator, and telegraph and express offices. Pop., 150.

GLEN ORCHARD, a post village in Muskoka dist., Ont., 21 miles north of Gravenhurst, on the G.T.R., or near Bala, close to the new line of the Can. Northern RR. It has, besides post office, a town hall, school house, and a church in the vicinity, with farm lands about. Pop., 75.

GLENORCHY, a post settlement in Halton co., Ont., 8 miles from Milton, the county seat, and near Oakville, a station on the Toronto and Hamilton branch of the G.T.R.

GLENORCHY, a station on the C.N.R., in Rainy River dist., Ont., 181 miles west of Port Arthur.

GLENPAYNE, a post office in Stormont co., Ont., 3¼ miles from Berwick, on the New York and Ottawa Ry.

GLEN PORTER, a post hamlet in Northumberland co., N.B., 3¼ miles from Blackville, on the Fredericton branch of the I.C.R. Pop., under 50.

GLEN RAE, a post settlement in Lambton co., Ont., and a station on the Michigan Central Ry. It contains 1 store. Pop., 50.

GLEN ROAD, a post settlement in Antigonish co., N.S., 6 miles from James River Station, on the I.C.R. Pop., 68.

GLEN ROBERTSON, a post village in Glengarry co., Ont., on the G.T.R., 16 miles from Coteau. It contains 4 hotels and several stores, 1 Roman Catholic church, 1 sash and

door factory, 1 carriage factory, 1 workmen's hall, and saw and grist mills. Pop., 500.

GLEN ROSS, a post village in Hastings co., Ont., on the Trent River, 2 miles from Anson, a station on the G.T.R. and Central Ontario Ry. It contains 1 store, 1 saw and 2 grist mills. The Trent Valley Canal passes through here, giving navigation for 25 miles, from Frankford to Myersourg. Pop., about 100.

GLENROY, a post office in Glengarry co., Ont., on the C.P.R., 4 miles from Green Valley. It contains 2 stores and 1 butter factory. Pop. of hamlet and vicinity, 100.

GLEN SANDFIELD, a post settlement in Glengarry co., Ont., on the G.T.R., 3 miles from Glen Robertson. It contains 1 church, 2 stores, 1 blacksmith shop, 1 factory and express office. Pop., 200.

GLENSHEE, a post settlement in Norfolk co., Ont., 7 miles from the G.T.R. station of Delhi, 8 miles west of Simcoe Jct., and 12 miles east of Tillsonburg. It has 1 Methodist church, 1 general store, 1 grist and saw mill, and 1 blacksmith shop. Pop., 62.

GLENSHEE, a settlement in Pictou co., N.S., 3 miles from West Merigomish, 11 miles from New Glasgow on I.C.R. It contains 1 store and 2 saw mills. Pop., about 40.

GLENSIDE, a station on the Spokane Falls and Northern Ry., in Yale district, B.C., 7 miles from Phoenix, and 17 miles from Grand Forks.

GLEN SMAIL, a post settlement in Grenville co., Ont., 3 miles from Spencerville, a station on the C.P.R., 9 miles from Prescott. It contains 1 store, post office, 1 cheese factory, and 1 blacksmith shop. Pop., 75.

GLENSMITH, a post settlement in Dauphin co., Man., 2 miles from Glencairn Station, on the C.N.R. It contains 2 churches (Methodist and Presbyterian), and 2 stores. Pop., 250.

GLEN STEWART, a post settlement in Dundas co., Ont., 9 miles from Iroquois, on the G.T.R. It contains 1 store and 1 butter and cheese factory.

GLEN SUTTON, a post village in Brome co., Que., on the Missisquoi River, on the C.P.R., 9 miles from Richford, Vt. It contains 1 Anglican church, 2 stores, 1 hotel, 2 grist mills and 1 saw mill. Pop., 600.

GLEN TAY, a village in Lanark co., Ont., on the River Tay, 4 miles south of Perth, on the C.P.R. It contains 1 Methodist church, 1 store and 1 large woolen factory. Pop., 300.

GLEN TITUS, a post office in Kings co., N. B. See Titus Mills.

GLEN UIG, a post office in Antigonish co., N.S., 7 miles from Antigonish, on the I.C.R.

GLENVALE, a post village in Frontenac co., Ont., on the Kingston & Pembroke Ry., 10 miles from Kingston, and 1½ miles from Glenvale Station. It contains 2 churches (Methodist and Presbyterian), 1 store and 1 cheese factory. Pop., 125.

GLENVALE, a small settlement in Westmoreland co., N.B., 3 miles from Petitcodiac, on the I.C.R., 23 miles from Sussex, and the same distance from Moncton. Pop., about 60.

GLEN VALLEY, a post office in Assa. W. dist., Prov. of Saskatchewan, near the line of the Prince Albert div. of the C.P.R.

GLEN VALLEY, a farming and post settlement in New Westminster dist., B.C., on the Fraser River, ½ a mile from Whonnock Station, on the C.P.R., 33 miles east of Vancouver.

It is also near Langley, in the agricultural region of the Lower Fraser Valley. The place has progressed rapidly in recent years, being a good farming and dairying dist., (the yield per acre of hay averages 4 tons): the salmon and lumber industry is also a source of local wealth. It has 2 churches (Epis. and Pres.), 1 general store, 1 grist mill and 1 saw mill, besides express and telegraph office at Whonnock. Pop., about 500.

GLEN VIEW, a post office in Lanark co., Ont.

GLENVIEW, a rural post hamlet in Calgary dist., Prov. of Alberta, $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles south of the Bow River, 12 miles from Langdon, a station on the main line of the C.P.R., 21 miles east of Calgary. It has a good school house.

GLEN VILLA, a post office in Stanstead co., Que., near North Hatley station on the Boston & Maine RR.

GLENNVILLE, a post settlement in Westmoreland co., N.B., 3 miles from Petitodiac, a station at the junction of the I.C.R. with the Elgin & Havelock Ry.

GLENNVILLE, a post office in York co., Ont., 2 miles from Newmarket on the G.T.R., 34 miles north of Toronto.

GLENNVILLE, a post settlement in Inverness co., N.S. (Cape Breton Island), near the source of Big River, 1 mile from Black River Station, on the Inverness & Richmond line. It is moreover, 5 miles from Broad Cove Mines, 7 miles from Mabou, and 26 miles north-west of Orangedale Station, on the I.C.R. It has, besides the post office, a school house, and Government telegraph office. Pop., about 106.

GLEN WALTER, a post hamlet in Glengarry co., Ont., 6 miles from Cornwall, on the River St. Lawrence and on the G.T.R. It contains 1 store. Pop. of hamlet and vicinity, 58.

GLENWELL, a post office in Qu'Appelle dist., Prov. of Saskatchewan, $2\frac{1}{4}$ miles from Kaiser, on the Wolsley and Regina branch of the C.P.R.

GLEN WILLIAM, a post village in Kings co., P.E.I., $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Murray River Station on the Belfast & Murray Harbor branch of the Prince Edward Island Ry., south of Georgetown. It has 1 public hall used as a place of worship, with 3 Presbyterian churches within a radius of 4 miles; 1 general store, 2 saw mills and 1 wood work factory. Pop., 200.

GLEN WILLIAMS, a post settlement in Halton co., Ont.

GLENWILLOW, a post settlement in Middlesex co., Ont., $5\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Appin on the G.T.R. It contains 1 Methodist church. Pop., 225.

GLENWOOD, a post and lumber settlement in Twillingate dist., north-east Nfld., on the Gander River, with port on Gander Bay 30 miles distant, and a station on the Reid-Nfld. RR., 14 miles east of Notre Dame Jct. Besides the post office and a school, there is a large lumber mill operated by the Nfld. timber estates, and cutting about 7 million feet of lumber a year. It has 2 telegraph offices, and at the station an express office. Pop., 300.

GLENWOOD, a post settlement in New Westminster co., B.C., 4 miles from Hazelmere, on the G.N.R. Pop., 150.

GLENWOOD, a pretty post village in Yar-

mouth co., N.S., near Argyle, on the Halifax & Yarmouth RR. It contains 1 Free Baptist church and 2 stores. Pop., about 200.

GLENWOOD, a post office in Kings and Albert co., N.B., near Oak Point.

GLENWOOD, LOT 8, a post settlement in Prince co., P.E.I., a few miles from Coleman station on the P.E.I. Ry.

GLENWOOD STATION, a post settlement in Kent co., Ont., on the Père Marquette Ry. Port Alma is its port. It contains a Methodist church, 1 mill and an express office. Pop., 200.

GLOUCESTER, a maritime county of New Brunswick, bordering on the Gulf of St. Lawrence and the Bale des Chaleurs. The surface is extremely diversified with mountains and rivers, and on its coasts are numerous islands, the principal of which are Shippegan and Miscou. Great Shippegan Harbor, comprising three commodious harbors, and Little Shippegan and Bathurst Harbors are in this county. Into the latter flow one large and four small rivers. None are navigable. The Intercolonial Railway and the Caraquet RR. traverse the county. Area, 1,196,676 acres. Chief town, Bathurst. Pop. (1901), 27,936.

GLOUCESTER, a station in Carleton co., Ont., on the Ottawa & Prescott division of the C.P.R., 9 miles from Ottawa. It contains 1 telegraph office. Pop., about 60.

GLOUCESTER JUNCTION, a station in Gloucester co., N.B., on the I.C.R., 5 miles from Bathurst.

GLOVER HARBOR, a settlement in the dist. of Twillingate, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 67.

GLOVERTOWN, a settlement engaged in the fishing and logging trade in Nfld., on the Terra Nova River, falling into Bonavista Bay. The nearest station, 4 miles distant, is Alexander Bay, on the Reid-Nfld. RR., 30 miles north of Port Blandford. It has 1 Methodist church, 4 stores and 5 saw mills. Pop (1901), 291.

GOATFELL, a station on the C.P.R., in Kootenay dist., B.C., east of the Columbia River, 9 miles from Kitchener.

GOBEIL, a post office in Charlevoix co., Que., 60 miles from St. Joachim, on the Quebec Ry., Light & Power Co's. Ry., and near Murray Bay, a port on the north shore of the St. Lawrence River.

GOBLE'S CORNERS, a post settlement in Oxford co., Ont., on the G.T.R., 7 miles from Woodstock. It contains 1 store, 1 wagon factory and express office. Pop., 106.

GOBLIN BAY, a settlement in the dist. of Fortune Bay, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 28.

GODBOUT, a bay in Saguenay dist., Que., at the mouth of the Godbout River, affording a fine harbor.

GODBOUT, a post and fishing settlement in Saguenay co., Que., on the north shore of the St. Lawrence, 225 miles below Quebec, 45 miles from Little Metis, and a port of call in summer for the steamers (at 10 day intervals) of the Que. & No. Shore SS. line. It is situated at the mouth of the Godbout River, near Point de Mont, and about 12 miles south-west of Trinity Bay. It has 1 Roman Catholic church and 2 stores, besides post and telegraph offices. Pop. (French-Canadians and Indians), 60. which are engaged in fishing in the summer and hunting in the winter. Potatoes and a few other root crops are also raised.

GODDENVILLE, a settlement in the dist. of Harbor Grace, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 93.

GODEFROI, a small river in Nicolet co., Que., rises in the seigniorie of Roquetallade, and running north-east falls into the St. Lawrence.

GODERICH, the county town of Huron co., Ont., and the chief shipping port on the east shore of Lake Huron. It is delightfully situated at the mouth of the River Maitland, and is the north terminus of the Buffalo and Goderich branch of the G.T.R., 165 miles from Buffalo, and 62 miles north north-west of London. It contains 2 Methodist churches and 1 each for Episcopalians, Roman Catholics, Presbyterians, Baptists and Disciples, 4 public schools, 1 collegiate institute, separate school, 2 weekly newspapers ("Huron Signal" and "The Star"), 2 telegraph offices, 4 banks, 7 hotels, 50 stores, 3 planing and 2 flour mills, one being a branch of the great Ogilvie system; also manufactories of woollens, iron castings, machinery, leather, boots and shoes, organs and high class wood work, etc. Goderich is the centre of the salt industry of Canada, 5 wells being situated there. The lake fisheries are also of great value, employing a large number of tugs and sail boats, the product being principally shipped to the United States. Goderich has daily communication with all lake points by steamers, and possesses unrivalled docks for handling lumber. It has a first class harbor, protected by over 2,000 feet of piers, with a lighthouse on a high bluff. As a health and pleasure resort, it is unsurpassed on the chain of lakes, possessing both saline and mineral waters, and all boating facilities. There are ample systems of water-works (from artesian wells), and electric light, both owned by the town. Pop. (1900), 5,000.

GODFREY, a post settlement in Frontenac co., Ont., on the Kingston & Pembroke Ry. (Bedford) 29 miles from Kingston. There are lead, silver and zinc mines in the neighborhood. Pop., 58.

GODOLPHIN, a post hamlet in Northumberland co., Ont., 5 miles from Campbellford, on the Bellevue branch G.T.R. It contains 1 Methodist church and 1 cheese factory. Pop., about 30.

GOD'S LAKE, in Keewatin dist., N.W.T., on which there is a post of the Hudson Bay Co. The lake is drained north-eastward by the Shamattawa River into Port Nelson, on the Western shore of Hudson Bay.

GOFF'S, a post settlement in Halifax co., N.S. 5 1/4 miles from Enfield, on I.C.R., and 21 miles from Halifax.

GOGGINS, a settlement in Kings co., N.B., 2 miles from Penobsquis, on the St. John branch of the I.C.R.

GO HOME, a post village (open in summer only) and holiday resort, in Simcoe co., Ont., on the Go Home River, 21 miles equi-distant from Midland and Penetanguishene stations, on the G.T.R. and Georgian Bay. The members of the Madawaska Club (composed chiefly of the staff of the University of Toronto and their friends) have a number of summer cottages here. These are provisioned by a supply boat from Midland. Pop. (in summer, 400; in winter, 20).

GOLBURN VALLEY, a post settlement in Humboldt dist. Prov. of Saskatchewan, 8 miles

from Tisdale, a station on the Prince Albert branch of the Can. Northern RR., 88 miles south east of Prince Albert.

GOLDBORO', a post office in Guysboro' co., N.S., 51 miles from Antigonish, on the I.C.R.

GOLDEN, an incorporated village in East Kootenay dist., B.C., situate at the confluence of the Columbia and Wapta Rivers, on the main line of the C.P.R. It is the distributing point of the Columbia River Valley for north and south, and is also the headquarters of the Columbia River Trans. Co. It contains 4 churches (Anglican, Roman Catholic, Presbyterian and Methodist), 3 large and several small stores, 4 hotels, 1 lumber mill, 1 smelter, 1 sash and door factory, agency for the Imperial Bank of Canada, 1 printing office issuing a newspaper, telegraph and express offices, 2 schools, Government offices, court house and hospital. Pop., 750.

GOLDENBURG, a post settlement in Algoma dist., Ont., on the Mississauga River, 8 miles from Dayton, a station on the "Soo" branch of the C.P.R., 26 miles west of Algoma Mills, on the north channel of Lake Huron, with port at Thessalon. It has 1 Presbyterian church and 1 saw and shingle mill. Pop., about 100.

GOLDEN GROVE, a post settlement in St. John co., N.B., 12 miles from St. John, on the C.P.R. and I.C.R. It contains 4 churches (Anglican, Roman Catholic, Methodist and Baptist), and has 1 woollen mill. Pop., 150.

GOLDEN GROVE MILLS, a post office in St. John co., N.B., 6 miles from Colebrook on the I.C.R.

GOLDEN LAKE, a post village in Renfrew co., Ont., on the Ottawa & Parry Sound div. of the G.T.R. It contains 1 church, 3 stores, 1 hotel, 1 saw mill, 1 express office and daily mail. The islands on the lake contain many summer resorts. Pop., 130.

GOLDEN LAKE, a pretty lake on the Madawaska River, Renfrew co., Ont. Lat. 45° 35' 51" N., lon. 77° 25' W., about 6 miles long by 3 wide. There are several Indian clearings on its banks.

GOLDEN PLAIN, a post office in Assa. E. dist. Prov. of Saskatchewan, 11 miles from Kennedy, on the Reston branch of the C.P.R., 30 miles west of Moosomin.

GOLDEN RIDGE, a settlement in Carleton co., N.B., on the St. John River, 18 miles from Hartland, on the C.P.R., 12 miles north of Woodstock. Pop., 15.

GOLDEN STREAM, a post village in Macdonald co., Man., on Pine Creek, a station on the Winnipeg and Edmonton line of the Can. Northern Ry., 8 miles from Gladstone. It contains 3 churches (Anglican, Methodist and Presbyterian), 6 stores, 3 hotels, 1 flour mill and 1 bank. Pop., 900.

GOLDEN VALLEY, a post settlement in Parry Sound dist., Ont., 29 miles from Trout Creek on the Toronto & North Bay div. of the G.T.R. It contains 1 Methodist church, a school and 1 saw mill. Pop., about 106.

GOLDENVILLE, a post village in a mining dist., in Guysboro' co., N.S., on St. Mary's River, 3 miles from Sherbrooke, and 40 miles from the nearest RR. station, Antigonish, on the I.C.R. There are rich gold mines in the vicinity. It has 1 Presbyterian church, 3 stores, 2 hotels and 3 quartz crushing mills. Pop., 300.

