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
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
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

ECLIPSES DURING 1926

(F. L. BLAKE)

In the year 1926 there will be two eclipses, both of the Sun.

I.—A Total Eclipse of the Sun, January 14th, 1926 invisible at Toronto and the whole of America. The path of the Total Eclipse traverses in a curve from the central portion of Africa south easterly across the Indian Ocean to latitude 10°S., and longitude 80°E. almost directly south of the southerly point of India, thence north easterly across Sumatra and Borneo to a point in latitude 14°28′ and longitude 14°58′E. in the Pacific Ocean.

II.—An Annular Eclipse of the Sun, July 9-10, 1926, invisible at Toronto and all Canada except the extreme western portion bordering on the Pacific Ocean. The path of the Annular eclipse traverses the Pacific Ocean in a bowed curve north of the equator from a point in latitude 4° 12′ N. and longitude 132° 4′ E. to latitude 1° 47′ N., longitude 103° 29′ W. The whole path lies over the ocean touching a few small islands in its most northerly point in latitude 25° 20′ N. and longitude 170° W.

STAR TABLE

From the times of the upper transit of the Pole Star may be derived, with the aid of the following Table, the approximate times of the culmination, and of the rising and setting of the principal fixed stars, as seen from the parallel of 45° north latitude.

To ascertain when any star found in the following Table will be on the meridian, add the number in the left-hand column of figures to the meridian transit of the pole star given in the calendar, and from the result subtract the constant quantity 1h. 34m.

To find the time of rising of the star, subtract the number opposite to it in the right-hand column of figures from the time of its meridian passage. For the setting, add the same number to the time of its meridian passage. Those stars marked (....) revolve in a circle of perpetual apparition, and do not rise or

set at places in and to the north of latitude 45°.

EXPLANATION OF THE ARTICLES IN THE CALENDAR (See Pages 18 to 29)

Standard times* are given in all columns headed Toronto, Quebec and Winnipeg.

The times* of the SUN'S RISING AND SETTING† are given for the upper limb, and are corrected for refraction for Toronto, Quebec and Winnipeg.

The standard times* both for the rising and setting of the Moon's centre are given for every day for Toronto, Quebec and Winnipeg.

The column, Sun on Meridian, gives the time that a watch keeping local mean time should show when the

shadow of a sun dial is on the noon mark in Longitude 5 h. 8m. W (77°0').

Moon's Age.—This column shows to the nearest tenth of a day the Moon's Age at mean noon in longitude 5 h. 8 m. (77°0')W.

The column, UPPER TRANSIT OF POLE STAR, shows for every day the mean time* at which the Pole Star makes its upper transit across the meridian of longitude 5h. 8m. W. It passes the meridian on October 16th, twice.

The time at which the lower transit of the Pole Star occurs may be found by adding 11h. 58m. 2s. to the time

The time at which the lower transit of the Pole Star occurs may be found by adding 11h. 58m. 2s. to the time of the preceding upper transit.

The column, SIDEREAL TIME SUN ON MERIDIAN, shows for every day the Sidereal Time when the Sun's centre is on the meridian of longitude 5h. 8m. W. (77°). For any other meridian, interpolation of these quantities is necessary. For example, October 10th, 1926, what would be the Sidereal Time when the Sun's centre is on the 81st meridian west longitude. Here the difference in longitude is 4°. The tabulated Sidereal Time on the 10th is 13h. 1m. 17s., and on the 11th, 13h. 4m. 58s., giving an increase of 221 seconds which, multiplied by 4 and divided by 360° gives a correction of 2.5 secs. to be added to 13h. 1m. 17s.

MOON'S PHASES—This Table gives times (75th meridian)* when the Moon passes the geocentric longitudes of 0°, 90°, 180° and 270° east of the sun. It gives also the times of her greatest and least distance from the earth.

GREATEST ELONGATION OF THE POLE (See Pages 32 and 33)

These Tables give the semi-diameter of the Sun, Polar Distance, Declination and greatest elongation of Polaris for latitudes 42° to 65° inclusive for every 10th day of the year 1926.

From the time of the upper transit of the Pole Star may be found approximately the time of its greatest

Western or Eastern elongations, by adding or subtracting the Constants given in the annexed Table.

THE STELLAR UNIVERSE

Being a short account of some of the magnificent Research work done by Dr. Shapley and other Astronomers on the extent and structure of our Stellar Universe. (F. L. B.)

Twenty years ago, the distances of only a comparatively small number of stars were known with any approach to accuracy. In Newcomb's list of stellar parallaxes in 1901, only fifty-eight were set down as

reasonably reliable.

In 1915 it was estimated that the distances of 200 stars could be pronounced as tolerably accurate. Since then many hundreds of parallaxes have been measured, about 1400 by the trigonometrical method

In 1916 Dr. Adams outlined the spectroscopic ethod. Adams in conjunction with Dr. Köhlmethod. Adams in conjunction with Dr. Köhlschutter, for some years an assistant at Mount Wilson detected a relationship between the brightness of stars and the intensities of certain lines in their spectra. Thus the absolute magnitude of a star may be determined and its distance deduced. In five years 2000 stellar parallaxes have been determined at Mt. Wilson by this beautiful process, which has been applied by the 100-inch reflector to stars as

faint as the seventh magnitude

The wonderful work of Dr. Shapley at the Mount Wilson Observatory on star-clusters and the structure of the Stellar Universe based upon the colours and magnitudes in stellar clusters has given us a more vastly extended knowledge of its almost inconmore vastly extended knowledge of its almost inconceivable extent in the depths of space. He first of all attacked the globular clusters lying outside of the Galaxy; next, the open clusters of the Milky Way. His first estimate of the distance of the Hercules cluster—100,000 light-years—came upon the scientific world with a shock of surprise. Later and more reliable measures resulted in a value—36,000 light-years—even this flavor was impressive enterially as years-even this figure was impressive, especially as

the Hercules cluster turned out to be one of the nearest. By 1919 Dr. Shapley had succeeded in measuring the distances of 86 of these globular clusters, which turned out to be, not independant stellar ters, which turned out to be, not independant stellar universes, but certainly dependant sub-systems or in a certain sense, "island universes." The nearest, Omega Centauri, is 20,000 light-years away; the most distant, N.G.C. 7006, 220,000 light-years. In April 1917 he detected blue stars in the open cluster Messier II, obviously giants in luminosity, whose minimum distance turned out to be 15,000 light-years. This interstellar distance is actually greater than the older estimates of the dismeter.

light-years. This interstellar distance is actually greater than the older estimates of the diameter

of the Universe.

The stellar universe is not a system, but a system of systems, or a cluster of clusters, the centre of gravity of this stellar universe is estimated to be in the Constellation Sagittarius among the dense star-

clouds of that region, 60,000 light-years from the Sun.

"The phenomenon of the Milky Way is largely an optical one. Although the existence of local and very extensive condensations of Milky Way stars is not denied, the conception of a narrow encircling ring is abandoned." "A thin central stratum of the galactic segment contains every star that has been seen or has been photographed for our catalogues. This stratum of stars apparently deviates less than 2,000 light-years from the galactic plane." In other words, the Sidereal Universe is a flattened disc, about 4,000 light-years in thickness and about 300,000 in diameter, while grouped around it are the dependant sub-systems, the globular clusters. "The galactic system is more than a hundred thousand times as large as we formerly believed it to be".

1926 MORNING AND EVENING STARS

MERCURY—Will be at its greatest elongation East 18° 23′ on March 14th, July 10th 26° 22′ and November 4th 23° 22′, when it may be seen a little before or soon after sunset in the western sky about those dates. At its greatest western elongations April 28th 27° 4′, August 25th 18° 20′, and December 13th 21° 13′, when it may be seen in the morning before sunrise in the eastern 'sky about those dates. Will be morning star to Feb. 15, evening star to March 31, morning star to Sept 19, evening star to Aug. 7, morning star to Sept 19, evening star to Nov. 25th then morning star rest of the year.

VENUS—Evening star to February 7th; morning star to November 21st then evening star rest of the year. At greatest western elongation 46° 16′ on April 18th. At its greatest brilliancy January 2 and again March 14th. Stellar magnitude—4.2.

MARS—Nearest the earth on October 27th, morning star to November 4th, then evening star rest of

the year. When nearest the earth its light time to reach us will be 3 m. 48.6 secs., light travels 186324 miles in a second of time. Its stellar magnitude being —2.1 on 27th October.

JUPITER—Evening star to January 25th, morning star to August 15th, then evening star rest of year. On April 23rd Mars and Jupiter will be in conjunction, Jupiter being 0° 51′ north. At its nearest to the earth about August 14th its light time is 33 min. 29 secs. and stellar magnitude—2.4. The Satellites or moons of Jupiter from the beginning of the year to February 18, by reason of the proximity of the Sun to the planet are not visible.

SATURN—Morning star to May 14, evening star to November 21st, then morning star rest of year. Venus and Saturn in conjunction November 21st, Venus to the south, both planets being in conjunction also with the sun on the same day.

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The correction for an increase of altitude of one inch in the barometer or for a decrease of one degree in the thermometer, is to be added to the tabular refraction, but when the barometer is lower than 30 inches, or the thermometer higher than 47°, the corrections become subtractive. When great accuracy is required, 0.003 inch should be deducted from the observed height of the barometer for each degree that the thermometer near it is above 50°, and the same quantity added for an equal decrease.



THE INCOME WAR TAX ACT

WITH AMENDMENTS OF 1918, 1919, 1920, 1921, 1922, 1923, 1924 AND 1925

The following is a summary of some of the more important provisions of the Act. The summary is not official and, in case of doubt, persons interested are recommended to write to the Commissioner of Taxation, Ottawa:—

INCOME

Section 3 defines income as follows:

- (1) For the purposes of this Act, "income" means the annual net profit or gain or gratuity, whether ascertained and capable of computation as being wages, salary, or other fixed amount, or unascertained as being fees or emoluments, or as being profits from a trade or commercial or financial or other business or calling, directly or indirectly received by a person from any office or employment, or from any profession or calling, or from any trade, manufacture or business, as the case may be, whether derived from sources within case may be, whether derived from sources within Canada or elsewhere; and shall include the interest, dividends or profits directly or indirectly received from money at interest upon any security or interest. ceived from money at interest upon any security or without security, or from stocks, or from any other investment, and, whether such gains or profits are divided or distributed or not, and also the annual profit or gain from any other source; including the income from but not the value of property acquired by gift, bequest, devise or descent; and including the income from but not the proceeds of life insurance policies paid upon the death of the person insured, or payments made or credited to the insured on life insurance endowment or annuity contracts upon the maturity of the term mentioned in the contract or upon the surrender of the contract; and including salaries, etc., of members of the Senate, House of Commons, judges, civil servants, etc., with the following exemptions and deductions:

 (a) Such reasonable amount as the Minister
 - (a) Such reasonable amount as the Minister in his discretion, may allow for depreciation, and the Minister in determining the income derived from mining and from oil and gas wells and timber limits shall make such an allowance for the exhaustion of the mines, wells and timber limits as he may deem just and fair:
 - (b) For the purposes of the normal tax only, five hundred dollars for each child under eighteen years of age who is dependent upon the taxpayer for support;
 - (c) Dividends received by or credited to share-holders of a corporation which is liable to taxation under the provisions of this Act shall not be liable to the normal tax in the hands of the shareholders, but shall be liable to the supertax and surtax provisions of this Act or any amendment thereto. The amount of the exemption from the normal tax to the shareholder shall not exceed the net amount of such dividends after the deduction of the interest or carrying charges, if any, in respect of such dividends. spect of such dividends;
 - (d) In determining the income no deduction shall be allowed in respect of personal and living expenses, and in cases in which personal and living expenses form part of the profit, gain or remuneration of the taxpayer, the same shall be assessed as income for the purposes of this Act;
 - for the purposes of this Act;

 (e) In any case the income of a taxpayer shall be deemed to be not less than the income derived from his chief position, occupation, trade, business or calling, and for the purpose of this Act the Minister shall have full power to determine the chief position, occupation, trade, business or calling of the taxpayer. Where a taxpayer has income from more than one source by virtue of filling or exercising more than one position, occupation, trade, business or calling, then the Minister shall have full power to determine

- which one or more, or which combination thereof shall, for the purpose of this Act, constitute the taxpayer's chief position, oc-cupation, trade, business or calling, and the income therefrom shall be taxed accordingly and the determination of the Minister exercised pursuant herctoshall be final and conclusive.
- (f) Travelling expenses (including the entire amount expended for meals and lodging) while away from home in the pursuit of a trade or business.
- trade or business.

 (2) (a) Where any corporation carrying on business in Canada purchases any commodity from a parent, subsidiary or associated corporation at a price in excess of the fair market price, or where it sells any commodity to such a corporation at a price less than the fair market price, the Minister may, for the purpose of determining the income of such corporation, determine the fair price at which such purchase or sale shall be taken into the accounts of such corporation. tion.
- (b) Where a non-resident person in whole or in part produces, grows, mines, creates, manufactures, fabricates, improves, packs, preserves or constructs anything within Canada and exports the same without sale prior to the export thereof, he shall be deemed to be carrying on business in Canada and to earn within Canada an a proportionate part of any profit ultimately derived from the sale thereof outside of Canada. The Minister shall have full discretion as to the manner of determining such proportionate part.

NON-RESIDENTS

- (3) (a) In the case of the income of persons residing or having their head office or principal place of business outside of Canada but carrying on business in Canada, either directly or through or in the name of any other person, the income shall be the net profit or gain arising from the business of such person in Canada.
- (b) Any non-resident person soliciting orders or offering anything for sale in Canada through or offering anything for sale in Canada through an agent or employee, and whether any contract or transaction which may result therefrom is completed within Canada or without Canada, or partly within and partly without Canada, or any non-resident person who lets or leases anything used in Canada, or who receives a royalty or other similar payment for anything used or sold in Canada, shall be deemed to be carrying on business in Canada and to earn a proportionate part of the income derived therefrom in Canada. The Minister shall have full discretion as to the manner of determining such proportionate part.

PROFITS AND DIVIDENDS

- (4) The share of a taxpayer in the undivided or undistributed gains and profits of a corporation shall not be deemed to be taxable income of the taxpayer, unless the Minister is of opinion that the accumulation of such undivided and undistributed gains and modificial reads for the contributed gains and profits in reads for the contributed gains are selected as the contributed gains and profits in the undivided of a corporation shall not be deemed to be taxable income of the taxpayer. tributed gains and profits is made for the purpose of evading the tax, and is in excess of what is reasonably required for the purposes of the business.
- (5) Dividends declared or shareholders' bonuses voted after the thirty-first day of December, 1920, shall be taxable income of the taxpayer in the year in which they are paid or distributed.
- (6) The income, for any taxation period, of a beneficiary of any estate or trust of whatsoever nature, shall be deemed to include all income accruing to the credit of the taxpayer whether received by him or not during such taxation period. Income accumulating in trust for the benefit of unascertained persons, or of persons with contingent interests shall be taxable in the

hands of the trustees or other like persons acting in a fiduciary capacity, as if such income were the income of an unmarried person.

- (7) Any part of the remuneration of a taxpayer retained by his employer in connection with an employee's superannuation or pension fund or plan shall be allowed as an exemption or deduction from the income of the taxpayer for income tax purposes, and any payment to an employee out of such fund or plan shall be included as taxable income of the employee.
- (8) In computing the amount of the profits or gains to be assessed, a deduction shall not be allowed in respect of-
 - (a) disbursements or expenses not wholly, exclusively and necessarily laid out or ex-pended for the purpose of earning the income, or
 - (b) any outlay, loss or replacement of capital or any payment on account of capital or any depreciation, depletion or obsolescence, except as otherwise provided in this Act.
 - (c) The annual value of property, real or personal, except rent actually paid for the use of such property, used in connection with the business to earn the income subject to taxation;
 - (d) Amounts transferred or credited to a reserve, a contingent account or sinking fund, except such an amount for bad debts as the Minister may allow and except as otherwise provided in this Act.
- (9) On the winding up, discontinuance or re-organization of the business of any incorporated company the distribution in any form of the property of the company shall be deemed to be the payment of a dividend to the extent that the company has on hand undistributed income.

RATE OF TAXATION

Section 4 establishes the rate of taxation as follows:

- (1) There shall be assessed, levied and paid upon the income during the preceding year of every person,-
 - (i) residing or ordinarily resident in Canada or.
 - (ii) who remains in Canada during any calendar year for a period or periods equal to one hundred and eighty-three days; or,
 - (iii) who is employed in Canada; or,
 - (iv) who, not being a resident of Canada, carrying on business in Canada; or,
 - (v) who, not being a resident of Canada, derives income for services rendered in Canada, to any person resident or carrying on business in Canada, but only upon that portion of the income so earned by such non-resident, except Corporations and Joint Stock Companies, the following taxes:
 - "(a) Four per centum upon all income exceeding two thousand dollars but not exceeding six thousand dollars in the case of a married person, or any other person who has dependent upon him any of the following persons:

(i) A parent or grandparent; (ii) A daughter or sister; (iii) A son or brother under twentyone years of age or incapable of selfsupport on account of mental or physical infirmity;

and four per centum upon all income exceeding one thousand dollars but not exceeding six thousand dollars in the case of all other persons;

And in all cases eight per centum upon all income exceeding six thousand dollars; And in addition thereto the following surtax:

SURTAX

(b) One per centum upon the amount by which the income exceeds \$5,000 and does not exceed \$6,000;

Two per centum upon the amount by which the income exceeds \$6,000 and does not exceed \$8,000; and an additional 1 per cent. for each succeeding \$2,000 of income up to \$100,000.

From \$100,000 upwards the following surtax rates apply.

Fifty-two per centum upon the amount by which the income exceeds \$100,000 and does not exceed \$150,000;

Fifty-six per centum upon the amount by which the income exceeds \$150,000 and does not exceed \$200,000;

Sixty per centum upon the amount by which the income exceeds \$200,000 and does not exceed \$300,000;

Sixty-three per centum upon the amount by which the income exceeds \$300,000 and does not exceed \$500,000;

Sixty-four per centum upon the amount by which the caccome exceeds \$500,000 and does not exceed \$1,000,000;

Sixty-five per centum upon the amount by which the income exceeds \$1,000,000.

CORPORATIONS AND COMPANIES

(2) Corporations and joint stock companies, no matter how created or organized, shall pay ten per centum upon income exceeding two thousand dollars. Any corporation or joint stock company the fiscal year of which is not the calendar year, shall make a return and have the tax payable by it computed upon its income for its fiscal year ending within the calendar year for which the return is being made.

FIVE PER CENT. ADDITION

(2a) The several taxes and surtaxes prescribed by subsections one and two of this section are hereby increased by the addition of five per centum of the amount of each of the said taxes and surtaxes payable with respect to any taxable income of \$5,000 or more for the calendar year 1919, or any taxable income of \$5,000 or more for accounting periods ending in the year 1919, as the case may be, and for each calendar year or accounting period thereafter.

PARTNERSHIPS

- (3) (a) Where two or more persons are carrying on business in partnership the partnership as such shall not be liable to taxation but the shares of the partners in the income of the partnership, whether withdrawn or not during the taxation year shall, in addition to all other income, be income of the partners and taxed accordingly.
- (b) A member of a partnership or the proprietor of a business whose fiscal period or periods is other than the calendar year shall make a return of his income and have the tax payable computed upon the income from the business for the fiscal period or periods ending within the calendar year for which the return is being made, but his return of income derived from sources other than his business shall be made for the calendar year. made for the calendar year.

(c) Where a husband and wife are partners in any business the total income from the business may in the discretion of the Minister be treated as income of the husband or the wife and taxed accordingly.

(d) Where a husband derives income as an employee of his wife or vice versa any remuneration paid to the husband or wife shall not be chargeable as an expense of the business in determining the net profit thereof.

(e) Where the husband of a partner in any business receives any salary or other remuneration therefrom, then the portion of the remuneration paid that bears a similar proportion to the interest of the wife in the partnership business shall be added to the income of the wife and taxed accordingly, or vice versa if a wife is employed by a partnership of which her husband is a member. is a member.

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TRANSFER OF PROPERTY

(4) A person, who, after the first day of August, 1917, has reduced his income by the transfer or assignment of any real or personal, movable or immovable property, to such person's wife or husband, as the case may be, or to any member of the family of such person, shall, nevertheless, be liable to be taxed as if such transfer or assignment had not been made, unless the Minister is satisfied that such transfer or assignment was not satisfied that such transfer or assignment was not made for the purpose of evading the taxes imposed under this Act or any part thereof.

DEDUCTIONS ALLOWED

- (5) Taxpayers shall be entitled to the following deductions from the amount that would otherwise be payable by them for taxes under the provisions of this Act:
 - (a) The amount paid by such taxpayer for corresponding accounting periods under the provisions of Part I of The Special War Revenue Act, 1915, and any amendments thereto, or The Business Profits War Tax Act, 1916, and any amendments thereto: Provided, that in computing the taxable income hereunder the taxpayer shall not include any taxes paid under the said Acts in the expenses of his business, and the Minister shall have power to determine any questions that may arise in consequence of Minister shall have power to determine any questions that may arise in consequence of any difference in the several periods for which the taxes under the said Acts, and under this Act, respectively, are payable, and the decision of the Minister shall be final and conclusive. In the case of a partnership, each partner shall be entitled to deduct such portion of the tax paid by the partnership under The Business Profits War Tax Act, 1916, and any amendments thereto as may correspond to his interest in the income of the partnership: Provided that such deduction shall not affect the liability of the taxpayer to tax hereunder in respect of any income which does not form part of the profits assessed under The Business Profits War Tax Act, 1916, but such income shall be assessed for income tax purposes in the same manner as if it were the only income of the taxpayer. were the only income of the taxpayer.
 - The amount paid to Great Britain or any of its self-governing colonies or dependencies for income tax in respect of the income of the taxpayer derived from sources therein, and the amount paid to any foreign country for income tax in respect of the income of the taxpayer derived from sources therein, if, and only if, such foreign country in imposing such tax allows a similar credit to persons in receipt of income derived from sources within Canada: Provided, that such deduction shall not at any time exceed the amount of tax which would otherwise be payable under the provisions of section three of chapter twenty-five of the statutes of 1918, or of any amending Act, in respect of the said income derived from sources within Great Britain or any of its self-governing colonies or dependencies or any foreign country; and further provided, that the said deduction shall be allowed only if the taxpayer furnishes evidence satisfactory to the Minister showing the amount of tax paid and the particulars of income derived from sources within Great Britain or any of its self-governing colonies or dependencies or any foreign country. (b) The amount paid to Great Britain or any of or any foreign country.

INCOMES NOT LIABLE TO TAX

Under the Act certain incomes are not liable to exation. These are described in Section 5, as taxation. follows:

- The income of the Governor General of Canada;
- (b) (i) The income of Consuls and Consuls General and of officials or officers of a foreign country whose duties require of them to reside in Canada, if and only if they are citi-

- zens of the country they represent and are not engaged in any business or calling other than the duties appertaining to their official position and provided that the country they represent by grants a similar exemption to officials of the Government of Canada.
- (ii) The income of officials of Great Britain or any of its self-governing colonies whose duties require of them to reside in Canada, and who are not engaged in any business or calling other than the duties appertaining to their official resistant. to their official position;
- (c) The income of any company, commission or association not less than ninety per cent. of the stock or capital of which is owned by a province or a municipality;
- (d) The income of any religious, charitable, agricultural and educational institutions, Boards of Trade and Chambers of Commerce:

- (e) The incomes of labour organizations and societies and of benevolent and fraternal beneficiary societies and orders;
 (f) The incomes of mutual corporations not having a capital represented by shares, no part of the income of which inures to the profit of any member thereof, and of life insurance companies except such amount as is credited to shareholders' account;
- (g) The incomes of clubs, societies and associations organized and operated solely for social welfare, civic improvement, pleasure, recreation or other non-profitable purposes, no part of the income of which inures to the benefit of any stockholder or member;
- (h) The incomes of such insurance, mortgage and loan associations operated entirely for the benefit of farmers as are approved by the Minister;
-) The income derived from any bonds or other securities of the Dominion of Canada issued exempt from any income tax imposed in pursuance of any legislation enacted by the Parliament of Canada;
- (j) The income of incorporated companies whose business and assets are carried on and situate entirely outside of Canada
- and situate entirely outside of Canada.

 (c) Any pension granted to any member of His Majesty's military, naval or air forces or to any member of the military, naval or air forces of His Majesty's Allies for any disability suffered by the pensioner while serving in any of His Majesty's Forces or in the forces of His Majesty's Allies during the war that began in August, 1914, and any pension granted to any dependent relative of any person who was killed or suffered any disability while serving in the said forces in the said war.

RETURNS MUST BE SENT IN

Every person liable to taxation shall make a return of income of the previous year without notice or demand each year, on or before the 30th of April.

Employers shall make a return of all persons in their employ receiving any salary or other remuneration in excess of such an amount as the Minister may prescribe,

an amount as the Minister may prescribe, on or before the 31st of March.

Corporations, etc., shall make a return of all dividends and bonuses paid on or before the 31st of March. All persons in whatever capacity acting having the control, receipt, disposal or payment of fixed or determinable annual or periodical gains, profits or income of any taxpayer, shall make and render, on or before the 31st of March, a separate and distinct return of such gains, profits or income, containing the name and address of each taxpayer. All returns due on or before the 31st of March returns due on or before the 31st of March must cover the twelve months of the preceding calendar year,

PENALTY FOR NOT MAKING RETURN

Every person liable to taxation who fails to make a return within the time limited therefor shall be liable to a penalty of five per cent. of the amount of tax payable; provided, however, that such penalty shall not in any case exceed five hundred dollars; and every person failing to deliver a return pursuant to any other provision of this section within the time limited therefor, shall be liable to a penalty of ten dollars for each day of default; provided, however, that such penalty shall not in any case exceed fifty dollars and further provided that in the case of a return by an employer as above required the penalty shall be further limited to an amount equal to ten per centum of the aggregate amount of the tax payable by the employees who should be reported on such return, subject however that in any case should the penalty be less than two dollars then in lieu thereof the penalty shall be two dollars.

In the case of religious, charitable, agricultural and educational institutions and boards of trade and chambers of commerce, default shall not be deemed to have commenced until the expiry of thirty days from the date of the mailing of a demand for a return by the minister.

All such penalties shall be assessed and collected from the person liable to make the return, in the same manner as taxes are assessed and collected.

PAYMENT OF TAXES

Under Amendments passed in 1920 it is provided that all persons when sending in their Income return must pay at least one-fourth of the amount of the tax and surtax, and may pay the balance in three instalments at two, four and six months with interest at 6 per cent.

"If any person liable to pay any tax under this Act pays as any instalment less than one-quarter of the tax as estimated by him, or should he fail to make any payment at the time of filing his return or at the time when any instalment should be paid, he shall pay, in addition to the interest at the rate of six per centum per annum provided for by this subsection, additional interest at the rate of four per centum per annum upon the deficiency from the date of default to the date of payment."

Trustees, Assignees, Executors, etc., shall pay all income taxes before distributing any estate, and must obtain a certificate from the Minister that there are no unpaid income taxes against the person, property or estate, before distributing the assets, otherwise such Trustees, Assignees, Executors or similar persons will be personally liable for the amount of the tax.

Under Section 8 the Minister may ask for additional information and may require the same under oath. Also that the Minister may require the taxpayer to keep adequate books of account.

Section 9 as amended, provides for penalties in the event of making default in the sending in of proper returns or of making false statements.

ASSESSMENT

Section 10 provides for the making of Assessments by the Minister,

"After examination of the taxpayers return the Minister shall send a notice of assessment to the taxpayer verifying or altering the amount of the

tax as estimated by him in his return. Any additional tax found due over the estimated amount shall be paid within one month from the date of the mailing of the notice of assessment. If the taxpayer fails to pay such additional tax within one month from the date of the mailing of the notice of assessment aforesaid, he shall pay, in addition to the interest provided for by subsection seven of section seven, of this Act, as enacted by section ten of chapter fortynine of the statutes of 1920, interest at the rate of four per centum per annum, upon the said additional tax from the expiry of the period of one month from the date of payment."

(2) The Minister, if he suspects that the tax-payer is about to leave Canada, may, for that or any other reason, by registered letter addressed to the taxpayer, demand payment of all taxes, penalties and accrued interest for which the tax-payer is liable, and the same shall be paid within ten days from the date of mailing of such registered letter, notwithstanding any other provision in this Act contained. Non-payment of the said tax within the specified time shall render the goods of the taxpayer liable to seizure by the sheriff of the city, county or district in which the goods of the taxpayer are situate. A certificate of non-compliance with any such demand, signed by the Commissioner of Taxation, setting forth the particulars of the demand and placed in the hands of the sheriff, shall be sufficient authority for him to seize sufficient of the goods of the taxpayer to meet the said demand.

The sale of such goods, and the disposition of the monies realized, shall be conducted in the manner prescribed by the law of the province in which the goods are situate as if the seizure were made under a writ of execution issued out of the Superior Court of the said province.

REFUND

The minister may, at or prior to the issue of the notice of assessment refund without application therefor any over-payment made by the tax-payer, or after the issue of the notice of assessment, provided application in writing is made therefor by the taxpayer within twelve months from the date of payment of the tax or the date at which the notice of assessment was issued.

Section 11 provides that all information received

Section 11 provides that all information received by the Government is held in secret.

APPEALS

The Amendments to the Act passed in 1923 provide the necessary machinery for dealing with Appeals against assessments made. The taxpayer objecting to an assessment must file a Notice of Appeal in the form prescribed by the Act within one month from the date of the issue of the Notice of Assessment and provided the taxpayer furnishes security to the satisfaction of the Minister in a sum not less than \$400.00 for the security of the costs of the Appeal the matter is referred to the Exchequer Court of Canada for adjudication.

LIEN FOR UNPAID TAXES

Section 25 of the Act which provided that unpaid taxes should constitute a lien on the assets of the taxpayer, was repealed on 27th June, 1925.

In case of any further information being required, application should be made to the Commissioner of Taxation, Ottawa.



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INCOME TAX RATES AND ESTATES DUTY IN GREAT BRITAIN, 1925-1926

The most important change in the Income Tax in the Finance Act of 1925 was the reduction of the general rate from 4s. 6d. to 4s. in the pound. The relief to earned incomes was increased, and incomes under £500, of tax-payers over 65, were classed as earned incomes, whether earned or derived from investments. In the case of married couples this relief is granted when either spouse reaches the age of 65. There were also reductions in the Super-Income Tax on incomes of between £10,000 and £50,000. These were, however, offset by increases in the Estates Duties on estates of from £10,000 to £500,000.

RELIEFS AND ABATEMENTS

Under the new act a deduction of one-sixth is granted as relief to all earned incomes; with the limit of a maximum deduction of £250. This was an increase from a deduction of one-tenth with a limit of £200 deduction. The exemption limits were left unchanged-£150 of earned income and £135 unearned. If a man is married, the exemption is raised to £225. If the wife is also earning the exemption may be increased by £45 or by nine-tenths of the wife's income if below this amount. The exemption for the first child is £36, and for each other child £27 of assessable income. For dependent relatives the exemption is £25. A widower or widow with children is allowed the same exemption as a mar-The first £225 of taxable income after allowing all exemptions is taxable at 2s 0d in the pound, instead of 4s 0d. In addition to these abatements, in the case of all earned incomes under £2,000, there is the further abatement of sixteen and two thirds per cent, and instead of the whole income being assessable, as is the case with all income from investments, 833 per cent of the total received is liable to taxation. Farmers pay income tax on the annual value of their land. For land not utilized they pay on onethird of its annual value.

GRADUATION OF TAXATION

Relief for small incomes is granted: first by the classification as assessable income, and secondly by charging the first £225 of taxable income—after all exemptions have been deducted, at one-half the standard rate—at 2s. 0d. in the pound instead of 4s. 0d. Thus a man with £500 of earned income, with a wife, three children and his mother to support will pay £7 13s. 4d. income tax:—

A man with £1,000 earned income can claim the same exemptions. He will pay on £225 at 2s. in the pound and on £368 6s. 8d. at four shillings. There are exemptions allowed in respect of Life Insurance premiums.

THE SUPER-INCOME TAX

The super-income tax under the new rates still begins at £2,000. The rate for the first £500 is 9d. It rises on a graduated scale to 4s, 6d, on incomes between £5,000 and £15,000. The rate on higher incomes was left unchanged at 5s. 6d. on incomes of £30,000 and 6s. on incomes over £30,000.

About 80,000 persons pay super-tax, and the gross income assessable is estimated at £470,000,000. The reduction in the rates was estimated as a loss of £10,000,000 a year to the Treasury.

RATES OF INCOME TAX

The Income Tax rate was at its highest from 1918 to 1922 when it was 6s. in the pound. In 1907 the rate was 1s. in the pound, and from 1909 to 1914 it was 1s.2d. For the last normal year at this rate, the yield was £47,240,771 as compared with the £319,000,000 estimated for 1923-24. Since the beginning of the war the rates have been as follows:—

DOUBLE TAXATION

In case of incomes taxed both in the United Kingdom and in a British Dominion, there is deducted from the British tax the whole of the Dominion tax where this does not exceed one-half of the amount of the British tax. Where the Dominion tax exceeds one-half, the amount deducted is one-half of the British tax. The relief on incomes taxed both in the United Kingdoni and in a Dominion is fixed at one-half rate-2s. 3d. in the pound. No relief is given on incomes taxed both by the United Kingdom and a foreign power, but claims can be made for exemptions and abatements allowed under the law. Claims can be made for five years back, but this limit will gradually be extended to six years, although no claims for years prior to 1920-21 will be allowed. Income from the Irish Free State is exempt from British tax, but liable to the Irish tax of 5s. in the pound. Many people deriving income from the United Kingdom are unaware that they can recover part of the income tax, this being due to the fact that dividends are often marked "Free of Tax", or that no mention whatever of tax is made when the dividends are paid through a local branch of a British company.

ESTATE DUTY

The changes in the estate duty in 1925 were made to offset the reductions in the super-tax. They affect the same range of incomes. The rates as they now stand are as follows:—

The receipts from the sources of the ordinary revenue of the country are paid into what is called the Consolidated Fund, and payments therefrom are made to cover the ordinary expenses. These receipts and payments, therefore, constitute what may be considered as the regular income and expenditure of the country, receipts from and expenditure out of loans and all other extraordinary transactions being excluded.

LEGAL WEIGHTS AND MEASURES IN CANADA

In Canada the law provides, with respect to weights, that the unit shall be the standard pound (avoirdupois) of 7,000 grains, one-sixteenth part of the standard pound shall be an ounce (437½ grains), one hundred pounds a cental, and two thousand pounds a ton, and that four hundred and eighty grains shall be an ounce troy. As regards measures—That the unit or standard measure of capacity, as well for liquids as for dry measures, shall be the gallon, containing ten standard pounds of distilled water, weighed with the water and air at a temperature of sixty-two degrees Fahrenheit with the barometer at thirty inches, the quart shall be one-fourth part of a gallon, and the pint one-eight part of the gallon, and eight gallons shall be a bushel.

This gallon, commonly known as the "Imperial gallon," contains 277.274 cubic inches.

The standard measure of length is the yard, one-third part of which it is provided shall be a foot, and the twelth part of such foot shall be an inch.

IMPERIAL MEASURE

Special note should be made of the fact that Special note should be made of the fact that certain standards of weights and measures used in some of the states of the United States are not legal (though frequently used in Canada. These standards are not so large, being about 20 per cent. smaller in capacity than the legal standards in Canada, i.e., the Imperial pint, quart and gallon. The following tables show the regulations in Canada regarding Fruit, Root Vegetables and other commodities

APPLES & PEARS

All barrels used for packing apples or pears shall contain as nearly as practicable 7056 cubic inches. Half-barrels shall contain as nearly as practicable, 3528 cubic inches.

When Apples, Pears and Quinces are sold by the barrel, such barrel shall contain, as nearly as practicable, 7056 cubic inches.

Boxes used for packing apples shall contain as nearly as practicable 2174 cubic inches. Every such package (barrel or box) must be marked with the name and address of the person or corporation doing the packing, the name of the variety and the grade, namely, No.1, No.2, Domestic, No. 3; or Extra Fancy, Fancy, 'C'.'

Crates used for packing apples shall contain as nearly as practicable, 2174 cubic inches.

The weight of a barrel of apples varies considerably according to the variety. The standard weight as accepted by the railway companies is 155 pounds. This includes the weight of the barrel.

PEAR OR CRAB APPLE BOXES shall contain as nearly as practicable 1760 cubic inches.

PEACH BOXES shall contain as nearly as practicable one or other of the following quantities: 932 cubic inches, 828 cubic inches, 725 cubic

Plum or Prune Boxes shall contain as nearly as practicable 6724 cubic inches.

CHERRY Boxes shall contain as nearly as prac-

ticable 729 or 364½ cubic inches. FOUR BASKET CRATES shall contain as nearly

BERRY AND CURRANT BOXES when level full as nearly as practicable, one or other of the following quantities: 67.2 cubic inches, 33.6 cubic inches; on and after October 1st, 1924.
FRUIT BASKETS when level full as nearly as practicable, one or other of the following quantities: one bushel, twenty quarts, eleven quarts six quarts two quarts.

VEGETABLES

All potatoes, onions, artichokes, beets, carrots, parsnips and turnips must be sold by weight, except when offered for sale with the top leaves attached, commonly termed by the trade, "green vegetables", or when potatoes are sold by the closed barrel.

Potatoes offered for sale must be graded as Canada A quality, Canada B quality or Canada C

7056 cubic inches.

The regulations above referred to, do not apply to new potatoes when shipped between June 1st and September 30th, both dates inclusive, nor to seed potatoes, nor to potatoes or onions for export where compliance therewith would prevent the sale.

EXCISE TAXES AND REGULATIONS

Special War Revenue Act, 1915, and Inland Revenue Act and Amendments

The following excise taxes shall be imposed, levied and collected on the articles hereinafter specified namely:-

Matches

16A. On every package of matches manufactured or imported a stamp of the value of one cent for each 100 matches or portion of 100.

When matches are put up in packages containing not more than sixty and not less than thirty matches each, the tax shall be payable at the rate of one-half of one cent for each package, and when in packages containing less than thirty, the tax is one-fourth of one cent per package. one cent per package.

Sales Tax
A Sales Tax is collected of five per centum on the A Sales Tax is collected of five per centum on the sale price of all goods produced or manufactured in Canada, including the amount of excise duties when the goods are sold in bond, the tax to be payable by the producer or manufacturer at the time of the sale thereof by him, and of a like tax upon the duty paid value of imported goods, the tax to be payable by the importer, or transferee who takes the goods out of bond, at the time when the goods are imported are taken out of warshouse for consumption subject or taken out of warehouse for consumption, subject

or taken out of warehouse for consumption, subject to the following conditions, that is to say:
Subject to the provisions of Sub-section 3 of Section 19 B.B.B.; every manufacturer or producer shall take out an annual license for the purpose aforesaid, and the Minister may prescribe a fee therefor not exceeding \$2.00 and the penalty for neglect shall be a sum not exceeding 1,000 dollars.

Licenses

The Act says that a wholesaler or jobber who sells not less than fifty per cent of his total sales of goods to a licensed manufacturer or producer to be used in articles to be produced for sale, may be granted an annual license, the fee therefor not to exceed two dollars. Subsequent rulings are to the effect that any wholesaler or jobber may be granted a license.

LUMBER;—Manufacturers of lumber and lumber dealers shall obtain a Sales Tax License except where otherwise provided, on sales of lumber by licensed lumber dealers. Sales Tax may be computed on not less than 50% of the selling price to persons or firms not in possession of a Sales Tax License.

Retail lumber dealers who do not manufacture lumber or who do not sell lumber to other lumber dealers or to other licensed manufacturers need not take out a Sales Tax License.

Exemptions

(1) The said consumption or sales tax shall not be payable in the following cases, that is to say:
(a) on goods exported; or
(b) on sales by a licensed manufacturer or producer to another licensed manufacturer or producer of goods to be used in the production of articles for selection.

sale; or
(c) on goods imported by a licensed manufacturer or producer to be used in the production of articles

for sale; or

(d) on goods sold by a licensed manufacturer or
producer to, or on goods imported by, a licensed
wholesaler or jobber whose sales are to be accounted for in accordance with the provisions of the Act. Goods exempt from Sales Tax are indicated in the Tariff under Schedule A; also see list of goods exempt page 118.

Cable and Telegraphic Messages.—Every cable company and telegraph company shall pay to the Minister for Consolidated Revenue Fund, on the first day of February, the first day of May, the first day of August and the first day of November in each year, a sum equal to three cents upon each despatch or message other than press despatches or messages for which a charge of fifteen cents or more

was imposed. Every company may charge the three cents to the person paying for the transmission.

RAILWAY AND OTHER TICKETS.—A tax shall be collected on every Railway Ticket to any place in or outside Canada, and on every Vessel Ticket giving transportation between places in Canada, or from a place in Canada to a place in Newfoundland, West Indies, Bermuda, British Guiana, British Honduras or the United States. The tax shall be, in addition to the cost of the ticket, as follows:—

On Bank Overdrafts the Bank must charge two cents on each \$50, or fraction thereof, of the maximum amount of the overdraft at the close of business on any day. An overdraft shall not be deemed to be outstanding until the fourth day on which the

MEANING OF TERMS USED

- 1. Unless the context otherwise requires:-
- (a) The initials "M. ft." represent and have the meaning of the words "one thousand feet board measure;"
- (b) The initials "n.o.p." represent and have the meaning of the words "not otherwise provided for;" and n.e.s. is an abbreviation of "not elsewhere specified."
- (c) The expression "gallon" means an Imperial gallon;
- (d) The expression "ton" means two thousand pounds avoirdupois;
- (e) The expression "proof," "proof spirit" or "proof spirits," when applied to wines or spirits of any kind, means spirits of a strength equal to that of pure ethyl alcohol compounded with distilled water in such proportions that the resultant mixture shall at a temperature of sixty-two degrees Fahrenheit have a specific gravity of 0.9187 as compared with that of distilled water at the same temperature;
- (f) The expression "gauge," when applied to metal sheets or plates or to wire, means the thickness as determined by the Imperial Standard Gauge;
- (g) The expression "in diameter," when applied to tubing, means the actual inside diameter;
- (h) The expression "sheet," when applied to metals, means a sheet or plate not exceeding three-sixteenths of an inch in thickness;

11a. TEN PER CENT ADDITIONAL DISCOUNT

The importer of goods entitled to the benefits of the British Preferential Tariff shall be entitled to a discount of ten per centum on the amount of duty computed under such Tariff, when such goods are conveyed without transhipment from a port of a country enjoying the benefits of the British Preferential Tariff into a sea or river port of Canada:

Provided that goods entitled to the herefits of the

Provided that goods entitled to the benefits of the British Preferential Tariff shall be entitled to the discount authorized by this section, when such goods are shipped on a through bill of lading consigned to a consignee in a specified port in Canada, when such goods are transferred at a port of a British Colony or possession not enjoying the benefits of the British Preferential Tariff, and conveyed without further transhipment into a sea or river port of Canada.

Provided, however, that this discount shall not apply to duties on any of the following articles, viz., wines, malt liquors, spirits, spirituous liquors, liquid medicines and articles containing alcohol; sugar, tobacco, cigars and cigarettes.

Provided further that this discount shall not apply in the case in which the duty does not exceed fifteen per centum ad valorem, or, in the case of a specific duty or a specific and ad valorem duty combined in which the computed rate does not exceed fifteen per centum ad valorem, or to goods admitted into Canada which have the benefit of reductions provided for in the Canada-West Indies Trade Agreement, 1920.

12. INTERMEDIATE TARIFF

2. The rates of Customs duties, if any, set forth in Column 2 "Intermediate Tariff" shall apply:

To goods the produce or manufacture of any British or foreign country to which the benefits of such Intermediate Tariff shall have been extended in the manner hereinafter provided, when imported direct from such foreign country or from a British country, (see also Notes 14, 15, 16, 17, 19).

13. GENERAL TARIFF

3. The rates of Customs duties, if any, set forth in Column 3 "General Tariff" shall apply to all goods not entitled to admission under the Intermediate Tariff or under the British Preferential Tariff.

14. ITALIAN CONVENTION

"Articles the produce or manufacture of Canada imported into Italy and articles the produce or manufacture of Italy imported into Canada shall not be subjected to other or higher duties or charges than those paid on the like articles the produce or manufacture of any other foreign country."

15. FRANCO-CANADIAN CONVENTION

The rates of duties set forth in Schedules D, E. and F of the Franco-Canadian Convention of 1922, apply to natural and manufactured products originating in and coming from France and from the French Colonies, Possessions and Protectorates (which are held to include such products from the Saar Basin, until otherwise ordered) upon entry for duty in Canada, when such products have been conveyed

All British Colonies and British Possessions which grant to Canada the benefit of the most favourable Customs tariff treatment which they may extent to any foreign country:

Denmark Switzerland
Finland Venezuela
Japan Italy

Until further advised all British Colonies and Possessions are held to be entitled to the benefits of this Convention.

Treatment of commercial travellers' samples under the Franco-Canadian Convention of 1922, is to be continued as in the past.

- (a) Invoices of articles for entry in Canada under the Franco-Canadian Convention of 1922, shall be certified as to origin, quantity, value and any other particulars, as prescribed by the Customs regulations.
- (b) Every invoice of champagne, cognac brandy and armagnac brandy shall be accompanied by a certificate of analysis and purity issued under the authority of the Government of the country of production.
- (c) Goods which are not accompanied by proper certificates shall be entered under the General Tariff.

16. BELGIUM CONVENTION ACT

The benefit of the Franco-Canadian Convention is extended to products originating in and coming from the territory of the Economic Union of Belgium and Luxembourg or from the Colonies and Possessions of

Belgium or from territory of which Belgium is mandatory under the provisions of the Covenant of the League of Nations, when imported and conveyed without transhipment from a port of Belgium or Luxembourg or a Colony or Possession of Belgium or of the mandated territory aforesaid or from a port of a country enjoying the benefit of the Preferential or Intermediate Tariff into a sea or river port of Canada.