GOLDFIELD, a post office in Stormont co., Ont., $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Finch, 29 miles east of Kemptville Jct., on the C.P.R.

GOLD FIELDS, a village in Colchester co., N.S., 9 miles from Stewiacke, on the I.C.R., 4 miles from Shubenacadie.

GOLD HILL, a mining settlement in Kootenay dist., B.C., on the Lardo River, and a station on the Lardo & Kaslo steamer line of the C.P.R., with port at Lardo, at the head of Kootenay Lake. Gold and copper ore have been found in the region. It has 1 Roman Catholic church, 1 store and 1 hotel. Pop., under 100.

GOLD MINES (MOUNT UNIACKE), a small village in Hants co., N.S., 4 miles from Mount Uniacke, on the Dom. Atlantic RR. It contains 1 Presbyterian church, 3 stores, 1 hotel, 1 saw and 3 gold mills. Pop., 150.

GOLD RIVER, a post settlement in a mining dist., in Lunenburg co., N.S., on Gold River, $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile from Western Shore, on the Halifax & South-Western RR., with port on Vaughan Lake and River. It has 2 churches (Episcopal and Baptist), 1 store and 6 ore-crushing, grist and lumber mills, telegraph and express offices. Pop., about 2,000.

GOLD RIVER LAKE, a pretty sheet of water in Lunenburg co., N.S., is of a circular form, and gives rise to a branch of the Gold River.

GOLD ROCK, a mining settlement in Thunder Bay dist., North-West Ont., between Lake Superior and Manitoba, on Lake Manitow, 25 miles from the C.P.R. Station of Wabigoon, 53 miles west of Ignace. It has 1 general store and 1 hotel. Pop. 40.

GOLD RUN, a post office in Yukon Terr., via Skagway, Alaska, north of B.C.

GOLDSMITH, a post and farming settlement in Essex co., Ont., 15 miles from Essex Centre, 3 miles from Blytheswood, on the Michigan Central Ry., and 7 miles from Leamington. It contains 2 churches, school and tri-weekly mail.

GOLDSTONE, a post settlement $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles from station on the G.T.R., in Wellington co., Ont. It contains 1 Methodist church, 1 store, 1 school, carriage and blacksmith shop. Pop., 25.

GOLDSTONE STATION, a post office in Wellington co., Ont., on the G.T.R. (Hamilton & Southampton div.) 12 miles from Fergus.

GOLDSTREAM, a summer resort in Nanaimo dist., B.C., on the Esquimalt & Nanaimo Ry. It contains 1 hotel and 1 saw mill, and an electric transmission plant supplying Victoria with electric light and power to run street cars and small factories.

GOLDWIN, a post village in Pontiac co., Que., on the Ottawa River, 1 mile from Vin-ton, a station on the Waltham branch of the C.P.R., 18 miles south-east of Waltham. It has 1 Roman Catholic church and 1 general store. Pop., 60.

GOLF GROUNDS, a station on the G.T.R., in York co., Ont., 4 miles east of Toronto.

GOLF LINKS, a station on the G.T.R., in Chambly co., Que., $1\frac{1}{4}$ miles from St. Lambert.

GOLSPIE, a country post office in Oxford co., Ont., $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Embro, on the C.P.R.

GONDOLA POINT, a post village in Kings co., N.B., on the Kennebecasis River, $2\frac{1}{4}$ miles from Quispamsis, on the I.C.R. It contains 2 churches (Anglican and Baptist), 1 store and large wharf, at which steamers call. Pop., 150.

GONOR, a settlement in the parish of St. Andrew's in Selkirk co., Man., on the east side of the Red River, on the C.P.R., 15 miles east of Winnipeg. It contains 2 churches (Roman Catholic and Greek), and 2 stores. Pop., 500.

GOOBLES, a flag station on the Reid-Newfoundland Ry., 31 miles from Clarenville, in Trinity dist., Nfld.

GOOD CORNER, a post settlement in Carleton co., N.B., on the St. John River, 10 miles from Florenceville, on the C.P.R. It has 1 Baptist church. Pop., 128.

GOODERHAM, a village in Hallburton co., Ont., on Pine Lake, 14 miles from Hallburton, and on the Irondale, Bancroft & Ottawa Ry. It contains 1 Methodist church, 3 stores and 2 hotels, 1 saw mill, 1 grist mill and 1 creamery. Pop., 95.

GOOD HOPE, a fort close to the Arctic Circle, in Mackenzie dist., N.W.T., on Mackenzie River. Lat. $67^{\circ} 30' N.$, lon. $130^{\circ} 40' W.$ Old Fort Good Hope is on the same river, 105 miles north-west.

GOODLANDS, a post settlement in Souris co., Man., a branch of the Deloraine, Waskada & Lyleton station of the C.P.R., 9 miles south-west of Deloraine. It has 2 churches (Methodist and Presbyterian), 1 hardware and 2 general dry goods stores, 1 temperance hotel, 4 grain elevators and 1 newspaper office ("Goodlands' Star"), published in Waskada. Pop., 50.

GOODSIR MOUNT, B.C., (11,670 feet in height).

GOODWIN MILL, a small post settlement in Gloucester co., N.B., on Bass River, 6 miles from Carquet, a station on the Carquet RR., with port at Bathurst, on an inlet of Chaleurs Bay, and on the I.C.R.

GOODWOOD, a post village in Ontario co., Ont., on the Midland div. of the G.T.R., 7 miles from Uxbridge and 35 miles from Toronto. It contains 3 churches, 2 hotels, 1 chopping mill, 3 stores and express and telegraph offices. Pop., 250.

GOODWOOD RIVER, a stream of that name in Carleton co., Ont.

GOOSE ARM, a settlement in the dist. of St. George, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 17.

GOOSEBERRY, a small fishing settlement in the dist. of Placentia and St. Mary's, Nfld., 17 miles from Placentia. Pop. (1901), 22.

GOOSEBERRY COVE, a post office in St. John co., N.B., on the Bay of Fundy shore, 3 miles from South Musquash, a station on the N.B. Southern RR.

GOOSEBERRY COVE, a post village in Trinity Bay, Nfld., 12 miles from Northern Bight, on the Reid-Nfld. Ry. It contains 2 churches (Anglican and Roman Catholic), 1 store, 1 cooperage, 2 cod liver oil refineries, and 2 lobster canneries. Pop. (1901), 111.

GOOSEBERRY ISLAND, an island on the east coast of Bonavista Bay, Nfld., 12 miles

from Northern Bight. They are inhabited by Eskimoes. Pop. (1901), 389.

GOOSE COVE, a fishing station and harbor in the dist. of St. Barbe, on the French shore, Nfld., 13 miles from Croquet (Croc Harbor), 96 miles from Tit Cove. Pop. (1901), 102.

GOOSE CREEK, a post and lumber settlement in St. John co., N.B., on the north shore of the Bay of Fundy, near the entrance to Chignecto Bay. The nearest station is Sussex (about 30 miles north), on the I.C.R., 43 miles north-east of St. John. Pop., 12.

GOOSE HARBOR RIVER, a small stream falling into Chedabucto Bay, on the south east (Coccheux) coast of Nova Scotia.

GOOSE ISLAND, in the St. Lawrence, 13 miles north east of the Island of Orleans, below Quebec city.

GOOSE LAKE, a small lake in Selkirk co., Man., drained by the Pigeon River into the east side of Lake Winnipeg.

GOOSE RIVER, Cumberland co., N.S. See Linden.

GOOSE RIVER, a post office in Kings co., P.E.I., 5 miles from head of St. Peter's Bay (St. Peter's station), on P. E. Island RR.

GOOSE RIVER GOLD MINES, a village in Halifax co., N.S., 20 miles from Lower Stewiacke, on the I.C.R. It contains 2 stores, 2 hotels, and 3 quartz crushers. Pop., about 100.

GORDON, a post settlement in Essex co., Ont., on the Detroit River, and on the Michigan Central Ry. Pop., 200.

GORDON, a station in Selkirk co., Man., on the Oak Point section of the Canadian Northern RR., 17 miles north west of Winnipeg.

GORDON, a post office in Assa. dist., Prov. of Sask., 5 miles from C.P.R. station of Wapella.

GORDON BAY, a post office in Parry Sound dist., Ont., and a station on the Can. Northern Ontario RR. (Mackenzie-Mann System), 18 miles from Parry Sound.

GORDON HEAD, a post office in Nanaimo dist., Vancouver Island, B.C., via Victoria.

GORDON LAKE, a post settlement in Algoma, Ont., 6 miles from Desbarats, on the C.P.R. It contains Presbyterian and Methodist churches, 2 stores and a blacksmith shop. There are three other lakes in this vicinity, viz.: Diamond, Cloudy and Bass Lakes, where excellent fishing is obtainable. The scenery around is beautiful, and the place is much patronized by American tourists. Pop., 50.

GORDON MILLS, in Hastings co., Ont. See Glen Miller.

GORDON MOUNT, B.C. (10,400 feet in height) near Field Station, on the C.P.R., between Golden and Stephen, 510 miles east of Vancouver.

GORDON SUMMIT, a station in Colchester co., N.S., on the I.C.R., 24 miles north-east of Truro.

GORDONSVILLE, a post settlement in Carleton co., N.B., on the St. John River, 4 miles from Bristol, on the C.P.R. It contains 1 Free Baptist church, 1 saw mill, telephone office and daily mail. Pop., 120.

GORDONVILLE, a post hamlet in Wellington

co., Ont., on Four Mile Creek, 5 miles from Arthur, on the C.P.R., 14 miles from Mount Forest. It contains 1 Presbyterian church, 1 store, 1 hotel, chopping, lumber and shingle mills and 1 cheese factory. Pop., under 100.

GORE, a township in Argenteuil co., Que., 10 miles from Lachute, on the C.P.R. The township contains 1 Methodist and 2 Episcopal churches, 1 store, 1 grist and 2 saw mills, and 2 cheese factories. Its principal lake is Long Lake.

GORE, a post village in Hants co., N.S., 3 miles from Clarksville, on the Midland div. Dom. Atlantic Ry. It has quarries of granite and slate. Gold has been found in small quantities. It is the seat of the court house of East Hants. Pop., about 100.

GORE, a post settlement in Richmond co., Que., on the G.T.R. It contains a saw mill and cheese factory.

GORE, a settlement in Argenteuil co., Que., 10 miles from Lachute, on the C.P.R., and on Can. Northern Ontario Ry. See Lakefield.

GORE BAY, a post village in Manitoulin dist., Algoma, Ont., 22 miles from Spanish Station, on the "Soo" branch of the C.P.R. It contains 3 churches (Methodist, Presbyterian and Anglican), 15 stores, 3 hotels, 1 grist and 2 saw mills, 1 sash and door factory, 1 private bank and agency of the Merchants' Bank of Canada, 3 printing offices issuing 3 newspapers. Pop., 800.

GORE'S LANDING, a post village in Northumberland co., Ont., on Rice Lake, 12 miles from Cobourg, on the G.T.R. It contains 2 churches and 2 stores. Pop., about 125.

GORING, a post hamlet in Grey co., Ont. south of Meaford, the village port on the Georgian Bay. It is 10 miles north of Markdale Station, on the C.P.R., 29 miles south of Owen Sound. It contains 1 general store and 1 grist mill, an Orange hall, and 1 blacksmith shop, with a public school and Methodist church 2 1/4 miles distant, and a Presbyterian church miles distant. Pop., under 50.

GORLITZ, a post office in Assa. East dist., Prov. of Saskatchewan, near Yorkton, on a branch of the C.P.R., 17 miles from Saltcoats.

GORMAN, a post office in Renfrew co., Ont., 7 miles from Douglas, on the G.T.R. and C.P.R.

GORMLEY, a post village in York co., Ont., and a station on the Can. Northern Ontario Ry. 6 1-3 miles north of Stoffville, on the G.T.R., 6 miles north of Markham, and 29 miles north-east of Toronto. It contains 2 churches, 1 store, 1 saw mill and 1 grist mill. Pop., 100.

GORRIE, a post village in Huron co., Ont., and a station on the C.P.R. It contains 3 churches (Anglican, Presbyterian and Methodist), 12 stores, 2 hotels, 1 grist mill, 1 saw mill, 1 bank, newspaper, telegraph and express and Bell telephone offices and 1 mechanics' institute. Pop., 650.

GOSCHEN, a post office in the Prov. of Saskatchewan (formerly Assin. E.), 15 miles from Carnduff, a station on the Souris & Estevan branch of the C.P.R.

GOSELIN, RUISSEAU, rises in Lotbinière co., Que., after a short course joins the Rivière Noire, which falls into the Beauvillage.

GOSFORD, a post office in Portneuf co., Que., 3 miles from St. Raymond, on the Que. & Lake St. John and Gt. Northern RR's.

GOSHEN, a post settlement in Albert co., N.B., on the Kennebecasis River, 10 miles from Annagance, and on the I.C.R. It contains 1 Baptist church and a store. Pop., 100.

GOSHEN, a settlement in Huron co., Ont., 7 miles from Brucefield, on the G.T.R. (London & Wingham branch), 6 miles from Clinton Jct.

GOSHEN, a post village in Guysboro' co., N.S., 18 miles from Antigonish, on the I.C.R. It contains 1 Baptist church, 1 store, 5 saw and 4 shingle mills and 1 carriage factory. Pop., about 300.

GOSHEN, a settlement in Queens co., N.B., 5 miles from Cody's, on the New Brunswick Coal & Railway Co.'s line. It contains 1 Anglican church and 1 saw mill. Pop., under 200.

GOSHEN, a river of Albert co., N.B.

GOSHEN, a station in Renfrew co., Ont., on the Parry Sound & Ottawa div. of the G.T.R., 11 miles west of Arnprior, and 5 miles east of Renfrew.

GOSHEN ROAD, a post office in Richmond co., Que., 6½ miles from Windsor Mills, on the G.T.R., 11 miles from Richmond.

GOSHEN'S ARM, a settlement in the dist. of Twillingate, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 53.

GOSPORT, a post village in Lennox co., Ont., on Hay Bay, 12 miles from Napanee, on the G.T.R. and Bay of Quinté RR. Pop., 70.

GOSSELIN'S MILLS, a post office in Compton co., Que., 10 miles from Coaticook, on the G. T.R.

GOT'S COVE, a settlement in the dist. of Trinity, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 13.

GOUFFRE, RIVIERE DU, a river of Quebec, rises in Charlevoix co., and falls into the estuary of the St. Lawrence at St. Paul's Bay, opposite Isle aux Coudres. Its course is very circuitous, and it is difficult to ascend, being full of rapids. Bog ore and magnetic oxide of iron are to be found on its banks in quantities. It produces salmon and other fish.

GOUGH LAKE, a small lake in the township of Dartmouth, Halifax co., N.S., with an outlet in Bedford Basin.

GOULAIS, a fine river in the dist. of Algoma, northwestern Ont., navigable for vessels of light draught for 10 or 15 miles from its mouth or entrance into Goulais Bay, south east end of Lake Superior. The lower part of this river flows in a very tortuous course between mountain ranges, through a wide and fertile valley.

GOULAIS BAY, a post settlement in the dist. of Algoma, Ont., 9 miles from Bellevue, on the Algoma Central & Hudson Bay Ry. It contains 2 churches (Presbyterian and Anglican), 1 store and 1 saw mill. Pop., 400.

GOULAIS RIVER, a post settlement in the dist. of Algoma, Ont., 7 miles from Bellevue, on the Algoma Central and Hudson Bay Ry. It has Anglican and Presbyterian churches, 1 store and a saw mill. Pop., 300.

GOULD, a post settlement in Compton co., Que., on the Salmon River, 8 miles from Scotstown, on the C.P.R., 25 miles west of Megantic, and 40 miles east of Lennoxville. It is situate in a good farming and stock-raising region, with fine fishing and hunting in the vicinity. It has 2 churches (Anglican and Presbyterian), 3 saw and grist mills, carriage and sash and door factories, with express and telegraph office at Scotstown. Pop., 900.

GOULD STATION, a post settlement in Compton co., Que., near Scotstown (Megantic and Sherbrooke div.), on the C.P.R. Pop., about 100.

GOULD'S, a station on the Haliburton branch G.T.R. in Peterboro' co., Ont., 53 miles from Lindsay, and 3 miles from Haliburton.

GOULD'S, a purely farming settlement, about 3 miles in length, in the dist. of Ferryland, Nfld., 6 to 9 miles from St. John's. Pop. (1901), 339.

GOULD'S LANDING, or HORTON CORNERS, a small village in Renfrew co., Ont., on the Ottawa River, 9 miles from Renfrew, on the C.P.R. and G.T.R. It is a telegraph station and the port at which the Ottawa steamers disembark their passengers for the portage of 12 miles to Cobden, where they resume water communication. Pop., under 50.

GOULD'S POINT, a settlement in the dist. of St. Barbe, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 20.

GOULD'S ROAD, UPPER, a settlement in the district of Port-de-Grave, Nfld., 3 miles from Brigus. Pop. (1901), 139.

GOUMMITZ RIVER, rises in the south angle of Bonaventure co., Que., and runs into the Restigouche, between the Rivers Gaduamgou-shout and Pescudy.

GOUPIL, a post office in Drummond and Arthabasca co., Que., 4½ miles from Daveluyville on the I.C.R.

GOUROCK, a post office in Wellington co., and a station on the G.T.R., 3 miles from Guelph Jct.

GOVAN, a post village in Humboldt dist., Prov. of Saskatchewan, and a station on the Pheasant Hills branch of the C.P.R. It has 1 Methodist church, 1 hotel, 8 stores, 1 bank (Northern Bank branch), with telegraph and express offices at station.

GOVERNMENT ROAD, a station on the C.P.R. in Renfrew co., Ont., 5 miles east of Pembroke.

GOVERNOR'S ISLAND, in Hillsboro' Bay P. E.I., lies to the south-west of Alexandra, and is about 4 miles from shore. It contains about 100 acres, and is chiefly noted for its lobster factories, which belong to P.E.I. When the new bridge which will span the Hillsboro' is complete, a branch of Murray Harbor Ry. will traverse it.

GOWAN, a station on the Toronto & North Bay div. of the G.T.R., in Simcoe co., Ont., 5 miles from Barrie. Shanty Bay (¼ of a mile distant), is the post office.

GOWAN BRAE, a post settlement in the parish of Rollo Bay, Kings co. P.E.I., 3 miles from Souris, the nearest banking, telegraphing and railway point. It has 1 flour and 2 saw mills, 1 cheese barrel factory. The Roman Catholic church is 2 miles distant. Pop. 124.

GOWANSTOWN, a village in Perth co., Ont., on the Stratford & Owen Sound div. of the G. T.R., 5 miles from Palmerston. It contains a town hall, 1 store and 1 hotel.

GOWER POINT, a post village in Renfrew co., Ont., on the Ottawa River, 3 miles from Fort Coulonge, on the opposite shore, a station on the Waltham branch of the C.P.R., in Prov. of Quebec. It contains 1 Roman Catholic church, 1 store and 1 hotel. Pop. 50.

GOWLAND LAKE, a post hamlet in the Prov. of Saskatchewan (formerly N.E. Assa., N.W.T.), 5 miles north-east of Rokeby, a station on the

North-Western branch of the C.P.R., 7 miles south-east of Yorkton. It has a small population (chiefly Methodists and Baptists) in the vicinity of the post office.

GOWLAND MOUNTAIN, a post settlement in Albert co., N.B., 3 miles from Elgin, on the Elgin & Havelock R.R. It contains 1 Baptist church. Pop. 200.

GOWRIE, a post hamlet in Perth co., Ont., 6 miles from Mitchell, on the G.T.R. It has 1 church.

GOYNISH RIVER, of Quebec. See Agwanish.
GRABURN, a post settlement in the Prov. of Alberta (formerly Assa. W., N.W.T.), 15 miles south of Walsh, a station on the main line of the C.P.R., 27 miles east of Dunmore Jct. (formerly Medicine Hat). Besides the post office, it has express and telegraph facilities at Walsh. Pop., about 100.

GRACEFIELD, an incorporated village in Wright co., Que., on the Gatineau River, a station on the Ottawa & Maniwaki div. of the C.P.R. It contains 1 church (Roman Catholic), 6 stores, 2 hotels and express office. It is a good lumber centre and has mica and phosphate mines. Pop., 500.

GRACE LAKE, a lake in Haliburton co., Ont.

GRACETON, a settlement in Provencher co., Man., and a station on the main line of the Can. Northern Ry., 13 miles west of Rainy River, 140 miles east of Winnipeg.

GRADY, a port of call on the Reid-Newfoundland steamers (Labrador line), 576 miles from St. John's.

GRAFTON, a post village in Carleton co., N.B., on the east bank of the St. John River, 1 mile from Woodstock, on the C.P.R. It contains 1 saw mill, and grocery store. Pop., about 200.

GRAFTON, a post village in Kings co., N.S., 2½ miles from Waterville, on the Dom. Atlantic R.R. It contains 3 churches (Baptist, Methodist and Reformed Presbyterian), 1 store and 1 saw mill. Pop., 150.

GRAFTON, a post village in Northumberland co., Ont., 1 mile from Grafton Station, on the G.T.R. It contains 4 churches (Anglican, Roman Catholic, Presbyterian and Methodist), 3 stores, 1 hotel, 1 flour mill, 1 woollen mill, 1 saw mill, and cheese factory (3 miles distant), evaporator, barrel factory, 1 branch bank, 2 schools and telegraph and express offices. Pop., 400.

GRAHAM, a post office in Leeds co., Ont., close to Graham Lake, 4½ miles from Seeley's (or Lyndhurst) station on the Brockville, Westport and North-Western R.R., a few miles north-west of Brockville, on the G.T.R.

GRAHAM, one of a small group of lakes in Leeds co., Ont.

GRAHAM, a post office in Vaudreuil co., Que., and a station (Lavigne) on the C.P.R., 37 miles north west of Montreal.

GRAHAM BAY, a station in Carleton co., Ontario, on the Ottawa & Parry Sound div. of the G.T.R., 9 miles west of Ottawa city.

GRAHAM ISLAND, the largest and most northern of the Queen Charlotte Islands group, in the Pacific Ocean, opposite Port Simpson, B.C., between the Naas and the Skeena Rivers, on the mainland, and about 130 miles north of Vancouver Island. Hecate Strait separates the islands from the Brit. Columbia coast. The

climate on the islands is very humid, while the land is for the most part a rolling plain, plentifully wooded. Fishing is the chief local industry, engaged in by a few white settlers and by remnants of the Haida tribe of Indians. Moresby is the other chief island of the group, the area of all being 5,100 square miles.

GRAHAMS, a station on the C.P.R., in Renfrew co., Ont., 10 miles east of Pembroke, 25 miles west of Renfrew.

GRAHAM'S ROAD, a post settlement in the north-east section of Queens co., P.E.I., 5 miles north of Emerald Jct., on the P.E. Island R.R. It contains 1 graded school, flour, oatmeal and saw mills. Its industries include, besides mixed farming and dairying, horse, cattle and hog raising. Pop., 208.

GRAHAMSVILLE, a post hamlet in Peel co., Ont., 1½ miles from Malton on the G.T.R. It contains 1 Methodist church and 1 store. Pop., 35.

GRAINFIELD, a post office in Northumberland co., N.B., near Indiantown, on the Indiantown branch of the I.C.R.

GRANBORO, a post village and farming community in Shefford co., Que., 5 miles from Granby on the C.V.R. It contains a cheese factory and a creamery. Pop., 200.

GRANBY, an incorporated village in Shefford co., Que., on the Central Vermont Ry., 14 miles from Waterloo. It has good water-power privileges, and contains 1 rubber manufactory, 2 saw mills, 1 grist mill, 1 tannery, 1 telegraph office, 4 churches, 2 hotels, 20 stores, 2 banks, 1 large rattan goods factory, 2 chair factories, 1 furniture and casket factory, 2 cigar and 1 tobacco factories, 1 carriage factory, 1 foundry, 2 machine shops, 2 blind, door and sash factories, 1 college, 1 convent, 1 academy, and 1 printing and newspaper office. Pop., about 4,000.

GRANBY, a station on the C.P.R., in Yale dist., B.C., 2 miles from Grand Forks and 12 miles east of Eholt Jct.

GRAND, a small river, takes its rise in Victoria co., N.B., and flows in a north-westerly course into the St. John River, above St. Leonard's, on the C.P.R.

GRAND ANSE, a post settlement in Richmond co., N.S., in Lennox Passage, and a station on the Cape Breton Ry. Pop. 250.

GRAND BANK, a thriving post town and port of entry in the dist. of Burin, Nfld., on the south side of Fortune Bay, 4 miles from Fortune, and 120 miles from Placentia. It is chiefly engaged in the bank fisheries, and has considerable trade with the United States, Canada and England. It contains a Methodist church, 8 stores, 3 hotels, telegraph and express offices. Pop. (1901), 1,427.

GRAND BAY, a post village in Kings co., N.B., on the St. John River, and a station on the C.P.R., 10 miles north-west of St. John. It has 2 churches (Presbyterian and Baptist), 1 general store, 1 hotel, 1 foundry and drilling machine forge, besides express and telegraph office. Pop., about 135.

GRAND BAY, a settlement in the dist. of Burgeo and La Poile, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 86.

GRAND BAY, of Quebec. See Ha! Ha! Bay.

GRAND BEACH, a settlement in the dist. of Burin, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 77.

GRAND BEND, a post settlement on Lake

Huron, in Huron co., Ont., 13 miles from Park Hill, on the St. Mary's & Sarnia div. of the G.T.R., the nearest railway point. Pop., about 200.

GRAND BERGERONNES, a lake in Saguenay co., Que.

GRAND BRUIT, a settlement in the dist. of Burgeo and La Poile, 37 miles from Port aux Basques. It contains Anglican and Methodist churches, 2 stores, 2 lobster canneries and 1 express office. A mail steamer calls here going west and east from Placentia and Port aux Basques. Deposits of gold, lead, zinc and silver are found in the vicinity; there is also a large belt of slate 2 miles distant. Pop., (1901), 166.

GRAND CALUMET, an island in the River Ottawa, 7 miles above Portage du Fort, in Pontiac co., Que. Area, 31,436 acres. At the foot of the island les Cadieux's tomb, surrounded to this day by a wooden railing. Cadieux was a roving interpreter, who had married a young Algonquin girl, and purchased at this portage furs for the traders. After a winter thus passed, he ascertained that a party of Iroquois were waiting to pounce upon the canoes. To prevent this, he and a young brave endeavored to inveigle the Iroquois into the woods, while the canoes descended the rapids, and by a circuitous route himself rejoin the voyageurs. He succeeded in the first part of his design; but, when thirteen days had elapsed and Cadieux was not heard from a party was sent to scour the woods, who found a small hut of boughs, and the corpse of the interpreter half-covered with green branches. His hands were clasped over a large sheet of birch bark, on which was scribbled his tale of exhaustion, hunger and death. The piece of bark on which his death-song was written (for Cadieux was a poet) was brought to the post of the Lake of Two Mountains, and the voyageurs set it to a plaintive melody, which is much in the style of the old Norman ballads. Pop. of island (1901), 1,339.

GRAND CASAPEDIA, a river flowing through Bonaventure co., Que., noted for its salmon and trout. It is a stream whose fishing is leased. See Casapediac, Grand.

GRAND CASAPEDIA, a post village in Bonaventure co., Que., and a station on the Atlantic, Quebec and Western Ry. It contains 2 stores. Pop., 400.

GRAND CHICOT, a post office in Two Mountains co., Que., on the C.P.R. (Montreal & St. Eustache div.), 3 miles from St. Eustache and 6 miles from Ste. Therese Jct.

GRAND CHIPUTNETICUT LAKE, a lake in York co., N.B., on the Maine border, 12 miles long and 9 miles wide.

GRAND CLAIRIERE, a post village in Brandon co., Man., and a station on the Hartney & Virden sect. of the Canadian Northern RR., 8 miles north west of Hartney and 29 miles south of Virden. It has 1 Roman Catholic church, 4 stores, 1 hotel and telegraph and express offices. Pop., 400.

GRAND COULEE, a post settlement in Assa. West. Prov. of Sask., on the main line of C.P.R., 42 miles west of Qu'Appelle. It contains 2 stores, a boarding house, 4 elevators, and a blacksmith shop. Pop. 50.

GRAND DESERT, a post office in Halifax co., N.S., via Halifax.

GRANDE ANSE, a post office in Richmond co., N.S., near Grandique Ferry.

GRANDE ANSE, a post village in Gloucester co., N.B., on Bale des Chaleurs, 29 miles from Bathurst, and on the Caraquet Ry., 31 miles from Gloucester. It contains 1 telegraph office, 1 Roman Catholic church, 6 lobster canneries, 1 hotel and 6 stores. Sandstone for architectural purposes is found in large quantities here. Pop., about 1,200.

GRANDE BAIE, or HA! HA! BAY, a post village in Chicoutimi co., Que., at the head of the navigation of the Saguenay River, 60 miles from its mouth and 12 miles from Chicoutimi. The Bay here is over a mile wide, and about 100 fathoms deep. It is called Ha! Ha! Bay, a name given to it by its early discoverers and is a great source of attraction to tourists during the summer months. Chicoutimi, on the Que. & Lake St. John RR., is the nearest railway station. The village of Grande Bale contains 1 Roman Catholic church, several stores and mills, and has a large trade in lumber. Vessels load here direct for England. Pop. 300; of parish and vicinity (1901), 1,628.

GRANDE CHUTE, a lake in Portneuf co., Que., in the township of Rocmont.

GRANDE COUDEE, a river of Quebec. See Coudee.

GRANDE ETANG, a village in Gaspé co., Que., 86 miles from Ste. Anne des Monts, on the Gulf of St. Lawrence.

GRANDE FRENIERE, a post village in Two Mountains co., Que., on the Du Chene River, 6 miles from St. Eustache, on the C.P.R. It contains 1 Presbyterian church, 1 store, 1 flour mill and 1 butter factory. Pop., 350.

GRANDE GREVE, a post village in Gaspé co., Que., beautifully situated on the north side of Gaspé Bay, 18 miles from Gaspé Basin. It contains 4 churches (1 Roman Catholic 1 Episcopal and 2 Methodist), 4 stores and 1 telegraph office. It has a large fishery station, and was originally settled about 1770. There is a lead mine in the neighborhood, but not in operation. Pop., about 400.

GRANDE ISLE, an island in the River St. Lawrence, between Lakes St. Louis and St. Francis, $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles long by $1\frac{1}{4}$ miles broad. It divides the stream of the St. Lawrence into two channels; that on the south side is called the Beauharnois Channel, in the course of which are the Rarids Croche, les Fauclles and de Bouleau, the latter both intricate and difficult to pass.

GRANDE LIGNE, or ST. BLAISE, a post village in St. Johns co., Que., on the Richelieu River, and on the Champlain div. of the G.T.R., 33 miles from Montreal and 9 miles from St. Johns. It contains 3 stores, 3 churches, French Prot-stant boarding school and 1 telegraph office. Pop., 600.

GRANDE MERE, a picturesque fall on the River St. Maurice (Que.), about 30 miles above its mouth, divided in two by an island of considerable extent. The fall on the west side of the island is about 40 feet, almost perpendicular; that on the east side is of much greater length but more gradual. The beauty and magnificence of these falls and the surrounding scenery can hardly be surpassed.

GRANDE MERE, Champlain co., Que. See Grand'Mere.

GRANDE MONTAGNE, a post office in Beauce co., Que., 6 miles from St. Joseph de Beauce, on the Que. Central RR.

GRANDE NOUVELLE, a small river of Bonaventure co., Que., empties into Bale des Chaleurs, and abounds with trout.

GRANDE NOUVELLE, a small river of the district of Lockeport, in Shelburne co., N.S., about $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles long by $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles wide. It is supplied by two small lakes called Mud Lakes, and has its outlet by a small river running into Green Harbor on the Atlantic coast. This lake abounds with salmon, pike, trout, alewives, and other fish.

GRAND ENTRY, a post office in Gaspé co., Que., 100 miles from Pictou.

GRANDE POINTE, a post settlement in Provencher co., Man., near the Seine River, and on the C.P.R., 11 miles from Winnipeg. It has a meat canning factory. Pop. 200.

GRANDE PRAIRIE, a post office in Yale dist., B.C., 16 miles from Ducks, a station on the main line of the C.P.R., 18 miles east of Kamloops.

GRANDE RIVIERE, or QUIAUSQUACK RIVER, rises near the head waters of the Restigouche and runs south-west into the River St. John, and about 5 miles above the Great Falls, in Madawaska co., N.B. Its banks are heavily wooded.

GRANDE RIVIERE STE. ANNE DES MONTS, of Gaspé co., Que., has its source in several lakes in the Shickshock Mountains, and empties into the Gulf of St. Lawrence at a village to which it lends its name. Total length 54 miles, 50 of which are navigable for canoes. It abounds with salmon and trout.

GRANDES COUDEES, a post village in Beauce co., Que., 14 miles from St. George de Beauce on the Quebec Central Ry. It contains 1 church, 3 stores, 1 grist and 6 saw mills. Pop. 100.

GRANDES PILES, a post village in Champlain co., Que., on the St. Maurice River, and a station on the C.P.R. It contains 1 Roman Catholic church, 8 stores, 4 hotels, 1 mill, 1 charcoal factory with 16 kilns, telegraph and express offices. It was incorporated in 1879. Pop., 500.

GRANDES VACHES, a settlement in the dist. of St. Barbe Nfld. Pop. (1901), 31.

GRAND ETANG, a post village in Inverness co., N.S., 8 miles from Margaree Harbor, 40 miles from Inverness Station, on the Inverness & Richmond RR. It contains 1 Roman Catholic church, 2 stores, 1 hotel, 1 carding mill, 1 saw mill, 1 lobster cannery and 1 telegraph office. Cod fishing and farming are carried on here. Pop., 2,000.

GRANDE VALLEE, a post settlement on the Gulf of St. Lawrence, in Gaspé co., Que., on the Grand Valley River, 50 miles east of Little Metis, a station on the I.C.R., 28 miles east of Rimouski. It has 1 Roman Catholic church, 5 stores, 2 lumber and shingle mills, besides telegraph office. Lumbering and cod fishing are the chief industries. Pop., about 400.