17. NETHERLANDS TRADE AGREEMENT

The benefit of the Intermediate Tariff is extended to products originating in and coming from the territory of the Netherlands, Netherlands East Indies, Netherlands Guiana and Netherlands West Indies, when imported and conveyed without transshipment from a port of the Netherlands, Netherlands East Indies, Netherlands Guiana and Netherlands West Indies, or from a port of a country enjoying the benefit of the Preferential or Intermediate Tariff into a sea or river port of Canada.

3. Invoices of goods for entry under the Intermediate Tariff shall be certified to as to origin, quantity, value and other particulars as prescribed by the Customs Regulations.

18. THE CANADA-WEST INDIES TRADE AGREEMENT, 1920

Agreement entered into this eighteenth day of June, nineteen hundred and twenty, between the Government of Canada and the Governments of the Colonies, as follows namely:—

Article III. Subject to the special provisions of Article III, (See Article III) the duties of Customs on all goods (other than tobacco, cigars, cigarettes, and spirituous or alcoholic liquors) being the produce or manufacture of any of the Colonies aforesaid imported into Canada which are now subject to duty or which may be made subject to duty at any future time shall not at any time be more than fifty (50) per cent. of the duties imposed on similar goods when imported from any foreign country.

Article III. The Dominion of Canada will grant to the articles specified in Schedule "A," being the produce or manufacture of any of the Colonies aforesaid, imported into Canada, the preferential treatment indicated in respect of each such article.

19. THE INTERMEDIATE TARIFF EXTENDED TO SPAIN

The benefit of the Intermediate Tariff is extended to products originating in and coming from the Kingdom of Spain, when imported and conveyed without transhipment from a port of the Kingdom of Spain or from a port of a country enjoying the benefit of the Preferential or Intermediate Tariff into a sea or river port of Canada.

20. THE FINLAND TRADE AGREEMENT

Goods produced or manufactured in Finland shall receive in Canada treatment as favourable as that accorded to goods produced or manufactured in any other foreign country so long as goods produced or manufactured in Canada enjoy in Finland the same treatment as is enjoyed by similar goods produced or manufactured in the United Kingdom.

To enjoy the benefits of this Act products must be conveyed without transferred fiber.

That if at any time it appears to the satisfaction of the Governor-in-Council, on a report from the Minister of Customs, that the payment of the special duty by this section provided for is being evaded by the shipment of goods on consignment without sale prior to such shipment, the Governor-in-Council may in any case or class of cases authorize such action as is deemed necessary to collect on such goods or any of them the same special duty as if the goods had been sold to an importer in Canada prior to their shipment to Canada.

25. FISH FROM NEWFOUNDLAND

8. Notwithstanding anything in this Act, fish and other products of the fisheries of Newfoundland may be imported into Canada free of Customs duty until otherwise determined by the Governor-in-Council, by Order published in the Canada Gazette.

9. Fish caught by fishermen in Canadian fishing vessels and the products thereof carried from the fisheries in such vessels, shall be admitted into Canada free of duty under regulation by the Minister.

to the Governor-in-Council whether such conspiracy, combination, agreement or arrangement exists.

3. The judge may compel the attendance of witnesses and examine them under oath and require the production of books and papers, and shall have such other necessary powers as are conferred upon him by the Governor-in-Council for the purpose of such enquiry.

4. If the judge reports that such conspiracy, combination, agreement or arrangement exists in respect of such article the Governor-in-Council may admit the article free of duty, or so reduce the duty thereon, as to give to the public the benefit of reasonable competition in the article, if it appears to the Governor-in-Council that such disadvantage to the consumer is facilitated by the duties of Customs imposed on a like article.

28. MARKING OF IMPORTED GOODS

ADDENDA

A selection of abridged notes to aid Importers and British Preferential. To secure the British Preferential tis necessary to note that:—

Animals, pure bred, for improvement of stock, to be duty free, must be imported under following conditions:-

- (a) Owner must be a British subject, resident in the British Empire.
- (b) Entry must be accompanied by a certificate stating the animal to be recorded in Canadian National Records or in an accredited Foreign Record. (See dogs, also fowls).

ANIMALS' QUARANTINE

"Cattle for breeding purposes and milk production, six months old or over, if accompanied by a satisfactory tuberculin test chart, dated not more than sixty days prior to the date of entry and signed or endorsed by a veterinarian of the United States Bureau of Animal Industry, must be detained in quarantine for such period as may be deemed necessary, and subjected to the tuberculin test; cattle reacting thereto must be returned to the United States or slaughtered without compensation."

"The agent of any railway or common carrier receiving cattle or other live stock for shipment shall attach to the way bill accompanying such shipment the district health certificate relating to such cattle or other live stock whenever the owner or shipper possessing such certificate requests him to do so."

ANIMAL IMPORTATION

The importation of cattle, sheep and other rumi-The importation of cattle, sheep and other ruminants and swine are at present prohibited importation from England and Ireland, except the northern counties of Antrim, Armagh, Down, Fermanagh, Londonderry and Tyrone, embarking at Belfast; Animals from Scotland must embark from Scotland, and in addition to the usual health certificate must be accompanied by an affidavit of the shipper declaring the animals have been in the said counties for 60 days immediately preceding embarkation. 60 days immediately preceding embarkation.

Automobiles for touring purposes may be brought in by a non-resident of Canada for a period of six months by making a deposit of \$25.00 and giving a bond for double the amount of duty. On proof of exportation the deposit will be refunded. For a period of only one month the deposit and bond are not demanded but the automobile must be duly entered at the frontier port of Customs on approved form in duplicate. form in duplicate.

Baggage, wearing apparel, and such articles as are in use and actually accompany persons arriving into use and actually accompany persons arriving into Canada and are necessary for the purposes of the journey, may be admitted duty free. It does not apply to merchandise for sale or goods belonging to other persons. Up to 40 cigars and 100 cigarettes may be admitted as baggage. Tools of trade in actual use may also be admitted free.

Boats for pleasure, but not for trade or profit, may be admitted into Canada for the season on the following permit, in duplicate, issued by the collector:-

Port and Date.... Permission is hereby given to.....to keep and use in Canada or in Canadian waters.

Broom corn:—All broom corn imported from foreign countries except the United States must be accompanied by a certificate of inspection, issued by the Federal Horticultural Board; therefore every importer is required to notify the Dominion Entomologist, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.

British Customs: itish Customs: All enquiries regarding British Customs should be addressed to Department of Trade and Commerce, Ottawa.

(1) A separate invoice must be furnished for preferential goods.

(2) Invoice must have certificate as to origin of

goods.
(3) Goods must be packed separately or not mixed

up with other goods.

(4) Goods must come direct or have a through bill of lading.

Cash discount not in excess of 2½% may be allowed off for duty purposes if actually deducted on the invoice. Trade discount should be deducted from both columns on the invoice.

Cattle for exhibition purposes over six months old attle for exhibition purposes over six months old entering Canada from the United States must have a veterinary certificate signed by a veterinary in-spector of the United States Bureau of Animal Industry, stating that they have passed the tuber-cular test within the last six months, also an affi-davit from the importer identifying the cattle entered.

ogs, pure bred. To obtain free entry the importer must produce a certificate of purity of blood signed by the breeder. He must also make an affidavit Dogs, pure bred. by the breeder. He must also make an affidavit that the dogs imported are the identical animals described on the certificate.

Deer and Moose. Deer shot for sport by persons not domiciled in Canada may be exported only within 15 days after the "open season." No person in any one year shall export more than the whole of one moose and three deer, and that in not over two shipments. The exporter must produce the license to a Collector of Customs and sign a declaration as to the quantities and parts exported, the same to be attached to the export entry. be attached to the export entry.

Firearms and dangerous and offensive weapons, re-

strictions on importation of:

"Note that a permit (which may be known as a Police Permit) in Form 76, is required by anyone to lawfully have upon his person elsewhere than in lawfully have upon his person elsewhere than in his dwelling house, etc., or to carry, concealed, a pistol, revolver, sheath knife, etc., or other dangerous or offensive weapon, and that a similar police permit is required by an alien to lawfully have in his possession anyuhere any firearm, or ammunition therefor, or any offensive weapon. British subjects may now have possession of guns or rifley without Police Permit or rifles without Police Permit.

Collectors of Customs and Excise are therefore inollectors of Customs and Excise are therefore instructed not to release for delivery any goods as described in subsection (a) and (D1) of section 118 of the Criminal Code to any importer, not being a recognized dealer, unless such importer has, where required, in addition to any Customs permit required, a permit in Form 76, as prescribed, from an officer of Police or other proper official authorized by the said section to issue such permits." mits.

Fowls, pure bred, must have certificate of blood describing the breed and signed by the breeder of the following form:-

"I hereby certify that the fowls herein described which I am this day shipping Also the following sworn to statement made by the importer.
"The fowls now imported and entered by the un-

dersigned, are the identical fowl as described in the invoice or entry.

Goods damaged in transit. Collectors may permit an importer to abandon to the Crown any whole package of goods damaged in transit, and be re-lieved of payment of duty thereon, if notice is given within 14 days of landing or entry of such goods.

-Collectors of Customs must not permit Gold export: of export.—Confection of gold except upon the production of a license issued by the Deputy Minister of Finance for each shipment, such license to state the value or the approximate weight in ounces of the gold comprising the shipment.

Goods perishable and breakable. Collectors are permitted to make an allowance for all damage in mitted to make an allowance for all damage in excess of 15% as certified to by the appraiser on perishable and breakable goods such as fruit, crockery and glass, if the claim is made within three days of the arrival of such goods. If duty has been paid on the full value of such goods, a refund may be arranged if the claim is made within 14 days and appraisement is made as soon as they can be examined.

Horses, carriages and harness going into the United States may be re-admitted into Canada duty free if they are returned within one year without change of ownership. They must be reported outward in duplicate with such description as to be identified on return. Duty is to be paid on repairs.

Literature, intended to be of use in gambling, pool selling, betting upon any race, fight, game or sport

is prohibited.

Machinery valued at not less than \$10.00 when exported for repairs may be re-admitted by payment of duty on the repairs, only if returned within one year, provided further that application was made for outward entry and examination at Customs at time of export.

Meats:—All shipments of potted, canned or pre-served meats must be examined by an officer of this Department of Agriculture in addition to the certificate of purity that must accompany such

Milk, Vegetable and Fruit Regulations:

tainers of milk, vegetable and fruit products:—

(a) Are to be marked with the initials, the surname and the address of the packer;

(b) Must give a true description of the contents; (c) Must show the firm No. assigned to the estab-

lishment;

(d) Must be subject to the approval of the Veterinary Director-General as to design of label. No such goods are admitted into Canada unless accompanied by a sworn declaration from the exporter that the goods are shipped in accordance with the regulations made under the Meat and Canned Foods Act.

Motor cycles as tourist outfit are admitted into entry into Canada for a period of one month under the same conditions as apply to automobiles, when for longer than one month the same conditions apply except a deposit of \$10.00 as a deposit instead of

Nursery Stock, etc.:—Importers of nursery stock, potatoes, etc., would do well to interview customs before placing orders to learn conditions and possibefore placing orders to learn conditions and possibilities of importation. Potatoes from Europe, Newfoundland, St. Pierre, Miquelon, California, Pennsylvania and West Virginia. Non-canned fruit and vegetables from Hawaiian Islands, certain species of pine, currants and goose berries (except from New York to Ontario), and certain species of harboring are prohibited invertible. barberries are prohibited importation. Also from certain states, coniferous trees and decorative plants, chestnuts and chinquapin, corn and broom corn, cut flowers and entire plants, oat and rye straw, vegetables and alfalfa hay are prohibited. Green house plants (accompanied by a certificate from consignor that plants were grown under glass) herbaceous perennials, herbaceous budding plants, bulbs and tubers, and cottonwood poplar from Dakota or Minnesota may be admitted without inspection.

All nursery stock etc. subject to inspection or fumiga-Intersery stock etc. subject to inspection or fumigation may be manifested on St. John, N.B., Niagara Falls, Windsor, Winnipeg, Vancouver or Ottawa (for scientific purposes). All European stock must be manifested on Halifax, St. John, N.B., Sherbrooke, St. Johns, Que., Montreal, Quebec, Winnipeg, North Portal or Vancouver.

Opium and Narcotic Drugs:—Cocaine, morphine, opium, eucaine and other drugs, may not be imported into or exported from Canada except under

license therefor, good only for the particular exportation or importation, when licenses are to be obtained on application to the Deputy Minister of the Department of Health, Ottawa; such drugs may only be imported or exported from Canada at the Canadian Customs ports named by the Department.

Oleomargarine:—No person shall import or manufacture oleomargarine without first obtaining a license from the Food Controller of Canada, Department of Agriculture. A record must be kept of all shipments, showing date, quantity, and from whom purchased. All packages must be labelled and clearly marked with the words "Oleomargarine" to the approval of the Food Controller.

erfecting entries. Sight entries must be perfected as well as entries on Form B1, on which duty is paid, pending production of certificate under Customs regulations for free entry of same, and for which a refund of duty is applied for.

Refund on goods returned not according to order, must comply with the following conditions:-

(1) Goods are to be identified by Customs.

(2) Application for refund within one month and export within three months of date of entry.

(3) Proof of export furnished.

(4) Must be accompanied by export entry in triplicate.
(5) Delivered under Customs supervision.

(6) Copy of waybill signed by carrier, also copy of export entry duly certified to by Customs officer at port of exit must be annexed to refund

Refund on goods damaged in transit, duty having been paid on the entire shipment according to the invoice, it will be necessary to bill the railway or inland carriers for the amount of the duty in addition to the value of the goods. It will then be up to the value of the goods. It will then be up to the railway to produce a short landing certificate from the ocean carriers if the goods are from overseas, or a proof that the goods were lost or destroyed beyond the confines of Canada. When this proof is produced it must be attached to the refund align. refund claim.

Samples (commercial travellers') are subject to duty each time of importation. The trunks may be admitted free after paying duty at time of first importation.

Samples of dutiable goods imported direct by non-residents of Canada from any British or French Treaty country may be admitted on deposit of a sum equal to the duty. The importer will make a temporary entry on the face of which he will make the declaration that the goods are samples for use only in taking orders and will be exported within 12 months. Samples to be re-exported must be marked for identification.

Seeds:—All importers of seeds, viz., clovers, grasses, vetches, rape, forage plants, field root, and garden vegetables, in lots of 10 lbs. or more, must submit a sample to be forwarded to the Government Seed Laboratory, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa,

Sight entries are usually occasioned by defective invoices or no invoices at all. They are to be made out in quadruplicate and the value of the importation must be so increased for duty as to be absolutely certain to protect the revenue. On receipt of corrected invoices a claim for refund may be submitted, but not after a period of six months, except by permission of the Department.

Special duty exemptions. Special duty does not apply in the case of goods not made in Canada, or when the difference between the home price at

time shipped and the price to the Canadian purchaser does not exceed 5% of the home price. Provided, however, the whole difference is to be taken into account for special duty purposes when exceeding 5%. If the home price at time shipped has been subject to sudden inflation the price at time of purchase may be accepted as the fair market value in the application of the dump.

Special duty does apply and without exemption allowance to articles of a class and kind made in Canada, even when admitted free of ordinary duty.

SPIRITUOUS LIQUORS.

Value for duty is subject to the following general regulations:

(1) Home consumption price at time shipped.

Actual trade discount allowed not to reduce below home consumption price.

(3) Commission for services rendered in the purchase of goods bought in the name and on the account of the importer and so invoiced and exported shall not usually be held as forming a part of the value for duty, when not in excess of 5%. All other commission charges are conof 5%. All other sidered dutiable.

(4) Price of goods as sold in bond not to be ac-

cepted for duty.

(5) Foreign revenue duties to be added, but foreign export duties not to be added.

Value must be without condition as to sale. Value for duty to be at the distributing point.

Must be the value on condition ready for shipment.

(9) Bonus for early delivery must be considered part of value for duty.

(10) Cash discount not over 21/2% is allowed off if actually deducted on invoices.

(11) Appraiser's valuation is to be accepted.
(12) Articles of different kinds, the highest value is to be taken as the average for duty.

(13) No allowance off for packages, straw, twine, etc.

Valuation for duty on goods not sold for home con-sumption may, usually, be determined by ascer-taining the total cost of producing the goods in condition ready for market and adding thereto the usual profits made on sales of a similar line of goods.

Waybills must show

(1) Name and address of consignee.
(2) Marks and number of packages.
(3) Description of packages.
(4) When goods are in hell When goods are in bulk, the number of pieces, bundles or bushels.

(5) In case of agricultural instruments, number and description of each class of instruments.

Wool and Hair:—All shipments of wool and hair coming into Canada via the United States are ad-mitted without disinfection or certificates. All others, except from San Domingo, must be accompanied by a certificate to the satisfaction of the Veterinary Inspector or they will be held at the frontier until the consignee satisfies the Department of Agriculture that he has or can provide facilities for disinfecting. Disinfecting of wool or hair requires exposure to a heat of 185° F. for at least 15 minutes under the direction of the Veterinary Director-General.

CUSTOMS PROCEDURE

SHIPPING GOODS TO THE UNITED STATES

The customs laws of the United States, governing the importation of goods, very materially differ from ours. They have no such thing as the manifesting system such as we have, and all merchandise is supposed to be entered at the first port of arrival. However, they have ports termed I.T. Ports (immediate transport ports) to which goods may be forwarded in bond, without appraisement at the frontier port. In this case the goods must be carefully marked "Forwarded in Bond."

Merchandise, in order to be entered under Immediate Transportation, without appraisement at the frontier, must be destined to a designated immediate transportation port, and must be billed via a port at which merchandise may be entered for transportation to another port without appraisement.

These ports through which goods must be billed and to which they must be consigned may be learned from the transporation company as the lists are too extensive to be given space here.

If goods are destined for a foreign country they are entirely under Transportation and Exportation entry in bond, in transit, for exportation from the seaboard port.

Goods to be returned to the United States: Merchants finding it necessary to return goods not according to order and wishing to obtain refund of duty will be required to make out three different forms to accompany the way bill when goods are shipped back. If shipment is over \$100.00 the forms are as follows:

1. "Foreign Owner's Oath" or "Oath of American Manufacture."

American Consular Certificate.
 Export papers in triplicate.

Where shipment is under \$100.00 the American Consular Certificate is not required.

The intending consignee must send to the U.S. shipper for an affidavit on a prescribed form, mentioned above as the Oath of American Manufacture, declaring the goods to be of United States origin or manufacture, in order that the goods when returned may pass the U.S. Customs without duty.

When this affidavit is received it must be attached to the way bill by the transportation agent here and

forwarded along with the goods. This will enable the United States Customs Officer at the frontier to recognize the goods as home manufacture and have them forwarded on to destination without duty. original U.S. shipper may secure these forms at his original U.S. simpler may seeme these forms at his customs, but a better way is for the intending consignee to secure a copy from the local express agent here and forward same to the U.S. firm with all necessary explanation as to line of procedure and thus avoid possible delay.

The American Consular Certificate forms must be obtained from the nearest American Consul, who will send blank forms in triplicate. These must be filled in as required and returned to the American Consul with his fee, when he will return one copy to the intending consignee, who will attach same to way bill with other documents mentioned.

Export entry, procurable from Customs Department, must be made out by consignee in triplicate and attached to way bill together with the Foreign Owner's Oath and Consular Certificate. One copy will remain on file at the port of exit, the second copy goes to the Customs Department and the third copy will be returned by the Customs officer at the Canadian port of exit to the merchant who returned the He will then attach it to the refund of duty claim along with a copy of the way bill as a guarantee that the goods have been returned.

British Customs:—See Article and Table of British Customs Duties elsewhere in this Almanac; For further information enquire Department of Trade and Commerce, Ottawa.

CURRENCY CERTIFICATE OF INVOICE

Importers should, when ordering goods from Britain or any foreign country, instruct the exporter or salesman to always give the value of the goods in the home consumption column of the invoice, and to show the same in the currency of the country of export.

And the exporter should also be very carefully instructed to place on the invoice the currency certificate.

In respect of invoices of goods from Great Britain or from any country where the currency has not sub-stantially depreciated the certificate of the exporter,

showing the relative value of the paper currency in standard currency, as indicated by the form below, is accepted.

EXPORTER'S CERTIFICATE.

This certificate is not necessary where the appreciation or depreciation is less than 1%, as the value for duty may be computed at the rate of exchange as shown by the Appraiser's Bulletin.

In other cases where the currency has substantially depreciated, there must be furnished a certificate, signed by a Consul or a Canada Trade Commissioner, or of a Bank, in the following form:-

CERTIFICATE OF CONSUL.

I certify that at the date of exportation of the goods described in the within or annexed invoice, the true value of the currency, in which the invoice is made out, as compared with the standard dollar of Canada, is at the rate of. (Dollars and Cents)

Signed... At the present time this certificate applies to goods imported from Germany, Austria-Hungary, Jugo-Slavia, Russia and Czecho-Slovakia.

OODS SHORT LANDED

Merchants frequently find when a consignment of goods has arrived, that on comparison with the invoice or the way bill some of the goods are missing. In such a case duty must be paid on the entire face value of the invoice. If a whole package is missing it is only necessary after clearing the entire lot to accept what is termed a "short warrant" for the goods short landed. On the arrival of the stray goods it will simply be necessary to present this warrant to the Customs to secure their release.

But if on examintion of the goods the importer finds part of contents of packages missing, he must, within 14 days notify the collector or the Customs Appraiser in writing of the missing goods.

The Appraiser will at once examine the shipment, and if satisfied that the goods reported on the invoice are not enclosed he will make a notation to that effect on the invoice. This notation will serve as a proof

that duty has been paid, and enable the importer, at a subsequent date, to have the missing goods cleared without further duty on a value included in entry or to obtain a refund of duty if such is desired.

SETTLERS' EFFECTS ENTRY

Bona fide settlers have no difficulty in bringing their effects with them when entering Canada. They have simply to make affidavit that they have owned their effects for at least 6 months, and that they intend to become bona fide settlers in Canada. Setlers going to the United States must state under oath that they have owned their effects for at least one year, but are not required to come under any obligation to become permanent settlers. The Canadian has this advantage, that he can enter the United States for the season and take his effects with him, and not have them become liable for duty.

TOURING WITH AUTOMOBILES, ETC.

A resident of the United States after getting a permit from the U.S. Customs, may enter his car into Canada for touring purposes for one month by simply calling at the Canadian customs office on the Canadian side of the Border and subscribing to a permit on a prescribed form.

This permit is made out in duplicate; one copy to remain on file at the port, and the other to be held by the tourist, to be returned to the Collector of Customs and compared with the copy on file, when the car makes its exit from Canada.

Should the tourist return via some other port, he will surrender his permit to the collector at the port of exit, who will at once mail it to the Collector of the port of entry, there to be compared with the copy on

Should the tourist wish to remain in Canada for a longer period, up to 6 months, he will be required to deposit with the collector \$25.00 and furnish a bond for double the amount of duty secured through an accredited guarantee company of Canada. A list of these, compared with their address, may be obtained at the Customs.

Should a tourist not return within the time limit, the car would be liable to seizure. Should a delay occur threatening to prolong the six-month period, the Customs Department should be communicated with at once to learn line of procedure.