GRAND FALLS, a post town and port of entry of New Brunswick, capital of Victoria co., pleasantly situated at the head of navigation of St. John River, and on the C.P.R. (Short Line), 202 miles from St. John, 116 miles

from Rivière du Loup. It contains, besides the county buildings, Episcopal, Roman Catholic, Presbyterian and Baptist churches, 2 hotels, 13 stores, 1 telegraph office and telephone exchange, 1 lumber mill, 1 wood working factory, and agency for the Bank of Montreal. In the immediate vicinity the River St. John falls precipitately a height of 180 feet. Over this fall is a handsome suspension bridge. The surrounding scenery is exceedingly beautiful, and hunting excellent, with abundance of moose, deer, caribou, bears, etc. Pop., 1900.

GRAND FALLS, on the river St. John, Victoria co., N.B., 225 miles from the sea. The river here rushes with great force over a rocky bed till it is suddenly narrowed by the projection of a rock; from the western side it rolls with irresistible impetuosity over the ledges, and is precipitated in a perpendicular line 45 feet into a narrow basin of pointed rocks, amidst which it foams and rages, till it escapes through a narrow rocky channel over a series of declivities half a mile in length, enclosed on each side by craggy cliffs overhanging its course, and almost completely interrupting the view. A fine suspension bridge spans the river over the falls.

GRAND FALLS PORTAGE, a post office in Victoria co., N.B., near Ortonville station, on the C.P.R., 7 miles from Grand Falls.

GRANDFATHER'S COVE, a small fishing station in St. Barbe dist., Nfld., 10 miles from Great Harbor Deep, 50 miles from Howley Station, on the Reid-Newfoundland Ry. Pop., 35.

GRAND FONDS, a post office in Charlevoix co., Que., near Murray Bay, on the St. Lawrence.

GRAND FORKS, a post town, the chief customs port of the south section of Yale dist., B.C., close to the international boundary line. It is situate on the Kettle River, and has three railways entering the town—the C.P.R., Great Northern and Kettle Valley lines. Here are located the large Granby Smelter Works and the Boundary Iron Works; it has also 2 saw and planing mills; besides 4 churches (R.C., Epis., Meth. and Pres.), 20 stores, 10 hotels, 2 chartered banks ("The Royal") and the "Eastern Townships"), the B. A. Trust Co., and the Dom. P. O. Savings Bank; together with 2 printing and newspaper offices ("Evening Sun" and "Gazette"), express, telegraph and telephone offices. Pop., 1,500.

GRAND FORKS JCT., a station on the Great Northern Ry., 3 miles from Grand Forks.

GRAND HARBOR, an arm of the Bay of Fundy, in Grand Manan Island, from which Grand Harbor Village, at its head, takes its name. It is a most commodious harbor. It lies off Charlotte co., N.B.

GRAND HARBOUR, a post village in Charlotte co., N.B., 51 miles from St. Andrews. It forms one of 5 villages on the Island of Grand Manan, in the Bay of Fundy. It contains Baptist and Episcopal churches, 5 stores, 1 private hotel, and 2 fish factories. Pop., about 400 (of village); 3,000 (of Island.)

GRANDIGUE, a post settlement in Kent co., N.B., 6 miles from Shediac Station, on the I.C.R. and Moncton & Buctouche RRs. It contains a Roman Catholic church, 3 stores, 2 hotels and 3 lobster factories. Pop., 420 (of parish, 1,600).

GRANDIGUE FERRY, a post settlement in Richmond co., N.S., on the north side of Loxnox Passage, 3½ miles from Grand Anse Station on the Cape Breton Ry. and a port of call of the steamers of the Bras d'Or Navigation Co. Pop., about 200.

GRANDIN, a settlement in the Prov. of Saskatchewan. Nearest railway station, Duck Lake, 6 miles distant, on the C.P.R. (Prince Albert branch). Pop. 225.

GRAND JERVEY, a settlement in the dist. of Fortune Bay, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 16.

GRAND JOGGINS, a small river in Digby co., N.S., falls into Digby Basin. It is navigable for vessels of from 100 to 120 tons burthen for 3 miles.

GRAND JOHN, a settlement in the dist. of Fortune Bay, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 58.

GRAND LAC, a lake in Joliette co., Que.

GRAND LAC, a lake in Labelle co., Que., in the township of Portland.

GRAND LAC ABENAQUIS, a lake in Dorchester co., Que.

GRAND LAC A LA CHUTE, a lake in Montmorency co., Que.

GRAND LAC A L'ÉPAULE, a lake in Montmorency co., Que.

GRAND LAC CASTOR, a lake in Labelle co., Que., in the township of Joly.

GRAND LAC DES BAIES, a lake in Chicoutimi co., Que.

GRAND LAC DES CINQ, a lake in Champlain co., Que.

GRAND LAC DES ILES, a lake in Maskinonge co., Que.

GRAND LAC SOURIS, a lake in St. Maurice co., Que., in the township of Shawenagen.

GRAND LAKE, a station on the Reid-Nfld. RR. (Bishop's Falls section), near a lake of the name, 6 miles west of Howley, and 10 miles east of Deer Lake, Nfld.

GRAND LAKE, a beautiful sheet of water in Queens co., N.B. Length, 25 miles; breadth, 6 miles. It has its outlet in the River St. John, through the Jenseg (a small but deep stream) opposite Gagetown. Several kinds of fish, especially trout, gaspereaux and salmon, abound in the lake and the streams flowing into it. Several rivers empty themselves into Grand Lake, the largest of which is the Salmon River, navigable from its mouth, but only 10 miles of its waters for steamers and vessels of 100 tons; for canoes 75 miles. The Gaspereaux River, a branch of the Salmon River, is navigable for canoes 50 miles. There are also several other rivers, branches of the Salmon River, ranging in length from 10 to 30 miles. Newcastle River is navigable for canoes 40 miles, and empties into Grand Lake, the scenery around which is very beautiful. On its banks and the banks of the Salmon and Newcastle Rivers are extensive veins of coal. Maquapit and French Lakes are connected with Grand Lake by a deep, narrow channel, through which small vessels can pass.

GRAND LAKE, a body of water in Queens co., N.B. Area, 47,232 acres.

GRAND LAKE, a settlement in the dist. of St. George, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 16.

GRAND LAKE, a lake in Rimouski co., Que.

GRAND LAKE, Montmorency co., Que. See Lake St. Joachim.

GRAND LAKE, a beautiful lake of Nova Scotia, 23 miles north of Halifax. It contains

several small islands, and forms the chief volume of the waters of the Shubenacadie River. Length about 8 miles; breadth 1 to 2 miles.

GRAND LAKE, a post office in Cape Breton co., N.S., and a station on the Sydney and Louisburg RR., 4 miles from Sydney.

GRAND LAKE, a small lake off Allan's River, in Annapolis co., N.S., north west of Fishers' Lake.

GRAND (or GREAT) LAKE HA! HA! a lake in Chicoutimi co., Que., in the township of Boileau, south of Grande Bale. It affords excellent fishing.

GRAND LAKE JACQUES CARTIER, a lake in Montmorency co., Que., noted for its fine fishing.

GRAND LAKE STATION, a post settlement in Halifax co., N.S., on the I.C.R., 23 miles north-east of Halifax city.

GRAND LAKE VICTORIA, a large lake of Quebec, Ottawa co., 200 miles east of Lake Temiskaming, on the borders of Quebec province and Nipissing dist., Ont., about lat. 47° 40' N. 77° 30' W.

GRAND LA PIERRE, a settlement in the dist. of Fortune Bay, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 19.

GRAND LIGNE, a station on the Quebec and Lake St. John Ry., in Chicoutimi co., Que., 5 miles from Chicoutimi.

GRAND MALBAIE, a lake in Charlevoix co., Que.

GRAND MANAN, a post village in Charlotte co., N.B., on the island of that name, 50 miles from St. Andrews, on the C.P.R. (St. Andrews, St. Stephen & Vanceboro branch). It contains 2 churches (Anglican and Baptist), 5 stores, 1 box mill, 1 branch bank and 1 telegraph office.

GRAND MANAN, an island in the Bay of Fundy, in Charlotte co., N.B. Length, 20 miles; average breadth, about 5 miles; coast deeply indented, affording numerous fine harbors. It abounds with valuable timber, has excellent facilities for ship building, and has various fishing stations around the coast. There are 3 lighthouses on the island. Distance from St. John 50 miles. The island is most picturesque and romantic, and is a favorite resort of summer tourists and invalids from the United States and Provinces. A submarine cable connects the island and the main land. A mail steamer runs three times a week in summer to and from the island and St. Andrew. There are 5 villages on Grand Manan, viz.: North Head, the steamboat landing; Centerville, Grand Harbor, Woodward's Cove and Seal Cove. There are 12 churches on the island, 2 saw mills, 3 kippered herring and lobster factories, and about 13 stores, 2 hotels, and telegraph and express offices. Pop., 3,000.

GRAND MATANE, a lake in Rimouski co., Que.

GRAND'MERE, a post village in Champlain co., Que., on the St. Maurice River, and on the G.N.R. (Grand'Mere Junction), also 3 miles from Lac à la Tortue, on the C.P.R. It has 3 churches (Roman Catholic, Anglican and Presbyterian), 20 stores, a branch bank, 11 hotels, a paper mill, 1 lumber factory, 1 foundry, 1 aerated water factory, with express, telegraph and telephone offices. Pop., about 3,000.

GRAND'MERE VILLAGE, a post office in Champlain co., Que., close to Grand'Mere, a station on the Great Northern RR.

GRAND METIS, a post village in Rimouski co., Que., on the St. Lawrence, 3 miles from St. Octave, on the I.C.R., 24 miles east of Rimouski. It has 1 R.C. church, 2 stores, 1 lumber mill, 1 cheese factory, besides telegraph office and express and telephone office at St. Octave. Pop., about 400.

GRAND MIRA, a post settlement in Cape Breton co., N.S., on Mira River, 21 miles from Sydney, on the I.C.R. It contains 1 Roman Catholic church, 6 stores, saw, shingle, planing and 3 saw mills. Pop. (1901), 686.

GRAND MIRA SOUTH, a post village in Cape Breton co., N.S., on Mira River, 18 miles from Sydney, on the Sydney & Louisburg RR. It contains 1 Roman Catholic church, 3 stores, and 3 saw mills. Pop. (1901), 686.

GRAND MIRA, UPPER, one of a group of settlements on the Mira River, in Cape Breton co., N.S., 30 miles from the nearest railway station (Sydney), on the I.C.R. The settlements, which include Grand Mira, Upper and Lower Grand Mira, South and North Salmon River and Victoria Bridge, are connected by steamboat service on the Mira River. In the district there are 1 Roman Catholic church, several schools and 2 general stores. Entire pop., 800.

GRAND NARROWS, a post settlement in Cape Breton co., N.S., on the shores of Bras d'Or Lake, and a station on the I.C.R. It contains 1 hotel. A boat plies to Baddeck, connecting with mails twice per day. The climate is exceptionally good; salmon and trout fishing can be obtained in the lake.

GRAND NARROWS REAR, a settlement in Victoria co., N.S., 5 miles from Iona, a station on the I.C.R.

GRAND NEIGETTE, a lake in Rimouski co., Que.

GRAND PABOS, a post office in Gaspé co., Que., on the Gulf of St. Lawrence, northeast of Paspébiac, on the Atlantic & Lake Superior RR.

GRAND PABOS WEST, a settlement in Gaspé co., Que., 36 miles from Paspébiac, on the Atlantic, Quebec and Western Ry.

GRAND POND, a beautiful lake of Newfoundland, about 60 miles long by 5 miles wide. Its banks are covered with timber. It abounds with fine fish, and discharges its waters into the Atlantic through Humber Sound.

GRAND PRÉ, an historic, agricultural and post village in Kings co., N.S., beautifully situated on the Dominion Atlantic Ry. (Windsor and Annapolis branch), 15 miles from Windsor and 60 miles from Halifax. It is separated from the Minas Basin by the Grand Pré Dyke, and Long Island, a small stretch of land which protects the dyke from the tides of the Basin. This is the scene of Longfellow's "Evangeline."

In the Acadian land, on the shores of the Basin of Minas,

Distant, secluded, still, the little village of Grand Pré

Lay in the fruitful valley. Vast meadows stretched to the eastward,

Giving the village its name, and pasture to flocks without number.

And again:

Still stands the forest primeval; but under the shade of its branches

Dwells another race, with other customs and language.

Only along the shore of the mournful and misty Atlantic

Linger a few Acadian peasants, whose fathers from exile

Wandered back to their native land, to die in its bosom.

In the fisherman's cot, the wheel and the loom are still busy;

Maidens still wear their Norman caps, and their kirtles of homespun,

And by the evening fire repeat Evangeline's story;

While from its rocky caverns, the deep-voiced, neighboring Ocean

Speaks, and in accents disconsolate answers the wail of the forest.

On this very spot, in 1755, several hundred Acadians were gathered together in order that they might be transported to other lands. There are many interesting relics of the French Acadians at Grand Pré. The foundations of their church can still be distinctly traced. The scenery around Grand Pré is very grand, particularly that off Cape Blomidon on the shores of the Bay of Fundy. The village contains 2 churches, 2 stores, and about 300 inhabitants, mostly farmers.

GRAND PRÉ, a post village in Maskinongé co., Que., on the River du Loup, 2 miles from Louiseville station on the C.P.R., 21 miles west of Three Rivers. It has 1 butter and cheese factory. Pop., 350.

GRAND RANG, a post village in Dorchester co., Que., on the Etchemin River, 21 miles from St. Joseph Station (Beauce co.), on the Quebec Central RR., and on the Chaudière River. It has 1 Roman Catholic church, 3 stores and 2 saw mills. Pop., under 100.

GRAND RAPIDS, a post and fishing settlement in Saskatchewan Province, 150 miles from Winnipegosis. It contains 1 Anglican and 1 Roman Catholic church, 3 stores and 1 boarding house. Pop., 150.

GRAND RIVER, a river of P.E.I., noted for oysters and codfish.

GRAND RIVER, a post town in Gaspé co., Que., 50 miles from New Carlisle, on the Atlantic & Lake Superior RR. Its port is Grand River. It contains 1 Roman Catholic church, 18 stores, 3 hotels, 2 saw mills, 3 lobster canneries and 2 telegraph offices. Pop., 3,000.

GRAND RIVER, a station on the C.P.R., in Madawaska co., N.B., 23 miles from Edmundston.

GRAND RIVER, a settlement in Kings co., P.E.I., 13 miles from Souris Station, on the Prince Edward Island Ry., 60 miles north east of Charlottetown. It contains 3 churches (Roman Catholic, Baptist and Presbyterian), 6 stores, 1 hotel, 1 grist mill and 1 lobster cannery. Pop., about 200.

GRAND RIVER, a river of Ontario, flowing through Haldimand county. Different kinds of fresh water fish, such as pike, sturgeon and pickerel are found in it.

GRAND RIVER, a river of Gaspé co., Que., which falls into the Gulf of St. Lawrence, east of Bale des Chaleurs, 16 miles from Percé; it affords excellent angling for salmon.

GRAND RIVER, a river of Richmond co., (Cape Breton), N.S., falls from Loch Lomond and enters the Atlantic Ocean a few miles east of St. Peter's Bay. It is well stocked with salmon and other fish.

GRAND RIVER, a post settlement in Richmond co., N.S., 17 miles from St. Peters on the Cape Breton Ry. It contains 1 Presbyterian church, 4 stores, 1 saw and shingle mill, with post and telegraph offices. Pop., 200.

GRAND (or OUSE) RIVER, of Ontario, rises in Grey co., on the borders of Melancthon and Proton townships, and flows through the counties of Wellington, Waterloo, Brant and Haldimand to Lake Erie, about 130 miles, the last 70 of which are navigable for schooners and small boats. At its mouth it is upwards of 900 yards wide, and forms one of the best harbors on the north shore of Lake Erie. Its banks abound with gypsum. A number of flourishing towns and villages are situated on its banks. Grand River is connected with Lake Ontario by the Welland Canal, which commences near its mouth.

GRAND RIVER FALLS, a post settlement in Richmond co., N.S., on Grand River, 18 miles from St. Peter's. It contains a Presbyterian church, 2 stores and a lumber mill. A considerable amount of money has been expended in the building of a fish ladder on the Falls to enable salmon, etc., to reach Loch Lomond—the source of Grand River. The district is rich in minerals, especially iron. Pop., 90.

GRAND RIVER GUT, a settlement in the dist. of St. George, Nfld., 4 miles from Little River, on the Reid-Nfld. Ry. It contains a Roman Catholic church, 4 stores, 2 saw mills, 1 telegraph and 1 express office. Pop. (1901), 76.

GRAND RIVER. LOT 14, a farming settlement in Prince co., P.E.I., on river of same name, 5 miles from Richmond Station. It contains Roman Catholic and Presbyterian churches, 1 store, 1 cheese factory and a lobster canery. The river flows into Malpeque Bay, which abounds in oysters. Pop., 500.

GRAND RIVER, SOUTH SIDE, a settlement in the dist. of St. George, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 261. Pop. (North Side), 250.