Canadian tourists going into the United States must follow a similar line of procedure, and secure a permit on Form C-12 at the Customs, in order to return his car without duty, and also enter his car on the U.S. side for one month on permit. For 6 months he must furnish a bond on an accredited guarantee company of the United States for double the amount of duty, but no deposit is demanded as with cars coming this way.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN EXCISE TAX

In some cases, Foreign Invoices must be raised by the amount of Foreign Excise or Luxury tax; see below:

THE UNITED KINGDOM

The United Kingdom allows a drawback of Excise and Customs duties on exportation of certain goods. This drawback must be taken into account as value for duty when goods are cleared at Customs here, as follows:

FRANCE

The sales tax upon all merchandise is one and three tenths per cent. A large number of articles

classified as luxuries are subject to a luxury tax of 12 per cent in addition to the sales tax of one and three tenths per cent. Brandies, liqueurs, "Aperitifs" and liqueur wines are subject to a luxury tax of 30% instead of the general rate of 12%. Eaux de vie is also subject to a luxury tax of 30%. Ordinary wines are not subject to a luxury tax.

Excise Tax.

Ordinary Wines up to 15 degree .66 Francs per Imperial gallon.

Ordinary Wines above 15 degrees .66 Francs per Imperial gallon and double the consumption tax on alcohol on the quantity of alcohol exceeding 15 degrees.

Liqueur Wines or imitation therof,

Dry and artificial raisin Wines,

Bitters and aperient beverages other than wine bases,—

Consumption tax on alcohol 1150 Francs per hectolitre of pure alcohol or 52.2 Francs per Imperial gallon.

Champagne is not subject to Excise or Luxury Tax.

HOLLAND (NETHERLANDS)
On spirits of 50% strength the Excise Tax is 6.82 florins per imperial gallon. Invoice must be raised.

ITALY.

An Italian Stamp Tax or an income tax of either ½ per cent., one per cent., or two per cent. ad valorem is levied on luxury and other goods. This tax does not apply to foodstuffs or goods of prime necessity. Invoices should be raised to meet this tax if the transfer is not less than ten lire.

CZECHO-SLOVAKIAN REPUBLIC.

All goods from this republic are subject to a Sales Tax of 1%, except a list that carry 10%. Invoice must be raised.

GERMANY.

There is a general Luxury or Sales Tax of 1½% on all merchandise sold in Germany. Also a large list of goods that takes 15%. This home tax must be taken into account in extending value for duty. Importers of goods from the above countries should confer with the local Customs Authorities to learn just how the import duty is affected by the abovementioned foreign taxes.



Chartered Banks in Canada are incorporated by Special Act of the Dominion Parliament and governed by the Bank Act (13-14 George V. Chap. 32), which specifies clearly the transactions in which banks may or may not legally engage, and embodies regulations designed to ensure the proper conduct of the banks' affairs. They are prohibited from engaging in any trade or business, from loaning money on the security of or dealing in the shares of any bank and from loaning more than \$10,000.00 to any of their officers or clerks.

Banks are empowered to issue notes, the amount of same being limited to the aggregate of the amount of unimpaired paid-up capital, plus the amount of current gold coin and Dominion notes deposited with the Central Gold Reserves; except that from Sept. 1st to the last day of February an additional issue is allowed (to assist the moving of the crops) to an amount not exceeding 15% of the combined unimpaired paid-up capital and rest or reserve fund. Banks must, when required, make payments of the company to the co

ments in Dominion Government notes up to \$100.

In the event of a bank suspending payment, the payment of notes in circulation is a first charge upon the assets of the bank. Notes are further secured by a Circulation Fund held by the Dominion Government. Each bank contributes to this fund an amount equal to 5% of its average circulation. If this fund were not sufficient, then each bank must make up the deficiency in proportion to its circulation. If the Directors of the Bank, Liquidator, etc., fail to make arrangements within two months from the day of suspension for the payment of all its notes and interest thereon, the Minister may make arrangements for the payment out of the Circulation Fund together with interest at 5% per annum from the day of the suspension to the day named for redemption.

While deposits are not a first charge on the assets of an insolvent bank, depositors have a certain measure of protection in the double liability clause, which provides that shareholders are subject to double liability, i.e., in the event of insolvency, if the property and assets of the bank are insufficient to pay off its debts and liabilities, each shareholder is liable for the deficiency to an amount equal to the par value of the shares held by him, in addition to any amount not paid up on such shares. Shareholders who sell their stock are not relieved of the double liability until the expiration of sixty days.

TRUST COMPANIES AND LOAN COMPANIES IN CANADA

Trust Companies act as Executors, Trustces and Administrators under wills, or by appointment as Trustees under marriage or other settlements, as Agent or Attorney in the management of estates of the living, as Guardian of minors or incapable persons, as Fiscal Agent for municipalities and companies, and, where so appointed, as Authorized Trustees in Bankruptcy. Some Trust Companies receive deposits and funds for guaranteed investments, but the loaning of actual trust funds is restricted by law.

The principal function of Loan Companies is the loaning of funds on first mortgage security; the money thus made available for development purposes being obtained mainly by the sale of debentures to the investing public and by Savings Department deposits.

REGULATIONS, ETC.

FIRST CLASS MATTER

1. Letters

The countries included in "North American Con-

The countries included in "North American Continent" entitled to Domestic letter rate are:—
British Guiana, British West Indies, Costa Rica, Cuba, Dominican Republic, Dutch West Indies (Aruba, Bonaire, Curacao, Saba, St. Eustatius, St. Martin), French West Indies (Martinique, Guadeloupe), Guatemala, Haiti, Honduras Republic, Mexico, Newfoundland, Nicaragua, Panama Republic, Salvador, and St. Pierre and Miquelon.

Letters and post-cards unpaid or insufficiently prepaid, whether domestic or foreign, will be forwarded to destination and double the deficiency charged on delivery.

2. Postcards

Cards bearing the printed title "Post Card" or "Private Post Card" can be admitted to both Canadian and International mails at printed matter rate, provided that they bear no written communication, and conform in all respects to the regulations regarding printed matter.

Private Post Cards must not exceed a size of 6 inches in length by 4 inches in width, nor be less than 4 inches in length by 3 inches in width.

The right-hand half of the face of the ordinary official post cards and of private post cards is to be strictly reserved for the address, postal directions and postage stamps. The left-hand half of the face and the entire back of the card are available for the purposes of the sender, subject to restrictions as to attaching articles to post cards.

3. 1/2c. Business Reply Cards.

Single reply cards bearing on the face the words "Business Reply Card" and prepaid &c. postage, are issued by the department to be sent out as enclosures with matter mailed in quantity addressed to places within Canada. Any organization using these reply cards must have its name and address printed on the lower right hand half of the face and must have matter (with or without blanks to be filled in) must have matter (with or without blanks to be filled in) printed on the reverse side of the card. Matter must be in print and not produced by mimeograph or similar multiplying process. Notless than 1,000 cards may be mailed at one time. Double reply cards are also available, the first half prepaid 1c. and the reply half, ½c., the first half being for printed communications only.

4. Express or Special Delivery Letters

Special Delivery letters bearing in addition to postage "Special Delivery" stamps of the value of 20 cts. or or-"Special Delivery" stamps of the value of 20 cts. or ordinary postage stamps of the value of 20 cts., and the words "Special Delivery" legibly written on the upper left hand corner of the envelope, may be accepted in Canada for special Delivery at any place in the United States and at the following cities in Canada: In Ontario—Belleville, Brantford, Brockville, Chatham, Fort William, Galt, Guelph, Hamilton, Kingston, Kitchener, Lindsay, London, Niagara Falls, North Bay, Oshawa, Ottawa, Owen Sound, Pembroke, Peterboro', Port Arthur, Sarnia, Stratford, Sault Ste. Marie, St. Catharines, St. Thomas, Toronto, Walkerville, Waterloo, Windsor and Woodstock; in Quebec—Hull, Montreal, Quebec, St. Hyacinthe, Sherbrooke, Shawinigan Falls, and Trois Eivières; in New Brunswick—Fredericton, Moncton and St. John; in Nova Scotia—Amherst, Halifax and Sydney; in Manitoba—Brandon and Winni-Halifax and Sydney; in Manitoba—Brandon and Winnipeg; in Saskatchewan—Moose Jaw, Prince Albert, Regina and Saskatoon; in Alberta-Calgary, Edmonton, Leth-

bridge and Medicine Hat; in British Columbia— Nanaimo, New Westminster, Vancouver and Victoria; in P.E. Island—Charlottetown. The "Special Delivery" stamps may be obtained at any Money Order post office.

Fully paid registered letters bearing "Special Delivery" stamps or ordinary stamps of the value of 20 ets., in addition to the postage and registration fee and the words "Special Delivery," come under the operations of this scheme of special delivery.

5. Registration

The scale of Registration Fees in addition to the Postage on all classes of matter to all Postal Union Countries except parcels sent by parcel post, is as follows:-

Both the Postage charge and Registration fee should,

in all cases, be prepaid by stamp.

The sender of a registered article for delivery in Canada or in any other Postal Union Country, can obtain an acknowledgment of its receipt by the addressee at an action delication to the ordinary postage and registration fees if requested at the time of posting. If requested after the registered article has been posted, the fee is 20 cents.

INDEMNITY FOR REGISTERED ARTICLES

Indemnity will be paid, provided the loss of the registered article is reported to the Department within one year of the date of posting, upon receipt of certain sworn statements of the persons concerned.

Canada. - In the case of registered articles posted in Canada for delivery in Canada, indemnity covers not only loss, but also rifling and damage. Indemnity is

provided at scale of charges shown above.

British and Foreign.—Except in cases beyond control (e.g., tempest, shipwreck, earthquake, and war), the Postal Administrations of all countries and Colonies included in the Postal Union undertake to pay an indemnity of 50 francs (\$10) when it is proved to their satisfaction that a letter or packet duly admitted to Registration has been entirely lost whilst in their custody.

SECOND CLASS MATTER

6. Transient Newspapers

Transient newspapers and periodicals include all newspapers and periodicals published in Canada, other than Canadian newspapers sent from the office of publication and British, Canadian and foreign newspapers posted by newsdealers. When addressed to any place within the Dominion, the United States or Mexico, and, when published in Canada and addressed to any place in lished in Canada, and addressed to any place in Great Britain, or British Possessions as mentioned above, they must be prepaid the following rate by Postage Stamp:

One cent per four oz. or fraction of four oz.

To countries other than those mentioned above the rate is two cents for two oz. or fraction thereof.

Transient newspapers and periodicals not published in Canada are subject to the ordinary printed matter rate of 2 cents per 2 ozs. for all countries except Canada, U.S. A. and Mexico.

7. Newspapers and Periodicals

Printed and published in Canada and posted from

the office of publication.

The general postage rate on newspapers and periodicals printed and published in Canada not less frequently than once a month, mailed by the publishers at the post office in the place where they are published, and addressed to regular subscribers or to newsdealers (not resident in the place of publication) in Canada, Great Britain, and (provided they can be forwarded by direct mail steamers or via England in the following British Possessions:—Barbados, Bermuda, British Guiana, Ceylon, Cyprus, Falkland Islands, Fiji, Gambia, Gibraltar, Grenada, Hong Kong, Jamaica, Leeward Islands, Malta, Mauritius, Newfoundland, New Zealand, Northern Nigeria, St. Lucia and St. Vincent, Sarawak, Seychelles, Sierra Leone, Southern Nigeria, State of North Borneo, Trinidad and Tobago, Turk's Islands, Union of South Africa (comprising the Provinces of British Bechuanaland, Cape of Good Hope, Natal, Orange Free State and Transvaal), Windward Islands and Zanzibar, is a bulk rate of 1½ cents per pound. The following exception, however, is to be noted:—Newspapers and periodicals published not more frequently than once a week and not less frequently than once a month, in any city, town or village which has a popula-tion of not more than 10,000, are entitled to pass free to regular subscribers and newsdealers in Canada to the extent of a circulation of 2,500 copies per issue within a distance of 40 miles from their place of publication. In all cases the centre of the area for free distribution will be the place of publication. Such newspapers and periodicals may also be delivered free to subscribers at the office at which they have been posted, except in cities where the letter carrier system is established. In the latter case ordinary transient newspaper rates are charged.

Copies of legitimate daily newspapers can be mailed by the publishers in Canada to regular subscribers and newsdealers in the United States or Mexico on prepayment in cash at the rate of 2 cents per pound or fraction thereof. Other newspapers and periodicals sent to the United States or Mexico either by publishers or other individuals are subject to the rate of 1 cent per 4

The postage on bond fidé specimen newspapers, and on papers and periodicals published less frequently than once a month, is 2 cents per lb.

8. British and Foreign Newspapers posted by Newsdealers in Canada

British and foreign publications as well as Canadian publications, if authorized by the Department may be posted by newsdealers in Canada to subscribers in Canada at the rate of 2 cents per lb. They cannot however be posted at that rate for local delivery at places where there is a free letter carrier service. Newsdealers may also post recognized Canadian newspapers and periodicals to regular subscribers in Great Britain and British Possessions as mentioned above, at the bulk rate of 2 cents per pound.

9. Books, Limits of Weight, etc.

A Book Packet may contain any number of separate books. Limit of weight for post in Canada, 5 lbs. For British and foreign post, 4 lbs. 6 ozs., but in case of a single book, a weight of 11 lbs. is allowed in the domestic mails, also in mails for the United States and Mexico. The limit of weight for a single book sent to Great Britain or other countries is 6 lbs, 9 ozs. Limit of size, domestic: $3\frac{1}{2}$ feet in length, width or depth, but in no case must the combined length and girth exceed 6 feet. For all other countries—18 inches in any direction, unless in the form of a roll, when a length of 30 inches is allowed provided the diameter does not exceed 4 inches.

Book packets must be put up in such a way as to admit of contents being easily examined. They may contain an unsealed invoice, but must not contain any letter or sealed inclosure.

Books for the use of the blind are free of Canadian postage when addressed to places in Canada, New-foundland, the United States and Mexico, and correspondence passing between blind persons in raised characters is chargeable at the rate of 1 cent per 2lb., and full prepayment is compulsory.

THIRD CLASS MATTER

10. Printed Matter, Circulars, Samples, Miscellaneous Matter

Miscellaneous matter, described as under, may pass between places in the Dominion of Canada upon pre-payment of the rates indicated below. The regulations do not admit of the transmission by mail to Great Britain (or other countries beyond the sea) of miscellaneous matter as such; but a great part of the matter referred to under that head may be forwarded to Great Britain and other countries at the rate applicable to books, etc .:-

Matter (other than newspapers and periodicals), wholly in print without reference to process, such as circulars, catalogues, calendars, hand-bills, books, pamphlets, printed forms, maps, prints, drawings, plans (without written specifications), engravings, lithographs, photographs (when not on glass or in cases containing glass), official or private post cards in quantities, sheet music (whether printed or written) instruction books in music, visiting cards and single post cards without written communications, the manuscript of books or newspapers (whether hand-written or type-written) botanical entomological and mineralogical specimens and the following partly-written and partly-printed matter:-militia and school returns, customs manifests, voters' lists, school or college examination papers and educational exercises passing between colleges and extra-mural students (written corrections and comments on examination papers and educational exercises may be enclosed with them, but no correspondence is allowed), printers' proof sheets with corrections, exhibition entry tickets, municipal assessment rolls, Dominion and Provincial Government returns on official blanks, with the exception of forms relating to commercial enterprises, such as telephones, railways, electric light, etc. operated by Provincial Governments, on which the rate of postage is 1 cent for each 2 ozs. or fraction thereof. To come within this class the material printed upon must be either paper, cardboard or parchment.

DEFINITION OF CIRCULARS

Circulars are communications in print, or produced by a multiplying process easy to recognise, but not direct from a typewriting machine, which are issued in identical terms to several individuals. A circular may, without becoming liable to a higher rate of postage, have a written date and signature, and may have the name of the addressee repeated in writing inside. Reproductions of imitations of hand or typewritten matter, in order to be accepted as circulars, must be handed in at the post office wicket, in a number not less than twenty identical copies, separately addressed. Failure to comply with either of these conditions will subject the article to letter rate of postage.

No letter or other communication intended to serve the purpose of a letter must be sent or inclosed in any such package or thing mentioned, and the same must be sent in covers open at the ends or sides, or otherwise so put up as to admit of the contents being, if necessary, easily withdrawn for examination by the officers of the Post Office to ensure compliance with this provision (if enclosed in sealed envelopes notched at the ends or sides, or with the corners cut off, letter rate of postage will be charged).

Writing paper specially prepared for the use of the blind transmitted from a recognized Institution for the Blind in Canada to blind persons for their own use is allowed to pass at the rate of 1 cent for each 2 lb. or fraction thereof; but before any Institution can post such paper at the above rate the Post Office Department at Ottawa must be satisfied as to its claim to be considered an Institution for the Blind.

LIMIT OF WEIGHT, ETC.

The limit of weight for a packet of miscellaneous matter is 5 lbs., and the general limit of size is $3\frac{1}{2}$ ft. in length, width or depth, but in no case must the length and girth combined exceed 6 feet.

Printed or written requests for return are recognized on books, miscellaneous matter, samples and parcels of merchandise, addressed to places within the Dominion, or in the United States, and same will be returned direct to the sender, subject to the payment by the sender, on delivery to him through the Post Office, of the full amount of postage to which the article was in the first place liable, together with any charges rated thereon on account of any deficiency in the original prepayment.

Full prepayment is compulsory for printed matter to places outside Canada, except U.S.A. and Mexico.

11. Samples, Canada, U.S.A. and Mexico

Samples of Merchandise and Goods not having saleable value and not exceeding 1 lb. in weight, may be posted in Canada, to be forwarded to any place in the Dominion, U.S.A., or Mexico, on prepayment of a rate of 1 cent for each 2 ozs, or fraction thereof under the following regulations:

Size limit, 18" x 8" x 4", or if rolled 18" long x 6" diameter.

Samples must be sent in covers open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination. Samples, however, of seeds drugs, &c., which cannot be sent in open covers, may be enclosed in bags of linen, or such like material, fastened in such a manner that they may be readily opened.

There must be no writing upon or in any packet of samples, except the address of the person for whom it is intended, the address of the sender, a trade mark or number and the price of the articles, or such words as may be necessary to indicate precisely the origin and nature of the merchandise.

Articles of saleable value even when intended to serve as samples, or goods sent for sale or in execution of an order, however small the quantity may be, or any article sent by one private individual to another, which are not actually trade samples, are not admissible.

Liquids (except intoxicating liquors), oils, etc., may be sent by mail in the Dominion if put up carefully in strict accordance with the directions given in the Postal Guide and ascertainable at any post office.

12. Samples for Great Britain and Foreign Countries

Samples of Merchandise, when addressed to places in Great Britain, must not exceed 1 lb. in weight, and must be prepaid. Size limit, 18" x 8" x 4", or if rolled 18" long x 6" diameter. See page 164 Table of Rates.

Samples of liquids (except intoxicating liquors), oils, glass, etc., are admitted as samples provided they are put up in strict accordance with the directions given in the Postal Guide.

13. Commercial Papers British and Foreign Post

Legal and commercial papers generally are liable to letter rate of postage when posted for delivery within the Dominion of Canada.

"Commercial Papers" are understood to comprise all papers or documents written or drawn wholly or partly by hand (except letters or communications of the nature of letters or other papers or documents having the character of an actual and personal correspondence), documents of legal procedure, deeds drawn up by public. functionaries, copies of or extracts from deeds under private seal and (whether written or printed on stamped or unstamped paper) way bills, bills of lading, invoices and other documents of a mercantile character, documents of insurance and other public companies, all kinds of manuscript music, the manuscript of books and other literary works, also open letters and post cards of ancient date which have already fulfilled their original purpose and pupils' exercises in original and corrected form but without any note which does not relate directly to the execution of the work. The rate, British and Foreign, is 2 cents per 2 ozs. but each packet must have a minimum prepayment of 8 cents covering a weight of 8 ozs. prepayment compulsory. No packet must exceed 18 inches in any direction unless in the form of a roll, when a length of 30 inches is allowed, provided the diameter does not exceed 4 inches The weight must not exceed 4 lbs. 6 ozs.

The maximum charge on any parcel up to 8 oz. shall not exceed 1 cent an ounce.

Parcel Post packets totally unpaid will be sent to the Branch Dead Letter Office.

Parcels must be prepared for mailing in such manner

that the contents can be easily examined.

It is desirable that the sender's address should appear either inside the parcel or on the cover. This must be

either inside the parcel or on the cover. This must be kept distinct from the address proper.

Parcels are, when re-directed, chargeable with additional postage at the rate which would have been chargeable had they been originally mailed from the office of re-direction to the new address, except in cases where the original and the re-directed addresses are both within the delivery of the same Post Office.

both within the delivery of the same Post Office. The limit of weight for a Parcel Post packet is fifteen pounds, and the general limit of size is 3½ ft. in length, width or depth, but in no case must the combined length and girth exceed six feet.

Parcel Post packets cannot be registered but can be insured (For fees for insurance of parcels, see paragraph on this page, No. 17).

Closed parcels may be exchanged with Great Britain, Newfoundland and most foreign countries and British colonies under the following Regulations:-

1. Every Parcel must be fully prepaid by postage

stamps.

2. The limit of size for parcels addressed to most countries is 3 ft. in length, width or depth, provided the length and girth combined do not exceed 6 ft. Information regarding the few exceptions to this limit may be obtained at any post office.

3. A Parcel must not contain a letter or any writing in the form of a letter, or any explosive, combustible,

or dangerous articles.

4. All Parcels must be securely and substantially packed and closed.

5. Oils, liquids, etc., can only be forwarded if put up with the same security required in connection with their transmission as samples in the ordinary mails. Fragile articles should be packed with special care.

6. Each Parcel must be plainly directed, and such direction must include the name and full address of the

person for whom the parcel is intended.

7. For each Parcel the sender must fill up a Customs Declaration. On this form the sender will supply an accurate statement of the contents and value of the Parcel; also the address thereof, with signature and place of abode of the sender. The Customs Declaration must be securely affixed by mucilage or paste to the parcel to which it relates.

Parcels from the United Kingdom or any other place beyond the Dominion will be liable to Canadian Custom duties, and under existing regulations must be examined for the purpose by an Officer of the Customs in the presence of the persons addressed.

Parcels must be handed to the Postmaster; in no case should they be dropped into a letter box or other receptacle for mail matter. Parcels to Great Britain may be insured. See par. No. 17, "Insurance" on this page.

The maximum charge on any parcel up to 8 oz. shall not exceed 1c. an ounce.

Parcels must be accompanied by a Customs Declaration, and should be open to inspection (unsealed), but sealed packages may be accepted providing sender's name and address is shown by printed label or rubber stamp, and nature of contents indicated.