GRAND RIVER LAKE, a lake in Richmond co., N.S., about 8 miles long by 3 miles wide in its broadest part, and indented by several bays. It gives rise to the Grand River. It is situate north west of Framboise.

GRAND RUISSEAU, a rivulet formed by two small streams in Charlevoix co., Que., runs north-east into the St. Lawrence.

GRAND RUISSEAU, a rivulet in Levis co., Que., runs north-east into the Chaudiere.

GRAND ST. ESPRIT, a post office in Nicolet co., Que., near St. Monique, on the Nicolet branch of the I.C.R., 6 miles from St. Leonard Jet. See St. Monique.

GRAND ST. LOUIS, a post office in Nicolet co., Que., 11 miles from St. Angele de Laval (Doucet's Landing) on the Three Rivers branch of the G.T.R.

GRAND TRACADIE, a post settlement in Queens co., P.E.I., 4 miles from Bedford Station, on the Prince Edward Island Ry. It contains 1 Roman Catholic church, 3 stores, 1 hotel, 1 school, 1 public library, 1 public hall, and 2 blacksmith shops. Pop., 215.

GRAND VALLEY, an incorporated village in Dufferin co., Ont., and a station on the C.P.R. It contains 4 churches (English, Methodist, Presbyterian and Disciples), 24 stores, 3 hotels, 1 grist mill, 1 planing mill, 3 grain elevators, 1 chartered and 1 private bank, 1 printing office, telegraph and express and Bell telephone offices. Pop., 751.

GRAND VICTORIA LAKE, situate in the northern part of Pontiac co., Que. Area, 36,600 acres.

GRAND VIEW, a post settlement in York co., N.B., on the north bank of St. John River, 7 miles from Canterbury Station, on the C.P.R. It contains 2 churches (Free Baptist and Reformed Baptist), 2 stores and 1 hotel, 1 branch bank, a school and wharf. There is a ferry service on the River. Pop., 100.

GRANDVIEW, a post village in Queens co., P.E.I., 1½ miles from Grandview Station, on the Belfast & Murray Harbor branch of the P.E.I. Ry. It has 2 churches (Methodist and Baptist), 2 stores, 1 branch bank and telegraph office. Pop., 191.

GRAND VIEW, a station on the P.E. Island RR., Murray Harbor branch, in Queens co., P.E.I., 23 miles east of Charlottetown and 24 miles west of Murray Harbor.

GRAND VIEW, a post office in Brant co., Ont., ¼ mile from Brantford, on the G.T.R.

GRAND VIEW, a post office in Dauphin co., Man., and a station on the Can. Northern RR. (Edmonton div.), 30 miles west of Dauphin.

GRANDY'S BROOK, a small fishing settlement in the dist. of Burgeo and La Poile, Nfld., 7 miles from Burgeo. Grandy's Brook is a salmon stream navigable for small vessels about 3 miles, but is dangerous of access.

GRANDY'S PASSAGE, a small fishing settlement in the dist. of Burgeo and La Poile, Nfld., 9 miles from Rose Blanche, 10 miles from Port aux Basques, on the Reid-Nfld. Ry. Pop., 15.

GRANDY'S POINT, a settlement in the district of Placentia and St. Mary's, Nfld., 9 miles from Placentia.

GRANGE, a post office in Macdonald co., Man., 6 miles from Cypress River, on the C.P.R., a station on the Souris branch, 97 miles west of Winnipeg.

GRANGER, a post office in Dufferin co., Ont., 6 miles from Orangeville on the C.P.R.

GRANGER, a post office in Cardwell co., Ont.

GRANITE, a station on the C.P.R., in Kootenay dist., B.C., on the lower west arm of Kootenay Lake, 4 miles south of Nelson.

GRANITE CREEK, a post settlement in Yale Cariboo dist., B.C., 110 miles from Spence's Bridge, a station on the main line of the C.P.R., 25 miles southwest of Ashcroft, \$490,000 worth of gold was taken out in 1885. Pop., 100.

GRANITE HILL, a post office in Parry Sound dist., Ont., south of Lake Nipissing, 12 miles west of Trout Creek Station, on the G.T.R. (North Bay Branch), 20 miles south of Callander.

GRANITE HILL, a post village in York co., N.B., on the St. John River, 18 miles from Millville, a station on the Gibson branch of the C.P.R., 2 miles from Woodstock Road Station. It has 1 Baptist church, 1 general store, 2 hotels and 1 wagon and sleigh factory. Pop., 105.

GRANITE QUARRY, a station on the Algoma Central and Hudson Bay Rv., in Algoma dist., Ont., 10 miles from Sault Ste. Marie.

GRANITE VILLAGE, a post office in Shelburne co., N.S., 6 miles from Sable River on Halifax & South Western RR.

GRANITEVILLE, a post settlement in Stanstead co., Que., 2 miles from Stanstead Jct., on the Granite branch of Boston and Maine Ry. It contains a Methodist church, 1 saw mill, granite quarries and cutting shops. Pop., 100.

GRANSWAY, a settlement in the dist. of St. Barbe, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 22.

GRANT, a post settlement in Russell co., Ont., 4 miles from South Indian station, on the G.T.R. (Swanton & Ottawa branch). It contains 2 churches (Baptist and Presbyterian), 1 school, 1 cheese factory and 1 shingle mill. Pop., about 200.

GRANT, a lake in Wright co., Que., in the township of Bouchette.

GRANT, a post office in Westmoreland co., N.B., overlooking Northumberland Strait. The nearest station is Port Elgin, on the N.B. & P.E. Island RR.

GRANTHAM, a settlement in Drummond co., Que., 2 miles from St. Germain, on the I.C.R.

GRANTHAM, a post office on Vancouver Island, B.C. Pop. of immediate dist., 50.

GRANTHURST, a post office in Oxford co., Ont., 5 miles from St. Mary's, on the G.T.R.

GRANTLEY, a post village in Dundas co., Ont., 5 miles from Chesterville Station, on the C.P.R. It contains 1 store, 1 Methodist church and 1 cheese factory.

GRANTON, a post village in Pictou co., N.S., on Middle River, 3 miles from Pictou, on the I.C.R., and 7 miles from Westville, on the Pictou branch of the I.C.R., 6 miles from New Glasgow and 10 miles from Pictou. It is the chief shipping point of the Intercolonial Coal Mining Co.

GRANTON, a post village in Middlesex co., Ont., and a station on the G.T.R. It contains 8 churches (2 Presbyterian, 3 Methodist, 2 Episcopal and 1 Roman Catholic), 10 stores, 1 branch bank, 1 saw mill and 1 flour mill, 1 telegraph and express office.

GRANTS, a station on the Reid-Newfoundland Ry., in Bonavista dist., Nfld., 54 miles from Clareville.

GRANT'S CORNERS, a post hamlet on the border between Glengarry and Stormont counties, 6 miles from Cornwall, on the G.T.R. It has 1 store.

GRANT'S LAKE, a small lake in Halifax co., N.S., 7 miles south-west of Halifax City, has its outlet by a small stream running into Molyneux Basin, on the Atlantic coast.

GRANT'S LAKE, a small lake on the East River, in Pictou co., N.S.

GRANTVILLE, a settlement in Peel co., Ont., 6 miles from Kleinburg, on the Toronto and Owen Sound branch of the C.P.R.

GRANTVILLE, a post village on an inlet of the Gulf of St. Lawrence, in Queens co., P.E.I., 6 miles from Breadalbane, east of Emerald Jct., on the P.E. Island RR. It contains public hall 2 churches, 1 blacksmith and repair shop and 2 flour mills. Pop., about 350.

GRANTVILLE, a post office in Yukon Territory, via Skagway, near Alaskan boundary, in N. W. British Columbia.

GRANTVILLE BAY, a bay on the northern coast of P.E.I., east of Richmond Bay. It re-

ceives the waters of Stanley River, at the mouth of which is the harbor of New London, which affords good anchorage for small vessels.

GRANVILLE CENTRE, a post settlement in Annapolis co., N.S., on the Port Wade branch of the Halifax and South-Western Ry., 22 miles from Middleton. It contains 2 churches, 2 stores, 1 grist mill and 2 saw mills. The M. & V.B. Ry. is being constructed, which, when completed, will make Granville Centre a station. Pop., about 300.

GRANVILLE FERRY, a post settlement in Annapolis co., N.S., on the Annapolis River, on the Port Wade branch of the Halifax & Southwestern Ry., 27 miles from Middleton. It contains 1 Baptist and 2 Methodist churches, 10 stores, 2 hotels, 2 saw mills and 1 telephone office. Pop., 600.

GRANVILLE LAKE, a body of water in Athabaska dist., Prov. of Alberta. Area, 250,880 acres.

GRANVILLE LAKE, in Keewatin dist., N. W.T., situate north east of Nelson Lake and south west of South Indian Lake, and to the south east of Reindeer Lake, in the Prov. of Saskatchewan.

GRANVILLE PLATFORM, a station on the New Brunswick Coal and Railway Co.'s line, in Queens co., N.B., 33 miles from Norton.

GRAPE ISLAND, a small island in the Bay of Quinte, Ont., situate between Hastings and Prince Edward counties, near Belleville.

GRAPHITE CITY, a settlement in Labelle co., Que., 9 miles from Buckingham (Buckingham Jct., on the C.P.R., Ottawa to Montreal North Shore line, is 19 miles east of Hull, opposite Ottawa). It contains 1 plumbago factory and 1 saw mill. The plumbago deposits in the neighborhood are said to be inexhaustible.

GRASSETT, a flag station in Algoma dist., N.W. Ont., on the C.P.R., 282 miles east of Port Arthur, between Amyot and Otter stations.

GRAS, LAC DE, situate in Mackenzie dist., N.W.T., to the north-west of Lake Aylmer. Area, 431,200 acres.

GRASS HILL, a small farming settlement in Victoria co., Ont., and a station on the Cobocook & Lindsay branch of the G.T.R., 11 miles north-west of Lindsay, and 4 miles east of Lorneville Jct. It has 1 small store. Pop., 30.

GRASSIES, a post village (Grassie) and station of Toronto, Hamilton & Buffalo Ry., in Lincoln co., Ont., 15 miles from Hamilton, 23 miles from Welland. See Grassies.

GRASSMERE, a post hamlet in the dist. of Muskoka, Ont., 6 miles from Huntsville, on the G.T.R. (Toronto & North Bay div.), 10 miles from Utterson. Pop., about 60.

GRASS RIVER, a river of Victoria co., Ont. GRASS RIVER, a post settlement in Dauphin co., Man., 6 miles from Tenby, on the C.N.R. There is a Lutheran church in the district.

GRASSY, a lake in Pontiac co., Ont.

GRASSY LAKE, a lake of St. John co., N.B., on the Salmon River.

GRASSY LAKE, a post office in the Province of Alberta, and a station on the Crows Nest div. of the C.P.R., 55 miles west of Dunmore Jct., and about the same distance east of Lethbridge.

GRASSY'S CORNERS, a post village in Lin-

coln co., Ont., and a station (called Grassies), on the Tor., Hamilton & Buffalo RR., between Vinemount and Smithville, and 4 miles from Grimsby, on the G.T.R. It has 2 churches (Presbyterian and Union) and 2 stores.

GRATES COVE, a harbor and fishing and farming settlement on a peninsula jutting out into the Atlantic between Conception Bay and Trinity Bay, Nfld., 30 miles north of Carbonear. The latter is a station on the Reid-Nfld. RR., the terminus of the Broad Cove and Brigus branches of the line, 34 miles north-east of Whitbourne, and 33 miles north of Brigus Jct., the latter being 44 miles east of St. John's. Grates Cove, in the dist. of Bay-de-Verde, has 3 churches (R. C., Epis. and Meth.), 3 schools, 12 cod liver oil factories, and 5 berry factories. The industries of the place embrace cod, salmon and herring fishing. The nearest telegraph office is Old Perlican, 6 miles southward, on the south east of Trinity Bay. Pop. (1901), 535.

GRATTAN, a post village in Northumberland co., N.B., on the Tabusintac River, 30 miles from Loggieville Station, on the Fredericton branch of the I.C.R. on Miramichi Bay, a few miles north-east of Chatham. It has 3 churches (R. C., Pres. and Meth.), 4 stores, 1 hotel, 1 grist and 2 saw mills. Pop., about 200.

GRATTAN, a post office in Renfrew co., Ont., near Douglas Station, on the Ottawa and Parry Sound div. of the G.T.R., 12 miles from Renfrew.

GRATTAN CORNER, a post office in Prescott co., Ont., 2 miles from Montebello, on the opposite shore of the Ottawa River, and a station on the C.P.R., 46 miles east of Ottawa and 75 miles west of Montreal.

GRAVEL, a station in Algoma dist., Ont., on the C.P.R., on the Gravel River, 31 miles west of Schreiber.

GRAVEL HILL, a post office in Stormont co., Ont., 1½ miles from Monklands, on the C.P.R., 69 miles west of Montreal, on Toronto div.

GRAVEL LAKE, a station in Thunder Bay dist., N. W. Ont., on the Duluth section of the Can. Northern RR., 52 miles south-west of Port Arthur, on Lake Superior.

GRAVEL LAKE, a small lake in Saguenay co., Que.

GRAVEL RIVER, a small river in the dist. of Algoma, N.W. Ont., runs into the east shore of Lake Superior, near Leach Island, south of Michipicoten Harbor.

GRAVENHURST, an incorporated town in Simcoe co., Ont., at the foot of the Muskoka lakes, about midway between Toronto and North Bay, at the junction of the G.T.R. and Canadian Pacific RRs. Population (1901), 2,146. Steamers leave twice daily in summer for the principal points on Lakes Muskoka, Joseph and Rousseau, and return meeting trains. Has a park, 6 churches, high school, 3 public schools, 3 large and commodious hotels, bank agency, foundry, carriage works, 30 stores, 4 large saw mills, 2 shingle mills, planing mill, a large new factory manufacturing hydraulic dentists' and barbers' chairs, dental cabinets, and supplies; a fine new opera house, telegraph, express, telephone and newspaper offices, locations in the province for manufacturing, especially furniture, woodenware, etc., unlimited quantities of timber available.

Reasonable inducements given to new industries. Situated on the rising ground between Gull and Muskoka lakes. The town is one of the healthiest in Canada, and is surrounded by beautiful scenery. Excellent facilities for boating, bathing and fishing on the picturesque and charming lakes that border on either side of the town. The Muskoka Cottage Sanatorium and Free Hospital for consumptives are just outside town limits.

GRAY, a post office in, Qu'Appelle dist. Prov. of Saskatchewan, near Milestone, a station on the C.P.R. (Portal Section), 54 miles south east of Moose Jaw.

GRAYSON, a post settlement in Assiniboia East. Prov. of Sask., on the Pheasant Hills branch of the C.P.R., 89 miles north-west of Kirkella and 58 miles south-east of Lipton. It has 3 church denominations (R. C., Pres. and Baptist), but as yet no churches; 6 stores, 1 hotel, 1 lumber yard, 2 blacksmith shops, 1 grain elevator, 3 implement agencies, and 2 livery stables. Pop., 60.

GRAYSTOCK, a post office in Peterborough co., Ont., 7 miles from Peterborough. There are 2 churches in the neighborhood.

GRAYSVILLE, a post office in Macdonald co., Man., near Gray's, a station on the Can. Northern RR., 6 miles from Carman and 59 miles west of Winnipeg.

GRAYTOWN, a post settlement in Assa. East dist., Prov. of Sask., 10 miles from C.P.R. station of Windthorst, on the Reston branch. It contains a Union church, 1 store and a school. Pop., 50.

GREAT BARRISWAY, a settlement in the dist. of Placentia and St. Mary's, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 54.

GREAT BARTIBOG RIVER, rises in Gloucester co., N.B., flows in an easterly course into the Miramichi River.

GREAT BASS, a river in Colchester co., N. S., runs south into Cobequid Bay.

GREAT BEAR, a lake in Pontiac co., Que.

GREAT BEAR LAKE, a great body of water in Mackenzie dist., N.W.T., situate south-west of the Coppermine River. Area, 7,565,600 acres.

GREAT BONAH, a small fishing settlement on the west side of Placentia Bay, in the dist. of Placentia and St. Mary's, Nfld., 80 miles from Placentia. Pop. (1901), 33.

GREAT BREHAT, a settlement in the dist. of St. Barbe, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 49.

GREAT BRIDGE, a post office in Colchester co., N.S. See Great Village.

GREAT BRULEY and **BERNARD'S COVE**, settlements in the dist. of Placentia and St. Mary's, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 58.

GREAT BURIN, a settlement in the dist. of Burin, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 236.

GREAT AND LITTLE CAPUCINS, two small rivers falling into the St. Lawrence between the Rivers Grand Metis and Matane, in Rimouski co., Que. They afford good sea-trout fishing.

GREAT CATALINA, a settlement in the dist. of Trinity, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 1,470.

GREAT CEDAR, a lake in Wright co., Que., in the township of Bouchette.

GREAT CENTRAL LAKE, a lake in Vancouver Island, Clayoquot or Alberni dist., B.C. Lat. 50° 20' N., lon. 127° W.