17. Insurance of Parcel Post, Canada, United States, Great Britain (including Northern Ireland). Irish Free State, St. Vincent, Grenada, China, Holland. Germany and New Zealand

Parcels posted in Canada for delivery within Canada, U.S.A., Great Britain, (including Northern Ireland), Irish Free State, St. Vincent, Holland, Germany and New Zealand which conform to Parcel Post Regulations are accepted for insurance up to \$100, against loss,

rifling or damage. The insurance fees are, Canada and U.S.:—3 cents for insurance not exceeding \$5, 6 cents for insurance over \$5 but not over \$25; 12 cents for insurance over \$25 but not over \$50 and 30 cents for insurance over \$50 but not over \$100. To Great Britain, Irish Free State, St. Vincent, Grenada, China, Holland, Germany and New Zealand:—12 cents for insurance not exceeding \$50, 30 cents for insurance exceeding \$50 and not exceeding \$100.

18. C.O.D. Service in Canada

Parcels may be sent C.O.D. within Canada whereby charges due the sender up to \$100.00 may be collected from the addressee and remitted to the sender by post office money order. C.O.D. parcels must be mailed at a money order post office but may be addressed to any post office in Canada or to any rural route. A C.O.D. tag, procurable at all money order post offices, must be used. Rural routes starting from money order post offices are for this purpose considered as money order post offices. C.O.D. fees are as follows: 15c for amounts to be collected up to \$50.00; 20c between \$50.00 and \$100.00. 30c between \$50.00 and \$100.00. C.O.D. fee is paid by postage stamps affixed by the sender in addition to the ordinary postage. C.O.D. fee covers insurance where parcels are prepaid at parcel post rates and registration where articles are prepaid at other than parcel post rates. The sender of a C.O.D. parcel may include postage and C.O.D. fee in the amount to be collected. is forbidden to send articles C.O.D. which have not been ordered or requested by the addressees and articles may not be examined before payment of the C.O.D.

The charges on C.O.D. articles may be increased, decreased or cancelled upon request of sender, made through Postmaster at office of mailing.

Note: Money order offices are shown in italics in the list of Post offices in Canada commencing on page 180.

19. Prohibited Articles

All explosive, dangerous or destructive substances intoxicating liquors, glass bottles or glass in any form liable to break, and all matter subject to speedy decay, all obscene or immoral books, publications, pictures, etc., libellous post cards and letters the covers of which bear words of an offensive character, and letters and circulars relating to illegal lotteries or other fraudulent schemes. Enquiry should be made at the Post Office in regard to transmitting game, raw furs, skins, plumage, etc., by mail.

20. Useful Hints

Register all valuable letters. Insure valuable parcels. Transmit money by Postal Notes or Money Orders. Make complaints and inquiries in writing, and address the Postmaster General at Ottawa. Preserve, and request correspondents to preserve envelopes of missent or delayed letters. Send to the Postmaster General envelopes of letters about which you seek information or

make complaint. In addressing letters add the name of the County and Province in which the office addressed the county and Province in which the chief are is located. Place stamp on the right-hand upper corner of the address side. Put your own name and full address in or on letter, to insure return if it cannot be delivered. In affixing postage stamps moisten the envelope, not the stamp. When stamps are moistened the gum is apt to be removed.

21. Domestic Money Orders

Post Offices at which Money Orders are issued and paid, are distinguished in the List of Post Offices, page 180, by being printed in *italics*.

DOMINION GOVERNMENT ANNUITIES

The Annuities Act was passed in order to provide a fixed yearly income, payable by the Government of Canada for life. Any resident of Canada may purchase a Canadian Government Annuity; or employers of labour may contract for Annuities for their employees; or societies incorporated for fraternal or other purposes, may contract for Annuities for their members. A Canadian Government Annuity is free from Dominion taxation, it is payable for life, not transferable, cannot be alienated, forfeited or stolen, cannot be seized or levied upon by process of law. Annuities may be purchased for any sum from \$10 to \$5000. As an example, a man aged 20 may secure an annuity at 60 of \$500 a year for the rest of his life by the payment of \$53.05 annually. At the age of 30 he would pay \$89.85 annually for the same annuity.

THE KING AND ROYAL FAMILY THE HOUSE OF WINDSOR

In 1917 the King, by Order-in-Council, changed the name of the Royal Family, from the House of Hanover to the House of Windsor.

THE KING.—George V., by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the British Dominions beyond the seas, King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India. His majesty is the second son of the late King Edward and Queen Alexandra, the elder son, Prince Albert Victor, Duke of Clarence, having died in January, 1892. George V. was born June 3rd, 1865. He married on July 6th, 1893, his second cousin, Princess Victoria Mary Augusta Louise Olga Pauline Claudine Agnes of Teck.

THE QUEEN.—Mary, only daughter of the late Duke of Teck, was born at Kensington Palace, May 26th, 1867, and was married at Windsor to His Majesty, then Duke of York, on July 6th, 1893.

The children of King George and Queen Mary are:-

Prince Edward Albert Christian, Duke of Cornwall, born June 23rd, 1894. He received investiture as Prince of Wales, July, 1911.

Prince Albert Frederick Arthur George, Duke of York, born December 14th, 1895, married, April 27, 1923, Lady Elizabeth Bowes-Lyon.

Princess Victoria Alexandra Alice Mary, born April 23rd, 1897, married Feb. 28th, 1922, to Viscount Lascelles, eldest son of the Earl of Harewood, has two sons, George Henry Hubert, born February 8, 1923, Gerald David, born August 21, 1924.

Prince Henry William, born March 31st, 1900.

Prince George Edward, born December 20th, 1902. Prince John Francis Charles, born July 12th, 1905, died January 18th, 1919.

The surviving children of the late King Edward VII. besides King George V., are:—

Princess Louise, Dowager Duchess of Fife (Louisa Victoria Alexandra Dagmar), born February 20th, 1867; married July 27th, 1889, Alexander William George, Duke of Fife, died 29th of January, 1912. Has two daughters, Alexandra, Duchess of Fife, born May 27th 1891, married October 15th, 1913, Prince Arthur of Connaught; and Maud born April 3rd 1893.

Princess Victoria Alexandra Olga Mary, born July 6th, 1868.

Princess Maud Charlotte Mary Victoria, born November 26th, 1869; married 22nd July, 1896, to Charles second son of the Crown Prince of Denmark, chosen King of Norway, November, 1905. Has one son Olaf.

Her Royal Highness Louise Caroline Alberta, born March 18th, 1848; married March 21st, 1871 to the Marquis of Lorne, ninth Duke of Argyll, who died in 1914

Arthur married Alexandra, Duchess of Fife; Margaret married Gustavus Adolphus, Crown Prince of Sweden, died 1920, and Patricia, married Commander Ramsay, son of the Earl of Dalhousie.

Her Royal Highness Beatrice Mary Victoria Feodora, born April 14th, 1857; married July 23rd, 1885, to Prince Henry of Battenburg, who died January 20th, 1896, and had issue three sons, of whom the youngest, Maurice, born 1891, was killed in action in France, October 27th, 1914, and one daughter, now Queen Victoria of Spain, married King Alfonso, May 31st, 1906.

The deceased children of her late Majesty Queen Victoria are:—

Edward VII., born November 9th, 1841; succeeded to the throne, January 22nd, 1901, died May 6th, 1910. He married Princess Alexandra of Denmark, March 10th, 1863. On the death of the King, Queen Alexandra took the title of Queen Mother. She died Nov. 20th, 1925.

Her Imperial Majesty Victoria Adelaide Mary Louisa, Princess Royal, Empress Frederick of Germany, born Nov. 21st, 1840, and married Jan. 25th, 1858, to Frederick Crown Prince of Prussia, afterwards (March to June, 1888) second German Emperor, who died June 15th, 1888, died August 5th, 1901, and had issue four sons (two deceased), the eldest William, the ex-German Emperor and four daughters.

Her Royal Highness Alice Maud Mary, born 25th, 1843; died December 14th, 1878; married his Royal Highness Prince Frederick Louis of Hesse, July 1st, 1862, who died March 13th, 1892; had issue five daughters and two sons; the second son died by accident, May, 1873; the youngest daughter died November 15th, 1878.

His Royal Highness Alfred Ernest Albert, Duke of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha, born August 6th, 1844; married the Grand Duchess Marie of Russia, January 9th, 1874, died January 30th, 1900; issue, a son, born Oct. 15th, 1874, (died February 6th, 1899) and four daughters, born October 29th, 1875, November 25th, 1876, September 1st, 1878, and March 1884.

Her Royal Highness Helena Augusta Victoria, born May 25th, 1846, died June 9th, 1923; married to H. R. H. Prince Frederick Christian Charles Augustus of Schleswig-Holstein-Sonderburg-Augustenburg, July 5th, 1866 (died October 28th, 1917); issue three sons, one of whom died an infant, and one died in South Africa, October, 1900, and two daughters.

His Royal Highness Leopold George Duncan Albert, Duke of Albany, born April 7th, 1853; married April 27th, 1882, to Princess Helen of Waldeck, and died March 28th, 1884, having had issue one son, now Duke of Albany, who succeeded his uncle, the Duke of Edinburgh, as Duke of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha, on July 30th, 1909, and one daughter.

THE KING'S CIVIL LIST

Immediately after the accession of His Majesty George V., there was passed in the Parliamentary session of 1910 the Civil List Act, an Act by which the charges on the consolidated fund for the maintenance of the King and his family are determined.

Until George III. came to the throne in 1760, the income of the sovereign was derived chiefly from Crown lands, from a variety of landed property in England and Wales, Scotland and Ireland, in which the sovereign had a life-interest, and from which he received the rents. In the feudal ages these lands constituted a princely patrimony. In later times this Crown property was greatly reduced by lavish grants to royal favorites. At the Restoration the income from Crown lands was ascertained by a committee of the House of Commons to amount to £217,900 a year, in addition to £4,000 from the Forest of Dean. By the time Charles II. had been on the throne three years he had by his lavish bestowal of the lands on favorites reduced the income to £100,000. William III., by his grants to favorites who had accompanied him from Holland, made further havoc with the Crown domains; so much so that at the accession of Queen Anne, Parliament endeavored to save the remnant by an Act (1 Anne, c. 8) which prohibited alienation of Crown lands, and enacted stringent provisions in regard to the length of the term for which they might be leased and the rents reserved.

Since then, and especially since the accession of the late King Edward VII., the income from the Crown Lands has very greatly increased, until in 1919, it amounted to £1,115,186, an amount double that granted to the King and Royal Family in the Civil List.

Queen Anne, George I. and George II. derived the larger part of their income from their life-interest in the Crown property, but when George III. came to the throne he surrendered his life-interest in the Crown lands. It was turned over to the nation in return for a fixed Civil List of £800,000, subsequently increased to £900,000. George IV., William IV., Queen Victoria and Edward VII., on their accessions, surrendered their lifeinterest in the Crown lands in return or a Civil List. The same course was taken by George V. when he came to the throne; and on June 15th, 1910, a committee of the House of Commons was appointed to recommend the new Civil List. It reported on the 6th of July, 1910, and its recommendations were embodied in an Act (1 George V., c. 5), which was passed through all its stages in the House of Lords on August 2nd, 1910. By this Act the King's Civil List was fixed at the yearly sum of £470,000, which was the same amount as that granted to King Edward VII

Her late Majesty Queen Alexandra in accordance with the Civil List Act passed at the accession of Edward VII. (1 Edward VII., c. 4), enjoyed an annuity of £70,000, and a similar provision is made in the Civil List Act of 1910 for Queen Mary in case she survives the King.

The late King Edward's daughters, Princess Louise (Dowager Duchess of Fife), Princess Victoria and Princess Maud (Queen of Norway), receive an annual allowance of £18,000 during their joint lives, which will be reduced at the death of each of the said princesses by £6,000.

At the death of Edward VII. the provision for the Royal Family amounted in all to £576,000, being £470,000 for the King's Civil List, and £106,000 in respect of allowances to other members of the Royal Family. This amount was somewhat increased by the allowance of £70,000 made to Queen Alexandra. As the Prince of Wales is entitled to the revenues of the Duchy of Cornwall, no special provision was made for him in the Civil List Act of 1910, but it was provided that, in the event of his marrying, an allowance of £10,000 a year should be made to the Princess of Wales, to be increased to £30,000 should she survive his Royal Highness. Each of King George's sons receives an annuity of £10,000 on coming of age, to be increased to £15,000 on his marrying. The annuity to the Duke of York was increased in 1925 to £25,000, in consideration of the fact that, while the Prince of Wales remains unmarried and without an heir, he is Heir Apparent. The allowance to the Princess Mary is £6,000 a year. No provision is made in the Act for children of younger members of the Royal Family.

The revenues of the Duchies of Cornwall and Lancaster are outside the Civil List arrangement. Those of Cornwall, valued at £60,000 a year, are vested in the eldest son of the reigning sovereign, who becomes by birth the Duke of Cornwall, by virtue of a patent of Edward III. in 1337. The Duchy of Lancaster was the private patrimony of Henry Bolingbroke, son of John of Gaunt. It is separate from the other possessions of the Crown in order and government, but united to it in point of inheritance. It brings in a revenue of about £40,000 a year.

THE BRITISH GOVERNMENT

There were few changes in the Baldwin Ministry in 1925. At the General Election on October 29, 1924, the Conservatives had been returned with a decisive majority over the Labor and Liberal parties combined. The figures were:—Conservatives, 412; Labour 152; Liberals 42; Constitutionalists, 3; others 6. During the year the Conservatives suffered several reverses at bye-elections, but not sufficient to affect their command of the House of Commons. Only four women were elected in October 1924, as compared with eight in the previous Parliament. As in the administration of Ramsay Macdonald, one woman was included in the Ministry. As yet no woman has enjoyed Cabinet rank in England.

The large majority of the Conservatives did not accurately reflect the politics of the voters. The Conservatives had 412 members of Parliament for a popular vote of 8,000,000. The Labour Party had 187 Members with a popular vote of 5,500,000; and the Liberals 42 Members with a popular vote of 3,000,000. The Conservatives thus secured one member for every 20,000 Conservative votes. The Labour Party one Member for each 36,000; and the Liberals had to secure 76,000 votes for each Member elected.

The House of Commons, as now constituted, has 615 members, as compared with 707 in that elected in December, 1918, and 670 the number before the passing of the Representation of the People Act of 1918, the Act which besides increasing the number of members, gave the vote, under certain restrictions, to women. The Irish representation is now only 13 (all from Northern Ireland), instead of 105: owing to the erection of the Irish Free State which embraces the three Southern Provinces and which sends no members to the British House of Commons.

The House of Commons has never been able to seat all its members. On the floor of the House there are 346 seats and the side gallery, set apart for Members, seats 82—making a total of 450 seats for 615 members. The Strangers' Galleries will seat in all 209 persons, but if a member occupies a seat in them he is debarred

from speaking.

The House of Lords, in 1924 had 738 members, of whom 104 held peerages created since 1916. Twenty-six peerages were held by women, whom the House of Lords has so far excluded from membership. The 28 peers, elected by the Irish peers for life, were not affected by the Government of Ireland Act of 1922. The composition of the House of Lords is as follows:—Hereditary peers, 661; Irish elected life peers, 28; Scottish peers, elected for each new parliament by the Scottish House of Lords, which comes together at Holyrood, solely for this purpose, 16; Archbishops, 2; Bishops, 24; Lords of Appeal—(life peers created to act as Law Lords), 6. In 1925 there were 121 peers, including several minors, who had not taken their seats.

No title attaches to office in Cabinet or Administration. The title Right Honourable is given to all Privy Councillors. These are appointed for life, and every member of the Cabinet, who is not already of the Privy Council, is made a Privy Councillor. The title Honourable is given to every member of the House of Commons.

THE OFFICE OF PRIME MINISTER

Prime Minister-Rt. Hon. Stanley Baldwin Until 1894 the office of the Prime Minister was officially unknown. It had developed as a consequence of the establishment of responsible government under a

party leader, but the Prime Minister, as such, had no official rank and no precedence. The first official recognition was in the form of a mention in the Court Circular, and it was 1905 before, by Royal Warrant, the Prime Minister was given precedence next after the Archbishop of York. There is no salary attached to the office of Prime Minister, but the holder usually combinessome other office which carries a salary. Mr. Baldwin is First Lord of the Treasury, an office usually held by the Prime Minister—Mr. Ramsay MacDonald was also Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, but was also secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, but accepted only one salary for the two offices. In precedence the Prime Minister now has his place between the Archbishop of York and the Lord Chancellor of Ireland, and precedence over every member of his Government except the Lord Chancellor.

The Treasury, of which the Chancellor of the Exchequer is the political head, provides the means for meeting the charges for the military, naval, and civil services. The Parliamentary heads of each of the spending and administrative departments of the Government are responsible for the estimates for their respective departments; but it is the duty of the Chancellor of the Exchequer, with the permanent Secretary of the Treasury, to check all these estimates before they are submitted to the House of Commons in Committee of Supply. The Cabinet becomes responsible for estimates which have been submitted to Parliament, and the rejection or reduction of an estimate by the House of Commons is tantamount to a defeat of the Government. The duties which bring the Chancellor of the Exchequer most prominently before the country, are those in connection with the Budget. The first Lord of the Treasury is one of its Parliamentary heads; but the duties of the First Lord are little more than nominal, and the office is usually held by the Leader of the House of Commons. The Parliamentary Secretary to the Treasury is the official title of the Government whip in the House of Commons. The Junior Lords are his assistants. The Financial Secretary represents the Treasury in the House of Commons.

THE HOME OFFICE

Secretary of State for Home Affairs-Rt. Hon. Sir William Joynson-Hicks.

Under Secretary-Godfrey Locker-Lamson, (£1,500)

The Home Department has the control of the London police force, and also the oversight of the police forces in the counties and municipal boroughs; and, generally speaking, the Department is responsible for the internal peace of the country. Prisons, convict establishments, criminal lunatic asylums, executions, and all matters connected with the post-judicial execution of the criminal law, come within the purview of the Home Office. It is also responsible for the administration of the factory code, and the laws relating to mining.

THE FOREIGN OFFICE

Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs—Rt. Hon. J. Austen Chamberlain.

Under Secretary-Rt. Hon. Ronald McNeill, (£1,500)

All diplomatic intercourse is conducted by the Secre-All diplomatic intercourse is conducted by the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, who is usually of the House of Lords. The office is next in rank and importance to that of Premier, and is sometimes held in conjunction with that office. Ambassadors and consuls receive their instructions from the Foreign Office. Foreign ambassadors in London have their audiences with the Secretary of State, and he also conducts the negotiations for international treaties. The Under Secretary represents the Department in the House of Secretary represents the Department in the House of Commons.

THE COLONIAL OFFICE

Secretary of State for the Colonies and Dominion Affairs—Rt. Hon. Lt.-Col. L. C. M. S. Amery.

Under Secretary-Hon. W. G. Ormsby-Gore, (£1,500)

The Colonial Office dates back to 1660, when a Committee of the Privy Council was appointed for the Plantations, as the Colonies were then called. This Council was continued until 1768, when colonial affairs were placed under the control of a Secretary of State. When the United States secured their independence in 1783, the office of Colonial Secretary was abolished, and colonial affairs were managed from the Home Office. From 1794 to 1854 the colonies were under the War Department. In 1854 a separate Secretaryship of State for the Colonies was created. In August, 1907, State for the Colonies was created. In August, 1907, the Colonial Office was organized in 3 departments; (1) Dominion Department, concerned exclusively with the self-governing colonies (2) Crown Department concerned with Crown Colonies; and (3) Department having charge of legal and financial business,

In 1925, the premier announced that the Colonial Office no longer correspond to the actual constitutional position within the Empire, and that the conduct of affairs for the Dominions would henceforth be under a separate new Secretaryship of State for Dominion Affairs, but that for convenience the new Secretaryship would be vested in the person of the Secretary of State for the Colonies.

THE INDIA OFFICE

Secretary of State for India-Rt. Hon. the Earl of Birkenhead.

Under Secretary—Earl Winterton, (£1,500)

The India Office in its present form dates from 1858, when an Act of Parliament was passed which directed that all the powers and duties hitherto exercised by the old East India Company, or the old Board of Control, should in future be exercised and performed by one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State. Under

the Government of India Acts of 1915, 1916 and 1919, the Secretary for India is assisted by a Council of not less than eight nor more than twelve members, nominated by the Secretary. At least half the members must have served or resided ten years in India and not have left India more than five years before their appointment. The expenditure of the revenues of India is subject to the control of the Secretary of State. cases where the Indian Legislative Assembly and the Viceroy are in agreement, the Secretary for India would not ordinarily intervene.

THE WAR OFFICE

Secretary of State for War-Rt. Hon. Sir Laming Worthington-Evans.

Under Secretary-Rt. Hon. Earl of Onslow, (£1,500).

Parliamentary and Financial Secretary to the War Office—Capt. H. Douglas King, (£1,200)

The Secretary for War has control of the army at home and abroad, and is responsible for its efficiency to the Sovereign and to Parliament. He directs all movements of troops, and all appointments made by the Commander-in-Chief are subject to his approval.

THE AIR MINISTRY

Secretary of State for Air-Rt. Hon. Sir Samuel J. G.

Under Secretary—Major Sir. Philip Sassoon.

At the close of the war the Air Ministry was made part of the War Department. So much objection was raised to this arrangement that in 1921 it was again erected into a separate Department and in 1923, when the first Baldwin Cabinet was formed, the Secretary was included in the Cabinet, as was also the case in both the Labour and Conservative Cabinets of 1924.

THE ADMIRALTY

First Lord of the Admiralty-Rt. Hon. Wm. C. Bridge-

Civil Lord of the Admiralty-Earl Stanhope, (£1,000)

Parliamentary and Financial Secretary to the Admiralty-J. C. C. Davidson.

The Admiralty, which has charge of the Royal Navy, is administered by Lords Commissioners. The head of the Department, who is always of the Cabinet, is known as the First Lord of the Admiralty. The other Lords Commissioners or Junior Lords are officers without seats in Parliament, and are respectively at the heads of the departments into which the Admiralty is divided. The foreign movements of ships are at the instance of the Cabinet, the Foreign Office, and the Colonial Office, and it is from these authorities that the Lords of the Admiralty receive their orders. In time of war the orders go from the Cabinet. At other times the movements of vessels are directed by the Foreign Office and the Colonial Office.

THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

President—Rt. Hon. Lord Eustace Percy Parliamentary Secretary—Duchess of Athol, (£1,200)

The Education Department exercises supervision over the various departments of state-aided education, and distributes the grants for education annually made by Parliament. These grants date from 1833; and in 1839 the Committee of Council for Education was established. The Vice-President was always of the House of Commons, and he was practically the Minister of Education. On the 1st of April, 1900, the Committee of Council for Education the Committee of Council for Education the Committee of Council for Education the Committee of Council for Education the Committee of Council for Education the Committee of Council for Education the C came to an end and its powers were transferred to the new Board of Education which consists of a President, the Principal Secretaries of State (these are the Secretaries for Foreign Affairs, for Colonial Affairs, for the Home Department, for War, and for India), the First Commissioner of the Treasury, and the Chancellor of the Exchequer. Under the Education Act of 1918. of the Exchequer. Under the Education Act of 1918, the approval of the Board of Education is necessary for all schemes for the development and organization of elementary and secondary education for children under 18, drawn up by the local authorities—the County and County-borough councils-which have charge of this work.

THE MINISTRY OF HEALTH

President of the Ministry of Health-Rt. Hon. Neville Chamberlain.

Parliamentary Secretary to the Ministry of Health— Sir Kingsley Wood, (£1,200)

Parliamentary Undersecretary for Health for Scotland

-Capt. Walter E. Elliot.

The Ministry of Health came into existence on July 1st, 1919. It then took over the functions of the Local Government Board in connection with the administra-tion of the poor law and of the laws affecting local government, with enlarged powers as regards public health. It also took over from the National Health Insurance Commissioners the administration of the National Insurance Acts.

THE BOARD OF TRADE

President of the Board of Trade-Rt. Hon. Sir Philip Cunliffe-Lister.

Parliamentary Secretaries to the Board of Trade— Overseas Trade Department, Arthur Michael Samuel, (£1,200)

Mines Department, Lt.-Col. G. R. Lane-Fox.

The Board of Trade is in charge of the administration of the laws relating to limited liability companies, and bankruptey; and it also has the oversight of all matters connected with the mercantile marine, harbours, canals, railways, and street car lines and electric lighting. The importance and range of work of the Board of Trade have been greatly increased since the War. In 1921, it took over the duties of the Ministries of

Food and Shipping.

THE POST OFFICE

Postmaster-General-Sir William Mitchell Thomson, (£2,500)

Assistant Postmaster-General-Viscount Wolmer. The Post Office in England controls the telegraph and telephone as well as the home and foreign mail departments. The telegraphs have been a Government undertaking since 1869. The telephones were taken over on Jan. 1st, 1912. The Post Office savings banks, of which there are over 12,000, receive sums up to a maximum of £50 in one year, or £200 in all. They also do a life insurance, and an annuity business on lines intended to meet the needs and convenience of the working classes. the working classes.

The National Insurance Act of 1910 is worked partly through the Post Office, as is also the Old Age Pension

Act of 1908.

THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES President of the Board of Agriculture-Rt. Hon. E. F. L. Wood.

Parliamentary Secretary and Deputy Minister of

Fisheries—Rt. Hon. Lord Bedisloe, (£1,500)
The principal duty of this Department before the war was the administration of the laws for preventing and stamping out cattle disease. It supervised the landing of live cattle imported from abroad. With the war came the necessity of increasing production, and the Board of Agriculture took a much wider scope. It undertook research and experiment, and made campaigns of education for the best use of the land. The addition of the Fisheries gives it supervision of the administration of all laws for the encouragement and improvement of the fishing industry.

THE MINISTRY OF PENSIONS

Minister—Major G. C. Tryon, (£3,000)

Parliamentary Secretary—Lt.-Col. Hon. G. F. Stanley,

This department was created during the war to administer the Acts granting pensions to disabled soldiers and sailors and the dependents of those killed. It was intended to be temporary, but there is no immediate prospect of an end to its work.

THE MINISTRY OF LABOUR
Minister—Rt. Hon. Arthur Steel-Maitland, (£2,000)

Parliamentary Secretary—H. B. Betterton.
The Ministry of Labour is another war creation. It has charge of the administration of laws connected with strikes, labour organization and other labour matters.

THE MINISTRY OF TRANSPORT Minister—Lt.-Col. Rt. Hon. Wilfred Ashley.

The Ministry of Transport, created during the War to oversee the transportation of war materials and food, has proved of more permanent usefulness than was anticipated. It is proposed to turn over its duties to the Board of Trade, but this has not yet been done.

OFFICE OF PUBLIC WORKS AND BUILDINGS

First Commissioner of Works—Viscount Peel.

This Department has the custody and supervision of

all Royal Palaces and parks, and also of buildings such as the Houses of Parliament, the Palace at Westminster, the Law Courts, and the public offices at Whitehall.

Rt. Hon. J. H. Whitley, Speaker of the House of Commons, was first elected to his high office in April, 1921, on the retirement of Speaker Lowther. The holder of the office is striotly non-partisan, and iscustomarily re-elected irrespective of changes of party majorities in the House. A pension (£4,000 a year) is usually voted to a retiring Speaker and he is raised to the House of Lords.

SALARIES

Salaries of Ministers are fixed by Act of Parliament, but each Ministerisfree to do as he pleases with his salary. During the war Ministers agreed to pool their salaries, which differ in amount, and to divide equally—an arrangement which gave each Minister about £4,500. arrangement which gave each Minister about £4,000. The pooling arrangement excited some discussion and led to a proposal that there should be a general revision of Ministers' salaries. In July, 1919, a bill was introduced to raise the salaries of all ministers receiving less than £5,000 to this level. It met with strong opposition on account of the state of the National Finances. A vote taken on August 6th, showed 178 in favour, 85 opposed, and 130 not voting. The bill was postponed until the autumn session, when a new arrangement was made by which most of the salaries, but not all, were increased to £5,000.

THE BRITISH ARMY

Before the Norman Conquest every freeman was bound to bear arms in defence of his country at the call of the King. This national militia was partially, but never wholly, superseded by the feudal system, introduced by-William I, under which lands were held in return for units of cavalry and infantry which had to serve for 40 days at the cost of the lord. In addition, kings frequently maintained mercenaries, first out of their private funds and later out of the royal revenues. Parliamentary consent to the maintenance of an army was established in the seventeenth century as a result of a struggle between the Commons and the Stuarts. The standing army became a national institution under James II, and the Mutiny Act, passed at the accession of William III, in 1689, and which has been renewed annually ever since, forms the basis of army discipline, without which a standing army would be impossible.

ADMINISTRATION

The Army is administered by the Army Council, the President of which is the Secretary of State for War. The other members are the Under-Secretary for War. The other members are the Under-Secretary for War, who is Vice President; the Chief of the Imperial General Staff, the Adjutant General, the Quarter-master General, the Master General of Ordnance, the Finance Member, and two permanent secretaries of the War Office. Only the President and Vice President are political appointments. Both are members of the Ministry which goes out with the resignation of the Prime Minister. The King is ex-officio head of the Air Council and Commandering Chief of the Army. Council and Commander-in-Chief of the Army.

COMPOSITION

The Army consists of the REGULAR ARMY, the RESERVES, the TERRITORIAL ARMY, which has absorbed the two older forces of the Militia and the Yeomanry, and the ROYAL MARINES, which are administered by the Navy but appear on both the army and the navy lists. Enlistment in all these forces in times of peace is voluntary. The term of service in the regular army. is voluntary. The term of service in the regular army is 12 years, of which from 3 to 9 years are spent with the colors and the remainder of the term with the reserves. The usual service is seven years with the colors and five years in the reserve.

COST

Cost
The Army Estimates, presented to Parliament on March 12, 1925, by Sir Laming Worthington-Evans, Secretary for War in the Baldwin Cabinet, called for an expenditure of £44,500,000, a reduction of half a million from that of 1924-1925. The number of troops asked for was 160,600 but owing to the difficulty in securing recruits Sir L. Worthington-Evans estimated that there would be a probable shortage of two to three thousand. The number asked for in 1924 was 161,600 but this total had not been attained. The reasons given for the failure to recruit the numbers required were (1) war-weariness and aversion to military life; (2) the attraction of emigration; (3) unemployment doles, which destroyed the bread-line

motive; and (4) uncertainty of employment at the end of the service. From 55% to 60% of the applicants had been rejected as unsuitable physically.

THE TERRITORIAL ARMY

The Territorial Army strength for 1925-1926 was kept at the same figure as in the previous year—7,955 officers and 177,599 of other ranks. In the second half of 1925 a large proportion of the Territorial sterming. ated their four years term of service, and great diffi-culty was experienced in replacing them. The Terri-torial Army is organized in 14 divisions, each including 3 infantry brigades, composed of 4 battalions, with division artillery, engineers, and auxiliary services as in the regular army.

THE RESERVES

Owing to the opposition of the trades unions, great difficulty was experienced in forming the Supplementary Reserve which was initiated in 1924. This Reserve was intended as compensation for the smaller Reserve was intended as compensation for the smaller numbers of the Army Reserve, which in 1925 numbered only 85,000, as compared with 145,000 in 1914. The Supplementry Reserve was intended to attract to the army the skilled workmen of the country and especially mechanics, motor drivers, electricians, and telegraphists. The trades unions took exception to the scheme on the ground that these men might be used by the Government as strike breakers. Explicit assurance was given to each recruit that he should not assurance was given to each recruit that he should not be called up for service in aid of the civil power.

THE INDIAN ARMY

The Indian Army in 1925 consisted of 224,800 officers and men. Of these 71,000 were British and 153,700 were Indian. Previous to 1924 all the higher officers were British, but a policy of Indianization is now in progress, by which Indian officers are being slowly substituted for British who are withdrawn.

The Regular Army consists of :—Cavalry, 20 regiments; Artillery, 162 regiments; Royal Engineers, Infantry, 124 regiments; Machine Gun Corps, Tank Corps, Labour Corps, Service Corps, Medical Corps, Army Dental Corps, Ordnance Corps, Veterinary Corps, Chaplains' Department, Queen Alexandra Imperial Military Nursing Service, Pay Corps, Educational Corps, Military Accountants Corps.

THE BRITISH NAVY

THE BRITISH NAVY, as a national force, dates back 16 cruisers, 27 torpedo boat destroyers and 24 subthe Tudors, although as early as the ninth century, marines. The work is to be carried out as follows: to the Tudors, although as early as the ninth century, King Alfred maintained ships of war out of the royal revenues. During the middle ages, and even after the reorganization of the Royal Navy by Henry VIII, naval defence was the duty of the ports and sea-board towns—a duty afterwards commuted into money, and levied by Charles I, under the name of Ship Money, in a manner which helped to bring about the Rebellion of a manner which helped to bring about the Rebellion of 1642. The Navy entered its modern period under Charles II, and was greatly improved and enlarged under his successor, James II (1685-88). It then included 173 ships of a total tonnage of 101,892 tons, carrying, when in commission, 42,003 men and 6,390 guns. During the century which followed, many abuses crept into its management, and in 1797 occurred the mutinies of Spithead and the Nore, which brought about many reforms in the treatment and feeding of the sailors. At this time (the Napoleonic Wars) the Navy included 411 ships, totaling 402,555 tons. The nineteenth century saw the change from sail to steam and from wood to iron and steel with the consequent steady growth in tonnage, culminating in the quent steady growth in tonnage, culminating in the modern Grand Fleet.

At the present time the Royal Navy is governed by the Board of Admiralty at Whitehall, headed by the First Lord of the Admiralty who is a member of the Cabinet. In addition the Board includes 4 sea lords, the Deputy Chief of Naval Staff and the Assistant Chief, one Civil Lord, a Parliamentary and Financial Secretary and a permanent Secretary. The Civil Lord and the Parliamentary Secretary are members of the Ministry. The King is, ex-officio, Admiral of the Fleet. istry.

The Navy Estimate, presented to Parliament on March 29th called for £60,500,000, an increase of £4,500,000 over the vote for 1925-1926. The vote did not, however, include the cost of new construction, the programme for which was not ready until July. The March Estimate included pay for an increased personnel of 2175 men, and an increase of £4,310,000 for marriage allowances for officers. It was announced that work would be resumed on the Singapore Base, but that a contribution of £250,000 from Hong Kong would relieve the British tax-navers of all cost for conwould relieve the British tax-payers of all cost for construction in 1925-1926. It was also hoped that the offers of help from Australia and New Zealand, rejected by the Labor Government, would be renewed. The estimate of the total cost of the Base had been reduced from £10,000,000 to £9,414,500.

THE ROYAL AIR FORCE

The ROYAL AIR FORCE is administered by the AIR COUNCIL which consists of the King, as Chief of the Air Force, the Secretary and Under-Secretary of State for Air,—who are President and Vice-President of the Council,—Chief of Air Staff, Member for Personnel, Member for Supply and Research, and Secretary to the Council the Council.

The STATIONS of the Air Force are: three in England, one in Northern Ireland, and six abroad. The foreign stations have their headquarters in Northern Africa, Mesopotamia, India, Malta, Palestine, and Trans-Jordania.

The ESTIMATES for the Air Force, for 1925-1926. presented to the House of Commons on February 19, 1925, totalled £21,319,300. This amount included £3,116,700 contributed by the Colonial Office for the Middle East, and £1,320,000 by the Admiralty for the Fleet Arm. The net vote was therefore £15,513,000, as compared with £14,500,000, for 1924-1925. Of this amount £3,412,000 was asked for pay for officers and men and £6,463,000 for research and experiment. The number of men of all ranks provided for in the Vote was 36,000, an increase of 1,000 over the number of 1924-1925. The increase was proportionately small, because, whereas in 1918 it took 81 men to keep one machine in service, in 1923 the figure had dropped to 65 and in 1925 to 51.

In presenting the Estimates, Sir Samuel Hoare stated that it was the intention of the Government to treble the strength of the Air Force over that of 1923, but that even with this rate of increase it would take years to attain numerical equality with that of France, which in 1925 outnumbered the British Force by three to one. In the summer of 1925 the British Force consisted of the equivalent of 54 squadrons of which to one. In the summer of 1925 the British Force consisted of the equivalent of 54 squadrons, of which 433 were organized as such with 21 flights of an average strength of 6 machines—half the strength of a normal squadron provided for the Fleet Air Arm, or for operation from Coastal bases. Of the 433 squadrons, 2513 were stationed at home, 8 in Iraq; 6 in India; and 413 in Egypt and Palestine. The number of completely formed regular squadrons for home defence was 18, a number which will be raised to 26 by March, 1926. by March, 1926.

A scheme of Air Reserves, formed of fliers trained at when completed, the force will include 2 reserves squadrons and 4 auxiliary Air Force squadrons, available in time of emergency. In 1925, the Air Department continued to give aid to civilian flying routes.

CANADIAN RECIPIENTS OF THE "VICTORIA CROSS"

The Victoria Cross (in imitation of the French Cross of the Legion of Honour) was instituted by Queen Victoria at the close of the Crimean campaign, 1856. It is granted to soldiers and sailors of any rank for a single act of valour, the performance of some single deed of devotion in the enemy's presence. It is a Maltese Cross, made of gun metal, with a Royal Crown in the centre surmounted by a lion and the words "For Valour" indented on a scroll below the Crown. The ribbon is red for the army and blue for the navy. A pension of £10 a year accompanies the decoration.

THE IMPERIAL SERVICE ORDER

This civil order of distinction was instituted by King Edward VII, August 8th, 1902, to more fully recognize the faithful and meritorious services rendered by members of the Civil Services of the various parts of the Empire. The following Canadians have been made Companions of that Order:—

THE IMPERIAL SERVICE MEDAL

It is also provided that members not eligible for companionships in the Imperial Service Order may, on retirement after service of twenty-five years or sixteen years, receive the 'Imperial Service Medal," which is of silver and of a design similiar to that of the badge of Companions of the Imperial Service Order.

THE DISTINGUISHED SERVICE ORDER

This Naval and Military Order of Distinction was instituted by Queen Victoria, September 6th, 1886, as a means of rewarding individual instances of meritorious or distinguished service in war.

Synopsis of the statutes relating thereto:-

- (1) This Order is designated the "Distinguished Service Order."
- (2) It consists of the Sovereign, and of such Companions as the Sovereign shall appoint.
- (3) The Kings and Queens Regnant of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Emperors and Empresses of India, are Sovereigns of the Order.
- (4) No person is eligible for this distinction who does not actually hold, at the time of his nomination, a Commission in the Navy, in Land Forces, of Marines, or in the Indian or Colonial Naval or Military Forces, or a Commission in one of the Departments of the Navy or Army, the holder of which is entitled to Honorary or Relative Rank, nor may any person be nominated unless his services shall have been marked by the especial mention of his name, by the Admiral or Senior Naval Officer commanding a Squadron or detached Naval Force, or by the Commander-in-Chief of the Forces in the Field, in despatches for meritorious or distinguished service in the Field, or before the enemy.
- (5) Foreign Officers who have been associated in Naval and Military operations with the British Forces are eligible to be Honorary Members of this Order.
- (6) Appointment is made by Warrant under Royal Sign Manual, and countersigned by one of the Principal Secretaries of State.
- (7) This Order ranks next to and immediately after the Order of the Indian Empire, and the Companions take precedence immediately after the Companions of the said Order of the Indian Empire and shall rank among themselves according to the dates of their respective nominations.
- (8) The Badge of the Order consists of a gold cross, enamelled white, edged gold, having on one side, in the centre, within a wreath of laurel, enamelled green, the Imperial Crown in gold, upon a red enamelled ground, and the crown with the control of the contr and on the reverse, within a similar wreath and on a similar red ground, the Imperial and Royal Cypher V.R.I., and is suspended from the left breast by a red riband, edged blue, of one-inch in width.
- (9) The names of these upon whom the decoration is conferred are published in the London Gazette, and a registry thereof is kept in the office of the Secretary of State for War.

ORDERS OF KNIGHTHOOD, ETC.

The Order of Baronets, the lowest hereditary rank, was instituted in 1611; a Baronet is designated "Sir John Smith, Baronet"—usually written Bart. Taking precedence of Baronets are members of The Most Honourable Privy Council, who are addressed "Right Honourable."

The Order of the Bath, instituted in 1399, and revived in 1725, is divided into three classes—Knights Grand Cross, G.C.B.; Knights Commanders, K.C.B.; and Companions, C.B.

The Order of St. Michael and St. George, instituted in 1818, has also three classes—G.C.M.G., K.C.M.G., and C.M.G.

The Royal Victorian Order, instituted in 1896, has five classes—G.C.V.O., K.C.V.O., C.V.O. Members 4th and 5th classes—M.V.O.

The Order of the British Empire has four classes-K.B.E., C.B.E., O.B.E., and M.B.E.

In all Orders of Knighthood the Knights Grand Cross and the Knights Commanders have the prefix "Sir" with the initials of their class following the name. Companions and Members bear no title, but have the letters C.B., C.M.G., M.V.O., as the case may be, attached to their names.

Knights Bachelors are gentlemen unconnected with any order who have received the honour of Knighthood, and are entitled to the prefix "Sir" and to "Knt." after name. They wear no insignia, and rank immediately after Knights Commander of the Victorian Order.

PUBLIC STATUTORY HOLIDAYS IN CANADA

(See also "Fixed and Movable Festivals," p. 13.)

DOMINION OF CANADA.—Sundays, New Year's Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Christmas Day, the birthday (June 3rd, or day fixed by proclamation for celebration of birthday) of reigning Sovereign. Victoria Day, Dominion Day, the first Monday of September, to be designated "Labour Day", Armistice Day (The Monday in the week in which the 11th of Nov. occurs), and any day appointed by proclamation for a ground fast of the place in the process.

Nov. occurs), and any day appointed by proclamation for a general fast or thanksgiving.

Note.—Thanksgiving Day, when proclaimed, shall be observed on Armistice Day.

ONTARIO.—Sundays, New Year's Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Christmas Day, Dominion Day, birthday of her late Majesty and her Royal successors, Labour Day, and any day appointed by proclamation of Governor-General or Lieutenant-Governor as a public holiday or for a general fast or Governor as a public holiday or for a general fast or thanksgiving, and any Dominion holiday not in-cluded in this list.

## DOMINION PARLIAMENTARY REPRESENTATION

REPRESENTATION BY PROVINCES

The four original provinces of the Dominion were Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, which were given parliamentary representation according to Section 37 of the British North America Act, 1867. By Imperial Orders in Council the provinces of British Columbia and Prince Edward Island vinces of British Columbia and Prince Edward Island were admitted into the Dominion, the former on July 20, 1871, by Order dated May 16, 1871, and the latter on July 1, 1873, by Order dated June 26, 1873. An Act of the Dominion Parliament of May 12, 1870 provided for the formation of the province of Manitoba out of Rupert's Land and the Northwest Territories as soon as these should be admitted into the Dominion of Canada, which admission was effect. Dominion of Canada, which admission was effected by Imperial Order in Council dated June 23, 1870, taking effect July 15, 1870. In consequence of doubts as to the legal validity of the Dominion Act of 1870, The Imperial Parliament passed an Act in 1871 making the Canadian Act valid and effectual.

PARLIAMENT OF CANADA

The Parliament of the Dominion of Canada consists of the Senate with 96 members and the House of Commons with 235 members, senators being appointed for life by the Governor-General and members of the House of Commons being elected by the people. The ordinary legal limit of duration for each parliament June 1, 1916, the duration of the 12th Parliament of Canada was extended until October 7, 1917. The 12th Parliament of Canada was dissolved by proclamation of the Governor-General on October 6, 1917, and the 13th Parliament of Canada was elected on December 17. 1917. A redistribution Act passed after each census readjusts the number of representatives in the House of Commons in accordance with rules laid down in Section 51 of the British North America Act, 1867, of the Imperial Parliament. These rules provide that the province of Quebec shall always have a fixed number of 65 members and that there shall be assigned to see of the thorn province. shall be assigned to each of the other provinces such a number of members as will bear the same proportion to the number of its population (ascertained by the census) as the number 65 bears to the population of Quebec. However by an amendment British North America Act passed by Imperial Par-liament in 1915, it was enacted that "notwithstanding Canada Year Book.

anything in the said Act, a province shall always be continued to a number of members in the House of Commons not less than the number of senators representing such province." As a consequence of this amendment the representation of Prince Edward Island has remained at 4 members.

THE SENATE

The numerical representation of the Senate by provinces is as follows: Prince Edward Island 4, Nova Scotia 10, New Brunswick 10, Quebec 24, Ontario 24, Manitoba, 6, Saskatchewan 6, Alberta 6, British Columbia, 6 Total 96.

HOUSE OF COMMONS

The representation of the people in the House of Commons has been governed by Acts of Dominion Parliament passed in 1903, 1904 and 1907. The provinces of Saskatchewan and Alberta were created by Acts of Dominion Parliament passed in 1905 and after the Northwest Census of 1906 the Representation Act was amended by an Act of April 27, 1907 which gave Saskatchewan ten members and Alberta seven members after the next ensuing election of October 26, 1908. The seven additional members thus given to Saskatchewan and Alberta brought the representation of Canada in the House of Commons up to 221. of Canada in the House of Commons up to 221. The Representation Act, 1914 which was assented to on June 12, 1914, came into operation for the election of the 13th Parliament of Canada. An amending Act and the Imperial Act 5-6, provides that the House of Commons shall consist of 235 members distributed by provinces as follows: Prince Edward Island 4, Nova Scotia 16, New Brunswick 11. Quebec 65, Ontario 82, Manitoba 15, Saskatchewan 16, Alberta 12, British Columbia 13 and Yukon Territory 1.

THE REPRESENTATION ACT, 1924
As a result of the census of 1921, a Bill for readjusting the representation in the House of Commons was first introduced 1923, but was not passed until the the close of the 1924 session. #### DOMINION FUEL BOARD

The Dominion Fuel Board was created upon the recommendation of the Minister of Mines in November 1922, primarily to instigate a thorough study of the underlying causes of recurring fuel shortages in Canada and of the methods by which they may be counteracted. It is composed of officers of the Departments of Mines and of the Interior. The personnel is designed to coalesce the facilities of various federal services in regard to geological, engineering and economic studies relating to the fuel problem, and to co-ordinate the results of other previous investigations, which, though conducted independently, have a common bearing upon that subject.