GREAT COD ROY, a river of Nfld., flows south-west into the Gulf of St. Lawrence, through the most picturesque scenery. Length

about 60 miles. Its banks are covered with excellent timber.

GREAT DESERT, a post office in Nipissing dist., Ont., near Lake Talton and Russagornis on the C.P.R., on the branch from north Bay to Fort William, on north shore of Lake Superior.

GREAT DOOR, a settlement in the dist. of Saskatchewan, Sask., 19 miles from Radisson on the main line Canadian Northern Ry.

GREAT FISH RIVER, or **BACK RIVER**, a river of the Mackenzie and Keewatin districts of Canada, rises in Sussex Lake on the north-east side of Great Slave Lake, and, after a tortuous north-east course, enters an inlet of the Arctic Ocean in lat. $67^{\circ} 7' 31''$ N., lon. $91^{\circ} 39' 45''$ W.

GREAT (or CONNAIGRE) HARBOR, a fishing settlement in the dist. of Fortune Bay, Nfld., on Connaigre Bay, 3 miles from Harbor Breton. It contains 1 lobster cannery. Pop. (1901), 125.

GREAT HARBOR DEEP, a fishing station in the dist. of St. Barbe, on the French shore, Nfld., north of White Bay, 38 miles from La Scie, 56 miles from Tilt Cove. Pop. (1901), 82.

GREAT HILL, a settlement in Queens co., N.S., 2 miles from Liverpool, on the Halifax & Southwestern RR. Pop., about 76.

GREAT JERVOIS, a fishing settlement in the dist. of Fortune Bay, Nfld., on Bay D'Espoir, 8 miles from Gaultois, 21 miles from Harbor Breton. It contains 1 Roman Catholic church, 1 lobster cannery, and has a splendid harbor and good anchorage. Pop. (1901), 88.

GREAT LAKE, a small sheet of water in Champlain co., Que.

GREAT LAKE BATISCAN, a lake in Quebec co., Que.

GREAT LONG LAKE, a body of water in the centre of Ungava dist., N.E.T., east of Seal Lake. It is drained by the Larch and Koksoak Rivers into Ungava Bay, an inlet of Hudson Strait, in the arctic zone. Area, 156,800 acres.

GREAT MANITOULIN, an island in the north channel of Georgian Bay, south of Algoma dist., Ont. It is 100 miles long by about 30 miles wide. Pop., 10,000.

GREAT AND LITTLE MECHINIS, two small rivers falling in between the Rivers Grand Metis and Matane, Que. They are on the south shore of the St. Lawrence below Father Point. They afford good sea-trout fishing.

GREAT MUSH-A-MUSH, a lake in Lunenburg co., N.S., 5 miles long and about 2 miles broad. It is the main source of the Mush-a-Mush River.

GREAT NOMININGUE, a lake in Labelle co., Que., in the township of Loranger.

GREAT OPEONGO, one of a group of small lakes south of the Ottawa River, in Nipissing dist., Ont., in the Algonquin National Park.

GREAT PARADISE, a fishing settlement in the dist. of Placentia and St. Mary's, on the west side of Placentia Bay, Nfld., 25 miles from Placentia. Pop. (1901), 175.

GREAT PUBNICO, a lake in Yarmouth co., N.S., has its outlet by a small river running south-east into Barrington Harbor.

GREAT QUIRPON, a settlement in the dist. of St. Barbe, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 57.

GREAT RATTTLING BROOK, a river of Newfoundland, taking its rise in Emma's Lake,

and flowing north is joined by several streams and falls into the Exploits River.

GREAT ST. FRANCIS, a lake in Beauce co., Que.

GREAT ST. LAWRENCE, a post town and port of entry in the dist. of Burin, Nfld., on the west side of Placentia Bay, 18 miles from Burin. It has a fine harbor, and extensive trade in the fisheries. Pop. (1901), 799.

GREAT SALMON RIVER, a settlement in St. John co., N.B., 10 miles from nearest station on the St. Martin's & Hampton Ry. It contains a Union church, 1 store, 1 hotel, 1 mill and telephone exchange. Pop., 50.

GREAT SHEMOGUE, a post settlement in Westmoreland co., N.B., on the Great Shemogue River, adjoining Shemogue Harbor, on Northumberland Strait, 10 miles north-west of Port Elgin, on Bay Verte, and a station on the N.B. & Prince Edward Island RR., north-east of Sackville, on the I.C.R. The settlement is 20 miles east of the port and town of Shediac, on the I.C.R., 2 miles from Point du Chene, the terminal of the Moncton & Point du Chene branch. Great Shemogue has 3 churches (R. C., Meth. and Baptist), 2 stores, 1 hotel, 1 saw mill and 1 grist mill. Pop., 200.

GREAT SLAVE LAKE (*Lac de L'Esclave*, "Lake of the Slave"), an extensive lake in the Mackenzie dist. of the North West Territories, situated between lat. $61^{\circ} 40'$ and 63° N., and lon. $10^{\circ} 30'$ and $117^{\circ} 30'$ W. The shape is very irregular. Length from east to west, 300 miles; greatest breadth, 50 miles. The shores, on its north side especially, are precipitous and rugged, and it contains many rocky and wooded islands. It receives from the north-east the surplus waters of Aymer and Artillery Lakes, and from the south those of Lake Athabasca by the Great Slave River. It discharges its own by the Mackenzie River into the Arctic Ocean. It is wholly frozen over for 6 months of the year. Area, 6,860,000.

GREAT SLAVE RIVER, in the Athabasca and Mackenzie districts, of the North West Territories, formed by the Peace River, after it is joined by Stony River from Lake Athabasca. It enters Great Slave Lake on its south side by two mouths, near Fort Resolution. Total course, 300 miles. The shores, in many parts, are well wooded. In its upper part it is interrupted by rapids and falls; its lower course is through an alluvial region. Magnificent scenery skirts its banks.

GREAT VILLAGE, a post village in Colchester co., N.S., on river of same name, 4 miles from Londonderry, on the I.C.R. It contains 2 churches (Pres. and Baptist), 3 stores, 1 hotel, grist, carding and saw mills, a tannery, school and telephone exchange. This village is situated in centre of an agricultural district. Pop., 500.

GREAT WATSHESHOO RIVER, Que., rises on the north shore of the Gulf of St. Lawrence. Good salmon are found in this river.

GREAT WEST LOON, a lake in Addington co., Ont.

GREAT AND LITTLE WHALE RIVERS, in Ungava dist., N. E. Terr., both of which drain westward into Hudson Bay, south of Clearwater Lake.

GREECE'S POINT, a post settlement in Argensteuil co., Que., on the Ottawa River, 6 miles from Stonefield Heights, on the C.N.

Quebec Ry. (Mackenzie-Mann system). It has 3 stores, 2 hotels, 1 cheese factory, and telephone exchange. Pop., 60 families.

GREELY, a post village in Russell co., Ont., 3 miles from Manotick Station, on the C.P.R. (Ottawa & Prescott branch), 14 miles from Ottawa. It has 1 Episcopal church, 2 stores, 1 hotel, and 1 cheese factory. Pop., 225.

GREEN, one of a group of small lakes in Nipissing district, N.W. Ont.

GREEN, a lake in Pontiac co., Que.

GREENBANK, a post village in Ontario co., Ont., 6 miles from the G.T.R. station of Blackwater Jct., 51 miles north-east of Toronto. It has 3 churches (Pres., Meth. and Baptist), 1 general store, and 2 saw and lumber mills. Pop., about 200.

GREEN BAY, an arm of Lake Manitou, is situated in Bidwell, on Manitoulin Island, Algoma dist., N.W. Ont.

GREEN BAY, a post village on Manitoulin Island, Algoma dist., Ont., on Lake Manitou. It contains 2 churches (Methodist and Presbyterian), 1 store and 1 saw mill. Massey, on the Soo line, C.P.R., is the nearest station. Pop., 250.

GREENBUSH, a post settlement in Leeds co., Ont., 4 miles from Bellamy, on the C.P.R. (Ottawa & Brockville branch), 10 miles from Brockville. It contains 1 church, 2 stores, and 1 cheese factory. Pop., about 150.

GREENBUSH, a station in the Prov. of Saskatchewan on the Prince Albert div. of the Canadian Northern RR., 22 miles west of Greenwood and 11 miles east of Prairie River.

GREEN BUSH, a post settlement in York co., N.B., on the St. John River, 10 miles from Canterbury Station, on the C.P.R. It contains 1 Baptist church and schoolhouse.

GREEN COVE, a settlement in Yarmouth co., N.S., 10 miles from Yarmouth, on the Dominion Atlantic and Halifax & Southwestern Rys.

GREEN COVE, a fishing station in the dist. of Twillingate, Nfld., 7 miles from Bonne Bay, a port of call of the Reid-Nfld. steamers. Pop. (1901), 62.

GREEN CREEK, a post office in Colchester co., N.S., on Shubenacadie River, 3 miles from South Maitland, on the Midland branch of the Dom. Atlantic Ry., 8 miles from Brookfield, and 11 miles from Lower Stewiacke, on the I.C.R. It contains 1 Presbyterian church and 1 saw mill. Pop., 156.

GREENDALE, a post settlement in Antigonish co., N.S., 15 miles from Antigonish, on the I.C.R. Pop., about 75.

GREEN EAST RIVER, rises near Second Lake in Rescouche co., N.B., and flows in a westerly course into the St. John River, in Victoria co.

GREENFIELD, a post settlement in Carleton co., N.B., on the St. John River, 6 miles from Florenceville, on C.P.R., between Woodstock and Perth Jct. It contains 3 churches (Anglican, Baptist and Presbyterian).

GREENFIELD, a post village in Glengarry co., Ont., and a station on the G.T.R. It contains 1 Roman Catholic church, 1 Presbyterian church, 4 stores, 2 hotels, 1 saw mill and telegraph and express offices. Pop., 100.

GREENFIELD, a settlement in Kings co. N. S., on the Halifax River, 6 miles from Wolfville, on the Dom. Atlantic Ry. It contains a Baptist church, 2 lumber and shingle mills. Pop., about 100.

GREENFIELD, a post village in Queens co., N.S., 10 miles from the mouth of the Medway River, upon the banks of which it is situated, and 14 miles from Brookfield, on the Halifax & South-Western Ry. (Mackenzie & Mann system). It is an agricultural district and summer resort, with good hotel accommodation. It contains a Baptist church, 3 stores, 1 saw and 2 shingle mills, and is in telephonic communication with Halifax. This place is noted for its fishing facilities. Its port is Ponthock Lake. Pop., 500.

GREENFIELD, a post office in Kings co., P. E.I., via Charlottetown.

GREENFIELD, a post office in Colchester co., N.S., 2½ miles from Union, a station on the I.C.R., 5 miles east of Truro.

GREEN GARDENS, a settlement in the dist. of St. George, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 72.

GREEN HARBOR, a post office in Shelburne co., N.S., near Shelburne, on the Halifax & South Western RR.

GREEN HILL, a post settlement in Cumberland co., N.S. Parrsboro, the terminus of the Cumberland Ry., is the nearest station.

GREEN HILL, a post settlement in York co., N.B., 5 miles from Cross Creek, on the Fredericton branch of the I.C.R. It contains 1 church (Methodist), 1 hotel, 2 grist mills. Pop., 321.

GREEN HILL, or SALEM, a post village in Pictou co., N.S., 6 miles from New Glasgow, and 5½ miles from Westville, on the I.C.R. It contains 1 Presbyterian church and 1 store. Pop., about 200.

GREEN HILLS, a settlement in the dist. of Burin, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 29.

GREEN ISLAND, a fishing station in the dist. of Trinity, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 7.

GREEN ISLAND BROOK, a fishing station in the dist. of St. Barbe, on the French shore, Nfld., 30 miles from Cape Norman. Pop. (1901), 44.

GREEN ISLAND COVE, a fishing station in the dist. of St. Barbe, on the French shore, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 56.

GREEN ISLAND COVE, a small cove in the dist. of Twillingate, on Green Island, near Catalina, Nfld. It has a lighthouse exhibiting a fixed white light, 92 feet above high water. Pop. (1901), 25.

GREEN LAKE, in British Columbia, situated between Alexandria and Thompson's River, is about 30 miles in length with a beautiful grassy shore. It has no outlet, save very partially by underground flow in the direction of the Bonaparte, a tributary of the Thompson. This lake is strongly impregnated with salt, its color being at the same time a fine sea green.

GREEN LAKE, a post office in the Province of Saskatchewan, near Duck Lake, on the Regina Branch of the C.N.R., 33 miles south of Prince Albert.

GREEN LAKE, a lake at the head waters of the Missassaga, in the district of Algoma, N.W. Ont., near the line of the Manitoulin and North Shore RR. It is surrounded by a valley of considerable width, unbroken by rocky ridges or lakes.

GREEN LAKE, a post office in York co., N. B., 12 miles from Woodstock, a station on the C.P.R., 65 miles from Fredericton.

GREEN LAKE, a small lake in Simcoe co.,

Ont., about 2 miles long by 1 wide, affording good fishing.

GREENLAND, a post office in Provencher co., Man., near Ste. Anne des Chenes, on the Can. Northern RR., 27 miles south east of Winnipeg.

GREENLAND, a post office in Annapolis co., N.S., near Smith's Cove, 7 miles from Deep Brook, a station on the Dom. Atlantic RR., 3 miles east of Digby.

GREENLAW, a settlement in the district of Alberta, 3 miles from near Deer, a station on the Calgary and Edmonton branch of the C. P. R.

GREENLAY, a post hamlet in the township of St. Francois Xavier de Brompton, in Richmond co., Que., $\frac{3}{4}$ mile from Windsor Mills, on the G.T.R. and Orford Mountain Railway. It has 1 store and 1 telegraph office.

GREENMOUNT, a post village in Prince co., P.E.I., 2 miles from Kildare River, contiguous to Alberton, and 4 miles from Alma Station, on the P.E.I. Rk. It has a "Christian" church, and saw, grist and carding mills near by. Alberton is the shopping and banking town of the district, and the seat of telegraph and express offices. There is good salt water fishing in Killcare River and in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, besides oysters, clams, and mussels. Pop., about 200.

GREEN MOUNTAIN, a post office in Yale and Cariboo dist., B.C., 85 miles from Okanagan, on the C.P.R.

GREEN OAKS, a station in Colchester co., N.S., on the Midland div. of the Dom. Atlantic RR., 2 miles from South Maitland, and 16 miles south-west of Truro.

GREENOCK, a post village in Bruce co., Ont., 8 miles from Walkerton, on the G.T.R. It contains 2 churches, 1 store and 1 hotel. Pop., 50.

GREEN POINT, a settlement in the dist. of Fortune Bay, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 13.

GREEN POINT, a post settlement in Gloucester co., N.B., on Baie des Chaleurs, 17 miles north of Bathurst. The nearest station (5 miles distant) is Petite Roche, on the I.C.R., 11 miles north of Bathurst. Pop., 650.

GREEN POINT, a post office in Prince Edward co., Ont., 12 miles from Pictou.

GREEN RIDGE, a post and farming district in Provencher co., Man., 8 miles from Dominion City, on the C.P.R., and $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Ridgeville, on the C.N.R. It contains 1 Presbyterian church.

GREEN RIVER, a small stream in Kings co., P.E.I., runs into the north side of Murray Harbor.

GREEN RIVER, a post village in Ontario co., Ont., $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Locust Hill, on the C.P.R. Its port is Pickering Harbor. It contains 1 Baptist church, 1 store, 1 flour and 2 saw mills, 1 wood-turning and 2 basket factories. Pop., 100.

GREEN RIVER, a post settlement in Victoria co., N.B., on the St. John River, and a station on the C.P.R., 9 miles south of Edmundston, and 29 miles north of Grand Falls. It contains 3 stores, and express and telegraph offices. Pop., about 700.

GREEN RIVER, a post office in Temiscouata co., Que., 7 miles from Riviere du Loup on the I.C.R. and the Temiscouata RR.

GREEN RIVER, rises north-east of Middle Lake, on the boundaries of Quebec and New Brunswick, and passing west of the Quamquer-

ticook Mountains, falls into the River St. John, 3 miles below Edmundston, Victoria co., N.B. It is from 80 to 90 miles long, with several lakes at its head which abound with fish.

GREEN ROAD, a rural post office and siding between Houlton Main and De Bec Jct., on the C.P.R., in Carleton co., N.B. Pop. of district, about 100.

GREEN'S BROOK, a post office in Pictou co., N.S., 14 miles from James River, on the I.C.R.

GREEN'S HARBOR, a large fishing and post village in the dist. of Trinity Bay, on the south side of Trinity Bay, 9 miles from Broad Cove, on the Reid-Nfld. Ry. Ship-building is also engaged in. Malls tri-weekly. It has 2 churches (Anglican and Methodist), 6 stores, 3 lumber mills, 5 lobster and salmon canneries, and 2 public halls. Pop. (1901), 514.

GREENSHIELDS, a village in Richmond co., Que., 4 miles from St. Cyr, a station on the G.T.R., 7 miles from Richmond. It contains 1 store and 1 saw mill. Pop., about 300.

GREEN'S LAKE, a small lake of Halifax co., N.S., emptying into Owl's Head Harbor.

GREENSLIDE, a station on the Arrowhead branch of the C.P.R., about 10 miles from Revelstoke.