The Board is assisted in its investigations by technical officers of the Departments of Mines and the Interior whose special qualifications and facility

ties for dealing with fuel problems enable them to be of service. Such additional assistance as may be necessary for this work can also be obtained by the Chairman, Charles Camsell, Deputy Minister of

Since April, 1912, the Department of External Affairs has been under the control of the Prime Minister, who carries the added title of "Secretary of State for External Affairs." An important duty of the Department is the issuing of passports to British born subjects or to persons naturalized in the Dominion.

#### HEALTH

The Department of Health was constituted in June, 1919, (9-10 Geo. V. Chap. 24). It administers the Food and Drugs, Maple Products, Honey, Opium and Narcotic Drugs, Proprietary or Patent Medicines, Quarantine, Leprosy and Public Works Health Acts, and also Part V of the Canada Shipping Act relating to the care of sick and distressed mariners and the collection of Sick Mariners' Dues. It deals with all matters and questions relating to the promotion, or preservation of the health of the people of Canada, over which the Parliament of Canada has jurisdiction, particularly in the following:—Co-operation with the provincial and other health authorities in the promotion of child welfare and in combating Venereal Diseases; Maintenance of a Medical Research Standardizing and Testing Labora-In compating veneral Diseases; maintenance of a Medical Research Standardizing and Testing Laboratory; Immigration Medical Inspection; Pollution of Boundary Waters; and the supervision of sanitary conditions and hospitalization for employees on public works.

#### INDIAN AFFAIRS

The Department of Indian Affairs was constituted in May, 1880, (43 Vic. Chap. 28). Up to 1830 the administration of the Indians was of a military character. For six years after Confederation, Indian Affairs was attached to the Department of the Secretary of State. In 1873 it was transferred to the Department of the Interior, and finally in 1880 the separate Department of Indian Affairs was established under the direction of the Minister of the separate Department of Indian Analis was established under the direction of the Minister of the Interior. The Indians to-day number over 109,000 (including 6,703 Esquimeaux), and are located on over 4,900,000 acres, divided into about 1,500 Reserves. Two important features of the administration are education and farming; 315 Indian Schools of all decess are in practice. of all classes are in operation, working in conjunction with the various churches, educating over 13,000 pupils; while about 222,000 acres are under cultivation. The Indians' progress in farming has been steady from year to year. A further important part of the administration is the Indian Trust Fund, which on March 31st, 1925, amounted to \$12,124,389.17 and is maintained from a percentage of all sales or leases of land, timber, and mineral.

#### INSURANCE

The Department of Insurance was constituted in 1885 (49 Vic. Chap. 45). It is charged with the duty of enforcing the Insurance law in the operations of all corporations or individuals engaged in any class of Insurance business. 

The Department of the Interior was constituted in 1873, (36 Vic. Chap. 4), and originally had jurisdiction over the Northwest Territories, Dominion, Ordnance and Admiralty Lands, the Geological Survey and over the Indians. The scope of its duties in administering and developing the federal public domain has been greatly widened by the growth of the Dominion, particularly of the West.

The area under administration exceeds 2,000,000 square miles. Specialized management of the varied natural resources of these territories is furnished through ten major divisions of the Department in-cluding the Dominion Lands Branch, Forest Service, National Parks, Water Power and Reclamation Service, North-West Territories, Topographical, Geodetic and Boundary Surveys, Dominion Observatories, Natural Resources Intelligence Service, together with the financial and general administrative units.

#### ROYAL CANADIAN MOUNTED POLICE

In 1873 the North West Mounted Police was constituted, (36 Vic. Chap. 35), to provide Police protection in the unsettled portions of the North West. In 1906 the title "Royal" was given to the Force. In 1920 the title was changed to "Royal Canadian Mounted Police," and with it was amalgamated the Dominion Police. The beadquarters were from Regina to Ottawa and the Force may now be called upon to perform duties in any portion of the Dominion. The Force has made a notable record in the maintenance of law and order in the settlement of the vacant lands of the Dominion. The strength of the Force in April, 1920, when it was at its peak, was 1880. This number has now, been reduced to 1000.

#### MILITARY SERVICE

- Canadian Militia is composed of the 1. The Active Militia and Reserve.
- 2. The Active Militia consists of the Canadian Permanent Force and the Units of the Active Militia of the several branches of the Service which are organized and perform annual training.
- 3. The Reserve Militia consists of Reserve Units and of all able bodied citizens between the ages of 18 and 60 with the following exemptions: Members of the King's Privy Council of Canada; Judges of all Courts of Justice; Members of the executive Councils of Provinces; Deputy Ministers of the Executive Councils of Provinces; Deputy Ministers of the Federal and Provincial Governments; Clergy and Ministers of all denominations; Telegraph clerks in actual employment; Officers and clerks regularly employed in the collection of revenue; Wardens and officers of all

public prisons and lunatic asylums; Members of the Naval Militia; Members of the police force and fire brigade permanently employed in incorporated cities, towns and villages; Professors in colleges and universities and teachers in religious orders; Persons disabled by bodily or mental infirmity; The only son of a widow, being her only support; Pilots and apprentice pilots during the season of navigation; Persons who, from the doctrines of their religion, are averse to begging arms or rendering persons. religion, are averse to bearing arms or rendering personal military service, under such conditions as are

prescribed.

4. The Reserve Formations of the Active Militia, as distinguished from the Reserve Militia mentioned

in paragraph 3, comprise:

(a) Reserve units of City & Rural Corps.
(b) Reserve Depots as may be provided for in the establishments laid down for the Canadian

Militia.

(c) The Reserve of Officers.

5. The Permanent Force is a small body of all the duties are mainly to provide training Arms. Its duties are mainly to provide training depots and schools for the Non-Permanent Active Militia and the staffs necessary at Defence Head-

quarters and the Military Districts.
6. The Non-Permanent Active Militia is a force consisting of all branches of the service, its total authorized strength at present being 10,458 officers

and 111,461 other ranks.

(b) In addition to the above, authority exists for the formation of further units but their actual organization and recruiting of personnel is not to be

proceeded with at present.

(c) Roughly speaking, all branches and active units are organized upon the British Army system.

#### TERMS OF ENLISTMENT:

7. (a) Permanent and Non-Permanent Active Militia for a period of 3 years.
(b) Reserve Militia, for such period as is prescribed (namely, to age limit for various ranks).
The Permanent Active Militia is available

at all times for general service.

(d) The Governor-General in Council may place the Militia, or any part thereof, on active service anywhere in Canada, and also be-yond Canada, for the defence thereof, at any time when it appears advisable so to do by reason of emergency,

# BRANCH OF THE ROYAL CANADIAN AIR FORCE

#### THE AIR SERVICE

Under the Act creating the Department of Na-Under the Act creating the Department of Ma-tional Defence, the powers, duties and functions, vested in the Air Board by the Air Board Act, Statutes of 1919, are administered under the direction of the Minister of National Defence. The Air Ser-vices have been incorporated in the Department of Mational Defence size the passing of that Act in National Defence since the passing of that Act in 1922.

The Air Service has three functions:-

the air defence of the country.
the conduct of flying operations for the civil services of the Government.
the control of civil aviation.

All three functions are administered by the Director of the Royal Canadian Air Force, Group Captain J. S. Scott, M.C., A.F.C., A.D.C., who is responsible to the Chief of Staff for the execution of these duties.

The Royal Canadian Air Force consists of Head-quarters at Ottawa, and Units as follows:—

The Headquarters organization is divided into three branches:-

(b) Assistant Director, Technical and Equipment,—Wing Commander E. W. Stedman, O.B.E.
(c) Assistant Director and Secretary—Mr. J. A. Wilson, Civil Aviation and other civil duties.

Camp Borden, Ont. is the main training station; and the technical depot, including workshops and central stores, is at Ottawa. The units at Vancouver, High River, Winnipeg, Ottawa and Dartmouth, in addition to Air Force duties, have undertaken large programmes of civil operations, principally for the forestry and survey services of the Dominion Government ernment.

The total personnel employed number 84 officers, 360 men, and 16 civilians.

The control of civil aviation is under the direction of an officer of the Permanent Air Force, who is appointed as Acting Controller of Civil Aviation and is responsible for the technical work involved in the inspection, registration and licensing of aircraft and airharbours; and the examination and li-censing of commercial pilots and air engineers; also, other duties as called for in the Air Regulations.

As there has been little development of aviation as a means for the transportation of mails, supplies or passengers, the work of operating companies has largely been in connection with forest patrol and survey work for the Provincial Governments, lumber and pulp companies. Aerial photography is also beginning to play an important part in such

Selected Officers and Men of the R.C.N. are sent to England to attend special courses in the Training Schools of the Royal Navy, and a proportion are lent to H.M. Ships for training at sea. They thus obtain experience in every class of ship of war.

#### ROYAL CANADIAN NAVAL VOLUNTEER RESERVE

The R.C.N.V.R. was organized early in 1923, Company Headquarters being established at Char-lottetown, St. John, Halifax, Quebec, Montreal, Ottawa, Toronto, Hamilton, Winnipeg, Regina,

Saskatoon, Calgary, Edmonton, Vancouver and

Prince Rupert.

Period of enrolment in the Force is for three years. Men are required to attend a minimum of 30 drills annually at Company Headquarters for instruction in Naval subjects, rifle drill, etc.; they perform a minimum of two weeks' annual Naval training at Halifax or Esquimalt.

#### ROYAL CANADIAN NAVAL RESERVE

The Royal Canadian Naval Reserve is organized along the lines of the R.N.R. Headquarters are established and a Registrar appointed at Halifax, Lunenburg, St. John, Charlottetown, Montreal, Quebec, Victoria, Vancouver and Prince Rupert.

The North West Territories now consist of the Territories formerly known as Rupert's Land and the North The North West Territories now consist of the Territories formerly known as Rupert's Land and the North West Territories, except such portions thereof as form the Provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan, and Alberta, and the Yukon Territory; together with all British Territories and possessions in North America, and all islands adjacent thereto not included within any province, except the Dominion of Newfoundland and its dependencies. By Order in Council dated the 16th March, 1918, this area was subdivided into the provisional districts of Mackenzie, Keewatin and Franklin. The North West Territories are governed by a Commissioner and six Councillors appointed by the Governor General in Council. The Commissioner in Council has power to make ordinances for the Government of the Territories under directions from the Governor General in Council or the Minister of the Interior, who may authorize him to make ordinances respecting direct taxation within the Territories in order to raise revenue, etc. establishment and tenure of territorial offices and the appointment and Territories in order to raise revenue, etc., establishment and tenure of territorial offices, and the appointment and payment of officers, maintenance, etc., of prisons, municipal institutions, licenses, solemnization of marriage, property and civil rights, administration of justice and generally all matters of a merely local and private nature in the Territories.

On June 10th., 1925 the Congregational Denomination in Canada merged into The United Church of Canada, with the exception of the following three city churches:—Olivet Church, Toronto; Stratford; Bethel Church, Kingston; also three small rural fields in Ontario and three Swedish churches in the West.

#### THE UNITED CHURCH OF CANADA

The negotiations towards Church Union between the Congregational, Methodist and Presbyterian Churches began in 1899 when the Boards of Home Missions considered plans of cooperation in the mission fields of Western Canada. In 1902 the Methodist General Conference, in 1903 the Presbyterian General Assembly and the Congregational Union appointed Committees to consider organic union. The first Joint Committee on Church Union met in 1904, with the late Rev. Principal Caven, D.D., LL.D., the late Rev. Albert Carman, D.D., LL.D., and the late Rev. Hugh Pedley, D.D., Conveners for their respective Churches.

In 1908 the Joint Committee agreed upon a Basis of Union. Each of The Supreme Courts of the negotiating Churches considered this Basis and suggested amendments. The final draft was made in 1909, approved by these supreme Courts and in 1910 and 1911 submitted to the Presbyteries, Conferences and congregations in accordance with the constitutional requirements of the respective Churches. The votes of Church members were as follows:

Congregationalists - 2,833 For 813 Against

Methodists - 150,831 " 24,357 "

Presbyterians - 106,755 " 48,728 "

Subsequent to this vote the decision to unite with the other Churches was taken by the Congregational Union in 1911, the Methodist General Conference Special Committee in 1912, and the Presbyterian General Assembly in 1916, and thus form The United Church of Canada.

In 1924 the Parliament of Canada enacted "The United Church of Canada Act", incorporating the Church. Enabling Acts were subsequently enacted in all the Provincial Legislatures except Quebec, which it is expected (Oct. 1925) will enact the Bill during the next session.

The Union was consummated on June 10th, 1925, in Toronto when the services were in charge of Rev. Prof. W. H. Warriner, D.D., President Congregational Union; Rev. S. D. Chown, D.D., LL.D., General Superintendent Methodist Church; and Rev. George C. Pidgeon, D.D., Moderator, Presbyterian General Assembly. The General Council elected Rev. George C. Pidgeon, D.D., Moderator, and Rev. T. Albert Moore, D.D., Secretary. It appointed four Commissions to report to the next General Council concerning the permanent organization of the United Church and directed the present Boards and Committees to carry on the missionary, social, educational and benevolent work until permanent organization is effected. The approximate strength of The United Church of Canada is 8,806 congregations; 693,000 members; 4,500 ministers, including 650 foreign missionaries.

#### CHRISTIAN SCIENCE IN CANADA

The Church of Christ, Scientist, or Christian Science denomination in Canada, includes fifty-seven churches; five in Alberta, thirteen in British Columbia, four in Manitoba, two in New Brunswick, two in Nova Scotia twenty-four in Ontario, three in Province of Quebec, three in Saskatchewan, and one in Yukon territory. These regularly organized congregations are in the larger cities and towns, but there are many other Christian Science denomination in Canada is not separately organized. ### THE RELIGIOUS SOCIETY OF FRIENDS

(QUAKERS)

The Religious Society of Friends in Canada is primarily an offshoot of New York Yearly Meeting (established 1695), and of Philadelphia Yearly Meeting (established 1681). The majority of Quakers came from the United States to Upper Canada during the period 1784-1820. There are three branches of the Society in Canada: the "Hicksite Friends", "Orthodox Friends" and the "Wilburite", or "Conservative" Friends. These three divisions do not exist in England, but are peculiar to American Quakerism from which the Canadian branches have originated.

#### THE HICKSITE FRIENDS

Form a part of Genesee Yearly meeting of Friends, organized 1834, and held in 1925 at Coldstream, Ont. The Clerk of the Genesee Yearly Meeting is C. Harold Zavitz, R.R. 2, Ilderton, Ontario. Official Organ "The Friends' Intelligencer", published in Philadelphia. Meetings are maintained in Ontario at Yonge St. near Newmarket, Schomberg, Whitchurch, Bloomfield, Coldstream, Sparta, Pelham (a union meeting with the Orthodox branch). In 1890 the numbers of this Yearly Meeting were given as 1,535, out of a total of 21,356 members in America belonging to this branch of the Society.

#### THE ORTHODOX FRIENDS

Under the authority of the Canada Yearly Meeting of Friends first established at Pickering, Ontario in 1867. In 1925 the Yearly Meeting was held at 113 Maitland Street, Toronto, the Clerk of the Yearly Meeting being Arthur G. Dorland, University of Western Ontario, London, Ont. Representative on the Social Service Council of Ontario Albert S. Rogers, 103 Poplar Plains Road, Toronto. President of Friends' Missionary Society of Canada Yearly Meeting, Ella R. Firth, 3 May Square, Toronto. Bible School Superintendent and Representative on Religious Educational Council, Conran K. Hay, 113 Maitland Street, Toronto. Editor of "Canadian Friend" (Official Organ), Phoebe J. Wright, 113 Maitland Street, Toronto. Meetings are maintained in Vancouver, B.C.; Calgary, Alta.; Swarthmore, Sask.; Hartney, Man.; and in Ontario at Toronto, Newmarket, Pelham, Rockwood, Beaconsfield, Uxbridge, Pickering, Hibbert, Wellington, Moscow, Sunbury and elsewhere. In 1904 the numbers were given as 1,122, out of a total of 92,265 members in America belonging to this branch.

#### THE "WILBURITE" OR "CONSERVATIVE FRIENDS"

From 1881 to 1918 Yearly Meetings were held at Pickering, Ont.; but more recently at Norwich. The Clerk of the Yearly Meeting is Mordecai F. Starr, Newmarket, Ont. Meetings are maintained in Ontario at Yonge Street near Newmarket, Pickering, Mariposa, Wellington, Norwich; and Winnipeg, Man. The last available statistics in 1899 give their numbers as 316, out of a total of 4,329 members in America belonging to this branch of the Society. There are therefore, counting all three branches, about 2,800 members of the Society of Friends in Canada.

### THE LAW OF INTESTATES ESTATES PROVINCE OF ONTARIO

### DESCENT AND DISTRIBUTION OF PROPERTY

As to all persons who died before the first day of January, 1852, the rules of descent are substantially the same as in England at that date.

Real estate of persons who died intestate (i.e., who have left no will) after that date and prior to the first day of July, 1886, descends first to lineal descendants and those claiming by or under them perstirpes, second to father, third to mother, and fourth to collateral relatives, subject to certain rules and regulations prescribed in the statute.

The surplus personal estate of intestates who died prior to the first day of July, 1886, is, after the expiration of one full year from the death of the intestate, to be distributed in the following manner: One-third shall go to the widow of the intestate, and the residue in equal proportions to his children, or if dead, to their lineal descendants; if there are no children or legal representatives subsisting, then where the net value of the real and personal estate does not exceed \$1,000, same belongs absolutely to the widow, and as to any excess over and above said amount after payments of debts, etc., the widow takes a moiety, and the other moiety goes to the next of kindred, in equal degree, and their representatives; if no widow, all to children; if neither widow nor children, all to next of kin, in equal degree, and their representatives. But no representation is admitted among collaterals further than children of intestate's brothers and sisters.

All real and personal property of persons dying on or after the 1st day of July, 1886, devolves upon and becomes vested in the legal personal representatives for the period of three years (which may be extended in a prescribed manner) subject to the payment of debts and to the effectual dispositions of deceased. The real and personal property of a married woman, in respect of which she has died intestate, shall be distributed as follows: One-third to her husband, if she leaves issue, and one-half if she leaves none, and subject thereto, shall go as if her husband had predeceased her. The realty and personalty comprised in a residuary devise or bequest is (unless the will otherwise directs) applicable ratably according to their respective value to the payment of the debts.

### COPYRIGHT IN CANADA

COPYRIGHT IN CANADA

The new Canadian Copyright Act which was passed on 4th June, 1921 and amended on 13th June, 1923, came into force on 1st January, 1924. On the same date a reciprocal arrangement between Canada and the United States became effective, the Minister having issued a certificate under subsection (2) of section 4 of the Copyright Act, 1921, extending the Act to the United States and the President of that country having issued a proclamation extending to Canada the protection and the President of that country having issued a proclamation extending to Canada the protection afforded by the copyright legislation of the United States. On the same date Canada's adherence to the Revised Convention of Berne and the extension of the British Copyright Act, 1911, became effective. This Act introduces an entirely new principle into Copyright law inasmuch as it makes provision for licenses to enable Canadian publishers to publish in Canada certain books which have not been printed in Canada.

The following is a summary of some of the principal provisions of the Act, but persons interested are

provisions of the Act, but persons interested are advised to obtain a copy of the Act which may be had on application to the Trade Mark and Copyright Branch, Patent and Copyright Office, Ottawa.

COPYRIGHT DEFINED

Section 3 defines Copyright as follows:
For the purposes of this Act, "copyright" means the sole right to produce or reproduce the work or any substantial part thereof in any material form whatsoever, to perform, or in the case of a lecture to deliver the work or any substantial part thereof in deliver, the work or any substantial part thereof in public; if the work is unpublished, to publish the work or any substantial part thereof; and shall include the sole right,

(a) to produce, reproduce, perform or publish any translation of the work;

translation of the work;

(b) in the case of a dramatic work, to convert it into a novel or other non-dramatic work;

(c) in the case of a novel or other non-dramatic work, or of an artistic work, to convert it into a dramatic work, by way of performance in public or otherwise;

(d) in the case of a literary, dramatic, or musical work, to make any record, perforated roll, cinematograph film, or other contrivance by means of which the work may be mechanically performed or delivered; and to authorize any ach acts as aforesaid.

such acts as aforesaid.

WORKS IN WHICH COPYRIGHT MAY SUBSIST Section 4 contains particulars of the conditions for

obtaining copyright:

obtaining copyright:
Subject to the provisions of this Act, copyright shall subsist in Canada for the term hereinafter mentioned, in every original literary, dramatic, musical and artistic work, if the author was at the date of the making of the work a British subject, a citizen or subject of a foreign country which has adhered to the Berne Convention or resident within His Majesty's Dominions; and if, in the case of a published work, the work was first published within His Majesty's Dominions or in such foreign country; but in no other works, except so far as the protection conferred by this Act is extended as hereinafter provided to foreign countries to which this Act does not extend. not extend.

Under sub-section 2, the minister may by notice in the Canada Gazette extend the above privilege to other countries under certain conditions.

Sub-section 3 covers copyright in mechanical musical contrivances.

Copyright shall subsist for the term hereinafter mentioned in records, perforated rolls, and other contrivances by means of which sounds may be mechanically reproduced, in like manner as if such contrivances were musical, literary of dramatic works.

TERM OF COPYRIGHT The term for which copyright shall subsist shall, except as otherwise expressly provided by this Act, be the life of the author and a period of fifty years

after his death.

There is a proviso permitting re-publication of copyright works after 25 years after the death of an author under certain conditions as to the payment of royalties, etc., under regulations made by the Governor in Council.

In the case of a work of joint authorship, copyright shall subsist during the life of the author who first dies and for a term of fifty years after his death, or during the life of the author who dies last, whichever

The term for which copyright shall subsist in photographs shall be fifty years from the making of the original negative from which the photograph was directly or indirectly derived.

The term for which copyright shall subsist in records, perforated rolls and other contrivances by means of which sounds may be mechanically reproduced shall be fifty years from the making of the original plate from which the contrivance was directly or indirectly derived.

#### COMPULSORY LICENSES

If, at any time after the death of the author of a literary, dramatic, or musical work which has been literary, dramatic, or musical work which has been published or performed in public, a complaint is made to the Governor in Council that the owner of the copyright in the work has refused to republish or to allow the republication of the work or has refused to allow the performance in public of the work, and that by reason of such refusal the work is withheld from the public, the owner of the copyright may be ordered to grant a license to reproduce the work or perform the work in public, as the case may be, on such terms and subject to such conditions may be, on such terms and subject to such conditions as the Governor in Council may think fit.

#### LICENSES

The following provisions contained in sections 13 and 14 are those introducing an entirely new principle into Canadian Copyright Law and are those which gave rise to so much controversy when the Act was under consideration.

Under the amendment these clauses are not to apply to "Any work the author of which is a British Subject, other than a Canadian citizen, or the subject or citizen of a country which has adhered to the Berne Convention." Some of the most important provisions under this section are as follows:

(1) Any person may apply to the Minister for a license to print and publish in Canada any book wherein copyright subsists, if at any time after publication and within the duration of the copyright the owner of the copyright fails:

(a) to print the said book or cause the same to be

printed in Canada;

(b) to supply by means of copies so printed the reasonable demands of the Canadian market for such book.