GREENSPOND, a post town, a port of entry, and island on the north side of Bonavista Bay, Nfld., 100 miles from St. John's by water, 183 by land. It has a good though small harbor, and is an excellent fishing station. Great numbers of seals are sometimes washed on the shore here during the spring seal fishery. Steamer from St. John's calls here every fortnight. Pop. (1901), 1,353.

GREEN'S POND, a settlement in the dist. of St. Barbe, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 83.

GREENSVILLE, a post village in Wentworth co., Ont., 1 mile from Dundas, on the G.T.R. It contains 1 store, 1 flour mill, 1 chopping mill, and 1 cider factory. Pop., 150.

GREENVALE, a farming settlement in Kings co., P.E.I., 4 miles from Souris.

GREENVALE, a post office in Pictou co., N.S., on Sutherland's River, 12 miles from New Glasgow, a station on the I.C.R., 2 miles north of Stellarton. Pop., 42.

GREEN VALLEY, a post settlement in Glenarry co., Ont., on the C.P.R., near the River Beaudette, 4 miles from Alexandria, the nearest banking point. Pop., 150.

GREENVIEW, a post office in Hastings co., Ont., 33 miles from Ormsby on the Central Ontario Ry.

GREENVILLE, a village in Cumberland co., N.S., and a station on the I.C.R., 25 miles north-west of Truro. It has 3 stores, 1 hotel, 2 saw mills, 1 blacksmith shop, besides post, telephone, telegraph and express offices. Pop., 314.

GREENVILLE STATION, a post village and station on the I.C.R. (Truro & Moncton branch), in Cumberland co., N.S., on Wallace River, 11 miles south-east of Oxford Jct. It contains 1 hotel, 2 mills, and telegraph and express offices. Pop., 125.

GREENWAY, a post settlement in Huron co., Ont., $7\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Parkhill, on the G.T.R. It contains 2 churches (Anglican and Methodist), 1 store. Pop., 50.

GREENWAY, a post office in Souris co., Man., and a junction station on the Carman & Hartney div. of the Can. Northern RR., 23 miles west of Somerset, and 16 miles east of Belmont.

- GREENWICH**, a post settlement in Kings co., P.E.I., on St. Peter's Bay, with station (St. Peter's) at the head of the Bay, on the P.E. Island RR. It has 1 Roman Catholic and 2 Presbyterian churches, 4 stores, 1 hotel, saw and grist mills, and 3 lobster canning factories, and at station (St. Peter's) telegraph and express offices. There is good goose and black duck shooting, as well as salmon and trout fishing in the vicinity. Pop., about 200.
- GREENWICH**, a post office in Kings co., N. S., a station (named Port Williams), on the Dom. Atlantic RR., 2 miles from Wolfville.
- GREENWICH CENTRE**, (formerly **ROUND HILL**), a village in Kings co., N.B., on the St. John River, 14 miles from Westfield Beach, on the C.P.R. It contains a Methodist church, 2 stores, 1 hotel, 1 grist and 1 saw mill, 1 shale and 1 axe factory, and telephone exchange. Pop., about 150.
- GREENWICH HILL**, a post settlement in Kings co., N.B., on the St. John River, 7 miles from Westfield Beach, on the C.P.R. It contains 1 Baptist church, 2 stores and grist and saw mills. Pop., 100.
- GREENWOOD**, a post village in Ontario co., Ont., 6 miles from Peking Station, on G.T.R., and Locust Hill Station on C.P.R. It contains a Methodist church, 1 store, 1 hotel, 1 flour mill and telegraph office. Pop., 250.
- GREENWOOD**, a post settlement in Kings co., N.S., 3 miles from Kingston, on the Dom. Atlantic Ry., 2 stations east of Middleton. It contains 1 church. Pop., 502.
- GREENWOOD**, a post settlement in Selkirk co., Man., 15 miles from Stonewall Station, on the C.P.R.
- GREENWOOD**, a post village in Yale dist., B.C., and a station on the C.P.R., between Midway and Grand Forks. It has 3 branch banks.
- GREENWOOD**, a station on the Halifax and Southwestern Ry., in Shelburne co., N.S., 20 miles west of Shelburne, and 12 miles east of Barrington, on the Halifax and Southwestern Railway.
- GREER**, a post settlement in St. John co., N.B., near the Bay of Fundy, 4 miles from St. Martin's, on the Hampton & St. Martin's Ry. Its port is Quaco. It contains a Methodist church and hall used by other denominations. Pop. 125.
- GREER MOUNT**, a post village in Pontiac co., Que., on the Ottawa River, 9 miles from Campbell's Bay Station, on the C.P.R. (Waltham branch), 56 miles west of Hull, opposite Ottawa City. It has 2 churches (Epis. and Meth.), 1 saw mill and 1 cheese factory. In the region there are deposits of mica. Pop., 150.
- GREGORY**, a post settlement in Muskoka dist., Ont., on Lake Rosseau, 5 miles from Barnesdale, on the Can. Northern Ontario Ry. There is connection in summer by steamer with Gravenhurst (at foot of Muskoka Lake, on G.T.R.), and with Port Carling and Falkenburg (on G.T.R., 126 miles north of Toronto) by stage daily in winter.
- GRENADIER ISLAND**, a post office in Leeds co., Ont., near Mallorytown, on the G. T.R.
- GRENFEL**, a post village in Simcoe co., Ont., 2½ miles from Colwell Station, on the Barrie & Meaford branch of the G.T.R., 5½ miles west of Allandale, and about 7 miles from Barrie. It has 1 Methodist church. Its chief trade goes to Barrie, its shipping town. Pop., about 50.
- GRENFELL**, a post settlement in the Prov. of Saskatchewan, on the C.P.R., 44 miles east of Qu'Appelle. It contains 4 churches (Anglican, Methodist, Presbyterian and Baptist), 25 stores, 2 hotels, 1 chartered bank, 1 private bank, 1 printing office and newspaper, 6 grain elevators, telegraph and express offices. Pop., 850.
- GRENIER**, a post office in Beauce co., Que., 4 miles from Ste. Marie Beauce, a station on the Quebec Central RR.
- GRENVILLE**, an incorporated village in Argenteuil co., Que., on the River Ottawa and on the C.P.R., 58 miles from Montreal and about 63 miles from Ottawa. It is at the head of the Carillon Canal. It contains 4 churches (Episcopal, Roman Catholic, Presbyterian and Methodist), about 12 stores, 4 hotels, 1 saw mill and 2 telegraph offices. Pop., 495.
- GRENVILLE**, a county of Ontario, bordering on the St. Lawrence, comprises an area of 296,742 acres. This county is traversed by the G.T.R. (main line), also by the C.P.R. (main line and Ottawa & Prescott div.). Capital, Prescott. Pop. (1901), Grenville South, 12,831; of Leeds and Grenville, 13,647.
- GRES FALLS**, on the River St. Maurice, about 17 miles from its mouth, in St. Maurice co., Que. The falls can only be considered as a cascade whose waters are separated into several channels by a few islets clothed with rich foliage.
- GRESHAM**, a post hamlet in Bruce co., Ont., 8 miles from Paisley, on the G.T.R. It has 2 Presbyterian church and a saw mill. Pop., 25.
- GRETNA**, a post settlement in Lennox co., Ont., 5 miles from Napanee, on the Bay of Quinté and G.T. Rys. It contains a Methodist church, and is noted for its productions of fruit. Pop., 150.
- GRETNA**, a post village in Lisgar co., Man., and is the junction of the C.P.R. and G. N. Rys. It contains 5 churches, 1 chartered and 2 private banks, 3 stores, 2 hotels, 1 roller mill, and telegraph and express offices. The district is agricultural. Pop., 800.
- GREVILLE BAY**, an inlet on the shore and entrance to Basin of Minas, Cumberland co., N.S.
- GREY**, a flag station on the Temiskaming & Northern Ontario RR., 3 miles north of Temagami and 75 miles north of North Bay, on the G.T.R. and C.P.R. lines, in Nipissing dist., Ont.
- GREY**, a post village in Huron co., Ont. See Cranbrook.
- GREY E., N. & S.**, a county of Ontario, bordering on Georgian Bay, comprises an area of 1,163,864 acres. It is drained by several streams, and the land is excellent for agricultural purposes. The G.T.R. and C.P.R. traverse this county. Capital, Owen Sound. Pop. (1901), 74,609.
- GREY PINE RIVER**, in Chicoutimi co., Que., runs into the Grande Decharge, which connects the Saguenay River with Lake St. John.
- GREY RAPIDS**, a station in Northumberland co., N.B., on the I.C.R., 16 miles south of Chatham Jct.
- GREY'S MILLS**, a small post settlement in

Kings co., N.B., on the St. John River, 13 miles from Rothesay, on the I.C.R. It contains 1 Baptist church, 1 store, and has a daily mail from St. John. Pop., 129.

GREYSTEAD, a settlement in Middlesex co., Ont., 6 miles from Allsa Craig and 3 miles from Denfield, on the London and Wingham div. of the G.T.R., the nearest railway point. Pop., 35.

GREYWOOD, a post village in Annapolis co., N.S., on Allen River, 9 miles from Annapolis Royal, a station on the Dom. Atlantic RR., 20 miles east of Digby, on the Bay of Fundy. It has 1 Episcopal church, 1 store, and 1 rotary saw mill. Pop., about 100.

GRIERSFORD, a post office in Renfrew co., Ont., 3½ miles from Eganville, on C.P.R. and G.T.R.

GRIERSON, a post hamlet in centre of prosperous farming community in Alberta Province, 2 miles from Okotoks, on the C. P. Ry. It has a Presbyterian church.

GRIERSVILLE, a post hamlet in Grey co., Ont., 5 miles from Meaford on G.T.R. It contains 1 church and a few farm houses and blacksmith shop. Pop., 50.

GRIFFIN, a post office in Stanstead co. Que., near Stanstead Jct., on the Boston & Maine Ry.

GRIFFIN COVE, a post office in Gaspé co., Que., 42 miles from Gaspé Basin, on the Gulf of St. Lawrence.

GRIFFIN LAKE, a small settlement in Yale dist., B.C., on Eagle River, on the C.P.R., with telegraph office, 18 miles west of Revelstoke. Pop., 12.

GRIFFIN LAKE, a small settlement in Leeds co., Ont.

GRIFFIN'S CORNERS, a small post village in Elgin co., Ont., a station on the Tillsonburg, Port Burwell & St. Thomas div. of the C.P.R., 14 miles from Port Burwell Jct. It contains 1 church, 1 store, 1 hotel, and 1 cheese factory. Pop., about 50.

GRIFFITH, a post village in Renfrew co., Ont., on the Madawaska, 27 miles from Caldwell, on the Ottawa and Parry Sound branch of the G.T.R. It contains 2 churches (Presbyterian and Roman Catholic), 2 stores, 3 hotels, and 1 saw mill. Pop., Griffith and Matawatchan (1901), 697.

GRIGUET BAY, an inlet of the Atlantic, in the dist. of St. Barbe, Nfld., on the extreme north of the island above Hare Bay, on the east coast. Pop. (1901), 47.

GRIGUET HARBOR, a fishing station on the French shore (dist. of St. Barbe), Nfld., at the extreme north-east of the island, 40 miles north of Croc Harbor. It is a desirable resort for tourists or health-seekers, as the air is bracing, while the ponds of the region abound with trout. It has several churches and small general stores. Pop. (1901), 95.

GRIMSBY, a thriving incorporated village in Lincoln co., Ont., on Lake Ontario, and on the G.T.R., 17 miles from Hamilton. It contains Episcopal, Roman Catholic, Presbyterian, Methodist and Baptist churches, 2 express and 2 telegraph offices, 1 flouring mill, saw and planing mills, 1 iron foundry, 19 stores, 2 hotels, 1 canning factory, sash and door factory, 1 bank, 1 printing office, high and public schools, and has a large trade in fruit and country produce. Fruits of all kinds grow in abundance. It has

electric light and electric railway from Hamilton and waterworks. Pop., 1,000.

GRIMSBY CAMP GROUND, a summer resort, near Grimsby, on the south shore of Lake Ontario. It contains 1 telegraph office and is close to the line of the Toronto, Hamilton & Buffalo RR.

GRIMSBY CENTRE, a post settlement in Lincoln co., Ont., 3¼ miles from Grimsby. It contains 1 Anglican church.

GRIMSBY PARK, a post village in Lincoln co., Ont., on the G.T.R. It contains 1 Methodist auditorium, 1 store, 2 hotels, telegraph and express offices. It is a well-known summer resort on the shores of Lake Ontario. Its summer population is about 1,000.

GRIMSTHORPE, a post office in the district of Algoma, Ont., near Providence Bay. The nearest station is Massey, on "the Soo" div. of the C.P.R., in the North Channel of Lake Huron.

GRIMSTON, a post settlement in Grey co., Ont., 4 miles from Dobbinton, on the G.T.R., 27 miles from Owen Sound.

GRINDSTONE ISLAND, one of the most important of the Magdalen Islands in the Gulf of St. Lawrence; it has an area of 1,370 acres. At the western limit is the thriving little village of Etang du Nord, in Gaspé co. Pop. of the latter parish (which has a post office), in 1901, 2,376.

GRINDSTONE ISLAND, an island in Shepody Bay, near the head of the Bay of Fundy, Albert co., N.B. On it are a lighthouse and fog alarm. Lat. 45° 43' 13" N., lon. 64° 37' 25" W. It is 1 mile long. Formerly grindstones were manufactured here; the last few years building stone has been quarried in quite large quantities.

GRISWOLD, a post village in Brandon co., Man., on the C.P.R. main line. It is in the centre of a fine wheat district and contains 3 churches (Anglican, Presbyterian and Methodist), 2 stores, 1 hotel, 1 flour mill, 1 branch bank, 1 printing office and newspaper, and 1 telegraph office. Pop., about 350.

GRIT, a post office in Nipissing dist., on the C.P.R., station (Corbell), 9 miles east of North Bay, on Lake Nipissing. See Corbell.

GROAIS ISLAND, a settlement in the dist. of St. Barbe, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 119. The population of Groais Harbor (1901) is 10.

GROAT'S ISLAND, on the north side of Bonavista Bay, Nfld., one of the islands forming the harbor of Greenspond. It is a fishing station.

GROHAM, a lake in Leeds co., Ont.

GROLE COVE, a small fishing settlement in the dist. of Fortune Bay, Nfld., on the east side of Hermitage Bay, 16 miles from Harbor Breton. It contains 1 store. Pop. (1901), 134.

GRONDINES, a post village in Portneuf co., Que., on the north shore of the St. Lawrence, and on the C.P.R., 48 miles above Quebec. It has 4 lighthouses, and contains 7 stores, 1 flour and 2 saw mills, 5 cheese and butter factories, 2 lime kilns, 2 race-courses and 1 telegraph office. A steambot from Quebec calls twice a week, and from Montreal once a week. Pop., 440; of parish, 1,431.

GRONDINES, EAST, a post office in Portneuf co., Que., 3 miles from Grondines, a station on the C.P.R. (Quebec & Montreal div.), 10 miles west of Portneuf.

GRONDINES STATION, an early settlement in Portneuf co., Que., on the St. Lawrence River, 3½ miles from Grondines, on the C.P.R., 32 miles east of Three Rivers. It has 1 R.C. church, 5 stores, 1 hotel, 1 grist and 4 saw mills, besides post, express and telegraph offices. Pop., 1,250.

GROS MORNE, a post office in Gaspé co., Que., 120 miles from Little Metis station, on the I.C.R.

GROS RUISSEAU, a rivulet in Charlevoix co., Que., falling into the St. Lawrence.

GROSSE ISLE, a settlement and Government quarantine station on the St. Lawrence River, 30 miles below Quebec City, in Montmagny co., Que. The nearest station is Montmagny, on the I.C.R., 7 miles west of Cap St. Ignace. It has 2 churches (R.C. and Epis.), besides telegraph office. Pop., 165.

GROSSE ISLE, one of the Kamouraska Islands, on the south shore of the St. Lawrence, Que.

GROSSE ISLE, an islet in Lake St. John, Chicoutimi co., Que.

GROSSE ISLE, a station in Selkirk co., Man., on the Oak Point (Lake Manitoba) section of the Canadian Northern RR., 26 miles north west of Winnipeg.

GROSSE ROCHES, a rivulet in Saguenay co., Que., runs from the north-east and joins the Saguenay near Bay St. Etienne, 14 miles from Tadoussac.

GROSSES COQUES, a post settlement in Digby co., N.S., on St. Mary's Bay, 4 miles from Belliveau Station, on the Dominion Atlantic Ry., 4 miles from Weymouth. It contains 3 stores and 3 saw mills. Pop. (1901), 647.

GROSSES ROCHES, a post village in Rimouski co., Que., 40 miles from Little Metis, on the I.C.R., 27 miles east of Rimouski.

GROSS POINT, a settlement in Victoria co., N.S., on the south side of Boularderie Island, 26 miles from Sydney, on the I.C.R. and S. & L. Ry. Pop., about 100.

GROSVENOR, a post office in Guysboro co., N.S., 2 miles from Linwood on the I.C.R., 14 miles from Port Mulgrave, on the Strait of Canso.

GROVE CREEK, in Pontiac co., Que.