(2) Such application may be in such form as may be prescribed by the regulations and shall state the proposed retail price of the edition of such book

proposed retail price of the edition of such book proposed to be printed.

(3) Every applicant for a license under this section shall with his application deposit with the Minister an amount not less than ten per cent of the retail selling price of one thousand copies of such book and not less than one hundred dollars and such amount shall, if such application is unsuccessful be returned to such applicant less such deductions for fees as may be authorized by the regulations.

(4) Notice of such application shall forthwith be communicated by the Minister to the owner of the copyright in such manner as may be prescribed by the regulations.

(5) If the owner of the copyright shall not within a delay to be fixed by the regulations after communication of such notice give an undertaking, with such prescribed by the regulations, security as may be prescribed by the regulations, to procure within two months after the date of such communication the printing in Canada of an edition of not less than one thousand copies of such book, of not less than one thousand copies of such book, the Minister in his discretion may grant to the applicant a license to print and publish such book upon terms to be determined by the Minister after hearing the parties or affording them such opportunity to be heard as may be fixed by the regulations.

Provision is made for the Minister to decide in case two or more persons apply for the same license, also for conditions of publication and royalty to be raid the author

paid the author.

The licensee must undertake to publish an edition of not less than 1000 copies, and to print the whole book without alteration or abbreviation.

SERIAL LICENSE

Section 14 makes provision for serial licenses under similar conditions to book licenses.

INFRINGEMENT OF COPYRIGHT
Copyright in a work shall be deemed to be infringed by any person who, without the consent of the owner of the copyright, does anything the sole right to do which is by this Act conferred on the owner of the copyright:

The Act makes a number of important exceptions from infringement which are too lengthy to be

quoted here.

REMEDIES FOR INFRINGEMENT

Sections 19 to 25 give the particulars of remedies that may be obtained by the owner of a copyright when his copyright has been infringed.

IMPORTATION OF COPIES

Copies made out of Canada of any work in which copyright subsists which if made in Canada would infringe copyright and as to which the owner of the copyright gives notice in writing to the Department of Customs that he is desirous that such copies should not be so imported into Canada, shall not be

where the owner of the copyright has by license or otherwise granted the right to reproduce any book in Canada, or where a license to reproduce such book has been granted under sections twelve or thirteen,

has been granted under sections twelve or thirteen, it shall not be lawful except as provided in subsection three to import into Canada copies of such book.

Except as provided in subsection three, it shall be unlawful to import into Canada copies of any book in which copyright subsists until fourteen days after publication thereof and during such period or any extension thereof such copies shall be probihited.

Provided that if within the said period of fourteen

days an application for a license has been made in accordance with the provisions of section thirteen, the Minister may in his discretion extend the said period and the prohibition against importation shall be continued accordingly.

#### EXCEPTIONS

Sub-section three referred to above makes provision for the importation of single copies for certain specified purposes.

#### ADMINISTRATION, ETC.

The remainder of the Act provides for the Administration of the law and for Registration of Copyrights and specifies the following fees.

#### REPEAL OF CERTAIN ACTS

All the enactments relating to copyright passed by the Parliament of the United Kingdom are, so far as they are operative in Canada, hereby repealed. Provided that this repeal shall not prejudicially affect any legal rights existing at the time of the

The Copyright Act, chapter seventy of the Revised Statutes of Canada, 1906, and chapter seventeen of the statutes of 1908, are also repealed.

### PATENTS IN CANADA

The Patent Act, chapter 23 of the Statutes of 1923, was passed on the 13th June 1923, and by proclamation published in the Canada Gazette on the 7th July, 1923, was brought into force on the 1st September, 1924. This Act repealed the Patent Act, chapter 69, R.S.C., 1906. The Rules and Regulations and Forms under the new Act which were approved by the Governor in Council on the 27th July, 1923 also became effective on the 1st September, 1924, and on the same date, Canada's adherence to the International Convention for the Protection of Industrial Property was secured. The principal provisions of this Act are given below.

The Commissioner of Patents-Ottawa-receives all applications and has charge of all records.

Any person who has invented any new and useful art, machine, manufacture or composition of matter, or any new and useful improvement thereof not known or used by any other person before his invention thereof and not patented or described in any printed publication in this or any foreign country more than two years prior to his application, and not in public use or sale in Canada for more than two years prior to his application for patent therefor in Canada, may on a petition to that effect, presented to the Commissioner, and on compliance with the other requirements of the Act, obtain a patent granting to such person an exclusive property in such invention.

No patent shall issue for an invention which has an illicit object in view, or for any mere scientific principle

or abstract theorem.

Any inventor who elects to obtain a patent for his invention in a foreign country before obtaining a patent therefor in Canada may obtain a patent in Canada if applied for within one year from the earliest date on which an application for a foreign patent was filed or from 13th June, 1923, if no foreign patent had been issued for more than one year.

An application for patent filed in Canada by any person who has previously filed an application for patent for the same invention in a foreign country which by treaty, convention or law offers similar privilege to citizens of Canada shall have the same force and effect as the same application would have if filed in Canada on the date on which said foreign application was first filed in such foreign country provided the application in Canada is filed within twelve months from the earliest date on which any such foreign application was filed or from the 13th June, 1923. But no patent shall be granted on an application for patent for an invention which had been patented or described in a patent or printed publication in this or any foreign country more than two years before the date of filing of the application in Canada or which had been in public use or on sale in Canada for more than two years prior to such filing.

Every inventor shall, before a patent can be obtained, make oath or affirmation that he verily believes he is the inventor and that the several allegations in his petition are true.

Any person who has invented any improvement on any patented invention, may obtain a patent for such improvement; but he shall not thereby obtain the right of vending or using the original invention, nor shall the patent for the original invention confer the right of vending or using the patented improvement.

In the event of the inventor being dead or mentally or physically incapable, or if after the assignment of his invention the inventor refuses to make such oath or affirmation or if his whereabouts cannot be ascertained after diligent enquiries such oath or affirmation shall be made by the applicant and shall state that he verily believes that the person whose assignee or legal representative he is was the inventor and that the several allegations in the petition are true.

In any case where:-

(a) an applicant has agreed in writing to assign a patent when granted to another party or a joint applicant and refuses to proceed or (b) disputes arise between joint applicants; the Commissioner on proof of such agreement or being satisfied that one or more of such joint applicants ought to be allowed to proceed alone may allow such other party or joint applicant to proceed and may grant a patent to him. All parties, however, shall be entitled to be heard before the Commissioner after notice and an appeal from his decision lies to the Exchequer Court.

Every applicant shall state in his application, if resident in Canada, his address therein and if not so resident the name and address of some person resident in Canada to represent him for all purposes including the service of any proceedings taken under the Act. He shall also insert in his petition the title or name of his invention and send in a specification in duplicate thereof with an additional or third copy of the claim or claims.

The specification shall correctly and fully describe the invention and its operation or use as contemplated by the inventor. It shall set forth clearly the various steps in a process, or the method of constructing, making or compounding, a machine, manufacture, or composition of matter. It shall end with a claim or claims stating distinctly the things or combinations which the applicant regards as new and in which he claims an exclusive property and privilege.

Such specification shall bear the name of the place where, and the date when it is made and shall be signed by the applicant.

In the case of a machine or in any other case in which the invention admits of illustration by means of drawings, the applicant shall also send in drawings in duplicate showing clearly all parts of the invention; and each drawing shall bear the signature of the inventor, or of the applicant, or of their attorney, and shall have written references corresponding with the specification. The Commissioner may require further drawings or dispense with any of them.

One duplicate of the specification and of the drawings shall be annexed to the patent, of which it shall form an essential part.

In all cases in which the invention admits of representation by model, the applicant, if required by the Commissioner, shall furnish a model of convenient size exhibiting its several parts in due proportion; and when the invention is a composition of matter, the applicant, if required by the Commissioner, shall furnish specimens of the ingredients, and of the composition sufficient in quantity for the purpose of experiment. If such ingredients or composition be of an explosive or dangerous character, they shall be furnished with such precautions as are prescribed in the requisition therefor.

In the case of inventions relating to substances prepared or produced by chemical processes and intended for food or medicine the specification shall not include claims for the substance itself except when prepared or produced by the special methods or processes of manufacture described and claimed or by their obvious chemical equivalents; provided, that, in an action for infringement of a patent where the invention relates to the production of a new substance, any substance of the same chemical composition and constitution shall in the absence of proof to the contrary be deemed to have been produced by the patented process.

In the case of any patent for an invention intended for or capable of being used for the preparation or production of food or medicine, the Commissioner shall, unless he sees good reason to the contrary, grant to any person applying for the same a license limited to the use of the invention for the purposes of the preparation or production of food or medicine, but not otherwise; the Commissioner has power to settle the terms of such license and fix the amount of royalty or other consideration payable and his decision shall be final subject to appeal to the Exchequer Court.

The Commissioner may object to grant a patent whenever he is satisfied that the applicant is not by law entitled thereto or when the invention has already been patented in which case he shall notify the applicant stating grounds or reason therefor and every applicant who has failed to obtain a patent by reason of the objection of the Commissioner may at any time within six months after notice thereof has been mailed to him or his agent by registered letter appeal from said decision to the Exchequer Court.

In case of conflicting applications for any patent provision is made for submitting same to the arbitration of three skilled persons, two of whom shall be chosen by the applicants, one by each, and the third by the Commissioner and the decision or award of such arbitrators, or any two of them, shall be final as far as concerns the granting of the patent.

Every patent granted in respect of an invention made by a person while employed in the public service of Canada and relating to the nature of his employment shall be subject to restrictions set out in the Act as to the patentee allowing others to make use of the patented invention without the consent of the Commissioner.

The term limited for the duration of every patent of invention is eighteen years.

Whenever any patent is deemed defective or inoperative by reason of insufficient description or specification, or by reason of the patentee claiming more or less than he had a right to claim as new, but at the same it appears that the error arose through inadvertence, accident or mistake, without any fraudulent or deceptive intention, the Commissioner may on the surrender of such patent, within four years from its date or within one year from the 13th June, 1923, and upon payment of a further fee of \$30.00 cause a new patent to be issued.

The patent may be assigned, but same unless duly registered in the Patent Office shall be null and void as against any subsequent assignee.

Every person who, without the consent in writing of the Patentee, makes, constructs, or puts into practice any invention for which a patent has been obtained, or who procures such invention from any person not authorized by the patentee, and who uses it, shall be liable to the patentee, or his legal representative, in damages.

Any action for infringement of the patent may be brought in any Court of record having jurisdiction to the amount of the damages claimed in the Province in which the infringement is alleged to have taken place. Proceedings may also be taken in the Exchequer Court, which has jurisdiction over the entire Dominion of Canada.

Every patent shall be subject to the following conditions:—

- (a) The patentee shall satisfy the reasonable requirements of the public with reference to his patent and shall adequately manufacture the patented article or carry on the patented process within Canada.
- (b) Any person interested may present a petition to the Commissioner alleging same has not been done and asking that the patentee be ordered to supply the patented article at a reasonable price or grant licenses for the use thereof on reasonable terms.
- (c) The Commissioner shall then consider the petition and after hearing the parties may grant relief.

Such order shall not be made, however, before the expiration of three years from the date of the patent and not less than one year from the 13th June, 1923. The Commissioner, however, with the approval of the Minister, instead of hearing and determining the matter himself, may refer the petition to the Exchequer Court.

At any time not less than three years after the date of a patent and not less than one year after the 13th June, 1923, any person may apply to the Commissioner for the revocation of the patent on the ground that the patented article or process is manufactured or carried on exclusively or mainly outside Canada and the Com-

missioner may make an order revoking the patent forthwith or after such reasonable interval as may be mentioned in the order.

Where any patent has become void under prior Patent Act for non-payment of fees or failure to construct or manufacture or because of importation of the invention the patentee may within two years from the date of such voidance apply to the Commissioner for an order for the restoration and revival of the patent.

Every patentee shall stamp or engrave on each patented article sold or offered for sale by him the year of the date of the patent of such article, thus:—"Patented 1923," or as the case may be; or when, from the nature of the article, this cannot be done, then by affixing to it, or to every package where one or more of such articles is or are enclosed, a label marked with a like notice. For violation of this provision there is imposed a penalty not exceeding \$100.00, and, in default of payment thereof, imprisonment for a term not exceeding two months.

Falsely marking an article as patented with the intent of counterfeiting or imitating the stamp, mark, or device of the patent of another person, or of deceiving the public, or offering for sale as patented any article not patented in Canada, is a misdemeanour, and for which there is a fine not exceeding \$200.00, or imprisonment for a term not exceeding three months, or both.

Any intending applicant for a patent who has not yet perfected his invention, and is in fear of being despoiled of his idea, may file in the Patent Office a description of his invention so far as it has proceeded, with or without plans, at his own will, and the Commissioner, on payment of the prescribed fee, shall cause the said document, which shall be called a caveat, to be preserved in secrecy, and, if application is made by any other person for a patent interfering in any way therewith, the Commissioner shall forthwith give notice, by mail, of such application to the person filing such caveat, who shall, within three months thereafter, if he wishes to avail himself of the caveat, file his petition, and take the other steps necessary on an application for a patent. The application for the patent must be made within one year from filing of caveat, otherwise the Commissioner is relieved from the obligation of giving notice.

The Government of Canada may, at any time, use any patented invention by paying to the Patentee such sum as the Commissioner reports to be a reasonable compensation for the use thereof.

All specifications, drawings, models, disclaimers, judgments, and other papers, except caveats, shall be open to the inspection of the public at the Patent Office, under such regulations as are adopted in that behalf.

The following fees shall be payable before an application for any of the purposes herein mentioned shall be received by the Commissioner, that is to say:-On filing an application for patent, \$15.00; on grant of patent, \$20.00; (Payable on pain of forfeiture within six months from the date of notice of the allowance of patent). On lodging a caveat, \$5.00; on asking to register a judgment pro tanto, \$4.00; on asking to register an assignment, or any other document affecting or relating to a patent, \$2.00; for each and every patent mentioned in any notice given to the Commissioner by the Inventorafter the issue of a foreign patent of his invention to apply for a patent in Canada for such invention, \$2.00; on asking to attach a disclaimer to a patent, \$2.00; on asking for a copy of patent with specifications, \$4.00; on petition to re-issue a patent after surrender, \$30.00; on filing an application for restoration and renewal of a patent \$35.00; on office copies of documents, not above mentioned, the following charges shall be made: for every single or first folio of one hundred words, certified copy, \$0.25; for every such subsequent folio, fractions of or under one-half not being counted, and of one-half or more being counted as a folio, \$0.10.

# SUCCESSION DUTIES IN CANADA

It is somewhat outside the scope of The Canadian Almanac to give the complete text of the Succession Duty Acts of the various Provinces of Canada. A resumé of the Ontario Act is here given, and, in addition, tables showing rates of duty applicable in the other Provinces, together with certain surtaxes and exemptions, in the case of beneficiaries related in the direct line or by marriage, the exact relationship being shown at the head of each column.

In addition to the rates shown, there are higher rates applicable where herefrieders are listed.

In addition to the rates shown, there are higher rates applicable where beneficiaries are less directly connected, and in some Provinces, surtaxes are imposed where individual bequests or the value of estates

exceed certain sums.

### SUCCESSION DUTIES, ONTARIO

Property consisting of real and personal property of every description and every estate and interest therein capable of being devised or bequeathed by will or of passing on the death of the owner to his heirs and representatives is subject to Succession Duty, and the value thereof is taken on the basis of the fair market value as on the date of the death of the deceased, less an allowance for reasonable funeral expenses, debts and encumbrances and Surrogate Court Fees.

No duty shall be leviable:-

(a) On any estate the aggregate value of which does

not exceed \$5,000.

(b) On property passing by will, intestacy or otherwise to or for the benefit of the grandfather, grandmother, father, mother, husband, wife, child, daughterin-law, or son-in-law of the deceased where the aggregate value of the property of the deceased does not exceed \$25,000.
(c) Where the whole value of any property passing to

any one person does not exceeed \$300.

(d) On property devised or bequeathed for religious, charitable or educational purposes to be carried out in Ontario or by a corporation or a person resident in Ontario or on the amount of any unpaid subscription for any like purpose made by any person in his lifetime to any corporatior or person mentioned in this subsection for which his estate is liable.

(e) On any bond, debenture or debenture stock issued by a corporation having its head office in Ontario, transferable on a register at any place out of Ontario and which is owned by a person not domiciled at the time

of his death in Ontario.

No duty shall be payable in respect of any property:-(a) Given absolutely more than three years before the death of the donor to a child, son-in-law or daughterin-law, or to the father or mother of the donor to the value or amount of \$20,000 in the aggregate among all of them.

- (b) Given by the donor in his lifetime and not exceeding in value the sum of \$500 in the case of any one donee, or
- (c) Actually and bona fide transferred for full consideration in money or money's worth paid to the transferor for his own use and benefit.

Subject to the above the following duties are payable:-1. Every person applying for Letters Probate or Letters of Administration to the estate of the deceased person must file with the Surrogate Registrar within six months after the death of the deceased or such later time as may be allowed by the Provincial Treasurer, a statement duly verified containing a full inventory in detail of all the property of the deceased and the fair market value thereof at the date of his death as well as showing every person to whom the same passed with their places of residence and degree of relationship in which they stand to the deceased. Provision is also made for subsequent collection of duty on any property not disclosed therein. The provisions of the Act apply to transfers of property other than for valuable consideration made since 1st July, 1892.

Property outside as well as that within Ontario must he set out and if Succession Duties are payable to any

Property outside as well as that within Ontario must be set out and if Succession Duties are payable to any other Province or Country with which Ontario has a reciprocal arrangement for so doing, a rebate of the duty on such outside property will be allowed.

No foreign executor can assign or transfer any bond,

debenture, stock or share in any bank or other corporation having its head office in Ontario, standing in the name of the deceased person until the duty has been paid and if such bank or corporation permits same it shall be liable for said duty.

The duty may be paid within eighteen months after the death of the deceased without interest, but if not then paid, interest at five per cent per annum will be charged from date of death until the duty is paid. Instead of paying duty security may be given therefor to the satisfaction of the Provincial Treasurer. The executor is prohibited from paying or handing over any property to any of the beneficiaries until payment of duties, but should he do so the duty thereon with an additional rate of fifty per cent. is recoverable against him. Each beneficiary is liable for the duty upon the property passing to him. Power is given to any person liable to pay duty to raise same by sale, mortgage, or lease of the property vested in him or under his control.

The Provincial Treasurer has power to remit duty in cases of persons killed while on active military or naval service.

Where an estate includes Ontario securities issued under provisions exempting them from succession duty, the Treasurer may require that such securities form part of payment of succession duties.

There are a number of provisions in the Statute as to the mode of ascertaining the value of property, the amount of duty thereon and the payments thereof and it would be generally advisable to consult a Solicitor to prevent complication and delay.

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

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# LIFE ASSURANCE IN CANADA

The business of life assurance in Canada during the year 1924, was conducted by 44 active companies—28 Canadian, 7 British, 9 Foreign.

#### NEW ASSURANCES EFFECTED

In the year under review, the new policies effected amounted to \$628,687,615, an increase from those taken out in the preceding year of \$67,505,188. The respective amounts effected in each of the three classes of companies were:

It will be observed that the business of the Canadian companies exceeded that of the British and United States together by \$173,341,187.

#### TOTAL ASSURANCE IN FORCE

The net amount of life assurance in force December 31st, 1924, amounted to \$3,763,996,472 an increase over that of the previous year of no less than \$330,487,799. The distribution is shown as follows:

From \$135,453,726 in 1884 to \$3,763,996,472 in 1924, represents the large increase of over 2678% in forty years.

#### DEATH RATE

The death rate in the several classes of companies was determined approximately by a comparison of the mean number of policies in force with the number of policies which became claims by death. The death rate thus ascertained for 1924 was 6.8, a decrease below the average rate for the preceding four years. The total death claims paid from all causes amounted in the year 1924 to \$20,210,118. The following table gives the rate for each of the years 1920-21-22-23-24:

# ASSETS, LIABILITIES, NEW ASSURANCES, CANADIAN COMPANIES

In determining the relative merits of life assurance companies, a number of factors must be considered. The expense rate, interest rate, rate of mortality experienced, class of investments, character of the men who compose the directorate, and the officers should be considered, etc. Because a company's assets, new assurances, or total assurances in force may run into large figures, these in themselves would not necessarily determine the superiority of the company. As a matter of reference, however, the following items are given for Canadian companies with Dominion charters for the year ending December 31st, 1924:

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ROYAL ONTARIO MUSEUM OF ARCHÆOLOGY-Prof. C. T. Currelly, O. Medj., M.A., F.R.S.C., Director. Miss Cornelia G. Harcum, Ph.D., Keeper of Classical Collections.

The museum possesses large collections that show the primitive skill of the men in the Palæolithic, Neolithic, Copper, and Bronze ages. The early grain civilizations are illustrated in three galleries of Babylonian and Egyptian objects; the classical period occupies two galleries, and ethnology and the American Indian three. Of civilization later than that of Rome special attention has been given to the collection of arms, glazed earthenware, Chinese ceramics, Japanese work, woodwork and furniture, textiles, embroideries and laces.

The collections have been formed to teach as far as

possible the history of mechanical work, and to be a stimulus to the modern worker.

ROYAL ONTARIO MUSEUM OF GEOLOGY—Professor E. S. Moore, M. A., Ph. D., Director.

The exhibits are arranged chiefly on an economic The exhibits are arranged chiefly on an economic basis, sections being devoted to ores, fuels, ceramics, building stones, abrasives, refractories, etc. Especial attention has been directed to building and ornamental stones, copper, nickel, silver and gold ores and Canadian coals. The economic geology of famous mining regions is illustrated by suites of specimens among which the series from the nickel region of Sudbury and the Cobalt silver area are particularly complete. Glacial geology has received particular attention: striated surfaces, striated stones, and tillites are represented from all the known stones, and tillites are represented from all the known Ice ages and from all parts of the world.

ROYAL ONTARIO MUSEUM OF MINERALOGY—Professor T. L. Walker, Ph.D., F.G.S., Director. Prof. A. L. Parsons, B. A., Assistant Director.

This museum contains an unusually complete series of minerals from all parts of the world as well as a special collection of Canadian minerals for consultation by visitors particularly interested in the minerals and ores of Canada. The museum also contains collections of crystals, rocks, meteorites, radium minerals, and rocks from Antarctica.

A large part of these collections has been presented by persons connected with the mining industry.

ROYAL ONTARIO MUSEUM OF PALÆONTOLOGY-Professor

W. A. Parks, Ph.D., F.G.S.A., Director.

The museum contains extensive series of Invertebrate fossils arranged to illustrate the anatomy and classification of the different zoological branches, and to indicate the important faunas of the geological ages. Vertebrate fossils are represented by striking reptiles and by an excellent collection of fishes. The mounted skeletons of dinosaurs from Alberta are a feature of especial importance. Fossil plants are shown by good series of Carboniferous, Cretaceous, and Interglacial forms. The collections contain also a special Canadian series designed for the use of students of Canadian geology.

Much unique material is included in the exhibits, and many type specimens of particular value, e.g., Matthew's types of Cambrian fossils from eastern Canada and type dinosaurs from the Cretaceous formations of Alberta.

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
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