GROVE PARK, a post and farming settlement in East Assa., Prov. of Sask., on the Qu'Appelle River, 10 miles from Sinaluta, on the C.P.R. It has a school.

GROVE, THE, a post office in Middlesex co., Ont. See The Grove.

GROVES, a settlement in Halifax co., N.S., 3 miles from Windsor Jct., on the I.C.R. and Dominion Atlantic Ry.

GROVESEND, a post hamlet in Elgin co., Ont., near Lake Erie, and 9 miles from Aylmer, on the G.T.R. It contains a Methodist church.

GROVES POINT, a post and farming settlement in Cape Breton co., N.S., on Little Bras d'Or Lake, 2 miles from George's River Station, on the I.C.R., 6 miles from the towns of North Sydney and Sydney Mines. It contains 1 Presbyterian church, a school and 1 saw mill. Pop., 150.

GROVETON, a settlement in Grenville co., Ont., 3 miles from Spencerville, on C.P.R. It contains 1 Methodist church.

GRUBER, a post hamlet in Marquette co., Man., on Mossy River, and a station on the Sifton Jct. and Winnipegosis branch of the Can. Northern RR., 19 miles north-east of Sif-

ton Jct. (18 miles north of Dauphin, on Dauphin Lake), and 2 miles south of Winnipegosis, on the lake of the same name. It has 1 general store. Pop., about 25.

GRUMBLE ROAD, a station on the Kent Northern Ry., in Kent co., N.B.

GRUND, a post village in Souris co., Man., 7 miles from Glenboro, on the C.P.R., and 6 miles from Baldur, on the C.N.R., 1½ miles east from Grund is an Icelandic Lutheran church, and 2½ miles north-west of Grund is a Methodist church.

GRUNTHAL, a post village in Provencher co., Man., on the Rat Creek, 12 miles from Otterburne Station, on the C.P.R. (Emerson branch), 30 miles south-east of Winnipeg. It has 1 church (Mennonite), and 1 general store. Pop.,

GUARDS LAKE, in Colchester co., N.S., well stocked with fish.

GUAY, a post office in Levis co., Que., ¼ mile from Levis, on the I.C.R.

GUEGUEN, a post settlement on Northumberland Strait and the Cocagne River, in Kent co., N.B., 3 miles from Notre Dame Station, on the Buctouche & Moncton RR. It has 1 church, 3 stores, 3 hotels, 3 saw mills, besides a telegraph office. Pop., about 1,000.

GUELPH, a flourishing city, the chef-lieu of Wellington co., Ont., on the Speed River, on the C.P.R., and on the G.T.R., 48½ miles from Toronto. It is built upon a number of hills, which give it a picturesque appearance, while a fall of 30 feet in the river affords excellent water-power. The city is built almost entirely of limestone quarried in the vicinity. It contains 12 fine churches, 15 hotels, 2 printing and newspaper offices, the Ontario Agricultural College, good schools, 3 implement, 1 organ, 1 sewing machine, 1 novelty, 2 woollen, 4 carpet, 1 curtain and upholstery, and several other factories, 6 banks (Dominion, Montreal, Traders, Commerce, Metropolitan and Royal), and 1 flour, split pea, and oatmeal mill, with express, telegraph and telephone offices. Pop. (1901), 11,496.

GUELPH JCT., a station of the G.T.R., in Wellington co., Ont., at the junction of the Toronto and Sarnia branch of the G.T.R. with the Harrisburg and Southampton branch, 1 mile east of Guelph.

GUELPH JCT., a station on the C.P.R., in Halton co., Ont., at the junction of the main line (Montreal & Detroit), with the Guelph branch, 15 miles from Guelph.

GUERIN, a post office in Peterboro co., Ont. See Indian River.

GUERRE, RIVIERE A LA, rises in the township of Godmanchester, Huntingdon co., Que., and running north-west falls into Lake St. Francis.

GUIGUES, a post office in Pontiac co., Que., near Ville Marie, on the route of the Lake Temiscamingue steamers.

GUILDS, a post settlement in Kent co., Ont., 5 miles from Blenheim, on the Pere Marquette Ry. It contains 1 Methodist church and 2 stores. Pop., between 90 and 100.

GUIMOND, a post office in Kent co., N.B., near the St. Louis River, 12 miles from Richbucot, a station on the Kent Northern & St. Louis RR., and a port on Northumberland Strait.

GULCH, a settlement in the dist. of Placentia and St. Mary's, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 22.

GULF (or **STRAIT**) OF **GEORGIA**, an inlet of British Columbia, separating Vancouver Island from the mainland, in lat. 49° N., lon. 124° W. Average breadth 20 miles. It communicates with the Pacific on the north by Queen Charlotte Sound, and on the south-east by the Strait of Juan de Fuca.

GULF OF ST. LAWRENCE, a large inlet of the Atlantic Ocean, between lat. 46° and 50° N., and lon. 58° and 63° W., bounded by the provinces of Quebec, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and the colony of Newfoundland. It communicates on the east with the Ocean by three passages, the northernmost being the strait of Belle Isle, and the southernmost the Gut of Canso. Average length and breadth, 230 miles each. On its west side are the bays of Chaleur and Miramichi, and the estuary of the St. Lawrence River. It contains Anticosti, Prince Edward, the Magdalen, and many other islands.

GULF SHORE, a post office in Cumberland co., N.S., 4 miles from Pugwash, a station on the I.C.R. (Pugwash branch), 4 miles from Pugwash Jet.

Its fisheries are very important.

GULL COVE, a post village in Cape Breton co., N.S., on the sea coast, 2 miles from Gabarus and 30 miles from Sydney, on the G.T.R. It contains 1 Methodist church, 1 store and 1 lobster cannery. Pop., 100.

GULL COVE, a small fishing settlement in the dist. of Placentia and St. Mary's, on the west side of St. Mary's Bay, Nfld., 18 miles from St. Mary's. Pop. (1901), 22.

GULL CREEK, a post settlement in Addington co., Ont., 8½ miles from Tamworth, on the Bay of Quinté Ry. Pop., 50.

GULL EGG RIVER, Man., rises in the extreme north of Macdonald co., and flows in an easterly direction into Lake Winnipeg.

GULLIES, a farming settlement in the dist. of Port-de-Grave, Nfld., 3 miles from Brigus. Pop. (1901), 218.

GULL ISLAND, a fishing settlement in the district of Bay-de-Verde, Nfld., on the north shore of Conception Bay, 22 miles from Carbonear. Pop. (1901), 241.

GULL ISLAND, a settlement in the dist. of Twillingate, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 10.

GULL ISLAND COVE, a settlement in the dist. of Twillingate, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 14.

GULL LAKE, a post settlement in the Prov. of Saskatchewan (formerly Assa. West, N.W.T.), a station on the main line of the C.P.R., 35 miles west of Swift Current. It has telegraph and express offices. Pop., 50.

GULL LAKE, a small lake in Haliburton co., Ont., in which salmon-trout are found.

GULL MARSH, a settlement in the dist. of St. Barbe, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 22.

GULL RIVER, a small river of Victoria co., Ont., abounding with bass and maskinonge.

GULLY, a post office in Strathcona dist., Prov. of Saskatchewan, near the Big Gully Lakes, 3 miles from Marshall, a station on the Can. Northern R.R. (Edmonton div.), 12 miles southeast of Lloydminster, and 73 miles northwest of North Battleford.

GULLY LAKE, a small lake in Colchester co., N.S., ¾ mile long by ¼ mile wide. It contains trout.

GUNISAO RIVER, in Keewatin dist., N.W.T.,

north of the Prov. of Manitoba. It falls into the east side of Lake Winnipeg, south of Norway House.

GUNNING COVE, a post village in Shelburne co., N.S., on the west side of Shelburne Harbor, and 10 miles from Shelburne, on the Halifax and Southwestern Ry.

GUNNVIEW, Selkirk co., Man. See Gunter.

GUNTER, a post village in Hastings co., Ont., 6 miles from Gilmour on the Central Ont., Ry. It contains 2 churches (Methodist and Free Methodist), 1 store, 1 hotel, 1 saw and shingle mill, and 1 cheese factory.

GUNTON, a post office in Selkirk co., Man. and a station on the Teulon branch of the C.P.R., 35 miles from Winnipeg, 4 miles from Teulon.

GURNEYS, a settlement in Kings co., N.B., 3 miles from Norton, at the junction of the New Brunswick Coal and Railway Co's. line with the I.C.R.

GUSSET'S COVE, a settlement in the dist. of Bay-de-Verde, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 31.

GUTEIUS, a flag station with railway siding on the Slocan branch of the C.P.R., and on the Slocan River, a tributary of the Kootenay River, in Kootenay dist., B.C. Besides the local post office there is a large fruit ranch, together with a general store and a saw mill in the neighborhood. The place is hilly, with occasional flat lands in the valleys good for farming and ranching. Pop., 60.

GUTHRIE, a post village in Simcoe co., Ont., 3 miles from Oro, on the G.T.R., 7 miles from Hawkstone and 10 miles from Barrie. It contains 1 Presbyterian church, 1 store, and 1 saw mill, a carriage shop and public hall.

GUTHRIE, a post office in Missisquoi co., Que., 4½ miles from Stanbridge East on the Lehighsburg branch of the C.V.R.

GUT OF CANSO. See Canso, Gut of.

GUYSBORO, a beautifully situated post town in Guysborough co., N.S., at the head of Chedabucto Bay, 19 miles from Tracadie station, on the I.C.R. It contains 4 churches (Methodist, Roman Catholic, Baptist and Episcopalian), 10 stores, 1 hotel, 1 bank, 2 mills, and telegraph and express offices. Pop., 800.

GUYSBOROUGH, a post village in Norfolk co., Ont., 6 miles from the stations on the G.T.R. of Courtland and Tillsonburg. It has 1 Methodist church, 1 store and 1 saw mill. Pop., 300.

GUYSBOROUGH, a county in the north-eastern part of Nova Scotia, extends from the east end of Halifax co. to the Strait of Canso, and is bounded on the south by the Atlantic Ocean. Area, 1,059,840 acres. Along the coast the land is rocky and barren, but in the interior there is some excellent tillaged land. Gold mining is successfully prosecuted at several places in this county. The fisheries are also a great source of wealth to its inhabitants. Pop. of co. (1901), 18,320.

GUYSBOROUGH INTERVALE, a post settlement in Guysboro co., N.S., at the head of Guysboro Harbor, 14 miles from Afton and 16 miles from Heatherton, on the I.C.R., 12 miles from Antigonish. It contains 3 churches (Methodist, Anglican and Roman Catholic), 1 store, 1 fulling, 2 board and 2 shingle mills. Pop., about 800.

GWYNNE, a post office and station on the Wetaskiwin branch of the C.P.R. (Calgary &

Edmonton div.), in the Prov. of Alberta, 9 miles east of Wetaskiwin (152 miles north of Calgary), and 42 miles west of Daysland, the present terminus of the branch line.

GYP SUM MINES, a post settlement in Haldimand co., Ont., on the Grand River, 4 miles from Cayuga Station, on the G.T.R., 7 miles from Canfield Jct. It contains 2 churches (Methodist and Baptist), 1 store and 1 gypsum mill. Pop., about 75.

GYP SUM VILLE, a post settlement in Dauphin co., Man., reached by steambot from Westbourne Landing, a station on the C.P.R. (North-Western branch), 17 miles north-west of Portage la Prairie, at the foot of Lake Manitoba. The region is owned by the Manitoba Gypsum Co., where their industry is prosecuted, with the aid of a private railway from mill to mines, 12 miles in operation. The nearest railway station is Oak Point, on the Can. Northern R.R., north-west of Winnipeg, in Macdonald co. It has 1 Episcopal church, 1 general store, 1 hard wall plaster, wood fibre, mill and factory. Pop., 150.

HA! HA! BAY, a settlement in the dist. of St. Barbe, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 41.

HA! HA! BAY, Chicoutimi co., Que., on the Saguenay line of the R. & O. Navigation Co. See Grand Bale.

HABERMEHL, a country post office in Grey co., Ont., 4 miles from Elmwood, on the G.T.R.

HABITANT RIVER, of Kings co., N.S., enters the Bay of Fundy at Canning. It is frequented by large sea trout.

HACKETT'S COVE, a fishing harbour and post office in Halifax co., N.S., 23 miles from St. Margaret's Bay, on the Halifax and South-Western Ry. It contains an Anglican church, 4 stores and 1 flour mill. Pop., 250.

HADDO, a post office in Dundas co., Ont., 5 miles from Iroquois, on the G.T.R.

HADLINGTON, a post settlement in Peterborough co., Ont., 10 miles from Goderham, on the Irondale, Bancroft & Ottawa Ry. It contains 1 store, 1 saw mill, and has a weekly mail.

HADLOW COVE, a post settlement in Levis co., Que., on the St. Lawrence and a station on the I.C.R. and Quebec Central Ry., 2 miles from Levis. It contains 2 stores, saw and planing mills and telegraph office. It forms part of the town of Levis, and also part of St. David de l'Aube Riviere. Pop., about 400.

HAGAN, a post office in Nanaimo dist., on Vancouver Island, B.C., via Victoria.

HAGAR, a station in Nipissing dist., Ont., on the C.P.R., 31 miles east of Sudbury.

HAGARMAN'S CORNERS, a post village in York co., Ont., 1½ miles from Unionville, on the G.T.R., 20 miles east of Toronto. Pop., under 200.

HAGENSBORG, a post settlement in Burrard dist., B.C., on the Bella Coola River, 400 miles from Vancouver. It contains a Lutheran church, 2 stores, and 2 saw mills. At the mouth of the river lies an Indian Reserve, containing 4 stores and a salmon cannery. Pop. of Hagensborg 100—of Indians 200.

HAGERSVILLE, a post town in Haldimand co., Ont., on G.T.R. and Michigan Central Ry., 25 miles from Hamilton. It contains Episcopal, Methodist, Presbyterian, and Baptist churches, 1 telephone and 2 telegraph and express offices, 1 chartered and 1 private bank, 2 grist mills,

1 saw mill, 3 hotels, 23 stores, and a printing office issuing a weekly newspaper. Pop. 1,300.

HAGUE, a post village in the Prov. of Saskatchewan, and a station on the Regina branch of the C.N.R., 29 miles north of Saskatoon and 23 miles south of Duck Lake.

HAIL BAY, on Commissioners Lake, south-west of Lake St. John, Chicoutimi co., Que.

HAILEYBURY, a post settlement in Nipissing dist., Ont., on Lake Temiscaming, 103 miles north of North Bay, on the Temiscaming and Northern Ontario Ry. It contains 3 churches, 10 stores, a saw mill, 3 bank agencies, printing office issuing weekly newspaper. This is rapidly becoming a great mining centre. Pop., 600.

HAINSVILLE, a village in Digby co., N.S., 10 miles from Digby, on the Dom. Atlantic R.R. Pop. 175.

HAINSVILLE, a post settlement in Dundas co., Ont., 7 miles from Iroquois, on the G.T.R. It contains 1 Methodist church, 1 store, Pop. 65.

HAINSVILLE, a flag station on the C.P.R., in York co., N.B., 39 miles from Fredericton, and 26 miles east of Woodstock. It is a busy lumbering centre.

HAIR CUTTING LAKE, an enlargement of a river of the same name, in Northern Quebec, 178 miles north of Montreal. It is about 7 miles in length and from 2 chains to 2 miles in breadth. Along the shores iron sands like those of the Lower St. Lawrence are met with.

HAIR CUTTING RIVER, of Quebec, takes its rise in Great Beaver Lake, near the height of land between the head waters of the St. Maurice and those of the Gatineau, 189 miles north of Montreal, and falls into a tributary of the St. Maurice, Que.

HAIRY LAKE, one of a small group of lakes in Selkirk co., Man., near Lake Winnipeg (on the West shore).

HALBRITE, a post settlement in Qu'Appelle dist., Prov. of Sask., and a station on the C. F.R. (Portal section). It contains 3 stores, 1 hotel, a bank, and telegraph and express office. Pop. 200.

HALBSTADT, a post office in Lisgar co., Man., 8 miles from Emerson, a station in Provencher co., on C.P.R., and the Can. Northern R.R., 67 miles south of Winnipeg.

HALCOMB, a post office in Northumberland co., N.B., near Newcastle, on the I.C.R.

HALCRO, a post settlement in Saskatchewan Prov., beautifully situated on the south branch of the Saskatchewan, 15 miles from Prince Albert on the C.N.R. It contains Anglican and Presbyterian churches, and 1 store. Some of the best horses and cattle are reared in the territory; grain and vegetables are also largely grown here. Pop., about 800.

HALCYON HOT SPRINGS, a post settlement and sanitarium in Yale and Cariboo dist., B.C., on the Columbia River, adjoining Arrow Lake, and on the C.P.R., 13 miles from Arrowhead station, 23 miles south of Revelstoke. Besides the sanitarium (Hot Springs), there is 1 general store and telegraph and express offices. Pop., under 50.

HALCYONIA, a post settlement on the North Saskatchewan River, in the Prov. of Saskatchewan, 5 miles from Borden station on the Can. Northern R.R., 51 miles south east of North Battleford. It has 1 store and school; in the latter the Baptists hold their Sunday
